The Pacific Scandal Committee From the manner in which they are acting, it is evident that the Government are doing their very best to retard and delay the progress of the Bill which is to enable the Committee appointed in the above case, to take evidence under oath. Sir John, in the Commons, staved it off as long as decency would permit, and now his colleagues have been following his example in the Senate. When the Bill passed the Commons it should have at once been taken up, and passed without delay through the Upper House. But it was only on yesterday—and that by compul-sion—that the Bill was introduced, and, after considerable hesitation on the part of the Government, read a first time. Mr. Campbell—who very reluctantly assumed the responsibility-was then requested to allow the rules to be suspended, in order that the Bill might be passed without delay-especially as it contains but one clause, and is scarcely likely to provoke any discussion. To this, however, the Minister refused to agree, and persisted in his determination that the second reading should stand over until to-day, giving as his reasons, that there was no need for haste.

Perhaps not—from a Ministerial view of the case. The Government, doubtless, are not anxious that their misdeeds in the Pacific Railway matter should come to light. They would prefer to wait a little longer, and are studiously endeavoring to keep off the evil day as long as they possibly can, and therefore, of course, "there is no need for haste."

But the opinion of the country is somewhat different. The people are beginning to have their eyes opened to the state of things existing in their midst. The serious charges against the Government have been published throughout the length and breadth of the land, and the country, knowing the issues at stake, is only anxious that the charges should be confirmed or disproved—if they can be disproved—without any further delay. Consequently, there is great "need for haste." Can we wonder, therefore, if the country attribute the action of the Government to nothing but a desire to postpone, and if possible, to shelve the threatened inquiry into their equivocal proceedings?

The Government and The Custom

THE GOVERNMENT AND THE CUSTOM Houses.-During the debate on the Estimates, on Tuesday, Mr. Stirton exposed the partiality and favouritism of the Government in regard to the erection of Custom Houses. A vote was taken last year for a grant for a custom house at Three Rivers. No reason could be adduced for the proposed expenditure, unless it was for the purpose of purchasing political This grant was referred to on Tuesday, when the item for the construction of custom houses was under discussion. Mr. Stirton claimed that Gueiph was entitled to a custom house, seeing that the revenue collected at this post for the past fiscal year, of which we have returns, was, \$382,000, whilst the revenue collected at Three Rivers for the same period was only \$28,000. The argument was unanswerable, yet the Government would and could give no reason for spending the money on the Three Rivers custom house than the very unsatisfactory one, that the grant had been made last year. The Government in locating their public buildings never think of the convenience of business men, or the requirements and claims of cities or towns, but distribute their favours to suit their own political purposes or those of their supporters. Mr. Stirton has done all that he can in exposing this great wrong to Guelph, and he has fastened on the Government the charge of shameful partiality and favouritism in regard to this matter of the erection of custom houses. \$382,000, whilst the revenue collected

The Pacific Railway Contract.—There is some reason to suppose that the million of money which the Pacific Railway Act, as it is recited in the articles of agreement, requires shall be deposited in the hands of the Receiver General within one month safter the date on which the charter was granted, is a myth. The Receiver-General has not been put in actual possession of a cent of the money he holds, and acknowledges only the receipt of bank certificates of deposits on account of subscription for shares. That, however, might sufficiently authenticate the deposit were it not for a suspicious declaration in the Receiver General's receipts, which is to the effect that it is not the intention of the Government to remove any such deposit unless the removal is required to secure its safety. It is naturally suggested, in view of this condition in the receipt of the Receiver General, that the money has not been actually deposited, but possibly that the banks, some of them at least, by collusion and in anticipation of business from the Company, have granted certificates of deposit after receiving the guarantee of the Government above referred to.



The New Election Law.

The following is an analysis of the new Dominion Election Law, recently introduced by Sir John Macdonald, and now under the consideration of the House of Commons. It contains no less than 171 clauses. The following is an analysis of the most important clauses:

On nomination, day the returning officer, after having read the usual documents, shall ask the electors present to choose their candidates, and if there be no more than one he shall declare him elected one hour only after the election of such candidate, and during that interval any other candidate may be nominated by one of his figents.

The qualification of each candidate is set at \$2,000, and on nomination day, he shall be obliged to hand the returning officer an affidavit to that effect.

The law contains a new clause in virtue of which an absent elector may vote by means of a sworn declaration, bearing his name, his address, and alleging his right. This declaration must be signed and stront to after the nomination.

The bill enacts the same penalty as preceding laws against persons guilty of fraudulent practices, and also against the candidates who, for purpose or corruption, give directly of themselves, or indirectly through others, food or drink to electors, with the view of furthering their elections. The fine shall be \$200 and costs.

Before, during and after the election, candidates must pay no expenses relating to their elections, except through one or several agents whose names must be reported to the returning officer by the candidates. A violation of this clause must constitute a misdemeanor. The candidate himself may pay only his personal expenses caused by the election. The agent shall be bound to hand in to the returning officer, a statement in detail of the candidate's expenses, failing-in which they will be liable to a fine of \$20 for every day of delay.
