THE WINNIPEG CONFERENCE ON EDUCATION

FOR CANADIAN CITIZENSHIP

OCT 21-3 1919

I attended all the sessions of the Conference, as the University's representative, and beg to submit the following brief report.

The gathering was undoubtedly the most representative one that has ever met to consider Canada's educational problems. Over 1500 delegates were registered and every part of the Dominion was well represented. It was obvious from the discussions, and still more from general conversations and committees, that the members voiced in their various ways the widespread anxiety as to the function of education in the future of Canada. More than any one contribution to the debates, the outstanding impression was of the earnestness of the delegates, and their realisation of the deep importance of extension and reform in education as a national concern. This was well seen in the crucial debate on the need of a Bureau of Education, upon which there was a very sharp difference of opinion; for a compromise was reached to which the majority agreed in order to preserve as far as possible the chance of unanimity among the provinces.

The Conference wisely confined its resolutions in the main to general principles, affirming (a) the power of education in the building up of character, individual and national

(b) the need of forward movement in all grades of education with reference to its moral outcome; and

(c) the needs of immigrants.

In order to ensure that the Conference should not end in such general affirmations, it was resolved to form a permanent organisation representing the provinces. This National Council will have funds at its disposal, with which it is charged to establish a bureau. By this means it will be able to study in detail the ethical bearings of education, to examine the various schemes and experiments so as to work towards a policy, to support any promising movements for the strengthening of moral training within and without the schools, and to carry on educational propaganda. The bureau will be a collecting and clearing house, available for consultation, and able to disseminate information by publications. (This outline of the functions of the bureau was drawn up by your representative.)

The Council is to convene another Dominion Conference after an interval of not more than three years, report on the progress of of the bureau in its experimental period, and in the light of its experience rediscuss the problems of education for Canadian citizenship. Everything will depend on the personnel of the bureau, on the co-operation of the provincial representatives, and on the continued backing of the business community which brought the Conference into being and carried it through. If these conditions are favorable, the Conference will have proved a historic landmark in the development of Canadian education and of the Canadian nation.

My dear Sir Arthur:

I recall with great pleasure the dinner to the Scottish Curlers in Montreal, when I sat beside you. I am, as you see, Chairman of the Committee having in charge the celebration of the 150th Anniversary of the beginning of Scottish Immigration to Canada. You have already done us the honor of allowing us to use your name as a member of our Honorary Committee, but we have another and greater favor to ask of you.

During the celebration on July 17th at Pictou, and on the 18th at New Glasgow, we propose having meetings, both English and Gaelic, to be addressed by some of our distinguished visitors, the idea being that Scottish people will not be satisfied with mere entertainment, but will want something of an intellectual character. Will you kindly be one of the speakers at the English meetings? We should be greatly pleased and obliged. I would not think of limiting you in your choice of subject, but will venture to say this, that nothing could be more appropriate at such gatherings as we will have, than that truly admirable speech you made at the dinner to which I have referred.

I enclose a booklet giving further information about our celebration. One was previously sent you, but may have gone astray. I should perhaps add, that the others we are asking to speak at the English meetings are the Premiers of Canada and Nova Scotia, Right Honorable Arthur Meighen, and Sir Robert Falconer. 

Dear Dr Lomer,

Some little time ago I suggested to Robert Stead, President of the Canadian Authors Association, that these two organizations might cooperate in any plan that may be developed for celebrating the centenary of Francis Parkman. Since then Lighthall has told me that you are secretary of a Committee in Montreal for the same purpose. I shall be very glad if you can tell me what your Committee has in view, and if it welcomes the cooperation of other bodies. My own idea is that every organization that might properly be associated in such a scheme should cooperate, and that the plan should not only involve a fitting celebration but also if possible some tangible memorial of Parkman. Unquestionably a statue or a bust would be very desirable, but if this is impracticable, at least a memorial plate should be put in some suitable spot. Montreal seems to be the logical place both for the celebration and the memorial, but the exact spot in Montreal is perhaps a little more difficult to decide upon.



I have been expecting for the last month to be in a position to send you a copy of the preliminary announcement of our program for next summer, but there is always delay in connection with getting such a program completed. Therefore I thought that I would write you now and let you know what progress we have made and bring to your attention again the fact that I am hoping to see you here and a number of other men from Canada.

Vinogradoff's conference on political theories has been organized and I would be very grateful if a member of your staff in Political Science, who is interested in political theories, could be present. As I remember it, you spoke of Professor J. C. Hemmeon as the person for that particular conference. I will take the liberty of writing to him directly and sending him an invitation to membership in the Institute for next summer. I shall do the same in the case of Professor Cyrus McMillan of the English Department.

Our plans as outlined to you for a conference on the British Commonwealth of nations with Mr. Curtis as a leader have not suffered any change.

Other conferences have been organized to deal with Latin American problems, with China and Russia, with the economic and political aspects of the present European situation, and there is a possibility that we may have a conference on the work of the League of Nations and international problems connected with labor.

For lecturers we expect to have an Englishman who belongs to the Labor Party, a Frenchman, possibly M. Loucheur, and the Foreign Minister of Czechoslovakia, Dr. Eduard Benes.

There is every prospect of a most interesting group of people here this summer, especially as the work of the Institute has attracted each year more and more attention and its future has been assured by the receipt of support from two of the great educational foundations in this country. They have signified their willingness to participate with Mr. Baruch in paying the expenses of the Institute.

Si compiono undici secoli dal giorno in cui, nel maggio dell'anno 825, Lotario re d'Italia, nei campi di Corteolona, riordinando gli studi, designava la Scuola di Pavia, già allora fiorente, a centro dell'insegnamento superiore della regione lombarda; e vi chiamava gli studenti da Milano, da Brescia, da Lodi, da Bergamo, da Novara, da Vercelli, da Tortona, da Acqui, da Genova, da Asti e da Como. Quella Scuola, indirizzata fino allora agli studi di retorica, veniva subito rivolta alle scienze giuridiche; e, dalla seconda metà del secolo IX, una serie non interrotta di giuristi, raccolti intorno al Palazzo, ordine centrale del Regno Italico, dà opera alla creazione dei nuovi istituti giuridici, che, sulle linee della tradizione romana, conferiscono ordine, pieghevolezza e complessità alle leggi longobarde. Alla fine del secolo X e nel corso del secolo XI, una schiera di illustri docenti, tra cui rimangono i nomi di Sigefredo, di Bonfiglio, di Bagelardo, di Lanfranco, di Gualcosio, di Guglielmo e di

Ugo, compone nella Scuola l' " *Expositio ad librum papiensem* ", che, avanti gli splendori della scuola bolognese, è mirabile monumento di sapienza civile.

Tra questi maestri, emerge la figura di Lanfranco pavese, che, nato da famiglia di giudici, verso l'anno 1005, iniziava giovanissimo, forse vent'anni dopo, il suo insegnamento nella Scuola della città nativa, e poi, verso il 1040, per vicende singolari di quei secoli di ferro, costretto all'esilio, riparava in Francia, e là, fattosi monaco benedettino, a Bec, in Normandia, diveniva subito priore, poi abate del Monastero della S. Trinità di Caen. Qui fu assunto da Guglielmo il Normanno a consigliere e ministro; poi, seguendo la fortuna del suo principe, dopo la conquista d'Inghilterra, otteneva in premio, nel 1070, la sede arcivescovile di Canterbury, che resse come primate d'Inghilterra, per lunghi anni, fino alla sua morte, avvenuta nel 1089.

L'Università e la Città di Pavia si propongono di commemorare degnamente quelle glorie. Nel maggio prossimo — ricorrenza undici volte secolare della data di riordinamento degli studi in Pavia — verrà eretto, in una delle corti del Palazzo universitario, un ricordo marmoreo a Lanfranco, che sarà segno della riconoscenza dei viventi a quei remoti fattori del rinascimento civile in Italia e in Europa.

L'Università di Pavia vuole ricordare che, da quei lontani tempi, in questa gloriosa sede, gli studi ebbero culto ininterrotto. Anche se, nei secoli XII e XIII, la Scuola pavese ebbe un periodo di decadenza, essa durò rivolta agli studi del diritto civile e canonico ed alle arti, come ne fan fede i nomi del vescovo Lanfranco, di Bernardo da Pavia, e di numerosi altri teologi e giuristi. Sicchè il diploma imperiale del 1361, che elevò lo Studio di Pavia a Studio generale, non segna se non un'integrazione ed un rinnovamento.

L'Università di Pavia vuole ricordare che, nella serie gloriosa dei suoi docenti, dallo scoto Dungalo a Lanfranco, da Gualcosio a Bernardo, da Baldo e da Giason del Maino all'Alciato e al Menochio, dal Crisolora e dal Valla, da Gerolamo Cardano e da Gaspare Aselli, fino al Volta, allo Spallanzani, al Borsieri, allo Scarpa, al Mascheroni, al Monti, al Foscolo, al Romagnosi; da Luigi Porta e da Bartolomeo Panizza al

Bordoni, a Eugenio Beltrami, ad Ercole Vidari, a Pasquale Del Giudice, a Contardo Ferrini, al vivente Camillo Golgi, vede una tradizione luminosa di pensiero e di magistero civile, che deve essere devotamente continuata, e da cui essa trae gli auspicî per il suo avvenire. Essa sente che il popolo italiano, nel suo rinvigorisce, nella sua rinnovata coscienza, guarda con giusto orgoglio a questi antichi e perenni focolari del sapere, come a nobili segni del suo onore e della sua grandezza, attingendone fede per il suo sicuro progresso e per la sua missione di civiltà nel mondo.
