The Evening Chit-Chat

When a wealthy old woman, in a town near Boston, who had lived alone for many years, died the other day, and her house was overhauled by the estate, it was found to be literally crammed with all sorts of extraordinary truck which this woman had picked up at bargain sales during the last twenty years.

There were bird cages and men's shirts and quantities of cheap handkerchiefs and a half a dozen baby carriages, tricycles, and tin snips, bushels of cheap jewelry and toilet articles, and lots of dress goods.

In fact, almost any article you could name was found somewhere in that house.

The old servant, who lived with her, said that bargain hunting was her mistress' chief diversion. She took all the newspapers and attended almost all the bargain sales they advertised. It made no difference what the articles were, how completely foreign to any use she could have for them. If they were marked down sufficiently, she purchased them.

If she saw a bargain sale of men's shirts "marked from \$1.50 to 50c. for this day only" neither snow nor rain, thunder nor lightning, nor even Boston slush, could keep her from going in town and buying half a dozen.

If it was advertised that only a limited number of some article would be sold to each customer, she would often purchase the full amount and then go back to the shop later in the day and try to get another lot.

The storerooms in the house and all the chests and drawers and cupboards were so crammed with her gleanings that in the last few years of her life her treasures had spilled over into the open and almost every room was littered with bundles of all shapes and sizes.

Now, of course, on this evidence, it wouldn't take an expert alienist to suspect that the old person was decidedly crazy.

And yet—of course, you've seen it coming—there are mighty few women who don't have at least a touch of that mania.

The old lady thought that anything that was marked down was a bargain. So do the majority of women.

It's only the exceptional woman who ALWAYS remembers that an article marked to one-tenth its value is still expensive unless it just fills a niche of need.

It is only the exceptional woman who NEVER buys a thing because "it was such a bargain."

Buying in the off-season sales is at most the only way the woman of moderate means can keep up with the times.

But to make such buying wise one must have one's wardrobe for the next season well planned out, and so know just what one wants.

Otherwise, the attempt at economy is apt to end in the foolish extravagance of getting some sartorial white elephant on one's hands.

I do not think women of moderate means can realize too fully the value of taking advantage of off-season sales.

At the same time they can hardly stop their ears too carefully against the lure of a bargain that's only a bargain because it's marked down to half price and not because it is anything they really want.

Next time you go bargain hunting suppose you remember the old lady and be warned.

An Outpost of Empire.

In December, 1908, there appeared at Tamale the first white woman the natives had ever seen, and she brought her plans with her. Five of the natives had carried it 200 miles from the nearest railroad station. Tamale is in West Africa, about 400 miles south of Timbuctu. It is headquarters for the Northern Territories, a British possession or protectorate lying north of Ashanti and between French and German colonies. There is a railroad from the coast as far as Kumassi, and beyond that metropolis the trail through the forest is fairly good to Tamale, where the Chief Commissioner of the Northern Territories of the Gold Coast is engaged in civilizing and developing the resources of a wild country that is said to contain wide auriferous areas. Its products at present, however, are cocoa, indigo, tobacco, cereals, ground nuts, yams and tropical fruits. The Commissioner in 1908 was Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. G. Waterston, and the first white woman to present herself at Tamale was his wife, who had determined to share his dangers and keep house for him in the savage interior of Africa.

Mrs. Nora Waterston, who seems to be a woman of heroic mould, tells the story of her experiences in the "Nineteenth Century" for January.

There were generally no more than five or six Englishmen at Tamale, and they had to rule several hundred thousand blacks in a territory of mountain, forest and desert, the area of which is estimated at from 38,000 to 50,000 square miles. These Englishmen were not delighted when they heard that a woman was coming out to live with them. It seemed to be no place for a white woman. The work was rough and dangerous, and the discomforts of the life were sometimes almost intolerable. Moreover, they could not answer for the safety of the lady. But she came, and there was an immense crowd of curious and excited people to welcome her. Describing the entry of the party into Tamale, Mrs. Waterston says:

We rode the last quarter of a mile at a wild gallop, the escort thundering behind us; and I see again the flags along the road, the archway with its huge written "Welcome," and the clouds of dust as we reined up to acknowledge the salute and inspect the guard of honor. When that was over we turned to greet the various chiefs and their followers, who were arrayed in all the splendor of flowing colored robes and silver ornaments, their horses decked with leather and leopard skins. There were many a friendly handshake, many a greeting in unknown tongues, and always a smile of pleasure and welcome.

As soon as Mrs. Waterston could get her horse in order and the piano was set up the natives heard grand opera, the old sentimental airs, regimental tunes, and even ragtime; and the music was a treat also to the white men, who said, "It does away with the feeling of exile." But life in Tamale was not all fun. In fact, this English woman kept house very much as the woman had done at home, but not so well, for the servant problem was more complicated and almost hopeless at Tamale. The Colonel's lady says:

"When I arrived on the scene there were many upheavals, and for the first few weeks it was a sorrowful world for my staff. I refused to have very course served up with fried onions. I utterly declined to eat curry more than once in every three days, and I organized a daily round of inspection to pantry and kitchen. They were horribly worried, poor boys; it makes me laugh now to think of William's face as I told him I must see every one of the dozen dusters I had given him a week previously. When I tell you that in West Africa a duster is used for the whole gamut of cleansing purposes, from lamp cleaning to polishing the glasses, you will understand my fastidiousness. I meant to raise the standards of living, and I tried by doing so, but I had no idea it would be such a hard task!

This little group of English people and their social functions in the wilderness, their teas, their seven o'clock dinner, their golf, their games of bridge and their musicals. They dressed for dinner, too, and had silver and cut glass and pink shaded lights on the table. In short they regulated their lives by the London standards, and made themselves comfortable as if they were to stay at Tamale forever. But at best it was a hard life, and the gayeties were few. Here at home," observes Mrs. Waterston, "they say that England has passed her zenith; but out there in England's colonies, her sons still give the best of mind and body, her women more than life, and give gladly, as their share of the price that is paid for the nation's glory, in which they, at all events, still believe."

The chief value of this lady's account of life at frontier Tamale is that it illustrates better than any official report could do the methods by which Englishmen maintain their ascendancy over a wild and superstitious population. We see them performing their duties with unflinching courage and the impressive faces of superior beings; paying much attention to ceremony; always alert and well groomed, and while living their lives apart, treating the natives with humanity and with a consideration according to their rank; working wonders with moral suasion, but prepared to be militant with all the resources they have in reserve; developing the country for the profit as well as the glory of England, but exercising nevertheless a civilizing influence among the people whose destiny they have taken into their own hands.—(The Sun, New York.)

The Government Climbs Down.

On Friday we suggested that a Royal Commission i.e. one appointed by the Crown and not locally, should be sought for; and empowered, i.e. by Statute, to inquire on oath into the whole business and circumstances connected with the granting of licenses and making of deals in timber and pulp lands.

On Saturday the Chronicle took notice of this suggestion and stated that "The Telegram has, indeed, gone so far as to urge last night that a Royal Commission be appointed to take evidence on oath into the whole matter."

We give this citation from Saturday's Chronicle to make it clear beyond the shadow of a doubt that the editor and the inspirers of his statement on Saturday took cognizance of the chief features of our suggestion, viz., that the Commission should be Royal, i.e. appointed by the Crown, and that it should be empowered specially to make compulsory inquiries on oath.

unobjectionable, provided the scope of the inquiry is extended to include the whole period since the passage of the 1901 contract.

Again, the Chronicle on that occasion, mentioning in terms a "Royal Commission," said: "If Sir Robert Bond and his supporters are prepared to accept this suggestion, we see no reason why the Government should not adopt it. If the Bond Party is so sure itself that it is prepared to agree to this, then it will readily be admitted that the Telegram's proposal is made solely in the public interest. If the Bond Party is not prepared to adopt this proposal, then the inevitable conclusion must be that the call for a Royal Commission is simply a political war-cry. If the hands of the Bond supporters are clean they should welcome this proposition, for they can suffer no harm from it."

Sir Robert Bond promptly and unreservedly accepted the suggestion. He stated that he was willing to have every act of his administration investigated and the full light of day brought to bear upon everything he and his ministers had done. He made no reservations whatever. He adopted our original suggestion as to the Tribunal, viz., that the Commission should be Royal and therefore impartially appointed, and that its powers should be unlimited in its scope of compelling evidence and the production of documents. That was our suggestion of Friday, concurred in by the Chronicle on Saturday and approved by Sir Robert in the letter we published last evening.

On Monday morning, however, the Government showed signs of weakening. In the Daily News of yesterday there appeared a veiled but not a full endorsement of the attitude of the Evening Chronicle of Saturday, and a most careful avoidance of a use of the term ROYAL COMMISSION. That was the reason why in our issue of yesterday we explained why we had suggested a Royal Commission, saying:

"On Friday we advisedly suggested a Royal Commission, so that the appointment could be made by the Imperial authorities, and that its constitution, proceedings and findings would be absolutely impartial."

Even the Chronicle of last night dropped all reference to a Royal Commission and followed the new lead of the Daily News.

This morning the Daily News on behalf of the Government completely repudiates what the Evening Chronicle on behalf of the Government had accepted on Saturday.

At that time the Government through the Evening Chronicle accepted the suggestion that the Tribunal should be a Royal Commission. In the meantime Sir Robert Bond expressed his concurrence over his own signature.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, March 14.
Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary, leading the Commons, made an important pronouncement of the Government's naval policy. Mr. McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, in defence of his estimates against attacks, explained that in 1914 Britain would have 30 and Germany 21 Dreadnoughts. The size of the British navy would be practically governed by that of Germany. Unless some marked change occurred in the German Naval law, this year would be the high water mark of the British estimates. Grey affirmed McKenna's statement, but emphasized the cordiality of Britain's foreign relations and the earnest desire that nothing should disturb these friendships, especially with Germany. Then he dwelt upon the difficulties encountered in the question of disarmament. He pointed out that it was the most civilized nation that spent most in armaments, asserting that unless mischief brought home to men's feelings as well as their minds the growth of armaments must in the long run break civilization down. Some thought the end would be war, but he thought it would more likely result in international revolution. Rivalry would not be stopped by a single nation dropping out of the race. Although Britain had a strong navy, her army was small, and agreement with Germany needed careful handling. He was hopeful that something might be done. Any real limitation of armaments must depend on the nations learning like individuals, to resort to law instead of to force of arms.

Special Evening Telegram.

VIRGINIA, Minn., March 13.
Death in the form of 500,000-tons of iron ore, rock, earth, ice and snow, slid down on 30 track layers who were working at the Norman open pit mine. Only four escaped the avalanche; three of these are in hospital suffering from injuries that may prove fatal. The place that was an open pit is now almost plain rock ore and earth. Here and there parts of a body may be seen, and crushed heads protrude from the mass. Arms and legs are seen at various angles as the great lantern steam shovels swing over the filled pit.

Special Evening Telegram.

RIO JANEIRO, March 13.
Anti-clerical riots occurred at Sao Paulo yesterday. The military police attacked the mob, which fought back. During the encounter many were killed and injured. Numerous arrests followed. All the churches have been placed under military guard. The rioting originated in the disappearance from the Parochial school of a young girl, who could not be produced by the school authorities when a demand was made for her.

MEXICO, March 13.
The entire Republic of Mexico is under martial law. The Government has begun the movement of additional troops. The rebels will be hunted down and every one found interfering with the railway service will be shot without trial. President Diaz professes confidence that he will crush the insurrection.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 14.
Russia has sent an ultimatum to China insisting upon a closer adherence to the provisions of the Treaty of 1881, which has been the subject of negotiations between the two countries for several weeks past. The Russian Army of Occupation it within a hundred miles of the frontier, marching on Kulja.

NAPLES, March 13.
An earthquake accompanied with strong detonations from Vesuvius occurred last night. An investigation showed that a great landslide had dropped from the upper part of the crater. The funicular railway was damaged. A party of tourists were about to ascend in the railway when the shock occurred.

LONDON, March 13.
Mr. Thomas McKinnon Wood, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, announced in the House of Commons today that the Mexican situation was engaging the attention of the Foreign Office. There was no reason to believe that British interests were endangered.

WASHINGTON, March 12.
The uprising in Mexico has spread to the States of Coahuila and Moscos, according to advices received by revolutionary agents here. The uprising as Moscos is formidable. Telegraphic communication with both States is almost destroyed.

Goff and Barnes, of the Carpenters' Union; Mr. O'Keefe, of the Bricklayers' Union; Mr. Woods, of the Firmen's Union; Mr. Whitmarsh, of the Shipwrights' Union; Mr. Collier, of the Tailors' Union; and Mr. Nichols, of the Typographical Union. All the speakers urged the Tinsmiths to keep up their fight for a fair wage, and promised them all the help possible, knowing they had the sympathy of the masses. New spirit was instilled in the Tinsmiths by last night's meeting, a fact which was acknowledged by their energetic President who, after thanking the Union representatives, brought the meeting to a close amidst much enthusiasm. Messrs. McGrath and Allan, on behalf of the Longshoremen's Union, offered the Tinsmiths the use of their hall on all and any occasion, a kindness which is appreciated by the Tinsmiths.

Hints to Householders.

(From the Medical Magazine, Feb. No.)
Medical Approval of Gas for Heating and Lighting—Important Tests at the Lewisian Infirmary.

The tests were conducted under the superintendence of Dr. F. S. Toogood, Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary.

1. To compare, hygienically, the relative values of the open fire and the gas radiator as warming agents.
 2. To ascertain if, and to what extent, the quality of the atmosphere of a room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps.
 3. To ascertain the hygienic value of the gas fire.
- The general conclusions arrived at from the results of the experiments are as follows:
- (1) That in both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation, gas consumed in modern incandescent gas burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.
 - (2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sick-room—in respect of its reliability, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust-producing propensities, and saving of both work and anxiety—are obvious to every professional man and woman.

Marine Insurance Coy.

Yesterday in the Assembly, Mr. Frank Morris, presented a petition from a number of Water Street merchants, asking for a charter to establish a Marine Insurance Company, to cover fish cargoes shipped from here. The trade at present pays very high premiums to foreign underwriters and these are certainly increasing. The establishment of the proposed company it is thought, will keep a deal of money in the country which heretofore found its way into the pockets of shareholders in foreign insurance companies. The projected company will not interfere with other local mutual companies and will be capitalized at \$100,000 with power to increase such capital. The matter was referred to a select committee consisting of Hon. R. Watson and Messrs. F. J. Morris, J. R. Goodison, G. Shea and H. J. Earle.

A tax for possible damage to extern roads and bridges was a separate matter and should be kept distinct from the Council's fees for driving within the city limits. It would be a pity to divide the monies collected. The Council in making these estimates had before them only their own requirements and it was proposed to devote half of the objects which the Council did not contemplate. Mr. Kent deplored the damage done to roads and bridges, the destruction of horses, &c., but, like Mr. Shea, he thought it unfair and unwise to divide this tax. Mr. Emerson was also severe in his condemnation of the running of cars over the roads and was glad to see that the owners would be taxed. The Premier held the same and the bill passed in its amended form and will be read a third time to-day.

Grey Backs Taft.

LONDON, March 1.
Sir Edward Grey referred to President Taft's speech on arbitration as bold and courageous and pregnant with consequences. He said such a statement ought not to go without response. We should be delighted to have such a proposal made to us. We should feel that it was something so momentous and so far-reaching in its possible consequences that it would require not only the signatures of both governments but the deliberate and decided sanction of Parliament, and that he believed would be given. The speech was cheered and created a deep impression. When he referred to the possibility of the adoption of Taft's proposal, he was listened to in intense silence. Then he said if the two greatest nations should thus make it clear that in no circumstances were they going to war with each other again, their example on the world must have beneficial consequences.
