# NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1812.

Its objects are :

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to struggling congregations.
2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.
3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the clergy.
4. A pension fund for aged and infirm clergy.
5. To provide bibles, prayer books, and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.
6. To receive and transmit contributions towards the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, or towards missions to the heathen in foreign lands.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.
  - (a) The Central Board is composed of all the clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society.
  - (b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land and the Investment Committees.
2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Episcopal Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.
3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Illand, the Secretary, or to Mr. Edwin Jones, the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Mr. George Veasey, the Treasurer of the Church Society.

The reports of the Central Board, the Diocesan Board, and Clergy Trust Fund were presented, adopted, and ordered to be printed.

A report from the District Association of St. Francis was also submitted and ordered to be printed.

Mr. W. G. Wurtele submitted the accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Local Endowment Funds, and Bishopric Endowment Fund, Mr. Veasey those of the Church Society, and Mr. E. A. Jones those of the Diocesan Board, which were adopted and ordered to be printed in the Society's journal.

Mr. Wurtele having, in consequence of business engagements, resigned the office of Treasurer of the Clergy Trust Fund, the following resolution was moved by R. Hamilton, Esq., seconded by Rev. Thos. Richardson, and unanimously adopted :—

“That the Church Society desires to place on record its appreciation of Mr. Wurtele's long, faithful and successful service as Treasurer of the Clergy Trust Fund; and begs that Mr. Wurtele accept the grateful acknowledgments of the Society for the same.”

Mr. Wurtele read a letter to the Society upon the past and present state of the funds under his management, which will be found appended to the report of Clergy Trust Fund.

Four gentlemen were elected members of the Corporation.

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected.

Sixteen gentlemen were elected to serve on the Central Board.

The members of the Diocesan Board were re-elected.

Jas. Dunbar, Esq., Q.C., was unanimously elected one of the Hon. Counsel of the Society.

The following amendment to Art. X. of the By-laws was finally adopted :

That all the words in Art. X. of the By-laws, page 16 of Church Society Report of 1874, beginning with "Provided that such By-law," to the words "it is finally adopted," inclusive, be erased, and the following substituted :

"Provided that such By-law or alteration may be proposed at any general meeting of the Society, for whatever object the same may be held, and when so proposed it may be discussed, altered, amended, or rejected; but at the meeting when the same shall be finally considered, the proposal may not be altered or amended from the form in which it was adopted at the former meeting, unless with the consent of two-thirds of the members present."

The thanks of the Society were tendered to the Hon. Counsel for valuable services during the past year.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. W. C. Scott, and seconded by Rev. M. M. Fothergill, and unanimously adopted :

"That this meeting desires to place on record its appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Edwin A. Jones, Esq., as Treasurer of the Diocesan Board, who, for four years, has devoted much time and attention to the duties of his important trust, and the meeting would express the earnest hope that he may be long spared to hold the office which to him is a labour of love."

Votes of thanks were also tendered to the Auditors for their services during the year.

The Lord Bishop closed the meeting with the Benediction.

## GENERAL FUND.

*(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, &c.)*

Your Board desires to draw special attention to the very serious decrease of \$315.74 in the receipts during the year as compared with 1876, and even then there was a deficiency of \$220.88 as compared with 1875. The small amount received is not sufficient to meet the payment of the before-mentioned grants of \$450, together with the amount required for educational purposes during the year.

This deficiency has mainly arisen from the fact that a large proportion of the parishes and missions, especially in the District of St. Francis, have failed to contribute as liberally as in former years, while the claims for grants to church purposes from that district have pressed heavily upon the fund.

It seems necessary to remind the members of the Church that it is from this fund alone that aid is extended to the erection of churches, parsonages, church school buildings, and also for partial payment of the salaries of teachers, besides all the general expenses connected with the working of the Church Society.

Your Board therefore cannot but deplore that in consequence of the crippled state of the fund, no grants can be made during the current year, except that for the support of education; and it will be even difficult to maintain all the schools upon the list at the present rate of payment,

unless the fund can be relieved of some of the ordinary working expenses. Your Board, however, hopes that the clergy and laity of the Diocese will spare no effort to place this fund in a more satisfactory condition.

#### MISSION FUND.

*(Devoted to the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and assessments from Rural Missions.)*

The increase in this Fund stands at \$129.20 over the receipts in 1876. For a full report of the Society's Missionary operations, your Board begs to refer to the report of the Diocesan Board.

#### WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

During the year a very important change has been effected in the By-law controlling this Fund, by the adoption, after mature deliberation, of a new By-law, more liberal in its provisions towards those who are participants in its benefits. In fact, a more generous By-law could scarcely be framed than the present one, which has placed this Diocese pre-eminent amongst the Canadian Dioceses in its care for the widows and orphans of the Clergy.

It is also gratifying to observe the hold this Fund has upon the affections of churchmen, as evinced by the fact that, notwithstanding the discontinuance of the Annual Sermon on its behalf, and the oft-repeated notices of the very healthy condition of the Fund, contributions still continue to be made from all parts of the Diocese, giving an increase over last report of \$25.93.

The following clergymen have, according to the provisions of the new By-law, made the required number of

payments, and are therefore paid up members, viz :—Rev. Messrs. Smith, Kemp, Merrick, King, senr., Lyster, Woolryche, Short, Roe, Fothergill, Vial, Burrage, Von Island, and Ker.

The following are in course of completing their payments, viz :—Reverend Messrs. Washer, Thompson, Richardson, Debbage, Riopel, Foster, Jenkins, Boyle, Hepburn, Rawson, Blaylock, Ball, Sykes, junr., Boydell, Chapman, Parkin, Sykes, senr., Richmond, Allnatt, Roy, Dinzey, Brock, Chambers, and Housman.

#### PENSION FUND.

*(For aged and retired Clergymen.)*

There has been a small increase in subscriptions to this Fund during 1877 of \$8.26, as compared with 1876.

It being the only Fund from which aid can be derived for those who, from age or infirmity, are unable any longer to continue the active work of the Ministry, it is much to be desired that it may continue to receive large help by legacies and subscriptions, until fair pensions can be provided for retiring Missionaries.

#### EDUCATION.

The Board has extended its operations during the year to schools in the Missions of Cape Cove and Malbaie, in the Rural Deanery of Gaspé. The schools hitherto aided during the past and former years, are doing good and steady service.

There can be no duty more important than that of fostering sound education in the various missions of the Diocese : it is indeed of paramount importance, and it is gratifying to notice that the Society's efforts are being duly appreciated. The Rev. Rural Dean Lyster writes that

Church Society, in consequence of the following resolution of the Synod of the Diocese :

"That it is desirable to have but one Fund for Algoma, to be entitled 'The Algoma Diocesan Fund,' the first charge upon which shall be the quota which this Diocese is pledged to contribute towards the Episcopal Stipend, the balance to be sent to the Bishop of Algoma, to be by him applied to the general missionary work in his diocese, or to any particular parts of the missionary work therein, as the donors shall direct."

The Reverend John Walters, Rector of Levis, who for the past two years has zealously discharged the duties of Secretary and Treasurer, having resigned the position, the Rev. George Hamilton, M.A., has kindly undertaken the task of Secretary, with Mr. George Veasey as Treasurer. All amounts, therefore, forwarded through the above channel, will be duly acknowledged in the monetary pages of the Society's report.

A sum of \$569 has been forwarded to the Bishop for missionary work, and \$62.60 to the Rev. E. F. Wilson for the Indian homes.

The regular quota of \$300 has been duly paid to the Episcopal Fund. The Rev. T. H. Appleby, of Sault Ste. Marie, while amongst us in October, collected the handsome sum of \$358 for special work in his parish, thus giving a total of \$1289.60 forwarded to the Diocese of Algoma during 1877.

The Bishop of that Diocese recently gave at Sherbrooke and Quebec a very full and interesting account of the work he had in hand; and churchmen may well be urged to help liberally the good work of spreading the knowledge of the gospel in this missionary diocese of the Canadian Church.

## SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL.

A sum of \$256.43 has been forwarded to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel as a small thank-offering for generous aid received during many past years.

## BEQUESTS.

Your Board records with gratitude the receipt of \$200, less certain charges, from the executors of the late Mrs. Bankier for the Widows' and Orphans' and Pension Funds of the Society.

Your Board would again venture to remind any who may by their will desire to bequeath money or property, that suitable "forms of bequests and devises by will" are to be found at the end of the annual report. And the Society would further respectfully venture to point out that Christian people having been entrusted with the care of money, it is incumbent upon them in the discharge of their duty in making the last disposition of their wealth that charitable objects should not be overlooked.

## OBITUARY.

It is not too much to say that the whole diocese mourns the loss by death of the late Principal of Bishop's College, Lennoxville—the Reverend Jasper Hume Nicolls, D.D., Oxon, a life member, and since 1851 one of the Vice-Presidents of the Church Society, and for several years Rural Dean of St. Francis. A ripe scholar and true Christian gentleman, he was ever found faithful to his duties as Principal of the College, and yet ready at all times to lend a helping hand to further the interests of the Church in the Diocese in every possible manner. It was he who, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, gave life and vigor to the present Deanery Association of St. Francis. No distance was too great, and no toil too burdensome, if he

Such generosity cannot fail to add another link to the chain of gratitude and affection which binds this diocese to the family of its late bishop.

On comparing the above with the statement presented a year ago, it will be observed that the payments for stipends and pensions have been less during 1877, by the sum of \$1,568.24, than in 1876.

The venerable Society for the propagaton of the Gospel, after repeated intimations of her intention, has carried into effect her purpose of reducing the grant to this Diocese, and for the current year we shall receive but £1,800, instead of £2,000 stg.

This reduction of nearly \$1,000 in our resources—and we know not how soon we may suffer an equal loss—coming upon the Diocese at a time of long continued financial depression, when the heavy dull sky of the commercial horizon shows, as yet, no indication of the silver lining said to belong to every cloud—will put a severe strain upon the earnestness of churchmen, if we are to keep up our missionary operations on the present footing.

In connection with this reduction, the Lord Bishop, at the request of the Board, issued the following circular:—

MY DEAR SIR,

By desire of the Diocesan Board I write to ask you to make as soon as possible, the following communication to the Clergy of your Deanery.

1.—Increase of money.—

The sources of the Board's income are

- (1.) S. P. G. Grant.
- (2.) Clergy Trust Fund, (portion of surplus)
- (3.) Mission Fund of Church Society.
- (4.) Grants from General Fund.
- (5.) Assessments of Missions.

Of these 1 and 2 are fixed sums; 3 is put at as high a figure in the estimates as there is a probability of its reaching; 4 is unable to meet the ordinary demands upon it, insomuch that grants for building Churches, &c., usually remain long unpaid because of the chronic weakness of the fund.



The only available source, then, from which to procure the means to pay the salaries of the Clergy is an increase in the assessments.

2.—Reduction of men.

If the money cannot be procured, it cannot be paid; and as a reduction of the rates of stipend is not to be entertained, it follows that there must be a reduction in the number of the missionaries.

Under these circumstances, it is desired that the Clergy of the several Deaneries should advise with the Board, and point out, (1) How, in their judgment, the funds may be so increased as to render a diminution of the number of the clergy needless; or, failing this, (2) How the missions can be so consolidated as to enable the reduced body of the clergy to cover the ground.

And, as the arrangements with the different congregations must be made at once, it will be necessary that the Board should be in possession of the views of the clergy not later than Dec. 15th.

To the Revd. Rural Dean.

Your Board is of opinion that under ordinary circumstances of prosperity, many missions in the Diocese would be found able and ready to make a considerable increase in their assessments—sufficient in the aggregate to make up for the reduction of the S. P. G. grant—and negotiations are in progress with a view to effect this object.

In the case of the District of Gaspé, the general ill success which has attended the fisheries during the past year, besides the depression of trade in other respects, has necessitated a continuance of the same assessments for another year.

In the Districts of Quebec and St. Francis, the possible alternative of reducing the number of the missions, unless

the local contributions are increased, has been laid before the respective Chapters of those Deaneries, and the matter has been taken up by them in the best possible spirit.

The Chapter of the Quebec Deanery have pledged themselves to use their best efforts to obtain a considerable increase, and the Deanery of St. Francis has adopted resolutions deprecating the amalgamation of any missions in that District, and agreeing to an increase of assessment in most of the missions.

Your Board would not be faithful to the trust committed to it, if it failed to point out to all the missions aided from its funds, that as the present circumstances of the Diocese constitute a time of trial, so it behoves every member of the Church to do his very utmost to bear the trial in a patient and steadfast Christian spirit. It is not seldom the case that when prosperity ceases to smile for a time, the subscription to the Church is the first expense which is reduced, as if a man's offerings for the sake of Christ and His religion were a matter of casual luxury to be given up and easily dispensed with, because of least necessity. On the contrary, do not the true precepts of the Gospel dictate that the offering to God and His service should be the last to suffer any diminution, and that those cases are extreme ones in which any reduction at all can be justified? A great reproach, then, will lie upon this Diocese, and especially upon its country missions, if it should occur that because of this loss of \$1,000 from the S. P. G., a single missionary is told that his services are no longer required. Your Board in faith—but without rashness—in faith not unmixed with judgment, has in the past extended in some measure the missionary operations of the Diocese, and we shall continue to believe that God will move the hearts of His people to provide the means of maintaining them in the future.

The following are the changes and appointments which have been made in the Diocese during the past year.

In the month of March, the Rev. C. B. Washer was appointed to the mission of Brompton and Windsor; and the Rev. Peter Roe to the mission of Inverness.

In the month of October, the Rev. E. A. W. King was appointed to the mission of Rivière du Loup; the Revd. James Hepburn to the mission of Magog and Georgeville; and the Rev. T. Blaylock, to the mission of New Carlisle.

In the month of November, the Rev. R. Harvey was appointed to the mission of Shigawake.

The missions unprovided with the ministrations of the Church at the present time are Labrador, Bury, and Malbaie.

By the appointment of the Rev. F. A. Smith, who carries with him his allowance from the Clergy Trust Fund, to the mission of New Liverpool, that mission has ceased to depend for aid upon the Diocesan Board.

The reports of the clergy are hereunto appended, from which we learn how great is the financial depression almost universally prevalent in the missions aided by the Board.

REPORT OF THE ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSO-  
CIATION—CHURCH SOCIETY, DIOCESE OF  
QUEBEC—FOR 1877.

Notwithstanding the continued pressure of financial difficulties throughout the country, the amount collected for the various objects of the Church Society does not fall short, but rather exceeds that of other years; a circumstance which should call forth the gratitude of the members of this Association to the Giver of all good, Who has so wonderfully blessed the work under adverse worldly interests; a circumstance also which should teach us a lesson of reliance and faith, and so invigorate the energies of God's people for further usefulness.

The following statement of the Church's work in the various missions, compared with that of last year, will be found of interest to the readers of the Annual Report.

ACTONVALE.

The report from Actonvale speaks discouragingly as to the prospects of the Church, owing to two causes—stagnation in the slate trade, and the want of such indications of richness in the copper deposits of the mines as to justify their being worked. Still the amount of \$254.41 appears as an increase over last year's subscriptions.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

No report. Financial statement \$344.26 less than last year.

BURY.

No report. Vacant.

COATICOOK.

During the past year twenty church families (representing the sum of \$750 subscribed annually for church purposes) have left the mission; this, with the depression of business, will account for the deficit this year, viz., \$444.25.

## COMPTON.

No report.

## COOKSHIRE.

The church in this mission, the corner stone of which was laid by the Lord Bishop of Quebec, in 1868, has just been completed. Amount raised will fall short of last year by \$300.

## DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rector of Drummondville reports financial depression and cessation of public works, but is cheered by the arrival of some capitalists from Scotland, who are about to start a spool factory. The sum of \$125.00 appears less than last year.

## DUDSWELL.

No report.

## DURHAM.

This mission shows a deficit in the aggregate of moneys collected last year of \$693.25. The amount, however, to outside objects is double what it was last year. A pleasing feature of this report is that it embraces a contribution from each station to eight different objects of the Church's work outside the mission.

## HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

The difficulty of keeping up Sunday schools in winter has induced the Incumbent to adopt the good old usage of catechising after the second lesson. He speaks of this as an experiment, and with some hope.

Three full services are kept up in this mission during the year. The collection for all church purposes falls short of last year by \$27.79.

## KINGSEY.

While several works have been accomplished in this mission, viz.: fencing church-yard of Holy Trinity, and providing a stone well at the parsonage, the amount collected falls short of last year by \$111.66.

## LENNOXVILLE AND MILBY.

The Rector reports a large falling off in subscribers by removal, and a reduction by others, which he readily accounts for—in consequence there is a large deficiency in the sum collected this year compared with last year's amount.

## MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

Incumbent reports all church property out of debt. Increase in amount raised over last year, \$347.18.

## MELBOURNE AND RICHMOND.

No report.

## SHERBROOKE.

The Rector reports the loss of valuable communion plate and linen, which were stolen from the church; also a subscription to replace them, which already reaches \$300.

Twenty-one communicants have been added during the year, making the number 230.

While the actual receipts for all church purposes fall short of last year by \$291.37, the amount for extra parochial purposes exceeds that of last year by \$17.

The Sunday school is composed of 121 scholars, 12 teachers and a superintendent, who have been zealous and diligent in this important part of our church work.

## STANSTEAD.

The church school in this mission is progressing favorably, the work done being creditable to teacher and scholars alike. There is a marked attachment on the part of the children to the church. Amount of subscriptions exceeds that of last year by \$132.88.

In the absence of full returns from several missions, it is impossible to say how near the approximation will reach last year; the present figures present a very large deficiency for all church purposes.

The Treasurer's statement of cash received for 1877 shows \$905.59, being \$97.40 under last year; that deficiency will no doubt be made up by returns sent in irregularly.

## ACTON.

Of the past year, considering the mission in its temporal interests, what I have to report is far from being encouraging.

The bright hopes raised by the opening of the slate quarry and the resumption of work in the copper mines, in the vicinity of the village, have not been realized; in fact they have dwindled away to almost nothing.

A few months, however, will tell whether Acton will be benefitted any more by mining operations or not.

Such being the case with this locality, no one will be surprised to hear that the attendance at church has visibly decreased in numbers. I am glad to be able to report great reverence shown during the services; which, no doubt, augurs well for the spiritual state of the members of the congregation.

Last winter our socials produced for us a good sum of money, with which a carpet has been purchased for the platform between the pews and the Chancel.

There have been 5 marriages; 10 burials, and 15 baptisms.

## BOURG LOUIS.

During the past year this mission has been slowly advancing towards a true appreciation of the Church and the Church's services, and at the same time there is noticeable a more tolerant and charitable spirit towards all members of the community than that which formerly existed. There has been a steady increase in the attendance at the services, so that the accommodation is taxed to the extent of making an addition to the church imperative. Altogether, I think a perceptible change for the better is gaining ground throughout the mission.

At the Pont Rouge, I held services every fortnight, from February until September, for the English residents and the employés of the North Shore Railway Company. These were held first at Mr. W. Davidson's, and latterly at the house of Mr. W. Parke, who played the harmonium at the services, and took the warmest interest in them, doing his utmost to get the people to attend, and to make them as attractive as possible.

The Bishop confirmed nineteen young persons on Whit-Sunday. The register shows eight baptisms and two burials during the year.

Among the improvements effected in the church, there may be mentioned the St. Augustinian memorial window to the late Reverends C. Roberts and F. J. Cookesley, the subject of the window being the Institution of the Holy Communion. It was executed by Spence, Montreal. Through the liberality of friends in Quebec, aided by three parishioners; a small Mason & Hamlin cabinet organ has been purchased, thus supplying a want which has been long felt. Mr. R. Morgan, music dealer, gave a beautiful alms plate, and Mr. W. A. Henderson an illuminated text on zinc. The Sunday school is indebted for treats to the St. Matthew's Sunday school, and the Mother's and Daughter's Meetings of the same church, also to Mrs. Aylwin, of Montreal, for Christmas cards. Indeed the mission is so much indebted to that kind lady for substantial aid that it would be almost an impossibility to keep it open without her help.

May I take this opportunity of thanking our benefactors, and assuring them that many prayers are offered for them and theirs by the poor people of Bourg Louis. It is pleas-

ing to note, that at the beginning of Michaelmas term, two young men from this mission matriculated at Bishop's College, with the intention of eventually becoming candidates for Holy Orders. It is also gratifying to state that the day schools are efficiently taught by teachers born and bred in the place. They take great interest in their pupils, and a good work is being done by them.

Among the causes for regret, I may mention that the parsonage is uninhabitable during the winter months, owing to faults in its construction. I have been obliged to abandon it until spring. From year to year I have done what I could towards putting it into better condition, but I am unable to do much, and the parishioners being mostly poor, are scarcely able to pay their church and school assessments, so that I cannot look to them for much material aid in accomplishing a work which is greatly needed.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

I was appointed to this mission in February last, and came into residence in the beginning of May. I have been kindly received in all parts of the mission, and am able to say that the aspect of things is decidedly encouraging.

*Brompton.*—Here I conduct morning and evening service every Sunday, and the congregations, on the whole, are good. Holy Communion is administered once a month.

The number of communicants is very small, but, I am thankful to say, on the increase. The Sunday school is going on well, but the number of scholars is below what I have reason to expect. I record, with much satisfaction, the erection of a horse shed of six stalls, near the church. This is certainly a great gain. Though there is here in this station much more to be done and learned, I am thankful for the measure of encouragement vouchsafed, and the pledge of future blessing.

*Wināisor.*—The church in this station is about four miles from Brompton Church, and is served every Sunday afternoon. I cannot say the congregation is not good, but some of the members are not so regular in their attendance as they might be. This may be owing to the church having been closed for a long time before my appointment. But I am glad to say there are signs of improvement in this as in other respects. The communicants are very few. I must mention that we are here burdened with a debt on the church land and building. Efforts are being made to discharge the obligation. Subscriptions have been promised, but I regret not being able to report the clearing off of the debt by the beginning of the new year, when we hope to resume our former contribution to the Diocesan Board. This mission station is very poor, and, in the eyes of the world, probably too poor to be worth the Church's attention. Fortunately, the Church sees differently, and we may, if, by God's help, we work steadily, quietly and confidently, anticipate rich results.

My financial statement looks poor, but is not so poor as it looks. The offerings have been willingly made, and may be taken as an earnest of greater things to come.

BARFORD AND HEREFORD.

The past year has been in some respects an important one in the history of this mission.

In every part of it there seem to be evidences of a slow but healthy growth. In December last the Lord Bishop visited the stations of Dixville and Barford for the first time; and twice during the year we have been benefitted and cheered by the presence of our chief pastor.

Three adults have been baptized, all of whom were brought up under other than Church influences. One was the mother of nine children, whom she had previously brought to holy baptism. Fifteen persons have been confirmed, and nearly all of them have become communicants.

There are in the whole mission eighty-five persons who have been confirmed; I am sorry to say, however, that only about one-half of them are regular communicants, but we look for a better state of things.

The wild lands given to Barford are likely to prove valuable, under the able and careful management of Mr. Horace Cutting, of Coaticook. Enough has already been disposed of to pay for a parsonage and to make a commencement towards a church, and we hope that the two lots unsold will ere long bring us nearly two thousand dollars towards an endowment fund. The financial statement shows an increase during the year of over one hundred and thirty dollars.

At Dixville the services have been fairly attended, and the interest in church matters seems to be increasing.

The Sunday school has been held every Sunday, under the superintendence of Mr. R. Smith and Mrs. Stevens. A very comfortable house has been bought here for a parsonage, and will be paid for from the proceeds of the wild

land. An excellent site for a church has been bargained for, but owing to some flaw in the title, the transfer has not yet been made.

The station of Barford has been re-opened since my last report. The church, which was begun some time ago, has been finished, and was consecrated last December. Regular fortnightly services have been held since its consecration, and the congregations have been larger than I expected. An excellent organ has been bought, but we are very much in need of a Communion service. Towards defraying the expenses of building this church, a small amount was given by the people, principally in work; a small sum contributed by friends in England. A grant of \$100 was made by the Church Society, and the remainder was given by the family of the late Dr. Ward. Dr. T. W. Ward has also deeded to the Bishop an acre of land for a graveyard (which has been consecrated), and twenty acres in another lot for general church purposes.

At Stanhope and Norton the congregation is not quite as large as last year. Very many families have left the place, owing to the shutting down of the mills. We are indebted to the Right Reverend the Bishop of Vermont for a grant of prayer books of the American Church, for use at Norton.

At Hereford the regular fortnightly service has been kept up; the congregation has remained about the same, but the number of communicants has increased. Last winter I had a large class for confirmation here, but they gradually left the place to seek for employment, and now only a few of them remain.

The congregation at Perryboro' has increased. Nine persons were confirmed here in July last, and I hope to have another class ready for next summer. As soon as the "hard times" are over, an effort will be made to build a small church at this station. A very interesting Sunday school has been maintained by the efforts of Mr. James Nish, Dr. Scott, and a few self-denying women of the congregation.

There is also an adult bible class, which is attended by nearly all in the neighborhood. This, I am sure, is a source of much good, especially on the Sundays when they have no service, as the young people of the place are thus kept from many temptations to evil.

Besides the regular work at these five stations, I have held services in school houses in other neighborhoods more

In conclusion, your missionary ventures to hope that these various signs of progress testify that the Holy Spirit of God is working in the hearts and lives of His people.

#### CAPE COVE.

I am glad to be able to report that our new church, to which I have had occasion to refer from time to time, was completed externally in October. It is generally acknowledged to be a very handsome building, and in the excellence and high finish of the work, to reflect much credit upon those engaged in its erection.

A vestry meeting was held in October for the purpose of making arrangements with the contractor, to whom a debt of \$800 remained due; but the fall fishery had proved a failure, and the outcry of poverty was so loud that it was felt to be useless and inexpedient at the time to attempt to collect even a small portion of this amount from the mem-

bers of the congregation. This feeling of depression is, I hope, passing off, and I believe something will be done shortly towards reducing the debt.

The people are not, on the whole, deficient in liberality, and some are generous even beyond their means; but there is hardly any money in the place. Cash is not paid for produce, or for anything except fish, and consequently must be scarce.

The congregation of Cape Cove is under many obligations to the Church Society for generous grants towards the support of three schools. Without these grants, one, at least, of our schools would have been closed during the past year.

The teachers are very grateful; for this part, at least, of their salary, and that which they receive from the Colonial and Continental Church Society, comes to them regularly and without delay. Were it not for this aid, hardly any respectable teacher of fair education would be found willing to take charge of our schools.

Three Sunday schools were in operation during summer and fall. Here there was an attendance of seventy children, of whom not a few came from a distance of from three to four miles, and these were amongst the most punctual attendants.

My thanks are due to Mr. D. Dumaresq, sen., who acted as Superintendent during my occasional absence at Percé, and also instructed a class very efficiently. He was assisted by the same staff of good and painstaking girls to whom I expressed my obligations last year for their kind and unselfish labors.

## COATICOOK.

During the year I have had three services every Lord's Day, and have assisted, as much as possible, in the Sunday school work of the parish.

Parochial visiting has been regularly kept up, each family receiving at least four visits in the year.

Owing to the continued depression in business, and the shutting up of nearly all our manufacturing establishments, a large number of my people have left the mission to seek work in Ontario, and the United States. I find on referring to my list of parishioners, that in this way I have lost, within the past fourteen months, twenty church families, numbering one hundred and two souls, and representing the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, subscribed annually for church work in the mission.

Add to this the fact that we are losing nearly two hundred dollars per annum more by failures, and by the inability of subscribers to pay the amounts appended to their names, and it will be seen that financially we have great difficulties to contend against.

As soon as business revives, we hope to be all right, and to increase both our numbers and our revenue.

We have to mourn the death, in August last, of Commander James Thompson, Royal Navy, who was the pioneer churchman of the mission, and one of its most exemplary and liberal members. He died full of years and honors, beloved and respected by all who knew him.

Cookshire, like most country missions, feels the pressure of the times, and we find it difficult to keep pace with the periodical increase in the assessment.

## DANVILLE AND TINGWICK.

First, as to Danville, Shipton.

This Township has, scattered over its area, probably more church families than are to be found in any other mission in the District of St. Francis, save that of Richmond and Melbourne.

The assessment, paid to the Board, is two hundred dollars, which my indefatigable warden, Mr. Chas. Devey, assures me is with difficulty collected. This is owing, of course, to various causes. The popular cry is "hard times;" then there are departures—anybody acquainted with these districts, know that the population is of a shifting character—there are deaths which sometimes make serious gaps in our subscription list, local failures, or low prices for farm produce, all combining to enhance the difficulty of getting in the assessment. In spite, however, of this, I hazard the opinion that if our people would conscientiously tax themselves to the extent of one cent on the dollar, on what they are worth, we should almost be a self-supporting mission. With the exception of two or three instances, the sums opposite our subscribers names on the assessment list, do not do justice to the parties concerned.

We must now pass on to Tingwick. It must be premised that this Township is divided, as far as mission work is concerned, into two sections. Troutbrook, and what, for the sake of convenience, we shall call McKeage Road.

In the former is situated the church, eight miles from Danville. Here we have about thirty five families on the church roll, paying an assessment of one hundred and twenty five dollars; occasionally a family sells out and moves away, thus narrowing down the circle of subscribers.

In the latter, McKeage Road, which stretches down towards Warwick station, are to be found about twenty two church families, who are destitute of Sunday services from one year's end to the other.

My Sunday appointments I have been able to keep with almost undeviating regularity. In two or three instances, last winter, being stuck in impassable drifts, I had to back out and return home. I never allow the weather or the

roads to interfere; my theory is, if one's horse can lead, one can follow; it is a simple rule, and works admirably in creating a confidence amongst the people.

It is gratifying to state that the Shipton congregation are rousing themselves to "take hold," as the phrase is, and finish the church. For the past fifteen or sixteen years the building has been left in the rough, so to speak, but a supreme effort is about to be made to make our church what it ought to be, and we venture to hope our local endeavours will be seconded and supported by our brother churchmen abroad. The circular appealing for aid will be out all in good time.

Last March we had a confirmation in Danville, twelve candidates being admitted to that apostolic rite. I have been very busy this Summer and Fall in preparing candidates for the approaching confirmation on the 7th prox., to take place in Danville and Troutbrook. I purpose preparing a number of elderly and married people for a confirmation to be held some time next summer.

With regard to the District schools, in which I take a great interest, and try to visit and examine as often as I can, there are no less than eighteen (two of which are church schools), scattered over the mission. I might say a great deal on this department of missionary work, but I forbear, merely observing that the more one visits these schools, the more one is amazed and shocked at the religious ignorance prevalent among the scholars. The reason is obvious.

Since the 1st January there have been twenty-one baptisms, one marriage, and seven burials.

## DRUMMONDVILLE.

This congregation has been passing through a period of painful difficulty and embarrassment. I suppose that this has been the case, to a certain extent, with other missions, owing to the general slackness of business. But we of Drummondville have been sufferers in a special degree. Our land is poor, and our farms alone will not support us. Lumber has always been our mainstay. When that failed, hemlock bark and white birch (for spools) did a little for us, but of late even these sources of income have collapsed. There are but very few among us who are not at this moment burdened with financial difficulties.

To make up each quarter's assessment has cost a struggle, and in the meanwhile other claims have had to bide their time. It has been needful more than once to issue the ominous notice of interdicted services. Had it not been for the staunch and liberal support rendered by our friend, Mr. Hemming, I am almost afraid the interdict would have been carried into effect.

Latterly we have had to betake ourselves to that much-abused resort for raising funds—a concert and bazaar, which proved a means of obtaining help from friends outside—from Acton, Melbourne, Lennoxville, Sorel, Montreal.

I am sorry to write in so gloomy a tone, but it is needful to explain our deficiency in contributing to church purposes generally.

We have lately been cheered by the addition to our number of some gentlemen from Scotland, who are about to start another spool factory, which it is hoped may have the effect of working some improvement in our circumstances.

Church work has gone on much as usual.

## DUDSWELL.

I have not much to report except the continuous round of parish work. My Sunday services, three in number, have been sustained with regularity.

The most important events of the year were a confirmation in June last, at which the Bishop confirmed thirty-three, and the erection of a new church at Dudswell Corner, called the church of "the Good Shepherd." The outside measurement of this church, including the porch, is 62 by 24 feet; spire and tower, 80 feet high; 250 sittings, and cost \$1,050. There is an ornamental chancel with panel work, containing appropriate scripture texts in gold letter, and a triplet stained glass window from Spence, containing the subject of the "Good Shepherd." The ceiling is panelled in harmonious water-color, as well as the walls. The site of this church is the gift of W. H. Lothrop, Esq., and is one of the most beautiful in the country, and the adjoining burying-ground is the gift of the Hon. J. G. Robertson. The only requisites to make this church complete are a font, a Communion set, and a musical instrument. How to supply the necessary Sunday services to the three churches of my mission, and one or two other appointments, is a difficulty. It is to be hoped that the cloud of commercial depression will soon lift, and the finances of the Diocese be in a condition to erect the Township of Westbury, with its two new churches, into an independent mission. Through the noble encouragement of R. Hamilton, Esq., Westbury has now the nucleus of an endowment.

The model school has been improved by an ash skirting, to protect the walls, and the children have contributed specimens of Canadian timber, minerals and fossils, as a beginning for a museum. The work of the school is going on well. I am anxious to keep up the standard as high as possible.

A systematic effort is being made to increase the parochial assessment. The times, however, are peculiarly hard with us, on account of a large semi-annual assessment to pay interest on railway bonds. This sweeps a large portion of the available cash entirely out of circulation, and makes everything move heavily.

Gave magic-lantern entertainments and Christmas trees to the Sunday school children. Great difficulty in getting

DURHAM.

In financial matters, as the subjoined statement will show, we are, this year, far behind former ones.

The pressure of the hard times was felt so much here, that we were unable to make any progress in the matter of a parsonage, though strong desires for one were felt and expressed, especially in Upper Durham, and several attempts were made at a beginning.

For the same reason, also, we have not been able, this year, to add anything to our Endowment Fund, as I had hoped we would do. We have, moreover, lost by death and removal, several of our best contributors, and, in consequence, have found great difficulty, especially in South Durham, in making our payments to the Diocesan Board.

I am happy to say, however, that the amount given by this mission to the various objects of the Society, *outside of*

*ourselves*, is more than double that of last year. Such an increase should be a matter of great thankfulness, and a source of great rejoicing among us, because it will appear as an evidence of our gratitude to God for past favors. As a mission we have a great deal to be thankful for, and it is to be hoped we shall never forget it, but continue to show gratitude by giving liberally towards all important objects connected with the spread of the Gospel and the strengthening of the church.

It gives me much pleasure to state that there is a great deal to encourage us, and great cause for thankfulness. Services have been performed with the usual regularity, in all our churches, and holy communion celebrated about once a month in each.

At Trinity church, Upper Durham, the congregations have been good throughout the year, and also the attendance at holy communion.

During last winter I held a series of cottage missions among the members of this congregation, and a great deal of success seemed to attend them. Certainly the interest manifested by the people was great, and did not flag throughout the season. Some good results have come under my own observation, and many more may be hidden from us. Our plan was simply to meet together from house to house, once a fortnight, to begin and close each evening with a short service chiefly from the Prayer book, but with special prayers for the parish, sick, &c., introduced; to read and converse upon a passage of Holy Scripture, following the life of our Lord, and to have a short address added by myself upon some important point connected with the Christian life. Familiar conversation upon any difficult point or passage was always encouraged, and all seemed to feel as well as express an interest in the subjects discussed. For myself I can say, that these missions were most enjoyable; and I am confident that a great deal of good might be done in any parish by means of them. One good result I might here suggest, as likely to follow from them. Parents and child, husband and wife, might, at such cottage-gatherings, learn to converse freely with each other upon religious subjects, and the amount of good which might flow from that cannot be calculated.

I propose to have these missions again this winter, in connection with special fortnightly services, in Upper Durham and L'Avenir, and hope that as great a blessing will then attend them as seemed to attend them last winter.

The Sunday school in Upper Durham has been better this year than last, and is still going on; but it is still very far from being what it ought to be, though a great deal of credit is due to the teachers for their faithful performance of duty.

In L'Avenir a "mission" was held this year, during the season of Lent, beginning on Sunday, the 11th March, and closing on the 18th. The people were prepared for it some time before, by means of cottage missions, similar to those held in Upper Durham. The congregations throughout the week of services were remarkably good, and the interest manifested was very great. Individual cases, upon whom good impressions were made, came to my own knowledge, and I have no doubt that a blessing attended our work. Certainly, since the mission the number of



communicants is increased, and the congregations have been remarkable. Indeed, the attendance at Divine service is now the most pleasing and cheering feature in connection with the church at L'Avenir. In all kinds of weather, the congregations have been very respectable, and many times, on *ordinary* occasions, the church has been crowded. This is, no doubt, in some measure due to the special services, and should be a cause for thankfulness. But I may be allowed to suggest here, with regard to missions in general, that what we are to expect from them is not so much immediate fruit as the continual springing up of spiritual plants, whose seed was there sown; and the manifestation, long afterwards perhaps, of good results, which cannot, even by the persons showing them, be traced back directly to the special word which caused them.

In connection with the mission in L'Avenir, I must acknowledge with gratitude, valuable assistance from the Rev. Professor Roe, of Bishop's College, the Rev. I. M. Thompson, the Rev. E. A. W. King, and the Rev. James Boydell.

I am sorry to say that the Sunday school in L'Avenir has not been any better this year than last. There are many reasons why there should be no improvement at present, but I cannot enter upon them here. I do not at all despair, however, for the future, but still hope to see a good Sunday school in L'Avenir, as *another* fruit of our "mission." The Lord Bishop visited this part of Durham last spring, and confirmed nine persons.

In South Durham there has been a marked improvement in the congregation, though it is still short of what it ought to be. The Sunday school here, however, has taken a great start, and through the summer was, by far, the best in the mission. The children all seemed to have a great interest in it. One little girl, to my own knowledge, used to walk a distance of about four miles to attend it, and was always grieved when the weather was too bad for her to go. For the good state of this school, a great deal of credit is due to the exertions of Mr. J. C. Armstrong, superintendent, and to Miss Ginn and Miss Johnston, teachers.

During this year occasional services have been held at some of the school houses, and regular services were given at Lisgar station last winter, but altogether they have not been very successful, and, for the present, are discontinued.

I have to record 2 marriages, 2 adult and 27 infant baptisms, and 11 burials.

## EAST FRAMPTON.

In an old mission like this, one year is so much like another, that it is difficult to get a starting point whence to commence a report. Last season I had something to say about our Bishop's visit here; something more to relate about confirmations; and as we have had a few events of minor importance this year slightly out of our usual routine, I will here relate them as they occurred. Early in last winter, the Rev. J. Sykes and I got up a missionary meeting, which was well attended, and my worthy brother of West Frampton gave us a most lucid and interesting account of the Church in Australia, from the day of its first planting up to the present; winding up his discourse with a description of the make, the color, the manners, the courtship and the marriages of the Aborigines of that colony.

The next event worth relating was a visit this last autumn from our worthy Rural Dean, who was induced to come here by request of the Bishop, to ascertain what was the cause of this mission being so far in arrears to the Diocesan Board. The result of the Rural Dean's visit, coupled with a letter to him from the Bishop, and a subsequent one to myself from the same quarter, and on the same subject, was most satisfactory. At that time we were one year in arrears, and to-day I am glad to say that when this year ends, Hemison Church will be only one quarter behind, an event which has never happened before. So it will appear, by referring to last year's report, that we have paid up six quarters this season from Hemison congregation, and that, too, in the face of unheard of hard times.

The commercial depression, which is felt all the world over, seems to afflict the inhabitants of this locality in a pre-eminent manner. The lumbering trade, once so profitable, has almost ceased on the banks of the river Etehem, while the land is in great measure unfit for agriculture--hence the difficulty of meeting our engagements with the Diocesan Board.

The services both at Hemison and Standon, have been duly observed, and, on the whole, well attended. The day school, too, at Hemison is doing well. And it was my pleasure early in the summer to be in a position to supply a want long felt in this mission, that of the establishment of a Sunday school, which since that time has been working well, under the supervision of Mr. G. Bagnall, who has

GASPÉ BASIN.

The services have been held in this mission with the usual regularity, interrupted only by calls to Malbaie during the Diaconate of the late Incumbent, and by absence on the last two Sundays in the year from the same cause.

Of St. Paul's, I have again to record diminution in number caused by removal. The congregation remains, otherwise, nearly the same, but depends very much for its financial prosperity upon the influx of strangers during the summer.

St. James' Church is very much out of repair, the foundation having, ever since the church was built, worked very much with the winter's frost. The site was ill chosen, in a damp place, upon a bed of almost impervious clay. The congregation see little prospect by any ordinary amount of labor of insuring the permanence of the building and fence.

An advance has been made in education, by the opening of a school on the North West Arm, under the tuition of Mrs. Thompson, who came here very strongly recommended by several clergymen of the Diocese. The additional taxation necessary for a third school district in this Township, (which makes the fifth school in my mission.) is very much felt during the present hard times, and I am afraid it will lead to a reduction of the present salaries paid the teachers, and consequently to a decrease in the efficiency of the schools.

HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

I continue to hold Divine service on the Lord's Day at three different stations, involving a drive of twenty miles, and frequently on week-days. Two Sunday schools also were maintained during the summer and autumn months. Having found it, in previous years, impracticable to maintain the Sunday schools in efficient operation during the winter months, I have this winter essayed public catechising after the second lesson at morning and evening prayer. I am not without hope that public catechising may have the additional effect of removing somewhat of the misunderstanding and prejudice which prevail in this as in other districts of the Eastern Townships, respecting the distinctive doctrines and practices of our church. At the same time I do not conceal from myself the difficulties which surround this revival in my mission of the Church's direction :—the necessity of making the catechising brief and interesting to the children, also of not exhausting the

patience of the congregation ; and in particular of not allowing the catechising to divert the minds of either old or young from the special purpose for which we meet together in the House of Prayer.

The attendance at Church has not been less regular than in former years.

The church wardens, in behalf of the Hatley congregation, have recently purchased, for a parsonage, a house conveniently situated near the church, together with an acre and a half of land. It is estimated that when repairs are made, which will have to be extensive, and some out-buildings erected, the property will have cost us about \$1,200.

Toward this the people have given cheerfully and liberally, according to their means. With a little extraneous aid, which I hope to obtain, there is every prospect of the praiseworthy resolve of the wardens, Mr. Weston and Mr. Benjamin Bowen, to have the purchase money in full collected before Easter next, being accomplished.

My people have been informed of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel's recent reduction of its grant to this diocese. They have hitherto met the demands of the Diocesan Board, and I think I may answer for them, that they will not show themselves inferior to other missions in coming forward to do their part towards meeting the increased liabilities thrown on the diocese. I could much wish, however, that, for reasons above referred to, no increase of assessment were required of us this year.

## INVERNESS.

I was placed in charge of this mission on the 10th June last, having been inducted by the Rural Dean, the Revd. Mr. King. I am not able to say much about the mission this year, having had charge only a few months. In entering on my work, I was most kindly and warmly received by the members of the church, owing not a little, I am sure, to the *prestige* of my brother's name, the Rev. Professor Roe, who was in charge of Inverness twenty years ago, and whose labors among the people are even now held in loving and grateful remembrance.

I hold Divine Service at St. Stephen's church, and three school houses, viz: Campbell's, Lysander, and Becancour, at the latter place only once a month. *Three services* every Sunday in the month but one, when I hold service at Becancour.

There are four Sunday schools in the mission, with a total of about *one hundred* scholars—average attendance *eighty*. These schools have been well attended during the summer months, and were only closed the second Sunday in November, owing to the state of the roads. I have had a Bible class on Fridays during the summer, which is also discontinued for the present; and a large number of the young people met during fine weather every Friday evening at St. Stephen's, to practice singing the hymns for the following Sunday. These meetings are well attended, sometimes forty present, and were opened and closed with prayer. On the whole, I am very much pleased with the appearance of things in this mission. The people are attached to the church and its services, but are very backward in the duty of giving to the support of the church or mission fund, or in paying their regular assessment dues. They plead poverty and hard times, and scarcity of money. I am inclined to think there is some truth in the plea, but hope they will gradually learn the duty and necessity of giving more liberally to the support of the church and its missionary work.

I would not be doing my duty were I to omit saying that my predecessor, the Rev. C. B. Washer, is spoken of by the people with great respect and attachment to him personally, and many regret his having left the mission.

I omitted stating that the services at St. Stephens and the Campbell's school house, and Lysander school house,

Missionary meetings for the Church Society, and Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the latter addressed by the Bishop, were also held during the year. Sunday school festivals for the young members were kindly looked after by the Ladies' Association.

A donation of land, to the value of \$70, has been made by H. Cross, Esq., church warden, and adds greatly to the beauty and convenience of the grounds around the parsonage. If we could secure a small piece from another member



of the congregation, it would enable us to remove an unsightly boundary now within a few feet of the door. The Missionary has also received substantial gifts, among others, a comfortable waggon, from the congregations of Upper and Lower Ireland. The fence around the burial ground has been renewed, and the hill in front of the church levelled, making the ingress and the egress more comfortable and less dangerous. A move has been made towards collecting funds for restoring the church, and we hope to see it accomplished the coming year.

At Christ church, the usual zeal on behalf of the Church Society has been shown, and assessment promptly paid. The fence here has also been repaired, and fine altar linen and altar cloth provided. Considerable impatience is manifested at not having the building of a new church pushed on, but I hope they will lose nothing by waiting. It is worse than useless to attempt too much.

The mission chapel at Adderley was opened for Divine service on St. Luke's day, by the Lord Bishop. It is now said to be the prettiest little church in the county, and cost \$600. This is a strong proof that the churches here do little credit to the Diocese, and every effort towards church building should meet with general approval.

During the year baptisms, 30 ; confirmed, 36 ; burials, 13.

## KINGSEY.

Divine service has been regularly celebrated in the three stations comprised in this mission, viz. : St. Paul's, Sydenham Place; the Holy Trinity, Denison's Mills; and the School House, Spooner Pond.

Holy Communion administered twice a month in St. Paul's, once a month at Holy Trinity.

The average attendance has been fair at St. Paul's ; good at Holy Trinity and Spooner Pond. The last-named congregation has been regularly organized this summer.

It has pleased God that death should deprive us of three who, by example and work, were true supporters of Christ's holy church.

The aged, pious and cheerful owner of Barrington Lodge was the first to leave us, respected and loved wherever known. He will be sadly missed in this mission.

And next, Mr. Richard McMannis, our delegate to Synod. Trusted implicitly by all who knew him, honored and loved by his neighbors and acquaintances, his death has left a blank of which we all are sensible. As my church warden he was simply invaluable : exact in his accounts, and diligent in promoting by all worthy means the welfare of the church and clergyman.

Our next great loss was Sir Edmond Cox, one to whom, under God, this mission is mainly indebted for the promoting and sustaining of the church. It is not possible to estimate the loss of men whose mind and heart are bent upon their duty to their God and to their church.

The record of death in our small community is indeed sad, though its sadness is relieved by that which constitutes it—by the sincerity, godliness and love of those we mourn.

On the 22nd day of June, the Lord Bishop confirmed eleven candidates.

The congregation of the Holy Trinity have made great efforts to improve the congregational singing, and have turned out almost as a body to attend the weekly practice during the winter months, not, I trust and think, without profit.

I gather from my register that there have been  
Baptisms—Infant, 5 ; Adult, 7. Marriages, 2 ; deaths, 5.

I regret very much to have to report no annual subscriptions to the Church Society, amounting to \$2.

I trust that my exhortations, public and private, may, with God's blessing, be more successful another year, and that the stigma of ingratitude may be thus removed.

A neat fence has been placed round Holy Trinity Church, at a cost of \$54, and a bible presented to the church by a member of the congregation.

A pleasing and most welcome testimony of affection was presented about Eastertide to the Incumbent, in the form of a purse, contributed by the various congregations, containing forty-five dollars.

In the way of improvements, I must not forget to mention the stoning of the well at the parsonage, which will now outlast the house.

## LEEDS.

During the year, the services have been held at the different churches and stations much the same as in former years. The congregations averaging about the same; perhaps, owing to removals and other causes, not quite as large. The people have been visited at their homes as opportunity served, and occasion required.

I am glad that whenever I appoint a service in any of the remote parishes, I always have a good congregation.

My Sunday services are usually three in the summer season, and in the winter three every alternate Sunday, and two on the other. This involves about twenty two miles travel, over rough roads. For the last confirmation I had a class of six girls, whom I should never have obtained but for holding service in the locality. In winter I have a week day service there once a month, but of course the attendance is not so good as on a Sunday.

I hold also a service on the borders of Thetford, at what is called the Frizzell school house, once a month, on a week day, which is, on the whole, very well attended, men often laying aside their work in haying and harvest to come. There, also, I gathered a few for confirmation. Personally, I have received every kindness from the people, especially from one family, the heads of which have been removed by death, within a year or two of each other. But though the father and mother have been taken away, the kindness and attention to myself have been continued unaltered.

I must here acknowledge my indebtedness to the young ladies of the several congregations, who have acted as collectors for the church society. Had it not been for their kind help, the list would have been a very short one, and the contributions very small. I find the whole amounts to nearly seventy-two dollars in subscriptions and collections, not bad considering how hard it is to get money. Broughton, twenty miles off, is served as usual, once in six weeks; congregation about sixty or seventy. There was a small confirmation class of six, when we were favored with a visit from the Lord Bishop, for the purpose of administering that holy rite.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

I was inducted into this mission July 9, 1876, and vacated it November 9, 1877.

Services have been held at each place alternately, morning and evening, and two Sundays out of every four in Olivers Corners' school house, at three p.m.

Improvement in attendance and in a general parochial interest, was more marked at Georgeville than at Magog. Yet here, too, it will be seen that some good results can be recorded. No parsonage had yet been built or provided for the mission when I left, but the people of Georgeville most kindly and laudably had made efforts to secure the clergyman's residence amongst them, instead of at Magog. The latter place, however, had been fixed upon as headquarters, and so the debt upon the church was substituted as the object which called out most loudly for attention at Georgeville; and I am rejoiced to say that sorry debt of ten years' standing was at last removed on the first of May, after the accumulation in various ways, during the preceding seven or eight months, of \$223.46 for final payments.

This happy success was due in great measure at the close, as it had been all along, to the earnest and persevering efforts of Miss Eva S. Tuck, seconded by well-sustained efforts of the congregation, especially in the matter of entertainments for the benefit of the church. In consideration of all that had been done locally and with so much difficulty, the Diocesan Board graciously forgave arrears due for the annual assessment, to the amount of \$100. An abatement of \$50 was also granted Magog, on account of deaths and removals.

From the Depository Committee the incumbent obtained a grant of fifty paged prayer-books, for services at out-stations; and also, at his own expense, supplied books, manuals and pamphlets, for Georgeville Sunday school.

Although free from debt, the church at Georgeville was not offered for consecration at the time of the Bishop's recent visit, because it seemed more fitting to defer this until, after the making of some needed repairs, it may become more worthy of being set apart as "the House of God."

This mention of the Church's parochial gains recalls very sadly certain heavy losses sustained in the removal by death of some of her most worthy members.

At Magog a severe loss has been sustained in the death of the Church Wardens, Dr. J. B. Hall and Mr. O. Warren, while at Georgeville Mrs. J. C. Tuck will be sadly missed.

The increased number of communicants and of the baptized, especially of adults, indicates, I trust, a better general appreciation of the importance of the holy sacraments. In these, as in the financial matters of the parish, the accompanying tabular statements will speak for themselves:

## NEW LIVERPOOL.

I beg to report for the information of the Church Society, that at the end of May I took charge of this parish, as successor to the Rev. T. Richardson, who had removed to Quebec. But as until the end of September I continued responsible for the due performance of the monthly service at Nicolet, I was not formally inducted into this charge until the 21st October.

I am glad to say that almost all the services have been fairly attended, and a good spirit seems to animate all the parishioners.

The Sunday school has been kept up to the average mark, though some children who belonged to it a few months ago, have removed, with their parents, to Toronto. Mrs. Roberts, with her usual kindness, invited all the children to a pic-nic in the autumn; and during Christmas week, another rich treat was afforded them, through the kindness of two prominent gentlemen of the congregation, aided by the ladies, who not only entertained them at tea, but set up for their gratification, a splendid Christmas tree, laden with suitable presents. I am happy to add that, mainly through the zealous exertions of Mr. H. Atkinson, church warden, our church edifice has not only been thoroughly repaired, but neatly painted, and is now in good order, inside and out. A most convenient and suitable site for a parsonage has been presented to the parish by the Messrs. Benson Bros. Some hundreds of dollars have already been subscribed for the building. It is intended to begin to build early in the spring. Thus a great want is in a fair way to be supplied.

Our day school is now in charge of a steady and competent teacher, and promises to be a decided benefit to the community.

On our arrival in the parish, we met with a kind welcome from all, and the same kindness continues undiminished.

The past year has been anything but an uninteresting one. Early in the year we had a visit from the Rev. Rural Dean King.

A fortnight later, on Quinquagesima Sunday, his Lordship the Bishop confirmed twenty-two candidates.

In March the Rev. M. M. Fothergill inspected our schools.

In the month of April, one much esteemed for his intellectual attainments and social qualities, the late C. Aylwin, Esq., of Cap Santé, was taken away from our midst.

The day Mr. Aylwin died, my horse was not well, and the roads were bad; but when the messenger came for me, I saddled it, and rode very quickly; and from that time the horse failed fast until it died. It was but young, and had cost me £30, but had carried me through many a long journey.

In July, the mission failed to meet its agreement with the Diocesan Board, and I had to suspend services. A meeting was called to consider what steps were to be taken. I attended the meeting, which was, I think, the largest vestry meeting we ever held here. I am glad to report that steps were taken to raise the assessment, and the services were restored.



But another difficulty faced us. An instalment on the parsonage debt had to be met, to raise money for which I went to Quebec, Montreal, and London, (Ontario,) and collected the required amount.

Mr. Dalziel, son of a former Incumbent, this fall collected \$23.75, towards paying for a new fence around the graveyard. To that he added \$10 from himself.

SANDY BEACH.

Never since I knew this coast, now nearly twenty years, did the material prospect seem so gloomy and discouraging. The fisheries, the mainstay of this population, have been, comparatively, a failure, and distress and difficulty are the consequences ; these local troubles, too, are aggravated by the general depression and stagnation in business and progress throughout the entire province. Those who have heretofore been in comfortable circumstances, have now enough to do to keep the wolf from the door, and the poor are threatened with utter destitution and suffering. Indeed, if extraneous help be not afforded, I dread to think what may be the result. Under these circumstances, it cannot be otherwise than that there should be a sensible diminution of all contributions for religious and charitable objects. This accounts for, and must excuse the diminished amount raised for the Church Society, yet small as is the actual sum sent up, it bears as fair a proportion to the means of the people, as did the contributions of more favored seasons. In a spiritual point of view, though nothing striking has to be recorded, the mission makes, I trust, some progress. The religious life seems deepening in the elder members of the church, and a fair proportion of the younger have become regular communicants. All the public ministrations of God's House are well attended, and private visiting and instruction are thankfully received.

STANSTEAD

Another quiet and uneventful year has passed away. It has brought with it, some discouragements and trials, but it has been rich in encouragement too.

There has been no decided increase of numerical strength, but I am persuaded there has been an advance in devotedness to God, and in general unanimity of feeling. This I consider as real an increase of strength as mere growth in numbers could possibly be.

The usual services have been kept up throughout the mission. In some cases, additional ones have been given. In Christ Church, Stanstead Plain, there have been two Sunday services, and one service every holyday throughout the year. In Libby Mills, there has been one service a fortnight. In Beebe Plain, the fortnightly service has been altered, during part of the year, to a weekly one, and the monthly service at New Boston, during the summer, to a fortnightly one.

Of the out-missions I have, as yet, no very decided progress to report. I have baptized several children in New Boston, and in Beebe Plain one or two. From the former place, three candidates presented themselves before the Bishop, in February last, for confirmation, and have since been admitted, by me, to holy communion.

In Christ Church, the average attendance has been about the same as during last year. The average attendance at Holy Communion also remains unchanged. Removals from our parish have been so numerous, and the consequent loss to our church so great, as almost to counterbalance the addition made to our numbers by the February confirmation.

As a means of awakening interest and doing good, we have established a "Church Guild," for general church purposes, but with a special view to the promotion of Temperance. It has been in successful operation for about two months. During that time we have had weekly meetings, largely of a literary character, which have been public and very well attended. Our aim and hope is to attract and keep the young from questionable places of resort, and to surround them with good and elevating influences. In connection with this Guild, a "Ladies Aid Society" is working most laboriously and efficiently. It is proposed to connect with it, too, a course of Lectures for the winter months.

Our church school is progressing most favourably under the care of Miss Barnard. For a time the attendance was largely reduced by the inroads of sickness. Now, I am happy to say, the numbers are creeping up again. The work done this term is most creditable to teacher and scholars alike. There is, too, on the part of the children, a marked increase of attachment to the Church. Thanks to the generous Societies which help us, we have a very good school. We yet need maps and appliances for our school room.

As to finances, we have been obliged to raise a large amount for repairs upon the church; an effort, too, has been made towards the purchase of a parsonage: and in view of these and other special burdens, it has taxed us to the utmost to secure the promised assessment of \$350. By dint of great exertion, however, we have succeeded in collecting it. The financial statement for the year, in consequence of the many special claims we have had to meet, shows a sum total considerably in advance of that for 1876.

We have now on hand sufficient money to purchase a bell, but are forced to wait for means to erect a tower, the turret, at first proposed for its temporary accommodation, being thought, by some, impracticable.

Again we have to acknowledge the generous kindness of our brother churchmen in Quebec. They have helped us, with liberal offerings, to secure the beginning of a Parsonage Fund. By the end of another year, I trust we shall be enjoying the fruits of their liberality.

My register shows a record for the year, of 17 baptisms, 2 marriages, and 9 burials. Eleven have been confirmed.

In a year of singular hardship and widespread suffering, we have been abundantly blessed of God. May we have such a due sense of His many mercies that we may ever show forth His praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

STONEHAM AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

The missionary feels no reason to regret the hopeful character of last year's report.

The happy relations between minister and people remain undisturbed.

In view of the reduction of the annual grant to this diocese by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, both congregations have cheerfully raised their respective assessments, notwithstanding both are annually decreasing in number, and the means of both are already fully taxed to meet local wants.

The missionary regrets that, owing to the well-nigh impassable state of the Stoneham roads during short periods of the year, he has not been able to visit as often as he could have wished his Lake Beauport congregation, who nevertheless do not fail to evince their personal regard for him, and their attachment to the services of the Church.

With the exception of a few individuals, the attendance at public worship at both services on the Lord's Day, by the Stoneham congregation, has been very praiseworthy. Some families walking regularly twelve miles on the Sunday, in all kinds of weather.

At Lake Beauport the Sunday school continues to be greatly indebted to Miss Vial for her valuable services.

At Stoneham the missionary devotes one afternoon in the week to the religious instruction of all Protestant children within this part of the mission. On the Sunday evening the adult members meet at the parsonage for the familiar exposition of God's Word.

The interior of the church has been repaired, a well has been made for the use of the parsonage, a good stable has been erected, and the glebe has been fenced in by the Stoneham congregation, during the past year.

Total amount raised in the mission for Church purposes during the past year, not less than \$200.

#### ST. SYLVESTER.

The missionary of St. Sylvester reports that, by the assistance of kind friends in Quebec, he has been enabled to make some improvements in the church at St. Sylvester—the House of God is now more seemly, in fact neat, and well appointed throughout.

The schools during the year have, from a variety of causes, been somewhat interrupted. The St. Margaret's school, near the church, has been closed for the past quarter, in consequence of the prevalence of diphtheria. The New Armagh school only received aid from the Society for one quarter, in consequence of non-compliance with the rules of the Education Committee. The school at St. Giles is closed for the present, but we hope soon to secure a suitable teacher and again provide instruction for the children.

WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

To write a report year after year, when nothing unusual takes place, is a piece of business which, I suppose, must puzzle more persons than the country parson resident in West Frampton.

Nothing to report, however, does not mean nothing done, but then the work is only what is done everywhere, and in many places, I dare say, better done, so that we have nothing to write without the appearance of boasting. But I think I may be permitted to boast of the willingness of the people of West Frampton, and the ready response to all appeals for help by contributions towards the objects of the Church Society and church purposes generally: and this in the face of hard times which press as heavily on the farmer in West Frampton as in other districts.

We have had two missionary meetings during the year, when addresses were kindly delivered by the Rev. F. Boyle, of East Frampton, and by our worthy Rural Dean.

I have every reason for gratitude for the many material expressions of good will from several members of my congregation, but especially for a most abundant supply of beef, poultry, and vegetables, from our kind friends, Mr. A. Ross, sr., and family. And these kindnesses have been so oft repeated, that I must risk giving offence by an acknowledgment in my report.

While we have every reason to be grateful to many, I am glad to state we are at strife with none, a circumstance which adds not a little to the happiness of the clergyman, and helps on the success of his work—in short, there is a community of feeling between the pastor and people of West Frampton, which is most cheering.

I must add that I am greatly indebted to the church wardens for the promptness with which the assessment is collected.

*The following reports have been received from clergymen and others not connected with the Diocesan Board :*

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

No very marked events have occurred during the past year in the mission stations around Lennoxville which are served by the Professor of Divinity and the Divinity Students of Bishop's College. The work in all of them has been kept up regularly and efficiently, and no signs of failure appear.

The Sunday school at Mitchell's continues under the charge of Messrs. Clement and Robert Browne. The service and Sunday school at Moulton Hill are conducted, as before, by Mr. Arthur Judge and Mr. Edward Harper. Ascot Corner mission has still the benefit of the services of Mr. Radley Walters, zealously seconded by Mr. Percy Chambers. With reference to these places we have no striking results to chronicle this year. Indeed, I need scarcely say, that it is only after long years of patient loving labours of this kind that substantial and lasting results are to be looked for. Regularity of attendance, however, on the part of the people and the children, and continued kind feeling and appreciation of work, are themselves real results, and very valuable ones.

The mission of Sandhill has, during the last few weeks, passed from the hands of Mr. Harvey to those of Mr. Frederick Webster. Mr. Harvey, who has served the mission of Sandhill for the last two years, was ordained by the Bishop of Quebec, on the 18th November, to the charge of the mission of Shigawake, in the Bay Chaleurs. Mr. Harvey belongs to the Diocese of Ontario; but by an arrangement made with the Bishop of Ontario, he is to serve temporarily as a deacon in the Diocese of Quebec. His labors at Sandhill were marked by a warm zeal, and unflinching persistency in every department of his duty; and by his bright, cheerful manner, and affectionate kindness, he won the goodwill of all classes, and was particularly successful in attaching to himself the young people. These results became apparent on the last Sunday that Mr. Harvey was at Sandhill. Though it was only known the night before that he was so soon to leave, the school house was crowded, and after the service an affectionate address

was presented to Mr. Harvey, accompanied by a purse of twenty-eight dollars.

The church at Milby is served by Mr. Robert Colston and Mr. Lee, but as this station is under the immediate supervision of the Rector of Lemoxville, a notice of the substantial progress which I believe has been made there may be looked for in his report.

It ought, perhaps, to be mentioned, as another token of the good work taking root, that the weekly offertory has been now permanently established at both Ascot Corner and Sandhill. Some small sums have also been contributed in these places towards some of the Diocesan funds; these will be found credited in the Treasurer's accounts. The church at Sandhill is insured and the insurance paid.

## LENNOXVILLE.

On a comparison of the amounts collected for the Church Society this year and last, it will be seen that there is a serious falling off in the number of subscribers. Out of the number of names on last year's list, twelve are wanting, and more than one has found it necessary to cut down the subscription of former years. The reason assigned for this diminution is, in every case, the "hard times," which press heavily all over the country. In some instances I know this to be the reason, and not the excuse.

The Society, as well as this parish, has suffered an almost irreparable loss in the death of the late Dr. Nicolls. He was never weary of advancing the interests of the Society in every possible way, urging its claims for support, and defending it from misrepresentations and misapprehensions. No doubt, a fitting tribute to his memory will be entered on the records of the Society. I would, however, on behalf of the congregation, give expression to our appreciation of his untiring efforts to help on every kind of Church work among us, by his counsel, and presence, and material aid. The church in Lennoxville, as well as throughout the district, is, in no small degree, indebted for the position she holds this day, to the labors of Dr. Nicolls during the last thirty years. And his memory is endeared to us all, no less by the bright, kindly, cheerfulness which characterised his intercourse, than by the words of earnest exhortation and spiritual instruction in which he so frequently addressed us. May the example of his pure, gentle, loving, Christian life, never be forgotten among us.

We have also sustained very serious loss in the removal, during the past year, of several members of the Church, who have left the parish. By all these changes, which I regret to say are likely to continue, both the numbers and the financial condition of the congregation are seriously

affected. Yet our statement shows that the offertory for ordinary expenses is slightly in advance of last year. I have to mention with much satisfaction the gift of J. B. Paddon, Esq., of a pair of handsome chandeliers for the body of the church, and one for the choir.

I must not conclude my report without referring to the formation of a "Ladies Missionary Union," which was quietly begun last spring, and has gone on successfully and profitably to all interested in it. The Union meets once a month for prayer and reading prepared papers on mission work, or articles from one or other of the missionary periodicals.

The services at the little church at Milby have been regularly carried on as usual, Messrs. Colston and Lee, Divinity Students of Bishop's College, being the lay readers in place of Mr. Simpson, who, from ill-health, has been unable to return to College.

In the month of June last, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese administered the rite of confirmation to fifteen candidates, all of whom have become regular attendants at the Holy Communion.

## ST. PETER'S CHURCH, SHERBROOKE.

During the past year our church here has sustained a sad loss. Sometime between Sunday, August 5, and Sunday, August 12, the church was entered by one or more thieves, who robbed our church of our Communion plate and Linen. We have recently had a meeting of our Vestry to consider what steps should be taken to replace our loss. A subscription list was started at the meeting, which has already reached three hundred dollars.

Our church population, during the past year, has decreased rather than otherwise. Some five or six families of artisans have left Sherbrooke and returned to England, being unable, as they said, to find employment in this country. Our congregations have, nevertheless, been fully sustained in number, and lately have been unusually large. The number of communicants, too, has slightly increased during the year. At the commencement of the year, in Advent 1876, we had 216 communicants; of these, during



the year, 4 have died, and 3 have left; 21 communicants have been added. So that our present number of enrolled communicants, who have communicated at least once publicly or privately during the past year, stands at 230. A large class of 36 has been preparing for confirmation since September, and will be presented to the Bishop, to receive the Apostolic rite, on Sunday afternoon, December 9th. Nearly all of them, I hope, will be added after that to our list of communicants.

During the past year there have been 30 public and 7 private celebrations of the Holy Communion in connection with St. Peter's church.

The usual Sunday and week-day services at the church, the Reformatory, and in our school-room, have been carried on by the Revd. C. P. Reid, Rector, and myself. There have been 46 baptisms, (2 of them of adults,) 8 marriages, and 17 burials during the year. The Sunday school numbers 121, with an average attendance of 100. It is carried on by 12 teachers and a superintendent, who have been zealous and diligent in this important part of our church work.

As last year, six lady-collectors kindly undertook the annual subscription list of our Diocesan Church Society. They have been very successful in their canvass of the parish. The result is \$259.

I append below a financial statement, from which it will be seen that our offerings for extra parochial purposes are \$17 in advance of last report.

## MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

Nothing worthy of note has occurred, so that my report for this year is very brief.

I have visited the different Islands as regularly as weather would permit me, and the services have been conducted as usual, and where opportunities have occurred I have had house visitation, with reading of God's word and prayer,

A new Church was commenced this year on Grosse Isle, a sufficient sum was raised to defray the expenses of the first contract, viz: Foundation, frame, rough boarding, shingling the roof only, tower and steeple, windows and door. All that remains to be done is, clap-boarding outside, and ceiling inside, with the entire painting, for which we want a sum of about \$200. All work is postponed until next spring, at which time I hope to procure from the people about \$100. But all subscriptions from the people depend upon a satisfactory fishing next year.

At Amherst, the Church has been painted outside. This was absolutely necessary, for it was much weather-beaten, and without paint, the wood-work would soon become injured.

The Church at Grindstone is in good order, and will be painted, if possible, next spring.

The schools are not as satisfactory this year as previously. The school master on Entry Island has been discharged. I have now but one school, and that on Grindstone Island. I am trying my utmost to persuade the people from the different Islands to have their children placed at the houses on this Island, and thus have the benefit of the school.

The subscription for the General Fund of the Diocesan Church Society of Quebec has been collected, but does not amount to much, owing to the Grosse Isle people not being able to subscribe, on account of being heavily pressed for money on their new church account.

It must be remembered that the people here have to subsist for the entire year upon their summer's earnings, having no work in the winter; and under these circumstances it is not easy to give.

The sum subscribed this year is \$20.80.

That the Clergy Trust Committee desires to place on record their deep sense of the faithfulness and thoroughness with which Mr. Wurtele has continued, during 23 years, to discharge the very responsible and laborious duties of Treasurer of the Clergy Trust Fund, the Bishopric Endowment Fund, and the numerous local Endowment Funds created under the auspices of the Church Society and entrusted to the management of the Clergy Trust Committee ;

That they further recognize the following facts as presenting more force and value than they can embody in words :

Mr. Wurtele has filled the office since 1855.

During the 23 years which have passed away, no loss has been incurred in any of the funds committed to his care.

The Clergy Trust Fund has grown from \$53,341 to \$104,632.

The Bishopric Endowment Fund has increased from \$40,262 to \$85,889.

The Local Endowments have been commenced within the period, and have already reached the sum of \$18,000."

The following letter was read at the annual meeting by Mr. W. G. Wurtele, and ordered to be inserted in the Annual Report :

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

On retiring from the office of Treasurer of the Clergy Trust Fund, I beg leave to place on record the progress of the funds managed by the Clergy Trust Committee.

The Clergy Trust Fund originated in 1855, when the Legislature of this country secularized the Clergy Reserves, only those clergymen being recognized who were drawing their stipends from that fund.

Arrangements were then made that these clergymen should be allowed to commute their stipends, provided they placed the capital received in the hands of the Church Society to form a fund for all future time, for the support of the Clergy in the Diocese. The Society pledged themselves to pay those clergymen the same amount of stipends they had formerly received from the Government. It was thought at the time to be a serious undertaking, as the capital received would not, at simple interest, yield the annual revenue required. The Fund was formed with \$53,341, with twelve clergymen to be paid annually \$3,991, leaving, as was then expected, about \$800 to be provided from the Society's funds, which at that time were very small indeed.

In the Providence of God, one of those clergymen was removed by death during the first year, and three more

shortly afterwards, two others left the Diocese ; there remaining up to the present time, six on the list. The fund prospered and increased, and during twenty three years no losses have been made. The fund at that time was not larger than the General Endowment Fund is at the present time, and now amounts to \$104,632.36, and without cost to any one member of the church, Clerical or Lay. At that time a dark and uncertain future seemed to be before us, our patrimony was swept away, our Rural clergy had but one hundred pounds sterling a year, and by what was then thought to be a great effort, their stipends were increased to \$500, and remained so until the formation of the Diocesan Board, when they were again increased to \$600, and a still further increase of late years to \$700 and \$800.

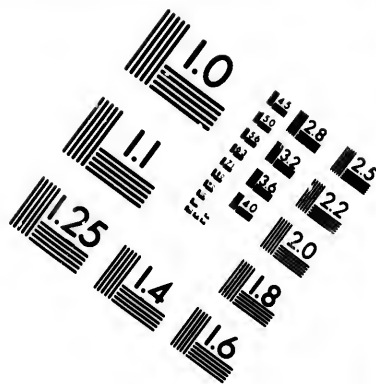
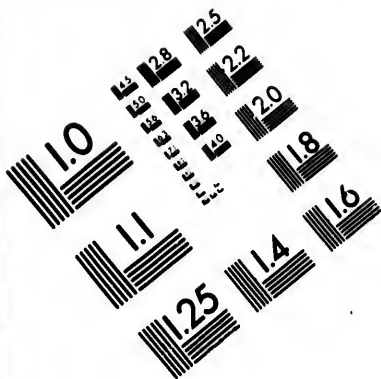
The next fund is the Bishopric Endowment: it was formed in 1848. One or two years previously the Clergy Reserves, intended for the support of the clergy of the Church of England in this country, were by an act of the Legislature divided among all denominations.

The portion coming to the Church of England from the sale of lands by the Government, was paid over to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. That Society seeing that no provision, by way of endowment, had been made for the future Bishop of the Diocese; with the permission of the Government, laid aside a portion of the large balance on hand for an endowment amounting to \$40,262. In 1856, this fund, by a Trust Deed, was transferred to the Church Society. In 1863, at the death of the beloved Bishop Mountain, the fund amounted to \$99,245, of which \$19,230 was paid over to the Bishopric Fund of Montreal, in order to equalize that fund with ours. We had then \$80,015 as the Bishopric Endowment for this Diocese, which now amounts to \$85,889.

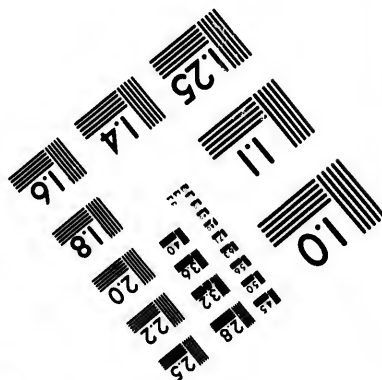
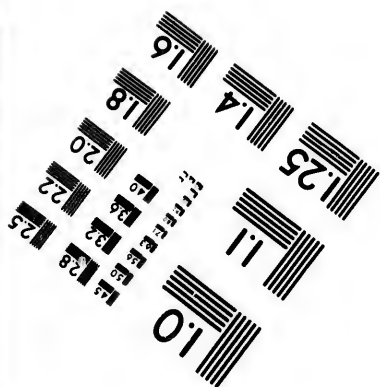
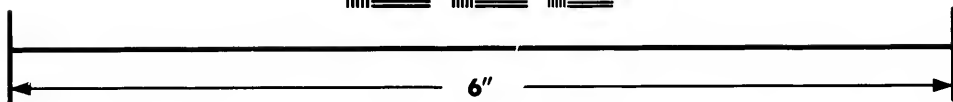
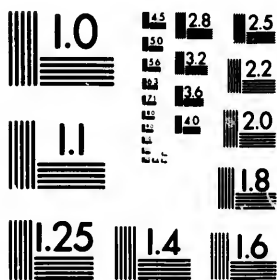
The Rural endowments, now numbering twenty three, having been formed from time to time within the last 14 years, excepting Three Rivers and Frampton, which were

formed some years previously ; these endowments have been created at a very small cost to the Society, \$150 each, and now amount to over \$48,000. Each endowment has its own Trust Deed, and so soon as the capital yields \$200 per annum, that sum is paid to the Incumbent in addition to his stipend. These endowments have been augmented by liberal donations, by legacies, and by contributions from the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, who, for these many years, has been a kind nursing mother to the church in this Diocese.

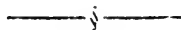

FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

1. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum (or Shares of Stock in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of Providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,

Towards the support of missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage

houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and churchyards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. *A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and devise unto the “Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec,” incorporated by a Statute of the province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171. all and singular, &c. [describe the real estate clearly.] to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever ; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof *to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other. and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.*

IV. *A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. *A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.*

Same as No. 3, down to the words “for ever”—then go on as follows :—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say : upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and Church-yard, and Burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

The ANNUAL SERMONS in aid of the various funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached—

FOR GENERAL PURPOSES on *Quinquagesima Sunday*.

FOR THE MISSION FUND on the *Sunday nearest to Michaelmas*.

FOR THE ALGOMA DIOCESAN FUND, on the day of Intercession.

FOR THE PENSION FUND, on Thanksgiving Day.

The attention of applicants for grants is particularly directed to the following rules:

1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage, glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.

2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt; or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent. of the value of the property or building when finished.

3. That the Treasurer when transmitting the amount of any grant of money made by this Society to any parish or mission in the diocese shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the church-wardens.

4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

5. That when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.

6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.

7. That no grant shall be made to any parish, mission or station, in which at least one sermon (in aid of the Pension Fund) shall not have been preached, and from which the subscription shall not have been sent in during the year.

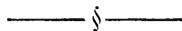
8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary in time to be submitted to the Finance Committee, who hold a meeting in the fortnight immediately preceding each meeting of the Central Board.

9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the duty of congregations to keep all their Church property in good repair.

10. Clergymen desirous of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first of May in each year.

11. No school shall be assisted for a longer period than twelve months without being Inspected and reported to be in a satisfactory condition.

12. That no application for grants in aid of churches, parsonages or buildings of any kind be entertained by the Central Board without a resolution from the Congregation approving of such application be sent at the same time to the Board.

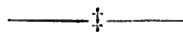

# BY-LAWS

OF THE

## Saint Francis District Association

OF THE

### CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

#### I. OF THE ASSOCIATION.

I. The Association consists of all persons resident within the District, who contribute five shillings annually to the funds of the Church Society.

II. The Association shall meet annually at Sherbrooke, in the second week in December, on which occasion the proceedings shall be as follows :

1. On Tuesday at 2.30 P.M., the annual business meeting of the Association shall be held, at which the Report shall be read. (and if necessary amended) and adopted, the Treasurer's account submitted, and the officers of the Association elected.

2. On Wednesday at 10.30 A.M., there shall be morning prayer and Holy Communion, together with a sermon bearing upon the missionary work of the church. the Preacher to be selected by the Rural Dean.

3. A public missionary meeting shall be held at 7 P.M., at which the Report or an abstract of it, as may be ordered by the business meeting, shall be read, and addresses made and also a collection taken up for some fund of the Church Society, at the discretion of the executive committee,

III. Special meetings of the Association may be called at any time by the Chairman, on requisition of any six members of the Association, made to the Secretary in writing.

IV. Notice of all meetings shall be given in writing to the clergy of the District (who shall be requested to give notice of the same in their several missions,) at least three weeks previous to such meeting. Notices of such meetings shall state their object.

V. No amendment or alteration of the By-laws of the Association shall be made, unless such amendment or alteration shall be proposed at one, and adopted, at an interval of not less than one month, at another meeting of the Association.

#### II. OF THE OFFICERS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

I. The Rural Dean shall be (ex-officio) chairman and shall preside at all meetings when present.

II. In case of the absence of the Rural Dean from any meeting of the Association or of any Committee thereof, such meeting may elect a chairman.

III. The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Association and Committees, and shall draft the annual report and keep minutes of all meetings of the Association and committees.

IV. The Treasurer shall receive all monies of the Association, and remit such, as are not appropriated by the Association, to the

Treasurer of the Diocesan Society, and shall submit a statement of his accounts at the annual business meeting of the Association.

V. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Rural Dean, the Secretary and Treasurer and four others, two of whom shall be Clergymen and two Laymen, who shall be elected at any meeting of the Association.

VI. It shall be the business of the executive committee to receive and report to the Association, upon all applications for grants of money from the various missions of the District, to sanction any outlay made by the officers of the Association, and to make the necessary preparations for conducting the annual missionary meetings of the Association. For these various purposes they shall meet from time to time at the call of the Rural Dean.

VII. All applications for grants must be in the hands of the Secretary, at least ten days before the Annual Meeting of the Association.

### III. OF SUB-COMMITTEES AND PAROCHIAL ASSOCIATIONS.

I. The Clergyman and Church Wardens of each Parish or Parish Mission form a sub-committee therein, of which the Clergyman shall be, *ex-officio*, chairman.

II. The sub-committee in each Parish or Mission may, in conjunction with those of the Parishioners who are willing to assist them, constitute a Parochial Association. Each Parochial Association shall appoint its own Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be *ex-officio* members of the sub-committee; and shall have power at any of its meetings to add to its number. The chairman, or in his absence the church wardens shall summon meetings of the Parochial Association.

III. Such sub-committees or Parochial Associations shall report annually to the District Association the sums raised in the respective missions, stating if there be any special donations, and for which of the general purposes of the Society they were made. They shall also mention what sums have been raised for local purposes and give any further information which they shall wish to appear in the Report of the Parent Society. Such report must be signed by the clergyman and *be in the hands of the Secretary* on or before the first of December in each year.

IV. One or more missionary meetings may, with the consent of the Incumbent, be held in each Parish or Mission in connection with the Parochial Association every year, such meeting shall be arranged by the Rural Dean in concert with the Incumbent.

NOTE A.—It is desirable that the clergy who intend to be present at the meetings of the District or Parochial Associations, *communicate their names to the Incumbent of the place where such meetings are to be held*, in order that provision may be made for their entertainment.

NOTE B.—It is recommended that besides the notice during Divine Service, a written notice of the time and place of meetings, be put up on the church door.
