

It was in 1836 that he saw the bales at Liverpool. In 1852, no less than 2,186,486lb. was imported. think no one in the world is so Twenty years later the figures had risen to 3,878,7391b. and still the demand grew.

The first small mills at Bradford were added to as progress was made. but within a few years of the first discovery it was found necessary to erect enormous buildings to cope with with the demands of the new industry. In 1852 Sir Titus Salt decided to use a piece of ground known as the Saltaire Estate, lying near the canal at Bradford.

His mills were then scattered in various parts of the district; he resolved to have one factory big enough to contain all his machinery and his army of workpeople. The Saltaire Mills were built, covering six full acres of ground and employing within a short time of their erection 3,000 hands. The business is now one of the greatest in the country.



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

DUBLIN, May 24-A bill is to be troduced into the Dail this session to carry into effect the pledge made Michael Collins that the Irish overnment would redeem all the Irish Republican bonds.

These bonds, to the amount of bout \$10,000,000, were floated in the nited States, in Ireland and elsehere, and contain an undertaking that they would be redeemed six onths after the re-establishment in Ireland of an Irish Republic. Michael collins claimed that the treaty, apart rom its terms, effectively establishd Irish freedom, and that the condion on which the bonds were issued had been practically realized.

Despite the difficult Irish financial position, President Cosgrave, as the bonds shall be paid off.

In ten years of his professional ca er, the St. Paul challenger has sucssfully withstood all efforts to snock him out, or even down, while he in turn has counted 30 knockouts in his last 34 bouts.

It was back in 1918 that Tommy counted his first knockout, flooring

For several years, Gibbons was merely a successful boxer, and it was not until 1921 that he began to show a punch that sent opponent after opstart of his successful march toward championship bout.

Gibbons won 20 straight centes ia the knockout route, then was outpinted by Harry Greb in a 15-round out in New York, in March, 1922, which went to Greb on the referee's lecision and with it the lightheavyweight title Gibbons was striving for.

In the list of knockouts that preeded the Greb affair, there were such names as Al Reich, Tony Melcher, Clay Turner, Jack Herman, Willie Meehan, and others who lasted less than one round. Paul Sampson, Jack Clifford, and others succumbed to his friving punch in a few rounds.

Since the Greb bout, Gibbons has ome along again with more knockouts and decision victories. In his last ncounter he met Chuck Wiggins, no mean portion in the lightheavyweight division, and Gibbons floored him six times before the referee stopped it in

Financial reward, at least imme diate, had little to do with Gibbons' eagerness in signing with Dempsey. The title bout has been his ambition for three years, and before he comes into the money at Shelby, the paid attendance will have to climb beyond the \$300,000 mark. For his end, Dempsey is assured of \$300,000, regardless of the attendance.
