## GRAND LODGE.

The Grand Lodge of British Columbia was instituted by Joseph Chilberg, G. C. T. of Washington, acting as a special D. R. W. G. T., at Victoria on the 6th May, 1886, with a membership of ten lodges. The late Rev. R. B. Hemlow was elected the first G. C. T. and Samuel Gough was first G. Sec. In the fall of the same year the first annual session was held at Nanaimo, twelve lodges, with an average membership of 41 members,

years, and Bro. Keith was elected G. Sec.

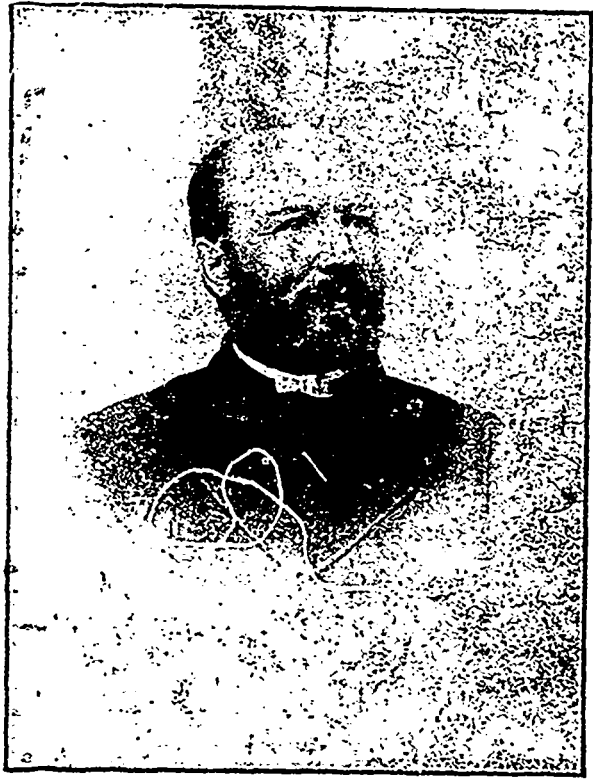
The fourth session was held at Victoria when twenty lodges, averaging 46 members each, were represented. At this session Bro. Gough was again elected G. Sec.

The fifth annual session in 1890 was held in Nanaimo when 29 lodges having an average membership of 41, were represented. At this session C. S. Keith was elected G. C. T. and R. W. Allison was elected G. Sec., which office he held for two years.

The sixth annual session was held

being represented. The Rev. J. A. Wood was elected G. C. T. and the G. Sec. was re-elected. At the second annual session held at New Westminster thirteen lodges, with an average membership of 46 members, were represented. At this session the late Rev. R. B. Hemlow was again elected G. C. T. and Bro. Gough re-elected G. Sec.

The third session was at Vancouver in 1888, and represented seventeen lodges, averaging 44 members each. Bro. Donald McGillivray was elected G. C. T. and served as such for two

at New Westminster in 1891 when the Rev. A. E. Green was elected G. C. T., which office he still holds. At this session 31 lodges were represented, having an average of 47 members each. This was the highest average the Grand Lodge ever reached.

At the seventh session held at Vancouver 45 lodges averaging 38 members each were represented. Lewis Hall was here elected G. Sec., which office he still occupies.

Victoria was the place of meeting for the eighth annual session last year. At this session 51 lodges, with the

We take great pleasure in presenting herewith a very good likeness of our esteemed Brother, the Honorable Simon B. Chase, P.R.W.G.T., and Chancellor of the Course of Study.

TO ALL GOOD TEMPLARS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA, GREETING :

The Order to which we have pledged our allegiance at the altar which we so much love, has claims upon us for more than our bare loyalty, but for the best preparation we can make to give it a brilliant and effective service.

Another has said our Order needs a "sanctified intelligence," and certain it is every Good Templar needs a thorough knowledge of the organized force he proposes to use, as well as the strength and character of the evil he has enlisted to fight. Each one needs this not only that his blows may be more telling on the enemy, his persuasions more convincing on the victim, but also that his own heart may become more and more interested in our great work for humanity.

We must love this work before we can become effective; we must love it, or we will not care to stay in it after the novelty dies away. We will not love it unless we study its purposes, its history, its triumphs and its defeats, and keep continually in touch with the Order's current pulsations.

Yesterday (June 4) was the fortieth anniversary of my connection with the Order, having used 160 different passwords, twenty of which were made by me during my term as R.W.G. Templar. The retrospect of my Good Templar history shows me how far short of my opportunities have I come in this service, and how much more I might have done, both in rescuing the victim and in forming public sentiment in favor of total abstinence and prohibition, had I been privileged to take the Course of Reading when I crossed the threshold of temperance work.

That the moving spirits in our Order early recognized the necessity

of educating our membership on all the questions pertaining to the reform and intended to prescribe some plan for such instruction is apparent from the language used in the ritual for our subordinate lodges. This was prepared and adopted at the 10th session of the R.W.G. Lodge in 1864 at Cleveland, Ohio, and has been in use ever since. The writer was chairman of the Committee and hence knows whereof he speaks when he says, that the authors intended when they wrote the three charges of Vice Templar, Chaplain and P.C. Templar, drawing lessons of temperance from nature, the Scriptures and history, that specific plan of extended temperance teaching should be formulated and put into execution in our Order. Indeed, we promise this in the final charge of the C. Templar to the initiate in these words: "I charge you to consider well the lessons of this lodge. Of necessity they have been brief; ponder them on your mind, and as you advance in our noble order they will be more fully exemplified and set forth." But no steps were taken to "more fully exemplify and set forth" these brief lessons until in 1888 the R.W.G. Lodge promulgated the Course of Study.

We now offer to Good Templars a rare opportunity to become thoroughly posted in all that pertains to the great temperance reform, and thus fitted to do efficient service. Read what two of our students say, who have just sent in their examination papers on this year's readings.

Sister Mrs. Ada A. Barnes, of Oberlin, Ohio, says: "How I wish every thinking man and woman would read the books, 'Alcohol in Science' and 'Temperance Physiology,' and that they might be taught to every child. How much good I might have done could I have read them years ago."

Rev. E. Edwards' of Minersville, Pa., also says: "'Alcohol in Science' has pleased me greatly. Would that I could have studied it twenty years earlier."

Bro. Jas. Mather, G. Sec., of the Grand Lodge of Western Australia, under date of March 8th, writes the following, showing how he values this branch of Templar work: "In this part of the Templar jurisdiction we are looking forward with intense interest to the full development of this educational department, and expect in a few years to see the whole system of Templar work revolutionized. During the nineteen years that I have been connected with the Order, there has been nothing attempted so calculated to benefit, so likely to elevate

and prosper, so certain to give permanency to our advance and solidity to our membership, as the general adoption of the Course of Study. Feeling this and knowing the great want of our beloved Order, it will be no fault of mine if you do not soon have many graduating students in this western portion of our island continent."

British Columbia has done well in supporting the Course, having had classes at New Westminster and Victoria, besides single students in other places, but we want her to do better. For this year's reading we want her to give us 100 students, and then we can surely have commencement exercises for the graduating class at her Grand Lodge session in 1896, and perhaps in 1895.

The conclusion of the great Temperance Congress just held at Prohibition Park in honor of the 90th birthday of Gen. Neal Dow, is summarized by another in these words: "The temperance reform needs a revival of total abstinence education. As one means to such an end what can be more efficient than the Good Templars' Educational Course?"

Will not our Brothers and Sisters of British Columbia come to the front by giving us 100 applicants for the Course within the next three months?

Since then we have been at home each year but one. Every delegate comes prepared and expects to pay as he goes, and no lodge is left to grapple with the burden of a lot of committee debts. The business can be transacted with greater despatch and less interruption than in some busy city where there are sights to see and friends to meet."

We feel that we cannot add so the above more than to say that we believe the time has come when British Columbia should adopt a permanent site for its annual meetings.

It is the fashion among dealers in all kinds of goods to exhibit the result of the use of their goods. The merchant places in his window finely decorated figures, showing the effects of his laces, silks and pretty ornaments. The grocer hangs up the happy pictures of "Mellin' Food Babies" and tired housekeepers rejoicing in some labor-saving soap. The shoemaker has pictures showing the gloss given to old shoes by some excellent shoe polish, and so on. In all the different kinds of business, men proudly display samples of their goods or the results of their use. The saloon keeper, however, has no desire to decorate his window in this way. He can have no pride in the work done inside. Yet, if you look near his door, very often a real live figure, the poor, ragged, shivering, little form of the child of one of the patrons of his shop, will plainly advertise his work for him. It is an example of the kind of child-life the dealer in wines and liquors will make for the

little ones of his customers. These bare-footed, ragged figures standing near the bar-room doors are, alas, the life-pictures which advertise the grog-shop's work, the manufactures of a business made legal by so-called Christian governments!

In presenting this issue of our paper to the public we do so without any excuse, as we deem the financial affairs of this Province fully justify us in curtailing expenses.
