Ottawa, April 23.—The debate on the address was concluded before 6 o'clock, and in honor of St. George's Day both the Senate and Commons took a holiday in the evening.

There were two interesting speeches in the Commons on the address, the other by Hon. Mr. Oustigan. It seemed a strange proceeding that a meeting sitting on the front ministerial benches should be found in the House getting accustomed to the work in Mr. Costigan's case. Once in a while, the Opposition, led by Mr. McArthur, would cheer the leader of the Opposition.

Mr. Costigan's speech was coldly received. Mr. Costigan does not often take part in a debate, but his was a notable contribution to the discussion of the school question.

STILL UNDECIDED

A BULLET THROUGH HIS HEAD

THE VICTIM LIVED TO TELL OF HIS MURDER

A Suburban Trapper Deliberately Shot His Companion and Left Him to Die in the Bush—Found Alive 24 Hours Later

Suburb, Ont., April 23.—Joseph Xie drew was shot by Jules Sauve at Carter, 36 miles west of here on the C.P.R. Saturday afternoon. Sauve and Xie drew had been out on a hunting and trapping expedition. They were returning from their season's operations, when within four miles from Carter, Sauve fired a bullet into Xie's back part of the head.

The bullet did not penetrate Xie's brain, and he was found the next day by James McIntosh, who happened to be passing on his way to the farm. He had laid out fully 24 hours in this condition, and was unable to make himself known.

Police Magistrate Quibell and Constable Gage of Suburb arrived on the scene for quick merchandise. Xie drew meantime Sauve had been apprehended. Sauve had his auto-mortem statements made, and was taken to the morning of the prisoner being present, and being identified by the victim as the man who shot him.

Crown Attorney Kehon of South St. Wm. Keir-Harvey moved for an adjournment of the trial until the morning of the commencement. Xie drew is resting easy, but he cannot survive.

IN THE COMMONS

Details of the Peace Treaty Not Known in London

London, April 23.—The House of Commons today the Government was questioned concerning the terms of the peace treaty between Japan and China.
