SUPPLYING THE

BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES WHO RE-MEMBER THE POOR AT XMAS.

The St. George's Society Distributes Abou Four Tons of Beef—The Irish Protest ants Care for More Than 200 Familie -Christmas at the Various Hospitals of the City.

To many in this city festive Christmastide brings little enough of joy, and there would be a dearth of Christmas cheer in many homes were it not for the generosity of those citizens who, as members of St. George's Society, the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society and kindred organizations, seek to ameliorate the condition of their poorer brethren by providing for their Christmas dinner. Yesterday, in accordance with their annual custom, these societies distributed their Christmas provisions.

There was a throng of poorly clad nual custom, these societies distributed their Christmas provisions.

There was a throng of poorly cladmen, women and children in waiting at St. George's hall, in Elm-st, at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, when the distribution was begun. For several hours thereafter the crowd taxed the capacity of the hall and the patience of the committee in charge. At one time it required all the president's persuasiveness to keep the applicants in order. All were supplied, however, some 8000 pounds of beef and 1600 loaves of bread being distributed, in addition to 400 pounds of tea, a proportionate quantity of sugar and candies and biscuits in abundance.

The day's workers were: Percival F. Ridout, president; George Stanway and George H Gooderham, vice-presidents; W. T. Boyd, J. H. Mason, S. Trees, J. J. Allworth, F. B. Cumberland and R. W. Elliott, past presidents; G. W. Beardmore, D. Plews, James Spooner and D. T. Symons, stewards. Henry Lucas, F. Sole, Elms Henderson and George Musson, committee. Secretary J. E. Pell, a veteran in benevolent work, was in evidence throughout the day. Seven hundred families, or about 8500 persons, were supplied with materials for to-day's dinner.

The rooms of the I.P.B.S. in Yongestreet Arcade also presented a busy scene for several hours yesterday. Although the applications were not as numerous as in previous years, there were distributed provisions as follows: 2500 pounds of beef, 225 pounds of sausages, 500 loaves of bread, and a large quantity of currant bread, tea, sugar and butter. This represents the Christmas dinners of some two hundred families.

Secretary John Bailie was in charge, with the following gentlemen as assistants: President R. C. Hamilton and James Hunter and Messrs. Robert Moon, Alex Purse, Frank Somers, and Samuel Crane.

New York, Dec. 24.—The Mail and Express this afternoon prints the following: An American who has been lowing: An American who has been sojourning in Cuba for some time past, and who has had excellent opportunities for observing the course of war in the island, returned to New York to-day and told what he had learned. He reports a heavy fight outside of Havana between the Insurgent forces under Maximo Gomez and the Spanish troops. The engagement took place near the town of Colon.

"It is worthy of note," he said, "that this town is within 120 miles of Havana, and while the Spanish authorities, as is always the case, report slight vana, and while the Spanish authorities, as is always the case report slight losses on their part and the rebels as having been severely punished it cannot obliterate the fact that the troops of Maximo Gomez have marched from the easternmost province, a distance of about 400 miles, with but slight hindrance on the part of the Spaniards. iards.
"Some 100 miles to the eastward of

"Some 100 miles to the eastward of Colon is the celebrated "Trocha," or trench, a dead line heavily fortified and garrisoned to prevent the entrance of the Insurgent troops, but which they have passed without firing a shot. They are now in the richest sugar producing province in the island.
"In point of fact, three-quarters of the island is at present disputed territory, there only remaining loyal to spain the provinces of Havana and Finas del Rio or Vuelta Abajo, where the tobacco growing interest can not Finas del Rio or Vuelta Abajo, where the tobacco growing interest can not afford to be disturbed, as this would cut off a large income supplied by the Cuban cigar manufacturers of Tapma and Key West.

"The Insurgents are well supplied with ammunition and arms. The Spaniards have not caught a single supply expedition. For years Cuban manus.

iards have not caught a single supply expedition. For years Cuban manufacturers have been contributing to a fund for this very revolution.

"The Cuban patriots are blowing up roads, tcutting telegraph wires and firing the sugar-cane. When the Government troops appear they retreat without offering battle.

"The ability of Spain to pursue the war depends on her ability to collect the taxes and contributions. A very large part of this income is derived from the cane industry. With the exception of a few sugar states very

from the cane industry. With the exception of a few sugar states very close to Havana, there is no grinding of cane in the island to-day. This the Spaniards characterize as anarchist warfare, but certainly the best way of beating an enemy is to cut off his supplies and that is the policy of the Cub-

ans.


