# PLANNING TO STERILIZE OF HEALTH

Dr. Nasmith Impresses Need of Preventing Contamination-Regulations For Chickens,

Soon after deciding to chlorinate the ffluent from the new trunk sewer before letting it run into the lake, the board of health, at their meeting yesterday, discussed the keeping of chickens within the city limits.

That diversion of many householders was brought to the attention of the board by a strenuous letter from a man who strongly objected to the hennery of a neighbor. Dr. Hastings was asked by the board to prepare a report as to best way of dealing with the chicken question.

"I don't think chickens should be tolerated within the city limits," said Dr. Hastings. "If they are they should be kept a certain distance away from houses." He told of the way certain United States municipalities dealt with the matter. They had ordinances forbidding the keeping of chickens within 100 feet of any dwelling.

Hens a Luxury.

"I look on hens as a luxury rather than as a necessity within a municipality," said the doctor. "They mean luxury to some and a nuisance

As to the water, Dr. Hastings strongly recommended that there be a chlorinating plant in connection with the filtration plant. But if the sewage efficient were successfully treated there would be no need for it, he said. So, it was decided to build a chlorination plant in connection with the Gibraltar plant if necessary and to chlorinate the efficient from the trunk sewer.

Dr. Nasmith's report on the work of the city laboratories and on the water situation was read and approved. He summed up the water situation to the effect that with the sewage system as it was being constructed the city could not hope to keep all untreated sewage out of the lake all of the time, and that therefore to obtain pure water the efficient should be chlorinated and the incoming water should be both filtered and sterilized.

To show the extent of the contamination of the lake around Toronto, samples were taken. They showed contamination 9 miles east of Toronto, 5 miles west and 3 miles south of the island. SUPREME COURT

British Columbia Electric Railway Case Reserved-Ozia's Appeal Lost

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.-In the supreme court to-day, the appeal in British Coumbla Electric Railway Company v. Wilkinson was heard. The plaintiff's husband was employed in the company's workshops at New Westminster, ment of fare from Vancouver to wark at New Westminster on a pas-senger car, which was some distance behind a train of freight cars proceeding in the same direction. The rear car of thefreight train became detached, in some unexplained manner, ran backward down a grade, collided with the passenger car and killed the plaintiffs husband.

In an action to recover damages, the jury found that the company was at fault owing to defective system of operation and awarded \$11,000 damages. On this verdict the trial judge entered judgment for the plaintiff. The British Columbia Court of Appeal affirmed this judgment on the ground that, while there was no evidence of defective systems. tem, the doctrine res ipsa loquitur aptem, the doctrine res ipsa loquitur applied, and it was not shown that receased was traveling in such circumstances as to come within the law applying to common employment, and the fault of a fellow servant. Judgment was reserved. The case of Ozlas v. Reeves & Co., an

appeal from the Supreme Court of Alberta, was then taken up. The appellant purchased machinery from the Receives Company on conditions as to examination, inspection and rejection for failure to satisfy warranties within a limited time. The machinery was found defective and he notified the company to make repairs from time to time, but continued using the machin-ery til llong after the time limited for rejection. The repairs called for were made on several occasions by the company, but it is alieged that they did not put the machinery in proper order for the use for which it was intended. On being sued for the balance of the unpaid price, the appellant contended that his right of rejection had been precent reversiged and that he was not properl vexercised and that he was not table. The trial judge held that by his conduct in continuing to work the machinery after he had discovered the alleged defects, he was estopped from complaining and entered judgment against him for the amount of the claim. #### INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION IN GER-Cologne is perhaps a fair sample of

all the cities of the empire in its educational facilities along industrial lines. Among the principal educational institutions of this kind is the Royal United Machine-Building School, which undertakes to prepare candidates for

superintending the building and installation of all kinds of machinery. There are evening and Sunday classes for those not able to attend at other times; and there are special courses dealing with the installation of gas and water works, the installation of electric works of all kinds and the superintendence of gas works.

Admission to these courses is open to any one who has worked as an apprentice in a shop, doing practical work, advancement from one class to another being granted after examination. The fees are \$23.80 per annum to citizens, and \$119 to foreigners. In certain cases tuition is free. E. pupil is insured against accident death, the premium per quarter being thirty cents. The curriculum of the first, or entering class, includes the following studies, to which forty hours per week are devoted: German, mathe-

The state also provides a school for teaching architecture and building, and the students are taught the use of tools

as well as the tenory of designing.

A school in which pupils are prepared for a career in industrial and decoratthe art is also one of the features of the state educational system. The pup-il entering this school is supposed to make a life work of what he or she is taught, for women are given equal fa-clittles with men. The course for a dioloma is four years and the tuition only \$10 per annum for natives and \$50 for foreigners. Practical training is given in drawing, painting in water colors and oil, designing of decorations, friezes, wallpaper, curtains, carpets, linoleum, clay i odeling, wood carving, etc. The practical work is supplemented by daily lectures on the theory of each trade and the instruction is very

In Wermelskirchen, a short distance from Cologne, the government has a school for teaching shoemaking. Al-the it is supposed that the art of making shoes is most highly developed in the United States and that all other nations copy its methods and forms, it is a fact that students from Lynn, Mass., and other cities near the centre of the shoenaking industry come to this school to be taught. The difference between an American workman and a German who has attended this school is that, while the American is an expert in doing one thing, the German has been taught how to buy leather, how to cut to the best advantage, and has been given a thoro course in the making of shoes from start to finish. He can operate any machine and perform any manipulation required. The course, like all others, takes from three to four years. This school is expected to graduate men able to

take charge of any shoe factory. A boy who is to follow a business career is not given a haphazard course of instruction. He goes to a special commercial school from the first day until he graduates from the commercial high school. The most celebrated and best equipped school of this kind in Germany is located in Cologne. The last semester the attendance numbered 1221 students from all parts of Ger-many, and there were also eighty-two foreigners. The faculty includes about fifty professors and tutors. The list of studies embraces: Political economy, public law, geography, French language and literature, science of insurance, mechanics and electrotechnics, trade technics, English language and literature, English commercial correspondence, common law, pedagogy, botboard of trade, library, handling merchandise, textile industry, mail and telegraph, trade laws, newspaper trade, protection of workmen and charitable institutions, tariff, insurance and mut-
