



KEEPING THE FACE SUPPLE.

To keep the skin of the face supple nd in good condition, steaming it is ideal. Too frequent steaming is not advised, once a week is usually often enough, as it has a tendency to make the skin flabby, but if indulged in now. and then, it serves to open the pores, emoves dust and accumulations and keeps the skin supple.

There are different methods of teaming the face, but a favorite one is to utilize the chafing dish, for with this the heat may be so regulated that the temperature of the water can be kept below the boiling point. However any kind of a vessel can be used over gas burner or alcohol lamp. The vater should never reach the boiling stage as steam from boiling water will burn the skin. The object is to cleanse the pores by perspiration.

Before beginning the steaming process, the complexion should be given a thick coating of cold cream, applying. it with the finger tips, using a rotary

The face is now held over the teaming vessel and a towel is so held hat the steam is directed to the face... After the perspiration starts, the ream is removed with a soft towel, and the complexion is again steamed. The wipping and steaming should. e continued until all trace of grease have disappeared. Ten to twenty ninutes may be devoted to this process, and then the face must e carefully dried, after which a dash of cold water will close the pores, the ace is again gently dried and a good

Shooting Old Seals.

Dear Sir,—My attention has been called to some interesting but very misleading figures and observations published in last evening's Telegram, and signed by the Hon. John Harvey, which purport to prove that the present rate of killing of old harp seals by the steamers' crews is leading to such a serious reduction of the herd as to warrant the absolute stoppage of this practice. Mr. Harvey's figures and contentions will not, however, bear close inspection, and are in my oninion based on entirely erroneous. opinion based on entirely erroneous premises, and misleading statistics as I hope to prove in this letter. As the important clause in the Bill now before the Legislature relating to this matter has admittedly been framed at Mr. Harvey's personal instigation, and there seems no other way open to sions upon which the clause has been based, I venture to trespass on your space to a greater extent than I would otherwise feel justified in doing. Mr. Harvey commences his article with figures purporting to show that there has been a serious steady average decrease in the catch of young harp seals at the front, taking 3-year peri-ods commencing in 1889 and ending in 1913, and so far as the quantity of seals actually manufactured is concerned, the figures are fairly correct.
