WAR BETWEEN THE TWO IN-EVITABLE.

Sofia, Sept. 1.-Both in official and reely held that war between Turkey reely held that war between Turkey and Bulgaria is imminent, and can be verted by nothing short of a miracle. It is not expected that either Government will formally declare hostilities, but that the prevailing conditions will force on a war.

There is no question that large numbers of insurgents have recently crossed the frontier. An extensive out-break in northern Macedonia is possible. The Autonomie prints a telesible. The Autonomie prints a telegram from Constantinople, declaring that the Sultan, influenced by the counsels of Germany, now favors a warwith Bulgaria. The Turks here, however, take an optimistic view, asserting that there is no danger of a war, as Turkey does not desire one and Prince Ferdinand and the present Bulgarian Government are not in a position to force hostilities.

The Bulgarian Agent at Uskub reserved.

The Bulgarian Agent at Uskub reports that the detachment of Turkish troops sent to garrison the small towns in that vilayet have spread destruction along their route; the villagers have been robbed and beaten, the women violated, and the Christian population subjected to every conceivable outrage, while the local authorities appear to be helpless to stop the atrocties. At the village of Drachevo, six miles from Uskub, the soldiers attacked all the peasants without the gendarmes intertering on behalf of the latter. The Bulgarian Agents report similar excesses in many other villages, and the position of the Bulgarian residents is reported to be terrible, as the cruelities committed by the Turkish authorities exceed all limit.

The Macedonian leaders claim that an aggregate of 2,000 Bulgarians have crossed the frontier in small parties and joined the insurgents during the past ten days. Gen. Zondieff, the President of the Macedonian Committee, and Col. Jankoff, one of the revolutionary leaders, who are now in Macedonia, send word that the insurgent forces number 12,000 to \$5,000 men. They expect that a general insurrection will be proclaimed this week.

Salonica, Sept. 1.— The Turks have occupied Klissura, Albania, recently raided by insurgents, without resistance. A number of Bulgarian villages in the vicinity were burned. Inspector-General Hilm Pasha recently sent a deputation, composed of hive Christians and five Turks to offer amnesty to the insurgents on condition that they lay down their arms before the Sultan's coronation. #### THEY ARE STILL IN THE DARK

Seven ministers of the Crown, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir William Mulock, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon Clifford Sifton, Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick have spoken on the new railway policy. Not one of the seven ministers has thrown a ray of light on the subject. Not one of them can say within \$10,000,000 what the road from Quebec to Winnipeg will cost. They have been challenged time and again to do so but on every occasion have been forced to admit that the Government has no surveys of the route over which it is proposed to run the new trans-continental railway. Nothing is known as to the grades that will be encountered. There is no data as to the character of the country to be traversed. The line may have to cross mountains, lakes, rivers and swamps for all the Government knows. Yet away they go plunging into the dark. Two of their former colleagues-Hon. A. G. Blair and Hon. J. Israel Tarte-have prayed for delay and deliberation before the credit of the country is pledged to support a deal of which so little is known. But Sir Wilfrid Laurier refuses to adopt common sense, business methods. He has promised his friends to pay up and his friends in return are willing to hand back a certain amount for campaign purposes. That is why the Premier persists on remaining in the dark. But the delay of reckoning is coming and the people of Canada will bring light to bear on the project, when the Government has sufficient courage to appeal to the



The name of this to her doom. The name of this chief conspirator against the Obre-novitch dynasty is Alexander Mas-chin, who became the implacable en-my of Queen Draga when she was still plain Draga Maschin, wife of his brother. As soon as Draga, after years of scheming, captured the af-fections of the young King and be-came his Queen in defiance of public sentiment in Servia, she speedily brought about the downfall of her



old enemy. Colonel Maschin lost all is appointments, was looked upon with suspicion and disfavor by King Alexander and was in disgrace spite the fact that he still held rank in the Servian army. Queen Draga was a good hater and

dangerous enemy, but she to have more than met her match in the person of Maschin. In revenge for the slights that had been put upon him he seems to have used all his influence to inflame his brother officers against the royal couple, were none too popular already, and when the conspiracy against them was organized he was its chief. On the night of June 10 he gave his the night of June 10 he gave his final instructions to the plotters at a tavern named the Servian Crown and then led them to the palace, where, it is said, he even took a personal part in the butchery of the King and Queen. When the couple concealed themselves it was Colonel Maschin who searched for them with such persistence that they were finally discovered and despatched in the secret room to which they had fled. Colonel Maschin is a veteran of both the Servian army and diplomatic corps. He served with distinction in the army, was military attache at Vienna and also served as Servian Minister, at an unimport-


as Servian Minister at an unimport-ant post. He is now Minister of Public Works under Ving Peter Ka-rageorgevitch and was a conspicuous figure at the welcome accorded the new King when he reached Belgrade



ONE THOUSAND SLAIN IN BAT-TLE AT SMILOVO.

Conflicts Raging in Macedonia-Adrianople Said to be Burning-Neveska Recaptured by the Turks.

Salonica, Aug. 31. — The Bulgarian insurgents sustained a severe reverse at Smilovo on Friday, 1,000 of them being killed. The insurgents to the number of 3,000 occupied à position on a height, which was stormed by six battalions of Turkish troops command-ed by Servet Pasha. After losing 1,000 of their number, the Bulgarians fled, in the face of the heavy Turkish artillery fire. The Turkish losses were insigni-ficant.

A new outbreak is reported to have A new outbreak is reported to have occurred in the environs of Salonica, and several skirmishes have taken place between Gievgyeli and Salonica, and there has also been a fight near Edidjevarda, both sides losing heavily. In the district between Kastoria and Storina, south of Monastir, the insurgents have destroyed all the fortified residences of the wealthy. Beys. A notorious brigand named Abdul Medjid recently delivered a harangue to the inhabitants of Tetovo, telling them to prepare themselves to slaughter all the prepare themselves to slaughter all the Bulgarians upon the first appearance of revolutionary bands in the neighbor-

hood.

Many wounded Turkish soldiers have been brought into Salonica from Uskub, Seres and Monastir. The Turkish troops are reported to be greatly discouraged, and many deserters have been thrown into prison. The insurgents have blown up the lighthouse at Vasiliko and now occupy all the principal points along the Black Sea coast. The barracks at Demotika, near Adrianople, have been blown up and the garrison killed.

Four thousand Albanians are pillaging the villages in the districts of Okrida and Krushevo. The latter district has been deserted by the population, who have joined the insurgents in the mountains. The Turkish forces in the frontier districts have been largely increased.

Reports from Constantinople say that seven hundred medical and veterinary students and army cadets have received their diplomas and commissions without having passed the usual examinations, and have been drafted into the Third Army Corps.



Otherwise the mourners were made up of the dead statesman's tenants, retain-ers and inhabitants of Haffield. The coffin was carried to and from the parish church by old servants.
