**The Reception  
And Its Moral.**

Last night's reception of the largest number of men from either service that have yet returned to the country at one time was exceedingly gratifying in its magnitude and spirit. It was only part of the debt that is owed them, there was no fault to be found with the payment. And if St. John's was glad to welcome them, it was plain also that they were glad and grateful to be so welcomed. The occasion had an additional appropriateness in that it reminded us emphatically of the part Newfoundland plays in the work of the service, senior also by many years in Newfoundland. In the friendly rivalry of the two services, the army has always had, and particularly in this war, the advantage that its deeds are more continuously conspicuous and by their nature more capable of celebration and advertisement than those of the army. There is besides of necessity no naval unit corresponding to our Regiment in the field, and our sailors must earn their honours individually. But that they have so earned them and that the fact is appreciated by their fellow countrymen last night's demonstration was ample testimony.

Though it may invite comparisons, which are not always desirable, it is no more than justice to say that demonstration was another indication of the fine spirit of St. John's, which has done so well in every line of service and in every obligation that the war has laid upon it. Not every other place in the Island has followed his lead. But many of these bronzed stalwarts that swung briskly down Water Street last night will scatter in a day or two to their homes all over the country. It will be not merely a pity, but a little strange, if, when they report again, as most of them will, they do not bring with them comrades to don the blue or the khaki. Their very appearance should have this effect: they are walking recruiting posters. The places that sent such men have others as good to send after them. Recruiting has lately fallen off again somewhat, and recruiting headquarters register almost our only and quite our most important, national service. It is in the fine appearance of our returned soldiers and sailors, their finer achievements, their experiences and personal narratives and all the sundry details of their active service that we believe the strongest incentive exists to the performance of this one paramount duty. If such an effect does indeed follow their homecoming, we shall have double reason to greet them warmly and feel proud of them.

**IN THE EAST.**

Not without reason the London papers express concern over the capture of Focsan by the Germans. This town formed the western, as Braila had formed the eastern, buttress of the Russian line thrown before the Sereth, and the opinion seems to be that the whole defence must now be abandoned. Thus another stage of the campaign ends and another position, that of the Sereth itself, must be assumed by the defenders. The situation is discouraging, but there is nothing desperate in it. Behind the friendly Russian shield the badly shaken Roumanian army reassembles its forces and its confidence: it represents a large potential factor that may soon become an actual one again. As the Times points out, if Mackensen is bent upon an invasion of Russia, his task is not a light one. If it is attempted from Dobrudja the Danube, first a tangle of marshes, must first be forced; if from Moldavia, first the Sereth and after it the Pruth interpose considerable obstacles that could only be overcome at great cost. This cost and that already paid for Wallachia may begin soon to prove too high for the Central Powers to afford from their human treasury.

Military prognostications have not often proved reliable in this war, but one comes now from America which opens up an interesting field of speculation. It is to the effect that a joint drive will before long be undertaken by the Russians in Armenia and the British east of Suez through the Holy Land, with the object of cutting across the Bagdad railway. To these concerted armies we might add the British army in Mesopotamia. There may be nothing in the prophecy, but more unlikely and fantastic ones have been made. The fresh British expedition against Baghdad is not likely to be intended to be an isolated adventure:

there has been too severe a lesson learned on that point. We might point, too, to the recent activity of the Russians in Armenia and the capture of El Arish by the British as events supporting the theory. If such a campaign does in fact open, it will be a most interesting one to watch and, if successful, attended by most important results. The major operations would, of course, fall to the share of the Russians, who have not far to go southward to cut this line, while the British offered the Turks the double distraction. The least that can be said of such an undertaking is that Turkey, already sick of the war and levied upon for operations in Europe, not her own, would find it the hardest problem she has yet been called upon to face.

Sir, With reference to your letter No. 47616/1916, dated 11th ultimo, I am commanded by the Army Council to forward herewith a report on the services of Surgeon Major Cluney Macpherson, Newfoundland Regiment. The Council desires to express their thanks to the Newfoundland Government for having placed the very valuable services of this Officer at their disposal.

Major Cluney Macpherson has rendered valuable services to the Anti-Gas Committee. Being in France at the time of the first gas attack, Major Macpherson suggested to the authorities at General Headquarters the substitution of a protective helmet made of flannel provided with a transparent window for the respirator of cotton waste, devised by Dr. John Haldane and Professor H. B. Baker, already in use. A helmet was made, and after it had been impregnated with suitable chemicals, suggested by Professor H. B. Baker, it was tested in Chlorine gas, and found to be good protection. Helms of this type were then made

and used for a few weeks with good results. Later developments in gas warfare caused the flannel helmet to be abandoned; but there is no doubt that Major Macpherson's suggestion was of great assistance to the troops during a critical period.  
Later, Major Macpherson proceeded to the Dardanelles and gave lectures, often under shell fire, to the troops on anti-gas measures. He also established a station at Mudros for reimpregnating helmets after use in gas. After the evacuation of Mudros he rendered similar services in Egypt and then visited Salonica, where he also gave lectures to the troops on recent developments in the methods of protection against gas.

**Sought Shelter.**

A young man, who gave his place of birth as Mosquito, Carbonear, called at the police station last night and begged for shelter, stating that he had no place to go to and was stranded. He also said that he had been in Sydney looking for work but could not get any. It since appears that because he did not offer his services for King and Country in Sydney, as he was eligible for enlistment, he was refused work.

## TO-DAY'S Messages.

11.30 A.M.

### THE ONLY WAY WITH GREECE.

LONDON, To-day. The Times to-day says it understands the note was drawn up at the Entente Allied conference in Rome, and had been despatched to Greece. It requires, the Times adds, prompt compliance with all the previous demands of the Allies and notification of acceptance of these demands by the Greek Government within a period which it is believed does not exceed forty-eight hours.

### SITUATION SERIOUS IN ROUMANIA

LONDON, To-day. The capture of Fokshani, the western bastion of the fortified Sereth line, by the Teutonic Allies is commented upon here as rendering grave the situation in Roumania. The fact that the capture of the town was not mentioned in the latest Russian official statement is regarded as probably being explainable by the Russian communication being of an earlier date than that of the German war office. The consensus is that the loss of Fokshani is a serious menace to the whole Sereth position. The Times to-day goes as far as to say: "It means that the Sereth lines are turned and that our Allies must now fall back once more. There is no sign of slackening in the enemy's determination. It may well be as our correspondent at Jassy, the new Roumanian capital, suggests, that he designs the complete subjugation of Roumanian territory." The Times pays a tribute to the great efforts Russia has put forth in Roumania's behalf, and says: "Her attempt to hold the Sereth lines has failed as the attempt to save Bucharest failed; but she has delayed the Germans for weeks and made them pay a heavy price for their successes. The main brunt of the recent defensive has fallen on Russia, for the bulk of the Roumanian army has been withdrawn behind the Russian lines to be refitted and reorganized. Russia could hardly hope to do more than delay the enemy's advance. Field Marshal Von Mackensen has three large armies at his disposal and we may be sure of Austria's superiority in big guns." With both their extremities now in the enemy's hands, the Sereth lines so far as they run west of the river are useless. No doubt the Russians are on their way by this time to the next main defensive, the River Sereth itself. Behind that line again is the formidable river line of the Pruth. Von Mackensen is now almost within striking distance of Russian territory, but he must either attempt the passage of the Danube from Dobruja or must force the river positions of the Sereth and Pruth before he can set foot on it.



### EXERCISE FOR HEALTH.

If your eliminative organs are sluggish and have been very much neglected you will need more strenuous exercise. This must be stimulated to activity. This can only be done by proper exercise. One of the best for this purpose should be taken in bed before rising.

Before you get up in the morning, lie out straight in bed with your hands at your sides. Then slowly raise the legs until they are at right angles with the body. Lower just as slowly and repeat ten times. Now jump out of bed, and follow this exercise with another, whose purpose also, is to induce peristaltic action. Stand erect, raise hands over head, and twisting the body to the right, at the waist only bend from the waist and try to touch the fingers to the floor. Turn the body to left at the waist only and repeat. Your legs are next in order. The following exercise while giving suppleness of movement, will also act upon the eliminative organs: Put hands on hips and swing first the right leg forward and back, and then the left leg. Try to keep your balance without taking hold of any support. After you have done this ten times raise the right leg until the knee is on a line with the waist. Hold it there a moment and lower. Repeat with the left leg.

You will find that these exercises, if vigorously done, will work miracles for you in your internal economy.

If you are careful to exercise daily, to add fruit juices to your diet, to avoid irregularity in meals, eating between meals, excess of sugars, starches and fats, and to Fletcherize your food, I do not think you will need any artificial aid to keep the interior of the body clean.

## St. John's Acclaims Naval Heroes.

**Hearty and Whole-Souled Welcome**  
Accorded 108 Reservists who Reached Town Last Night—Greeted by Entire Populace—Big Demonstration and Procession—City Ablaze With Bunting—Addresses by the Governor and Premier.

Shortly after 7 p.m. yesterday hundreds of people were seen making their way towards the railway station, and a few minutes passed the number increased to thousands, so great was the crowd that the large open space in front of the building and on Water Street extending east to Hutchings Street was packed with one great swaying mass of humanity. Not for many years was there such a gathering of the citizens of St. John's.

The Ladies' Reception Committee, who were the prime movers in the mammoth demonstration that was to follow, were as usual at their post. Those attending were:—Lady Morris, The Mayoress, Mrs. Browning, Mrs. (Justice) Johnson, Miss Shea, Mrs. Macpherson, Miss Whiteway, Miss Browning.

Lined up in front of the station and on the platform were the Royal Naval Reservists from H. M. S. Briton, the Volunteers now in training, squads from the C. L. B., C. C. C. and Newfoundland Highlanders, the C. L. B., C. C. C. and Newfoundland Regiment Bands.

The deputation of citizens who assembled at the station to receive the returning heroes consisted of the following:—Right Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Capt. Riley, M.C., A.D.C. to the Governor, Capt. McDermott, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Mayor Gosling, Lieut.-Col. Conroy, F. J. Morris, K.C., Councillor Tait, Major Montgomerie, Major Carry, Major Paterson and the Ladies' Reception Committee.

In accordance with the notice posted on the blackboard at the Railway Station, stating the hour of arrival of the express at 9 p.m. thousands of eyes watched with keen excitement the hands of the big electric clock in front of the railway building. Slowly the hands moved around till the minute hand showed 9:10; then the incoming express was heard to blow at Waterford Bridge, and ten minutes after the big engine was pounding its way into the eastern terminus amid the vociferous cheering of the thousands of people that lined the platform. After a few minutes of hurried inspection, in which time Master of Arms Thompson, of H. M. S. Briton gave some quick orders, the 108 men of the Royal Naval Reserve were marched to the front of the station and were again cheered to the echo by the big crowd that craned their necks and stood on tip-toe to get a look at the men that had done their bit. Never before had the people of

St. John's seen a finer body of men than the boys in blue when they stepped out into the cordon formed by the Volunteers in front of the station and were addressed by the Premier on behalf of the Ladies' Reception Committee and the country at large.

The greater number of the returned heroes have been absent for over two years and during that time have performed difficult and varied duties on board mine sweepers, battle cruisers and other ships of war in the North Sea, Atlantic Ocean and Eastern waters and upon their features is stamped the ruddy tinge of the strong breezes that sweep the ocean. Their strong physique, towering above the average citizen, filled everybody with admiration and pride.

After the Premier had concluded his address of welcome the giant parade, headed by the C. L. B. Band who were followed by the returned heroes, C. C. C. Band, the 8th. Regiment with bugle band, while squads from the city brigades acted as torch bearers, proceeded down Water Street and up Cochrane Street to Government House.

Along the route of march fully ten thousand citizens joined in the parade while from every window of private and public buildings cheers were given for the light-hearted sailors as they marched along with that easy gait and swing that is characteristic of the men of the Navy. At the Reid's Electric Works, Post Office, Bank Square and the Court House, the cheers were deafening, while all along the route of march a continual fusillade of patriotic songs and cheering was kept up. Reaching Government House grounds the returned heroes were lined up in front of the north entrance of Government House and were addressed by His Excellency the Governor who extended to the men of the Royal Naval Reserve a hearty welcome home. "You have true and loyal friends here who have been watching your career with deep interest all through the trying days of this terrible war. At the request of my Ministers we arranged with the Lords of the Admiralty that you should enjoy your leave in your old homeland among your dear relatives and friends." He was proud to see amongst the veterans Able Seaman Peddle who has won the Distinguished Conduct Medal and another, Seaman Boucher, who has been mentioned in despatches. He felt sure that had any of the others been given an opportunity they would have acquitted themselves in a like manner. His Excellency after complimenting the men on their appearance, called for three cheers which were heartily given. Cheers were also given for His Excellency the Governor and from the lusty throats of the naval heroes came one great cheer for the Ladies of the Reception Committee.

Cigars and cigarettes that were to be given to the men last night at Government House were sent aboard H. M. S. Briton, where the men received them this morning. By order of Commander MacDermott a special supper was served on board H. M. S. Briton last night when quite an enjoyable time was spent.

### The Imperial War Conference.

(From the Toronto Globe.)  
When the next Imperial Conference takes place at the end of February it will not follow the lines of previous conferences. The meeting summoned by the King will be in the nature of a War Council. Representatives from overseas Dominions will for the time being be members of the British War Cabinet. The subjects to be discussed will be restricted to those bearing on the conduct of the war, on the terms of peace that may be acceptable to the Allies, and on issues immediately arising out of the war. Premier Massey of New Zealand is credited with the statement that an opportunity may be found for the discussion of the problem of "the closer union and representation of the Empire." Whatever informal interchanges may take place regarding the proposed organic union of the Empire, it is unlikely that any attempt will be made at this stage to give effect to the undigested and impracticable theories of the new Imperialists. Sufficient unto the day are the battles thereof. The Empire is at war. To carry the European campaign through to a successful issue is a task that will tax all the energies of existing British and Dominion Ministries. The Empire has stood the test of an unparalleled strain. The new empire-builders will have to postpone, till the return of days of peace and normal political conditions, the discussion of a question that is bound, in any circumstances, to arouse considerable controversy.

Speaking before the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario in May, 1915, Mr. N. W. Rowell, with the political sagacity of the statesman, urged the calling together of an Imperial War Council "to consider how we can most effectively mobilize the resources of the whole Empire for this life-and-death struggle in which we are engaged." Not an Imperial Conference, be it noted, but an Imperial War Council. Mr. Rowell emphatically condemned at that time the mischievous busy-bodies who were clamoring for Imperial reconstruction in the midst of gigantic war. "If," said Mr. Rowell, "the Imperial Government thought there was any danger of there being thrust into the discussion at such a conference the question of the reorganization of the Empire, one need not wonder that they would hesitate about summoning such a conference." Nothing has happened since to alter this viewpoint.

It is argued by The London Chronicle that under the existing system the Dominions might be dragged into a war with which they have no concern, and that they must, therefore, adapt their political machinery to give a voice in shaping the Imperial policy. How would closer organic union serve to strengthen the freedom of choice of the Dominions? The question has only to be asked to foresee the difficulties that stand in the way of reconciling the freedom of national evolution with the proposals of the New Imperialists. Unity is essential to success in this war. In the words of Mr. Rowell: "We must save the Empire before we reorganize it."
