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# THE BOARD OF TRADE

Of the City of Toronto.

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## PRESIDENT'S REPORT, 1892.

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In pursuance of my function as President of the Board for the past year, I desire, while thanking the members for the honor conferred, to make reference to some matters of mutual interest.

While we are Britons, proud to belong to Queen Victoria's realm, we are Canadians, anxious to make the most of this land in which we live. We enjoy beneath the British flag all the reasonable conditions of social existence, comfort, even luxury, with all the essential elements of healthy progress.

If there have been bounds to our progress—and I recognize that there are some who are not satisfied with the ratio of our prosperity, and who point to the United States as our exemplar—it is for us, as sensible business men, to find out what is faulty in our present fiscal arrangements, and consider how it may be put right. But I beg to express my conviction that we have in Canada as high a level of general welfare and contentment as in any country under the sun.

Looking to the future, we have the satisfaction of knowing that the unoccupied lands of the earth are to-day very largely in Canada, more so than in the United States, and future emigration from the more crowded centres must flow to the one or to the other. We need more population, and I consider that everything possible to attract a good class of immigrants should be done, not only by Governmental action, but by any other means of effectually influencing the class in the old world that we wish to reach.

### TRADE POLICY.

It is germane to my present task to deal briefly with a subject to which this Board has at a former meeting committed itself, viz., Imperial

Preferential Trade. With the possibilities of great expansion under our own flag, it becomes us not to be too ready to go begging, hat in hand, at other doors, for an exchange of products—doors which are being closed in our face. As the excellent report of our delegation to the Congress of Chamber of Commerce, recently held in London, deals specially with the matter, I content myself with thus emphasizing the importance of the report these gentlemen will submit, and expressing for myself hearty approval of their united action.

In this trade policy, which we believe would do very much to consolidate the Empire, Canada, with her immense wheat fields—the future wheat fields of this continent, her rich mineral deposits, forests and coal beds, and her unrivalled system of railways, is fitted to play a most important part, so important that “Canada first” may be made truly consistent with the utmost loyalty to the mother land. Our interests ought to be inseparable, and *are* so, if all parties remain true.

It is with some hesitancy that I refer to the recent message of the President of the United States, with its manifest unfriendliness to Canada. That one-half of the message should deal with Canadian relations is significant of the importance attached to our fisheries and trade; but seeing that it is the last words of a moribund administrator, written under the pressing gloom of deep family affliction, and has been met practically with silence by the general press, it may be both wise and more dignified on our part to allude no further to it, and to express the hope that under the new administration a more friendly attitude may be assumed. One thing is certain, Canadians will not be coerced. In the face of a hostile policy we must manfully go on our way with sturdy British pluck.

#### GRAIN AND FLOUR.

With respect to the grain and flour trade of 1892, the conditions have been peculiar. The wheat harvests of 1891 and 1892 in the United States were so abundant that after supplying the requirements of the foreign market, the visible supply, which includes, of course, the wheat of the growth of 1891 that had not left the farmers' hands, and the surplus in store or transit of the growth of 1892, is the greatest ever known. It has been 30 or 40 million bushels greater than at the highest point of the previous year; being 64 millions in October, 70 millions in November, 72 millions early in December, and more than 80 millions at the close of the year.

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The Canadian wheat crop of 1892 (including Manitoba), while not so large as the hopes of the people in our North-west or the estimates of the Ontario Bureau of Agriculture expected, was still a gratifying one. It may be approximated at 44,000,000 bushels, namely 28,000,000 in Ontario and 16,000,000 in Manitoba and the Territories. Of this total possibly 18,000,000 bushels could be spared for export. While the Ontario crop of spring wheat was both short and of inferior quality this year, the quality of Manitoba hard wheat is unsurpassed, perhaps the finest in the world, commanding the highest prices in the market of the United Kingdom. Our fall wheat was of better quality this year than last.

It was to be expected that low prices for breadstuffs would prevail during the autumn and early winter of the year, and this has been the case. Prices of wheat were never so low within the memory of this generation as they were this winter, nor the stock so great. It is not to be wondered at, that, with a falling market throughout the latter half of the year, the results of business to our grain dealers have not been satisfactory.

I have pleasure in congratulating the Millers' Association on their incorporation. The flour manufacturers of this Province, numerous and influential as they are, operate at widely separated points, some on a limited scale and some on a large scale, one making wholly for the home trade, another wholly for export. In these different circumstances a policy which exactly suits every one is most difficult to frame. It is an advantage to them, however, to have legal status as a corporate body, giving, as this does, additional weight to their resolutions, and tending to produce concord in the measures taken for the general good.

The past year has been a hard one for many millers. Buying raw material and selling finished product on a steadily falling market is a difficult task for any manufacturer, and this is what our millers have had to do for many months. It is not unreasonable, I hope, to expect that there must be a reaction from such low prices, and that more satisfactory conditions during the present year will enable our millers to carry on their business with satisfaction and profit.

Efforts to market our barley in Great Britain have not met with the success we should have desired. The English brewers are firmly set in their preference for the two-rowed barley for malting purposes, and appear to agree that our six-rowed article will not suit their requirements. And yet this same grain has for many years been the admiration of

American brewers, a number of whom still buy it, in spite of the duty of 30 cents per bushel. The experiments made here in 1891 and 1892 in the growth of two-rowed barley for the British market were not encouraging; that of 1891 looked well and gave hopes, but this year's crop was disappointing. My opinion is that the attempt thus made to meet the prepossessions of the old country brewers in this respect, must be abandoned so far as the growing of two-rowed is concerned, and that our farmers must persevere in growing six-rowed barley, which is natural to our soil, and which is gradually being understood and appreciated. I shall be much surprised if the English malsters do not alter their opinion of it by and by.

#### OUR EXPORT TRADE.

Two years have elapsed since the adoption by the United States of the McKinley Tariff, and we are able now to estimate with a greater approach to accuracy what has been its effect upon our country. That it has lessened our market in the United States for barley, hay, beans, and various other products it is idle to deny, but our people have not sat with folded hands under the infliction—they have sought out other markets, and not without some share of success. Still, it is straining the facts to pretend that the deprivation of our nearest and promptest market for such of our natural products as I have named has been an advantage to us, except in so far as it spurred us on to look elsewhere for markets. It was stated by a prominent banker in Montreal some weeks ago, in referring to the effect of the McKinley Tariff, that the purchase of foreign bills of exchange during 1892 has never been equalled in any year since 1867, the inference apparently being that we were doing a larger export trade than before, in spite of the United States tariff. Now it may be admitted that our banks and our carriers by rail or water have been exceptionally prosperous, but I cannot believe that the middleman and the producer have shared to a like degree in this activity and profit.

My predecessor in his report last year urged the necessity of Canada taking the initiative in securing a commercial treaty with Great Britain. He also pointed out how great "the destiny of Canada might be, with freedom of commerce established between her and the United Kingdom, and the close community of interests that would inevitably follow in the wake of such relationship." From the glimpse he had had of our Northwest, he was able to speak with some authority of that vast territory,

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"where there is rich tillable land enough to make ten such provinces as the settled portion of Ontario." Since these words were written, our House of Commons passed the following resolution:

"If and when the Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland shall admit Canadian products to the markets of the United Kingdom upon more favorable terms than it accords to the products of foreign countries, the Parliament of Canada will be prepared to accord corresponding advantages by a substantial reduction in the duties it imposes upon British manufactured goods."

What makes this overture all the more significant is that the only amendment proposed to it was as follows:

"Inasmuch as Great Britain admits the products of Canada into her ports free of duty, this House is of opinion that the present scale of duties exacted by Canada upon goods mainly imported from Great Britain should be reduced."

It is thus manifest that the House of Commons is unanimously of the opinion that our true policy lies in the direction of increasing trade interchange between Canada and Great Britain. The important and immediate question for us to consider is: "What can we do to promote so desirable an end?" Suggestions have been made from various quarters that we should lower our tariff on goods imported from Britain that we ourselves do not manufacture, and on the goods produced by those who have expressed their readiness to compete with outside manufacturers. On such lines as these, greater trade interchanges would be the result; increased exports and imports usually go together.

#### IMMIGRATION.

It is a cheering fact in this connection to be able to note the great increase of immigration, of the best kind, into the North-west that has taken place during the past year. Once the stream begins to run it will go on widening and deepening its channels, for the best emigration agent is admittedly the successful immigrant. Even frost, the worst enemy of the North-west, is not so bad as once thought, and as settlements increase that part of our country will be not only great as a grain and root-producing region, but equally great in other departments of production. All this points in the same direction, namely, the importance of increasing our trade interchange with the great market of the world.

## THE WHOLESALE TRADES.

Desiring to know the results of the year's transactions in some of the leading lines of wholesale distribution, I have looked first into the dry goods trade. The volume of imports at this point grows steadily larger, cotton goods excepted—and this exception arises from the fact that we now produce a great variety of cotton fabrics which we formerly had to import. Indeed, the variety and quality of such fabrics made in Canada reflects the greatest credit on our mills. In woollens, as well as in hats and furs, our manufacturers are making marked progress. The admirable products of our looms, in the shape of tweeds and plaids for ladies' dresses, cloakings, and the like, ought not to pass without honorable mention. Only want of space prevents my naming other articles creditable to our textile industries.

There are no means of ascertaining the volume of home manufactures which we term "dry goods," passing through the hands of our wholesale dealers; but according to the Customs returns the value of imports in the five departments of cottons, woollens, silks, fancy goods, hats and bonnets, at Toronto, for the calendar year, 1892, was \$6,511,842, as compared with \$6,126,048 in 1891. An export trade in cotton to China and Japan, as well as woollens and other textiles to the West Indies are among the satisfactory incidents of the last year or two.

Nor must I omit to mention the efforts made by the Dry Goods Section of this Board to adjust inequalities in the Customs Tariff, to rectify abuses in credit, to improve the relations between buyer and seller. The good results of these efforts will not be confined to the dry goods trade. There are too many general stores in Canada, and it is still too easy for persons with neither business training nor capital to get merchandise on credit. We need to get closer to a cash basis, and above all we need to put down the practice of compromising with incompetent traders.

In the grocery trade, I am told, the volume of business has been well maintained, but the shrinkage of values of merchandise has reduced the total turn-over by perhaps 10 per cent. The year opened with a falling market in several lines of goods, notably sugars and syrups. A result of the drop in values and of undue competition has been that these important staples were sold during several months at under actual cost. Home-

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packed canned goods, such as vegetables and fruits, have also been disposed of by the jobber during 1892 under unfavorable conditions, largely because of over-production. Teas and dried fruits, on the other hand, have been in good demand at fairly remunerative prices. By reason of the narrowing margin of profit, and the increasing expense of doing business, the results of the year are stated by these in the business as being, for the year just closed, among the least remunerative of the last decade. Prices, however, have somewhat recovered, and the prospects for 1893 are considered more encouraging.

A somewhat more satisfactory tone prevails in the lines of hardware and metals and boots and shoes. In these, profits, while not large, have been perceptible, and a gratifying feature has been the reduced proportion of losses by bad debts, which arises, if I do not mistake, from the prudent credit regulations which our importers and manufacturers have applied to their business.

#### AN INSOLVENCY LAW.

The only authority that can enact an insolvent law is the Dominion Parliament, and appeals have been made to this body during the year by various commercial bodies to take steps to provide us with this necessary measure. It is proper to remind you, however, that so long as trade is overdone and conducted on unsound principles, no law will save merchants from loss by bad debts.

#### IMPROVED ATLANTIC SERVICE.

There is no subject of more immediate interest to business men than the improvement of our passenger and mail service across the Atlantic. It is indeed a matter of the first necessity to our commerce. Speaking in this room but a few days ago, a member of the Board showed that on a recent trip of a great New York liner to Liverpool one-fifth of the passengers were Canadians. Why should we, having ports on our own seaboard 400 to 600 miles nearer Liverpool than New York is, be compelled to send our buyers, our mails, our express freight through the latter city for quicker despatch? The great strides Canada has already made in railways from ocean to ocean and in fast service on the Pacific will largely miss their aim unless we make the further stride of quick travel on the Atlantic as well. It is perfectly true that this country has outgrown the present service.

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I am therefore heartily in accord with the resolution passed at the special general meeting of the Board on the 16th instant, which recited that, "A first-class Canadian fast Atlantic steamship service would materially increase the value of our European exports, decrease the cost of delivery of our European imports, largely augment the volume of our passenger travel, improve our foreign and postal service, and otherwise be of great national importance." It is clear to me, besides, that the concluding portion of the resolution, urging the need of governmental arrangements necessarily required "to secure such a service, and give it control of such railway service as said line of steamships must have," will meet the views of commercial men throughout the country.

I have thus submitted to you, according to my ability, a necessarily imperfect review of matters which justly come before us as a Board of Trade. I should not be true to myself, or respectful to you, did I not express my sense of the honor accorded to me by your suffrages. Presiding over a Board comprising more than nine hundred of the busy men of Ontario, representing all ranks of commerce and finance, I have learned much, and, I trust, have benefited by my experience. While, of course, the position is one not without anxiety, and one which calls for faithful work, I am grateful for many courtesies from the members, and I have had the satisfaction of finding myself surrounded with willing workers; for, gentlemen, the Council of this Board, as well as its Secretary, do a great deal of faithful and valuable work, and I believe they have at heart, as I trust we all have, the best interests of our country, our province, and our city.

Of the above amount, \$7,239.38 have been handed to the House Committee, and the balance (\$171 85) carried forward.

During the year we lost twelve of our members by death and several by removal, but their places have been taken by others, and we still continue to have 921 contributing members, and one honorary member.

THE GRATUITY FUND, instituted on the 29th June, 1886, continues to be favorably considered by our members, and at the present moment 851 are entitled to participate in its benefits. There are, however, 71 of the old members of the Board who have not yet taken advantage of it.

The total number of deaths in this branch since 29th June, 1886, has been 52, five of these having occurred since the Trustees issued its annual report in July last. And the amount paid out to the widows and children of deceased members to date has been \$55,157.01.

The fund now under the charge of the Gratuity Trustees amounts to \$73,000, and is invested in Land Security Company's debentures and first mortgages on real estate.

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# SECRETARY'S REPORT.

TORONTO, 31st December, 1892.

GENTLEMEN,—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the official proceedings of the Board for the past year. The Exchange of the Board was opened for business 304 days, and closed 62, viz., 52 Sundays, New Year's Day, also January 2nd, Good Friday, Queen's Birthday, also May 26th, Lieut.-Gov. Campbell's funeral; Dominion Day, and July 2nd, Civic Holiday, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day.

During the year, 563 meetings have been held in the rooms of the Board, as follows:—

12 members have died, 11 of whom were members of the Gratuity Fund. 851 members of the total 922 are members of the Fund, an increase of 106 since 1st Sept., 1886.

## SYNOPSIS OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR 1892.

Twenty-one meetings held.

Early in the year, the co-operation of the Council was sought by the Dominion Millers' Association, in seeking from the Dominion Government the establishment of a Modus Vivendi with Newfoundland, pending the settlement of the matters in dispute between the two countries. It is satisfactory indeed to know that not only have all obstacles to the fullest trade between the Dominion and Newfoundland been removed, but that there is every prospect, in the near future, that Newfoundland will form part of the Dominion of Canada.

## SMELTER AT SUDBURY.

In furtherance of the policy of the Board in seeking the development of the mining interests of the Province, a petition was forwarded to the Ontario Government, urging the establishment at Sudbury of a smelter, and the appointment of a Government Chemist.

## INSOLVENCY BILL.

On the 29th of March last, a general meeting of the Board was held to discuss this important question; the meeting was large, and of a representative character, and the resolution calling for an Insolvency Act

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applicable to the whole Dominion was, after a very full discussion, adopted.

The resolution of the Board was promptly acted upon by the Council, and the Legislative Committee of the Council lost no time in getting to work, the result of the combined labors of joint committees from the Toronto, Montreal, and Hamilton Boards of Trade, being that a Bill has been prepared and duly placed in the hands of the Dominion Government, who, it is confidently expected, will in response to the very general demand of the country, bring in an Insolvency Bill as a Government measure this session of Parliament.

In April, the Council, by its duly appointed committee, waited upon the Dominion Government to urge upon them the necessity of further aid being accorded to the Nipissing and James Bay Railway, the Ontario Government having granted a subsidy of \$3,000 a mile. It was pointed out that the road would open up for settlement a large tract of land rich in agricultural, mining, and timber resources, which would be of substantial benefit to the country.

#### ST. JOHNS, N.E., FIRE.

Early in July the attention of the Council was drawn to the great disaster that had befallen the people of St. Johns, Newfoundland. No time was lost in appealing to the membership, and the published reports of the results of this appeal are most gratifying, the total amount collected being \$10,055.50.

#### GRADING CANADIAN GRAIN FOR EXPORT.

In October notice was given by the Trunk Lines Association of New York that no Canadian grain would be received at the frontier for export via New York and Boston, unless same was graded, and the Board was invited to send delegates to attend a meeting in New York, for the purpose of arranging as to the number of grades to be allotted for Canadian grain. Delegates were duly appointed, the conference was held, and arrangements made, both as to the number of grades for which bins were to be provided, and for the inspection. A conference was had this month also, by the Railway and Transportation Committee of the Council, with Mr. Stephenson, General Traffic Manager of the Grand Trunk, and a change in the unsatisfactory service between Buffalo and Toronto was strongly urged. Mr. Stephenson has yet to be heard from.

## MUNICIPAL TAXATION.

In November, the committee appointed by the Council, in conjunction with the committee of the wholesale dry goods section of the Board, waited upon the Ontario Government for the purpose of urging the appointment of a Commission to consider and report on the most important question of municipal taxation. The delegates were most cordially received by Sir Oliver Mowat and the Government, and their representations were not without effect, a preliminary Commission having been appointed to collect facts for the consideration of the Government.

## ARBITRATIONS.

This most important feature of the Corporation has been very largely used by the membership during the past year, and has not, as in years past, been so largely devoted to the settlement of differences between members dealing in grains, many other branches of trade availing themselves of this prompt, equitable, and economic method of settling business difficulties.

During the year the following amendment to the By-laws was adopted:—

## TERMS OF TRADE

*(As adopted at General Meeting of the Board held January 19th, 1893.)*

17.— DEFINITION OF TERMS IN BUYING AND SELLING GRAIN, FLOUR, PRODUCE, AND PROVISIONS IN THIS MARKET, OR AT THE CALL BOARD OR AT OTHER TIMES BETWEEN MEMBERS.

All sales made without specified conditions, will be considered as strictly free of charge (F. O. C.) The seller to be under no obligation to furnish conveyance.

All business days mentioned to be terminable at three o'clock, P.M., except Saturdays when the hour shall be one o'clock P.M.

To be interpreted as FREE ON BOARD SAILING OR STEAM F. O. B. VESSEL OR BARGE—such conveyance, unless specially agreed on, to be provided by the buyer; and in case he fails to provide such conveyance within five days after day of sale, he is required to take the property as it lies, free of all shipping charges, on presentation by the shipper of a proper warehouse

receipt. During the five days, the property to be at the seller's risk of fire, but after the five days have elapsed, to be at the buyer's risk. When being shipped into vessel, to be at buyer's risk, and, if not insured by him, the seller to be at liberty to insure the cargo, and to charge the same to the buyer. The seller to give the buyer not less than five days free of storage from date of delivery.

**F. O. B. Cars.**

Cooperage of flour under this term being always the duty, and at the expense of the seller. The same to apply to butter and other cask goods. F. O. B. simply not to apply to sales in which the shipment is made by Railroad Cars, when the term will be distinctly F. O. B. cars, and in this case the seller has to provide the cars, and receive payment on presentation of original shipping bill. It being understood that due diligence is to be used by seller in obtaining cars, and also that the buyer may, if he wishes, supply cars, but no delay in making delivery which may occur through not getting cars, shall entitle either buyer or seller to cancel the transaction, or to demand any increase or reduction in the price, although in the interim prices or freight rates may have changed

**In Store.**

The buyer shall be subject to the current term of storage, not exceeding one cent per bushel on grain and five cents per barrel on flour and meal, the property to be at the buyer's risk immediately on delivery. When the property is liable to any back charges, such as accrued storage, shunting, freight or other charges, such must be paid by the seller, and the seller must satisfy the buyer that such charges have been settled, or the buyer may deduct the same from the invoice.

**On Track.**

This term to mean the delivery of the property in the cars of the Railroad, in the yard, or on the track where such cars are ordinarily placed after arrival in the city, or at any station on the line of road where the sale may be made. The property to be Free of Charges in its then position, and delivery to be made by the Railroad shipping bill or proper order, properly endorsed to buyer. The freight and charges to be deducted from the invoice, unless satisfactory evidence is afforded the buyer that such charges are paid.

**Cash.**

All sales to be FOR CASH, and payment to be made as follows on the different terms:—

**F. O. B.**—On presentation of the Bill of Lading, unless the five days provided for have elapsed, when the payment is to be made on presentation of the Warehouse Receipt or Receipts.

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F. O. C.—Payment to be made on the day of presentation of Warehouse Receipt or Receipts. All accrued charges to be paid by the seller.

IN STORE.—Payment to be made on the day of presentation of Warehouse Receipt or Receipts.

Payment in all cases to be made before the closing hour of Delivery. the bank on the day of presentation, unless by special agreement. Property, in all cases, to be at buyer's risk immediately after delivery of shipping bill or order.

Delivery will be considered completed on presentation of proper documents in all cases of sales F. O. B., F. O. C., and in Store at any of the regular City Warehouses or Elevators, duly posted on 'Change, unless otherwise specified at time of sale; also, On Track, except when buyer is allowed to weigh the property, when presentation of the invoice of the ascertained weight within the four days allowed shall be sufficient.

TRACK DELIVERY.—Payment to be made on properly endorsed Railway shipping bill or order, except when the property is subject to receivers' weights, when payment is to be made immediately on their being ascertained,—in no case more than four days being allowed for ascertaining such weights. After expiration of the four days, buyer to be subject to advice note, or invoice weights.

When Car Loads of Grain, Meal, Feed and other produce are purchased without any specified agreement as to quantity to be loaded in each, it will be understood that a Car-load of Ontario Grain shall mean 30,000 lbs., and a Car-load of Manitoba Grain shall mean 40,000 lbs. Car Loads.

If any greater or less quantity be shipped, the excess or deficiency, if it exceeds Five per cent., shall be settled between buyer and seller at Market price at time of delivery.

On contracts for more than one Car of Grain, Flour, and other Produce, F. O. B. Cars, any point, the seller to have the right to deliver same in single Car lots with proper documents attached, within the time specified in contract, unless otherwise agreed. Car Lots

When Grain is sold in specified quantities, the seller shall have the option of delivering within five per cent., more or less, of the quantity sold. Grain in Quantities

- Outside.** When property is offered, as at outside points, it shall mean on the Grand Trunk or Canadian Pacific system of Railroads within the Province of Ontario, south of and including Gravenhurst and Pembroke.
- Immediate Shipment.** Shall mean shipment within Five (5) days following day of sale.
- Prompt Shipment.** Shall mean shipment within Fourteen (14) days following sale.
- To Arrive.** To arrive shall mean shipped, or to be shipped, not later than than day following sale.
- Afloat.** When sales are made for shipment afloat the buyer to provide vessel; if he fails to do so within ten (10) days from date of notice that shipment is ready, he shall make payment on Warehouse receipt.
- Delivered afloat.** Sales made delivered afloat shall be payable on presentation of proper documents on delivery of cargo in good order and condition over rail of vessel
- Insurance** In all sales made for shipment afloat or delivery F.O.B. vessel, the buyer shall satisfy the seller that the same is insured against Marine and Fire accident, otherwise the seller or shipper may effect such insurance and charge the same to the buyer.
- C. I. F.** Property sold C.I.F. shall mean cost with Insurance and freight paid (or allowed in Invoice) to point at which delivery is stated, and buyer shall make payment on presentation of Bill of Lading and Insurance Certificates.
- Weights.** When grain is sold with out-turn guaranteed payments shall be made on presentation of Bill of Lading. The seller shall not be liable for a shortage unless reported within thirty days of arrival of grain at destination, and in default of such returns, Bills of Lading Weights shall then be considered as binding upon the buyer, but it shall be compulsory upon the receiver at any time, if desired, to furnish an affidavit of out-turn.
- Warehouses or Elevators** The Call Board Committee may designate Warehouses or Elevators in the City of Toronto, whose receipts shall be regular, upon the written application of the owners, lessees, or chief officers thereof, endorsed by not less than three members of the Grain Trade.

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The application shall set forth the location and name of such Warehouse or Elevator, depth of water, capacity, quantity of grain that can be received and delivered per hour, number of elevators, and facilities for cleaning grain.

The names of all Warehouses or Elevators designated by the Committee as regular, shall be posted on "Change."

Prior to being posted on "Change," such Warehouse or Elevator shall come under an obligation that on the Monday morning of each week, he, or they, will cause to be made out and sent to the Secretary of the Board, a statement of the amount of each kind and grade of grain in store at the close of business on the previous Saturday.

Should any Warehouse or Elevator fail to forward this report, or if the Committee finds that the reports so furnished are not correct, then the Committee shall have it in their discretion to remove the name of such Warehouse or Elevator from the list of regular Warehouses or Elevators until such time as this requirement is agreed to, and assurances given that the returns furnished will be absolutely correct.

The Secretary shall keep in his office a record of all Warehouses or Elevators which shall be made regular by the Board.

The Secretary shall on Monday morning of each week, furnish an exact statement, for the use of the members, of the number of bushels of each grade of Grain in store at the close of business the previous Saturday.

The work of the Board during the past has been such as to demonstrate the truthfulness of the statement that

"Boards of Trade are the natural and inevitable outgrowth of our commercial life. They are a part of that great system of the subdivision of labor which bespeaks our social and material progress. The necessities of trade and commerce produced them, and no more is required in defence of their existence than is required in defence of insurance, the wholesale merchant or the banker."

In conclusion, I respectfully submit that the members are to be congratulated upon the position which the Board of Trade of the city of Toronto occupies with reference to the commerce of the country.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

TORONTO, July 2nd, 1892.

To the Council of the Board of Trade, Toronto.

GENTLEMEN,

The Gratuity Fund Trustees beg to submit the usual Annual Report, together with the financial statement for the year just ended, and which is the Sixth of the existence of the Trust.

Seven names have been added to the membership during the past year, the number now being 850 as against 843 with which the year was begun.

The Trustees would be pleased to see those other members of the Board of Trade, who are eligible, join and become participants in the Fund, the advantages of which must be apparent to anyone who will examine into the system.

The removals by death during the year again show a reduction in the average of the anticipated death rate, which will be readily seen by the following table :

The Fund is administered with strictest regard to economy, as is evidenced by the small amount of the expenses of management.

The money in the bank has been invested, but the mortgages were not completed when the books were closed. All the funds of the trust are now invested in first-class Debentures and in Mortgages on productive Real Estate in the best parts of the city, and valued at very considerably over double the amounts of the several loans.

At the ensuing meeting in September, of which due notice will be given, Mr. D. R. Wilkie, Trustee, retires by rotation, but is eligible for re-election.
