For that purpose he proposed beforew annually for five years, under a Imperial guarantee, at four per cent. and one per cent sinking fund, the sum of 20,000 sterling, and the annual charge a the amount would be—List year, \$15,33; 2nd year, \$107,066; 3rd year, \$150,-

From this it would be seen that the maximum would be \$67,000.
