Earth Swallows **Teams of Horses**

GROUND OPENED UP AND PLOUGH-MAN LEFT ON EDGE OF CAVITY.

Two horses were killed and oloughman had a narrow escape in a field at Intake Farm, Mansfield, Notts. The field, which has been the scene of previous unaccountable subsidences. was being ploughed when the ground fell away just ahead of the team of horses, and a hole was formed 12 feet deep.

Before the ploughman could stop the horses they had plunged into the hole, dragging the plough after them. Both horses were suffocated. It is not known certainly what causes these caverns to form, but they are put down to the effect of colliery working by some,

Geologists who have examined the scene, however, believe that there is an underground stream that wears away the limestone rocks, letting down the surface earth.
