



Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-Please allow me space

to make a few remarks on the article which appeared in your issue of the 17th inst. under the heading "New Schedule of Wages," which shows a decrease of fifteen dollars per month in seamen's pay.

Well, sir, are we underdogs going to be banished from the country altogether, or what? Just fancy a sailor with a wife and two or three children, or a mother and two or three little sisters or brothers, getting sixty dollars per month and making half pay of an allotment, that's \$30.00 per month coming in to their dependents. How in the name of goodness is a woman and two or three children going to live, pay rent and buy coal on \$30.00 per month when, as stated, it costs \$35.00 to support one seaman on board ship with everything at wholesale prices? Perhaps those ship owners will say, "Oh, a seaman has no right to get married." Well, perhaps he hasn't, but he has a right to have a mother and perhaps other de-

The article under the aforesaid heading also states that crews of Danish, Norwegian and even Canaadian vessels are paid smaller wages than the crews of Newfoundland vessels. As to the Danish vessels, I do not know, but I know for a fact that both Canadian and Norwegian, and I will have to mention American, shipowners nay better wages than our NAd shipowners. For instances on an American foreign going vessel the wages is \$80.00, and the crew are divided into three watches, working eight hours per day, getting paid extra for overtime-I don't mean for reefing or taking in sail, but if the vessel has got to be shifted in dock before 7 a.m. or after 5 p.m. the crew are paid extra for doing so.

Now, on some of our Nfid. vessels the crew in some cases have to work 24 hours per, but nobody hears tell of overtime. I wish to inform my readers that this is not for my own benefit alone, as I do not expect to sail before the mast again, but as Capt. Kean said last night at the fishermen's meeting in the C. C. C. Hall, "I like to be with my countrymen when

fighting for their rights. I have sailed before the mast as mate and master, and back to mate again, and what I find on Nfld, vessels is, the only man on board worth mentioning is the master. All the others are underdogs. For myself I don't care what position I hold on a certain amount of discipline on board ship I consider myself equal to any man and any man equal to me. In fact I have seen cases where the vessel may-no, not may but wouldbe on the bottom to-day if it was not for some member of the ship's crew. The blow was stopped by Bloomfield's left and the sudden contact shattered McTigue's

"McTigue fought out the remaining rounds, using his left arm punches the greater part of the time, only attempting to cross with the right occasionally. Previous to the accident McTigue had much the better of the bout. In the first round he set too fast a pace for Bloomfield and knocked him down for the count of five. Bloomfield being saved by the gong.

In the remaining rounds there was little advantage to Bloomfield even with McTigue fighting.with an injured arm. 


