New York, Oct. 29 -The Post's Washington says the president has had furnished him the chief points of the reports of the heads of departments and is considering his message. A report has been circulated that he will recommend the abolition of the internal revenue system, but it not credited. It is doubtful whether the president will go It is doubtful whether the president will go any further than he did last year when he recommended the repeal of all internal revenue taxes except the tex upon distilled spinits. The treasury officials are confident that the revenues will not permit such wholesale reduction of taxation, as the abolition of the whole internal system. They have no confidence in the maintenance of the surplus at the present figure, and their opinions are based upon a thorough study of the effect of the reductions by last congress and of the necessities of government.

PACKSTAIRS JOURNALISM

We should like to know upon what principle of expediency-for the principles of decency seem there long ago forgotten-the conservative party in Toronto are outraging the common sense of the country by the style of their writings. No journalist sufficiently foul-mouthed to serve the turn could, it appears, be procured in Ontario; so the maritime provinces and the United States have been laid under contribution to furnish writers who were willing, for a consideration, to descend still lower than the previous depth of the Mail, and to minister to the basest passions of social and of political life. The first has now been experimented on for some time here, to the disgrace of our city, by an evening paper, pominally-but merely nominally-uncon nected with the Mail. It has been univers. ally condemned by the moral and honorable portion of the community. It has been censured by the pulpit and the press, but its proprietors, when money was to be made, cared for neither. It has been, since its commencement, busily endeavoring to introduce a style of journalism as new as contemptible, and as immoral as either. The backstairs of every city mansion have been traveled in the eager search for that particular description of news it considers suitable to the intelligence of its readers. Servant girls have been encouraged to tattle in its columns the private affairs of the families with whom they reside. Secret enemies can send to its office the distorted caricatures of better men, and find them faithfully reproduced for the amusethe contemptible, and the disgust of the honest. About Shooting Down Escaping Convicts In view of the killing of young Scott by Guard Harte outside the central prison walls last Tuesday, Mr. Fenton, county crown attorney, last night made the following strt.ment to a World reporter, with a request that it be made public:

strtement to a World reporter, with a request that it be made public:

Police constables and officers have not the same powers as guards and officers of convict prisons. The latter are justified in thoting and killing any convicts necessary to prevent an escape, but ordinary constables or police officers are not entitled to shoot and kill an escaping prisoner who offers no resistance, unless (1) the prisoner is accused of felony and (2) his escape cannot otherwise be prevented. If such escaping prisoner is charged with misdemeaner merely, or even if he be charged with felony and his escape can be prevented without killing him, the constable who kills him is liable to be tried for man 1-ughter at the least and possibly murder. It is ovicus that greater powers of control should be entrusted to guards in convict prisons, because the convicts are not merely accused, but con icted, and legally adjudged to suffer imprisonment for their crime. Unless the officers guarding convicts had power to kill on the instant any of them attempting to escape the convicts might rise en masse, overpower their guards, and effect their own deliverance. Therefore the dominion legislature has enacted that all prisoners confined in the central prison shall be subject to all rules and regulations approved by the licutemant-governor of Ontario, and the governor in council has approved of rules and regulations which permits any convict attempting to escape.
