UNLESS SOME ONE GIVES WAY

Conference at Indianapolis Ends in Deadlock and Grim Advice to Workers to Provide for Defence Fund.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 2.—With prospects pointing to a strike of 550,000 coal miners unless the present deadlock is broken by some unforeseen event, the national convention of the United Mine Workers of America adjourned this afternoon, after the discussion, without reaching a demand of a wage scale of the joint conference of the operators and miners of the central and southern states, and President John Mitchell of the miners' union advised the delegates to go home and look to the securing of defence funds in view of a possible industrial strike between miners and operators, the miners having refused to renew the present wage scale, and the operators having refused to grant an increase in wages.

The apparent determination of both operators and miners indicates that neither will make overtures to the other for further negotiations, and as indicated by the speeches of both the radicals and the conservatives of both organizations at the joint conferences it is probable that the 550,000 men controlled by the United Mine Workers will walk out of the mines in every part of the United States April 1.

There have been intimations but no assertions that the president of the United States and the national executive federation may be asked to set in motion negotiations looking to a rehabilitation of the joint agreements, and at least a discussion of some possible means of bringing the operators and miners together for further negotiations.

Before putting the motion to adjourn President Mitchell said: "I wish to inform the convention that there will be a meeting of the national executive committee at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. To the delegates here assembled and to the members of the organization at home, I want to say that they had better provide for a strike which will be of their own, and those who have not been supporting for at least a year should be left out."

Only one meaning was given to the resolution adopted by the convention yesterday, that in the event of any strike by the miners, the government will support a general strike would be declared.

WELL TRAINED

MAKES HIS PRESENCE FELT

But is Due to Leave in a Few Hours Now—Meanwhile, There is Baseball in Alberta.

The cold snap has done its worst, and the mercury in the thermometer will be on the climb to-day, and tomorrow. This was the cheering news from the observatory last night. Not during the whole of last winter was so low a temperature recorded as that of yesterday morning. At 8 a.m. the official indicator in Queen's Park showed 12 degrees below zero. By last night the mercury had risen to 2 below.

The visitation came all the way from the Hudson Bay region and froze the whole province, the western and southwestern portions escaped the full blast, and such spots as London and Champlain were favored by a milder type.

Quebec was also in the grip of the frost king yesterday. It was 10 below last night at Ottawa, and 12 below at Montreal and Quebec.

Only once during the severe 1914 winter were the rigors more keenly felt locally. That was on Jan. 4, when the record was 12 below.

The confidence of the weatherman that the cold will moderate is due to a rapid change in the weather over the southeast.

JACK FROST'S FLYING TRIP

MAKES HIS PRESENCE FELT

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It is true that never in the history of this country has a strike of such far reaching effect been threatened, it means a national suspension of mining if the strike comes on as the expiration of our mining contracts March 31.

It is reported from St. John, N.B., that a party of new guards, which had been stationed at the river on the St. John River on a tug 15 miles to Bely's Point. This broke the record of 1912, when the trip was made in January.

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RED FEENER IS USED

IN DEFENDING CHURCH

At the Church of St. Pierre du Gros Caillou, on the Rue St. Dominique, the authorities adopted rigorous measures. All the shops in the neighborhood of the edifice were closed, and armed municipal guards were stationed at intervals along the street, and a squad of mounted municipal guards in the Rue St. Dominique.

When the prefect of police, Lepine, arrived the shells were rolled and the people inside the church, numbering about 500 persons, began singing psalms while outside the rosy element, composed of Socialists, who threatened a counter demonstration, shouted revolutionary songs. Mr. Lepine three times ordered the congregation to open the gates, which the people refused to do and the firemen were ordered to force an entrance.

As they mounted ladders in order to break in the windows of the Chapel of the Virgin, an annex of the church, revolver shots rang out, and the firemen, amidst a shower of missiles the firemen scrambled up to the roof with a hose, the water was turned on and the fire of the building was soon flooded.

In the meantime the foreign crowd had been battered down, but the municipal guards fought barricades inside and met with fierce resistance. Numbers of the mob and the congregation were severely hurt, but the authorities eventually overcame the mob and the demonstrators were captured by one and led to the nearest station house.

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MANITOBA'S RURAL POPULATION BENEFITED BY CIVIC OR INDEPENDENT LINES.

Winnipeg, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—The special telephone committee of the legislature examined witnesses to-day from Gladstone, Yorkton and Neepawa municipalities, where telephone systems are in operation.

The committee was given to the effect that the saving to Neepawa residents in telephone rates by operating public owned system would be sufficient in twenty-five years to bear the cost of constructing three municipal plants.

DEFERRED DIVIDENDS SHOULD BE LEGISLATED OUT AS UNJUST OPERATION

Chicago, Feb. 2.—Delegates to the national insurance convention to-day embodied the result of their deliberations in resolutions. Six states voted against their adoption and twenty-three voted in the affirmative. The State of New York did not vote, its delegates declaring that they did not care to express an opinion on a matter recommending executive action, until after the presentation of the report of the Armstrong committee to the New York legislature.

The future policy of the states and territories represented in the convention was referred to a committee of 15 members, with power to enlarge its membership. This committee is to prepare a report, which will be submitted at a meeting to be held in New York at the next meeting of the national insurance commissioners, probably in September at Washington, D.C. The committee includes Attorney-General Mayer of New York. The report of the committee is adopted follows:

"We believe that as the deferred dividend plan, which consists in deferring all dividends to the end of a period named, and of forfeiting the shares of the surplus justly belonging to those policyholders who are injured or died before the end of the period, is in sound principle and unjust in its operation, and such legislation should be enacted which will remove the evils of this system.

"Five Annual Statements. "With respect to the character already issued there should be required from this time forward, an annual statement and provisional appointment of surplus to policyholders and the aggregate so apportioned to such policyholders should be charged to the liability of the company. With respect to all future policies there should be annual accounting of the shares of an entire surplus of the preceding year, after a reasonable margin of safety and an option on the part of the policyholder to withdraw or confer upon him other options relating to the purchase of additional insurance may be included.

"With respect to the representative form of government of the mutual insurance companies, we have carefully reflected upon the plan that has been proposed. We recognize the difficulty in accomplishing the much desired result, and we are impressed with the necessity of a change in the present methods, and we suggest for consideration a plan that should be adopted of some plan whereby there will be in each mutual company a division of jurisdiction with the state to select a representative or representatives to attend the annual meeting of the shareholders. Other details of such plan to be devised so as to bring as nearly as possible to each policyholder an equitable and practical ability of exercising his right to a vote in the management of his company.

HAMILTON NEWS

Hamilton, Feb. 2.—(Special)—Edward Bates, aged 55, a Bank of Hamilton messenger, dropped dead to-night at his home at East Barton-street. He had been on duty to-day as usual. He was heard to fall heavily in the bathroom. An investigation revealed that he had taken an overdose of medicine powder. He died in less than two hours.

The evening trades and labor council presented a good watch to Norman W. Thompson, treasurer. City Solicitor MacKiegan, who has been laid up for several weeks from a paralytic stroke, hopes to return to his office.

Piceman Resigns
Fireman Polemy has resigned. He was accused of using disrespectful language.

It is estimated that the receipts from the waterworks system will amount to \$215,000 this year.

A salvage corps of four or five men will likely be added to the fire department.

Major Labatt, assignment, was busy on the books of H. P. Heming, stock broker, to-day. Some of the creditors say that the liabilities amount to about \$100,000, of which about \$40,000 is unsecured, and that they will be lucky if they get 20 cents on the dollar. One man is interested in the tune of \$14,000 but a majority of creditors have not more than \$2000 to \$4000 involved.

The Socialists have got complete control of the Stockyards Company after paying fancy prices to the local directors, among whom were J. J. Scott, K. C., J. D. Gansler, R. K. Hope and Mr. Treble, Toronto.

Some months ago a skin-grafting operation was tried on Miss Olive Clegg, who had her scalp torn off. It was not a success and the girl's head has to be covered with an elastic net dressed every day. Another lot of young people will be asked to give enough skin for another operation.

GOVERNMENT AIDED PRESS SERVICE

C. P. A. Pass Itself on Record Encouraging the Propagation.

The Ontario Medical Council came in for severe censure at the hands of the members of the Canadian Press Association yesterday, when a resolution was received with applause and carried unanimously in disapproval of the conduct of the medical council in asking their organization to suppress on the part of one of the fraternity the use of the advertising columns of the papers.

Resolutions approving of the good service of the Canadian Association of Press and favoring similar government aid to the Canadian telegraph and the association's schedule of rates for foreign advertising was discussed. The association's schedule of rates was deemed the present rate too low, and suggestions were made in regard to securing a more general adherence to the present rates. It was also resolved that the association should submit correct statements of circulation, with as full detail as possible, so that perfect confidence could be established between buyer and seller of advertising space.

The daily press section of the association elected the following officers: President, W. M. O'Brien, Stratford; Secretary, A. G. Donaldson, Every Town; Editor, L. H. Dimean; Treasurer, St. Thomas Times; Executive committee, Messrs. Dobbins, Peterboro Register; McKay, Windsor Record; McIntosh, Guelph Mercury; Adams, London Advertiser; and Woodward, Chatham Daily.

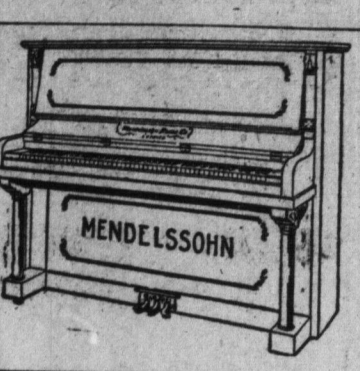

MORE MONEY IS REQUIRED FOR RIGHT KIND OF POLICE

Chief Grasset Says So in His Annual Report—Crime Statistics for 1905.

The annual report of the police department shows an increase of 2263 in apprehensions, making a total of 15,965 in 1905, but 7555 charges were withdrawn. Drunkenness and minor breaches of bylaws caused most of the trouble, an increase of \$63,269, \$54,714.46 was recovered.

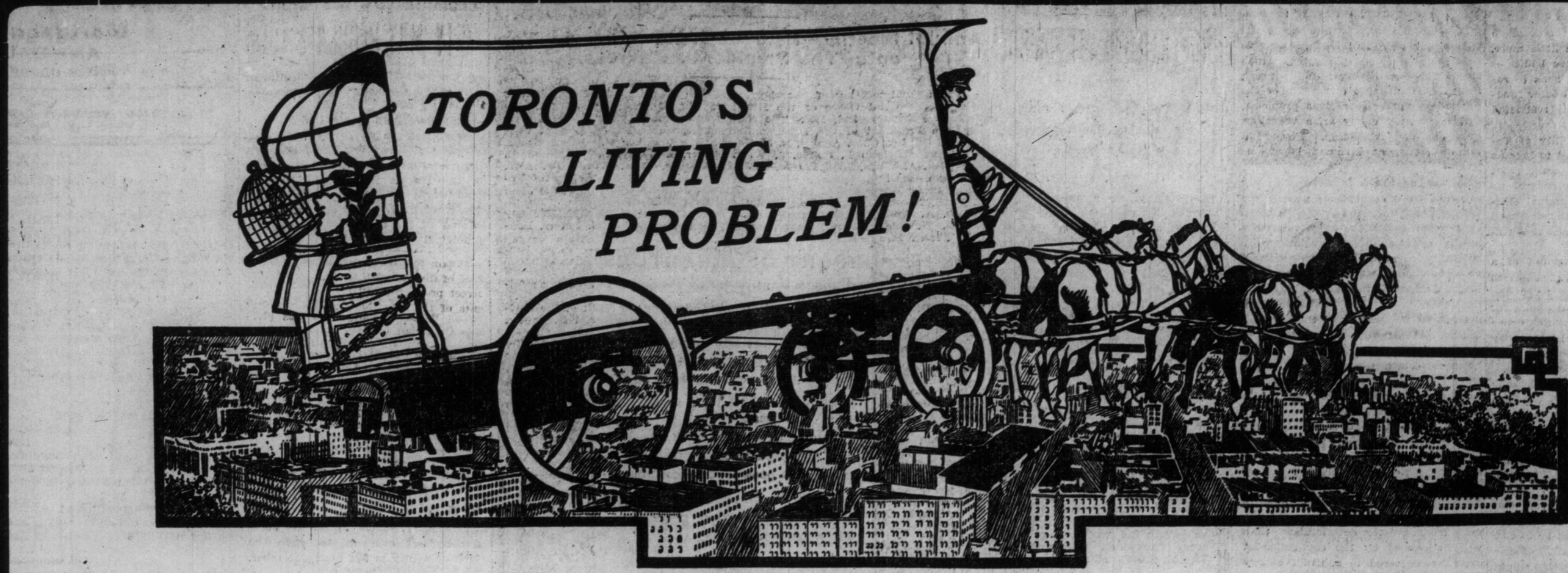

TENDERS FOR G. T. P.

Tenders to be Called for Two Sections of Transcontinental.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—To-morrow's Canada Gazette will contain notices calling for tenders for the construction of the sections of the National Transcontinental Railway from Winnipeg 240 miles eastward to Lake Superior Junction, and from Quebec City 100 miles westward to La Tuque on the St. Maurice River.

The standard of construction is to be the same as that of the G. T. R. between Montreal and Toronto, that is to say, the best and highest standard of excellence in the Dominion. The maximum grades will not exceed 4 per cent.

As a result of the re-surveys between Winnipeg and Lake Superior Junction, made by government engineers, the commissioners have succeeded in obtaining a much more favorable route than was chosen by the G. T. P. and effected a saving of ten miles.

FISH AND GAME ENTHUSIASTS.

Meeting to be Held This Afternoon.

A general meeting of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association will take place in Judge Morson's chambers, city hall, at 3 o'clock sharp this afternoon.

Anyone not a member of the association who takes an interest in the better protection of fish and game, and who wishes to join the association, is cordially invited to attend.

PREVENTIVE OF WRECKS.

Proposals for Wireless Stations Covering West Coast of Vancouver.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 2.—(Special).—To afford one sterling guarantee against avoidable delay in enabling shipwrecked mariners to communicate their plight to the authorities serving as a valuable preventive of wrecks, proposals are to be submitted to the government at Ottawa by Victorians controlling the Pacific Wireless Telegraph Company in Canada for the establishment of from six to ten stations, covering the west coast of this island, the promoters wanting only a sufficient subsidy to cover installing costs, not more than \$12,000 or \$15,000 for a system of six stations.

This has been pronounced one of the best moves toward safeguarding the graveyard coast, and the wireless people are willing to undertake its establishment, guarantee to continue efficient service and have their system in operation within sixty days.

Coincidentally, the provincial government would provide a continuous seaward trail with shelter huts at intervals of five miles, and a regular system of the location of land distance to the nearest telegraph post. Advisable economies in reference to existing wireless telegraph lines, a wireless system with a merely nominal outlay.

IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)

London, Feb. 2.—The first meeting of the imperial defence committee, which is newly constituted, was held yesterday at the war office. The C. A. P. learns that the new committee will follow precedent in the matter of calling into conference from time to time representatives of the colonies.

Pint of Whiskey Fatal.

Samia, Feb. 2.—"Death from alcoholism and exposure" was the verdict of the coroner's jury last night at the police court in the case of Joseph Kennedy, who was found dead at Point Edward on Tuesday morning after lying out in a vacant yard all night. The evidence proved he had eaten no supper and had drunk one pint of whisky in sixty minutes.

Paid in Bounties.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—The following sums were paid out in bounties during last calendar year: Iron and steel, \$1,590,206; lead, \$334,224; crude petroleum, \$322,900; manilla fibre, \$13,100.

TWO MEETINGS CALLED.

Shareholders of National Portland Cement Co. Apparently Divided.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the National Portland Cement Company is called to meet at the Labor Temple on Wednesday, February 7, at one o'clock. At this meeting it is expected the question of the removal of the plant from Durham to Niagara Falls will be submitted, and the shareholders will be asked to ratify the proposal.

In the meantime the shareholders have also received an unsigned notice marked "important" announcing that a meeting of the shareholders will be held at the Rossin House on Tuesday, February 6. Some of those interested in this enterprise are unable to understand the import of this last document, and it is freely hinted that the object may be to prepare the way for the ratification proceedings on the following day. During the year the company wiped off \$30,000 of the indebtedness to the bank, and there are available assets on hand more than sufficient to take care of the entire indebtedness. The company has had a very prosperous year, and under the circumstances it is expected that the proposal to demolish the plant at Durham and erect another one at great expense at Niagara Falls will be stoutly opposed by a large number of shareholders. They say that the machinery used for working the mill will not be suitable for converting the limestone of the Niagara district into cement.

Of the officers, non-commissioned officers and men or rural corps, 546 were trained in the semaphore, of whom 68 per cent. qualified.

Samuel Buchanan, aged 42 years, the only workman in the mill at the time, was blown to pieces. The roof, which rested on the walls without fastening, as is to be found in all powder buildings in order to give vent to the explosive force, was blown 300 yards.

MAY DIVIDE OTTAWA.

The Ottawa Free Press connects the visit of Premier Wilfrid Laurier to Ottawa with a proposal to divide the capital into two constituencies. At present the whole city returns two members. It is the only double constituency in the province. The metropolitan county of Carleton has a population of 35,000, and may be given two members, says the Free Press.

Two Ex-Mayors Dead.

St. Thomas, Feb. 2.—Ex-Mayor and ex-M.P. Thomas Arkell died this morning, aged 82 years. Death resulted from a fall sustained two months ago. He was a native of Gloucestershire, England.

Ex-Mayor D. M. Drake died yesterday evening, aged 78, and was born here.

Crawls Under Train to Death.

Malone, N.Y., Feb. 2.—William Gravel was killed here to-day by a freight train. The train stood across and blocked the road by which he was going to work. Thinking to save time Gravel crawled under a car.

McKenzie for Judgeship.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—It is reported that D. McKenzie, M.P., is to be appointed to a judgeship in Cape Breton, taking the place of the late Judge Dodd.

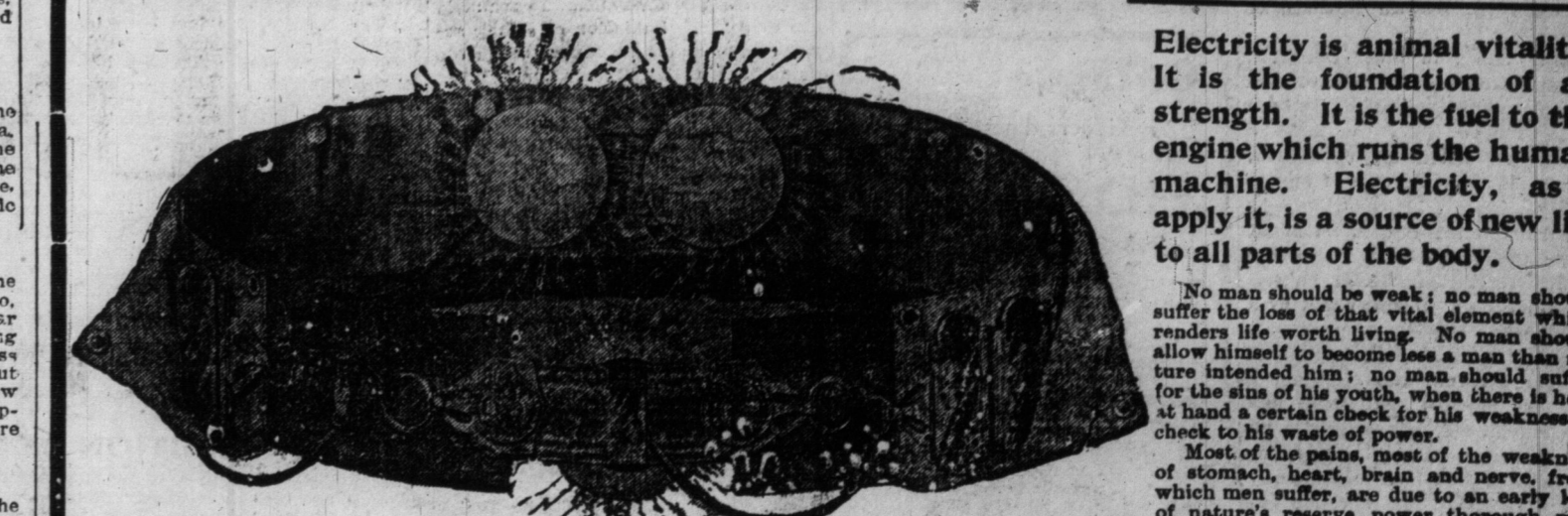

How Torontonians Came to Sudden Ends During Last Year.

According to the report of the chief of police, the following is the list of city casualties during last year. Sudden deaths found dead in bed, etc. 25; deaths from burning, 5; drowning, 14; died from choking, 1; accidental poisoning, 4; accident, 4; died from inhaling illuminating gas, 8; died as result of excessive liquor drinking, 2; killed by being run over by vehicle, 2; killed by train, 8; killed by trolley cars, 13; falling from street car, 1; falling from scaffold, 3; falling from window, 1; falling downstairs, 2; falling down elevator, 2; falling from hoist, 1; falling from building, 1; killed by elevator, 1; murder, 5; suicide by inhaling illuminating gas, 1; suicide by shooting, 8; suicide by drowning, 2; suicide by poisoning, 8; suicide by cutting throat, 1; suicide by hanging, 4.

CANADA TWO CENTURIES AGO.

Interesting Hints and Documents Received at Archives.

There was an interesting and valuable surprise in a package of documents received by Alex Fraser for the Ontario Archives yesterday from Wm. George of Bristol, England. The package contained five maps going back as far as 1680 of Canadian points made by Sayer, Danville and other persons who were in the map business at that time. Amongst the bunch is a small map of Frontenac Bay and district in 1750, and it has original charts with it which are falling down stairs. Official papers relating to Canada in the time of Sir Pouslet Thompson afterwards Lord Sydenham are included, as well as despatches of Sir Francis Bond Head in a couple of volumes. PROVINCIAL FIRE MARSHAL REPORT SHOWS INCREASE

Insurance Men Wait on Provincial Secretary With Suggestion—What His Duties Would Be.

Owing to so many fire losses in the province one-third to one-half of which is claimed as due to preventable causes, or are of an incendiary nature, a deputation of the Mutual Fire Underwriters' Association, consisting of Frank Haight, Waterloo; J. N. McKeenrick, Galt; James McEwing, Drayton; Hugh Black, secretary, Rockwood; B. H. Burton, representing the insurance committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and Chas. G. Cory, Toronto, waited upon Mr. Hanna for the purpose of urging the government to appoint a fire marshal to investigate all fires, and to prevent any action taken by the insurance companies.

BEEF SUGAR BOUNTIES.

Wallaceburg and Berlin Industries Share Tip \$75,000. The returns of the Wallaceburg and Berlin sugar beet factories have been received by the provincial secretary, because the industry receives a bounty from the government of one-half a cent per pound. From the Wallaceburg factory 1,376,098 lbs. were turned out, and from Berlin 2,610,753. The total bounty in one year must not exceed \$75,000, according to the terms of the act, so the companies will have to share this sum this year. This means that the Wallaceburg concern will get \$30,868, while Berlin will get \$44,132. The act granting the bounties set aside \$75,000 for the purpose, and next year's bounties will exhaust this amount. The total bounty has been earned for the first time during the past year, but the firms came very close to it in the two preceding years.
