



I do not think greater injury could be rendered to this country and the cause of the Allies, than that at this moment a suggestion should go forth to the world that there is any division of opinion here." The speeches of the Premier and Foreign Secretary Grey were followed with the closest atten tion, as they dealt with phases of the war situation which are of particular interest at present. Sir Edward Grey emphasized the long standing friendship between Britain and Bulgaria, and added, "our official information from the Bulgarian Government is that they have taken up a position of armed neutrality to defend their rights and independence; and that they have no aggressive intentions against their Balkan neighbors. Not only is there no hostility in this country toward Bulgaria, but there is a traditionally warm feeling of sympathy with the Bulgarian people. Prohibition Vote in Montreal

TO BE HAD WITHIN YEAR.

"The temperance cause is advancing so rapidly in the Province of Quebec that the people of Montreal need not be surprised if a prohibition vote is tried in the city before the end of next year," was the statement of John H. Roberts this morning on his return from Levis, where open voting on the prohibition question is now proceed-

In Levis, with a population of about 7,500, there are five hotels, twelve licensed grocers, one wholesale liquor shop and two bottlers. The number of electors is about 2,000, and it is expected that before the poll closes about half this number will

have recorded their vote. The prohibition vote is being taken under the Quebec Temperance Law, and is an open procedure. The Mayor or returning officer attends at the Town Hall, and all electors wishing to record their vote are asked by him whether they are in favor of the byaw and told to answer "Yea" or 'Nay." The answer is recorded, and the decision of whether the hy-law shall come into force rests on a simthis country's famous soldiers have ple majority. > Arrangements have been made by the temperance organisers, as well as by the liquor interests to ensure that there shall be a continuous stream of electors, aat stated intervals, so aas to keep the poll open as long as possible, and as the law allows one day for every 400 voters, it may be that the polling will not close until to-morrow. Up to yesterday the temperance people claim that there is a majority in their favor of almost ten to one, and they are already taking steps to start a campaign to "clean out" Quebec


