BYLAW No. 9 For 1920

A BY-LAW FOR THE ESTABLISH-MENT OF A COMMISSION TO MANAGE THE WATERWORKS AND HYDRO-ELECTRIC WORKS

WHEREAS it is deemed desirable to provide for entrusting the con-struction and control and manage-ment of the Waterworks and Hydro-Electric Works of the Village of Wat-ford to a Commission to be called "The Public Utilities Commission of the Village of Watford." "HEREFORE the Municipal Coun-cil of the Village of Watford enacts as follows:--1. That the construction, control and management of the Waterworks

and management of the Waterworks and Hydro-Electric Works of the Vil-lage of Watford be, and the same are

lage of Watford be, and the same are hereby entrusted to a Commission to be called "The Public Utilities Com-mission of the Village of Watford." 2. That such Commission shall consist of three members to be elect-ed as provided under the provisions of "The Public Utilities Act" and Amendments thereto, and the Com-missioners shall have all the powers, rights and privileges as are confer-red by the said Act or Amendments red by the said Act or Amendments thereto upon Commissions establish-ed thereunder.

This By-law shall take effect and come into force immediately upon the passing thereof.



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

LAMBTON COUNTY COUNCIL Warden's Address, Surburban Road Commission Report, Treasurer's Report, Etc.

"We have had a very successful year. Providence has been good to the Province of Ontario, in fact to the whole Dominion, and the County of Lambton had one of the best crops in its history," said Warden Thomas Simpson in the prefatory remarks of his address at the open ing of the December session of the Lambton County Council in their Chambers, County Court House building, Monday. "Further, added the Warden, we have not a single action against the county for damages due to bad roads, which is in itself quite a compliment."

Sand and Gravel Forecasting some of the work to ome before the County Fathers, he stated that one of the several things to be taken up will be the question of getting a supply of sand and gravel from the companies dredging in the St. Clair River. "I understand some municipalities have obtained some sand and gravel, he said, but the County of Lambton has not received a single yard from the com panies operating along the river." Mothers' Pensions

Continuing, the Warden stated that a short time ago he had receiv ed a communication from the Pro vincial Mothers' Pension Board re questing him to name a committee to operate in the county. He selected the following; R. J. White, chairman, R. Stirrett, John S. Donald, Mrs. Neil Grant and Mrs. Anderson. "These pensions will no doubt cost the county some money, he said, but it will relieve some of the societies who are now carrying on the work. I have looked over some of "he applications and the ladies who are to receive the aid are in bad financial condition, but I am satisfied that we have men on the board who will look after the interests of the county as well as the needy.

"I might also report that the advisory board of the County met the committee from the Council of the County of Middlesex and arrived at a plan whereby the county systems can be linked up, and I think it would be advisable to prepare bylaws to take up some of the short roads as connecting links" he said in conclusion.

Breif Session. The council did not get warmed up to buiness. They assembled at two o'clock and adjourned at three after disposing of a number of com-





QUALIFICATION OF MUNICIPAL CANDIDATES

As under the new law tenants are now qualified to run for municipal office such as Mayor, Reeve, Councillor, etc., the provisions of the Act may be interesting and are as follows:

Every person shall be qualified to be elected a member of the Council of a municipality who

1. (a) Is a householder residing in the municipality or is rated testified that approximately 35 per on the last revised assessment roll of the municipality for land held in his own right for an amount sufficient to entitle him to be entered on the Voters' List, and who resides in or within two miles of the muntcipality

vised Voters' List as qualified to vote at Municipal Elections. (c) Is a British subject.

(d) Is of full age of 21 years (e) Is not disqualified under

2. The rating of land shall be in respect of a freehold or leasehold legal or equitable, or partly of each. 3. "Householder" shall mean the person who occupies and is assessed as owner or tenant of a dwelling or apartment house or part of a dwelling or apartment house separately occupied as a dwelling.



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
