## "C-B" A GOOD HOME RULER WILL GIVE PARLIAMENT TO EMERALD ISLE

T. P. O'Connor, Telling Story of Ireland at Montreal, Thinks British Government Will Grant Satisfactory Measure.

Montreal, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Mr. Fitzgibbon faced a thousand people this evening when he introduced T. P. O'Connor, who once more and in a splendidly eloquent fashion told the story of Ireland.

He claimed that home rule to Ireland would be equally beneficial to England, and would consolidate the empire. Mr. O'Connor declared, in fact, that any English politician who would support home rule because it would alone benefit Ireland would be a traitor to his country. He further declared that he firmly believes. These are my reasons for this confidence.

**Reasons for Confidence.**  
"In the first place the Liberal party has a strong majority with which to work—a majority of about 150 votes. Without counting the Irish party, which totals a vote of eight members. This means that what the Liberal party sets out to do it probably will be able to do."

"In the second place, the premier, Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman, is as good a home ruler as I am. He has already been sponsor for two home rule bills in 1898 and 1899—and he states today that his views on this subject so far from being changed in the years that have since elapsed, have only been strengthened. He has never lowered the home rule flag, and he has spoken out boldly in favor of the cause, even at times, as when in the last election, it might have been to his favor not to make it so prominent."

**Cabinet Favors It.**  
"Furthermore, the whole cabinet is more or less in favor of self-government for Ireland. I believe the masses of Englishmen, and especially the working classes, are now in favor of the measure. This is a wonderful change, and it is simply and entirely the result of the growing appreciation amongst English people of the merits of the case, and of the injustice to Ireland of the present system."

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy was an early caller on Mr. O'Connor this morning, and the latter accepted with pleasure another invitation to join Sir Thomas on his inspection trip through Western Canada next September. Mr. O'Connor will probably go to Ottawa tomorrow, then to Toronto, and then back home.

## NOTHING TO SQUEAL ABOUT.

**Tom Lewis Says He Told Truth at Bribery Investigation.**  
London, Oct. 10.—Tom Lewis, one of the witnesses in the London bribery investigation in Toronto, said today: "I will be on hand to give evidence when the investigation is resumed in Toronto tomorrow. I told the truth when I was in Toronto before, and I will stick to it when I go back."

"I do not intend to be bulldozed or frightened by anyone. I told the whole truth and nothing but the truth before, and I will repeat it in the box again. I have nothing to 'squeal' about and nothing to give up."

"I was a little confused regarding the time I left London for Detroit, before the investigation commenced, but I do not think it makes any material difference to this case what time I left, or what time or where I had my supper on that occasion."

## BRIBERY CASE TO-DAY.

The London bribery case will be resumed in police court this morning with "Tom" Lewis on the stand. Jerry Collins came to town last night and is registered at the Iroquois.

H. Lamothe, the clerk of the crown in chancery at Ottawa, has been served with a subpoena duces tecum, to bring the ballots and other papers into court. It is not alleged that he had any personal knowledge of corrupt practices.

President White of the Ottawa Liberal Association has also been served with a subpoena.

## REAL SNOWSTORM IN ONTARIO WITH SLEIGHING AT GODERICH

Even Toronto Gets a First Taste of Winter Weather, Which Was General in the Georgian Bay and Lake Huron Districts Yesterday.

The first snow of the season fell in Toronto last night, and reports indicate that a snowfall was fairly general, Goderich being treated to no less than six inches, Parry Sound three inches, and other northern towns along the Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, all the way from one to three inches. At Brantford there was a miniature blizzard, and at midnight snow was falling in the city.

At the observatory no surprise was expressed at the occurrence.

"We have often had snow as early as this," said the weatherman, "but just off-hand we cannot recall the date."

Yesterday's fall was pretty general all over the west and north, and today will be fair and cold. So far Ontario has escaped with practically little or no frost, and in many gardens and conservatories the foliage and bloom are as luxuriant as in midsummer.

## EIGHT INCHES OF SNOW—SLEIGHING AT GODERICH

Goderich, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Goderich and vicinity is today in the throes of a northeast blizzard.

Since midnight over eight inches of snow has fallen and sleighing in general. Following a heavy fall the snow has caused irreparable destruction to fruit and shade trees, besides destruction to telegraph and telephone wires.

Part of the trestle work of the Guelph and Goderich Railway, recently undermined by the Grand Trunk shovel, has fallen and a large portion is overhanging the Grand Trunk tracks.

## ELECTIONS SHOULD BE VOID IF DECISION IS HELD GOOD

**Hon. Mr. Haultain Argues Against Pronouncement of Judge Prendergast That Saskatchewan Has No Controverted Election Law.**

Regina, Sask., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The famous Prince Albert election trial came up before Judge Prendergast today, and although the decision was withheld until the end of the week, it developed that there was a sensational outcome.

Hon. F. W. G. Haultain argued that if the courts sustain the decision of Judge Prendergast and hold that the Controverted Election Act is not in force, it will follow that the election ordinance is not in force, therefore the late elections must have been unduly held. The only way out of such a state of affairs would be voiding of the whole of the late elections and calling for new general elections.

From arguments and comments of judges, it would seem that Saskatchewan is face to face with a situation which promises to throw the province into chaos and from which a general election will be the only relief.

The appeal being concluded is by provincial rights and is to the effect that the decision of Judge Prendergast be thrown out, that no protests may be entered against members of legislative assembly, because there is no controverted election law in force in the province.

This implies that by mistake or by design those who framed the Saskatchewan Act left out any mention of controverted elections laws and provisions that members elected by means afterwards discovered to be fraudulent or otherwise could hold their seats and not be open to protest and controverted proceedings.

Mr. Haultain, in a brilliant speech, in which he went into the whole question of the election law, was not in favor of the decision of the Liberal lawyers, there was absolutely no redress for the public from fraudulent and corrupt election methods. It was a matter, he said, of deep concern in the whole province. It was not the whole province that was affected by the decision of the courts.

## BIG FACTOR IN WINNIPEG COUNCIL AGAINST MUNICIPAL DEVELOPMENT

**Fight Over Power Question Is Growing Bitter—Companies Lobbying at City Council for Right to Bring Power Into City.**

Winnipeg, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The fight over the power question in Winnipeg is growing bitter. Despite the fact that the city has come to terms with Cecil B. Smith, the power companies are lobbying at the city hall for the right to bring power into the city.

One company has already made an offer and another will make a proposition this week.

To complicate matters, two outside companies are at loggerheads over their water rights, and there promises to be a big legal fight.

On the east side of the Winnipeg River, they (the Bonnet Falls Co.) are entitled under a grant of the Dominion power, and under an alleged guarantee or assurance of the Manitoba provincial government, to the whole of the waterpower.

The Great Falls Power Company promised to start work this week, and Mr. Wright says if they do an injunction will be taken out and the case will be fought in the courts to the very end.

There is a big factor in the council fighting against municipal development, claiming the city's finances are such as not to warrant. They are supporting outside companies, and it is said they are decrying the state of the city's finances in order to kill the municipal ownership scheme.

## NEWFOUNDLAND TO WITHDRAW CONCESSIONS TO AMERICANS AND CONFISCATE PIRATES

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 10.—A St. John's, Nfld., despatch says: The colonial government has resolved to combat the fishing modus vivendi entered into between England and the United States, by dragging forth every known colonial law and enforcing it to the letter against American fishermen.

The opposition newspapers condemn the government for overriding the wishes of the colony in order to conciliate the United States, and declare that the terms of the arrangements fully justify the intense indignation which is expressed.

The Morning Post is of the opinion that this should convince Newfoundland that the time has arrived to federate with Canada.

## EVOKES BITTER CRITICISM

London, Oct. 10.—The publication of the text of the Newfoundland modus vivendi evokes strong editorial articles this morning.

The opposition newspapers condemn the government for overriding the wishes of the colony in order to conciliate the United States, and declare that the terms of the arrangements fully justify the intense indignation which is expressed.

## MORE POWER ASKED FOR THAN HAD BEEN ESTIMATED

At a meeting of the Ontario hydro-electric power commission yesterday it was announced that applications have been received from municipalities aggregating 65,000 horsepower. It had been estimated that the initial demand would reach 62,000 horsepower. But there will be power a-plenty to supply any demand.

On Monday night a meeting was held at Belleville under the auspices of the board of trade, when power matters were discussed. Just now Alexander Culverwell, president pro tem, and permanent managing director of the Northumberland and Durham Power Company, is in that city getting men interested in the shares of the company. He says he is doing "a land office business," but is vigorous in his condemnation of the tactics of Dr. Stinson and Sam Nesbitt, who, he says, are doing all they can to hinder him in his work. Nesbitt was one of the original directors, but his connection was severed last week.

## PROVINCES MUST GIVE UP CONTROL OF FISHERIES

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The resolutions of the provincial premiers have been laid before the federal authorities, and an answer to their request for an increase of subsidy is expected tomorrow.

It is understood that the provinces will have to give up their claims to a control of the fisheries in order to obtain an increased allowance, and that the premiers of all the provinces have practically agreed to this. The commercial travelers' tax will be abolished by British Columbia, Quebec and Ontario.

## FOSTER WON'T BE SCAPEGOAT ALL DIRECTORS SHARE RESPONSIBILITY

Says Agreement Was Very Plain Straightforward—Foster Due to Appear Before Commission To-Morrow.

MR. FOSTER DEFENDS.

"It was a proposition which we could take to another trust company, which another trust company could entertain, and upon which we could raise the money by way of mortgage and violate no rules, ethical or otherwise, governing the investment of trust money. Why should not the Union Trust Company have an opportunity to consider the proposition?"

"It cannot be said that the syndicate undertook to put anything first in a secret or underhand way, and if the directors did not know the facts it was their business to look into the documents."

"I am willing to take responsibility as a director, but I want the others to take their full share. This transaction was not done under cover, but with a particularity that was remarkable."

"In all this transaction no money was borrowed personally by, nor did one dollar pass, in any way, into the pockets of Messrs. Foster, Wilson and McGillivray."

"I admit the quality of the position. Foster, Wilson and McGillivray were directors of the Union Trust Company at the same time directors of the Great West Company. Was the Great West Company less economically managed? Were less care given to that business because we were directors of the Union Trust in the point of economy and prudence? Could anyone find fault with the management?"

"Messrs. Wilson, McGillivray and myself are neither looters nor prospectors. We wish to have a reputation, and built up, so far as I am concerned, in a white, fierce light. It would be foolish, after building up a reputation, to risk it as manager of a trust company."

George W. Fowler, M. P., the very much-wanted witness by the royal commission on insurance, did not appear yesterday morning, and although Mr. Shepley had received a message from him to the effect that he would be in Toronto on Friday morning, he disclaimed with the commission the desirability of issuing a bench warrant and having Mr. Fowler brought before the commission. This matter had not been decided last night, but one thing is sure, and that is that Mr. Fowler will have to come to Toronto and appear before the commission. Mr. Shepley says the commission has the power to make him, and will take every advantage of the power vested in them.

"A member of parliament may be arrested on a bench warrant when he ignores the subpoena issued to compel his attendance in a case like this, at any time save when the house is in session," says Judge McTavish, but the question has before this been raised. If Mr. Fowler hasn't been trying to dodge an appearance until the November session, would free him.

According to a despatch to the World last night, however, George W. Fowler is coming to Toronto for the first time on Friday, Oct. 13, at 7.30 p.m. on Tuesday night. If he comes to Toronto he will arrive at the Union Depot at 2.55 this afternoon. He is accompanied by his wife, who is on her way to Montreal. Mrs. Fowler is a daughter of Mr. P. C. 131 Walker-road.

Hon. George E. Foster was on the stand for awhile, and made a long explanatory statement.

Matthew Wilson, K. C. of Chatham, was put on the stand and questioned by Mr. Shepley as to the preliminary steps leading up to the control of the stock in the Provincial Loan Company by William Laird, Kowik, K. C. who was acting for the Independent Order of Foresters. The examination along this line will be continued to-day.

When recalled yesterday morning, Mr. Foster gave a statement of the Union Trust investments for the year 1905. United States securities held by the company amounted to \$449,109.68, and there were also Kamloops Lumber Co.

GEN. BOOTH SENDS MESSAGE GOING TO CANADA SOON

Sends Cablegram of Encouragement to Canadian Soldiers in Congress Here.

The 24th annual Canadian Congress of Salvation Army officers opened at the Temple, Albert-street, last night, when 200 delegates were officially welcomed by Acting Mayor Shaw.

Another year's sacrifices and successes demand my hearty congratulations. With blood and fire religion you are fighting for God and rightness. You will be faithful to the principles written on my heart. God is fighting for you.

The message was received with applause. Well-worded remarks, Commissioner Coombs introduced Acting Mayor Shaw, who said he was sorry Mayor Coatsworth was not present to welcome the Army.

The Salvation Army taught of a golden home for the future, that God was all love, and every day carried out the teaching of Jesus Christ. He never says the hand on the street without wishing to take off his hat and shout with them "God bless the Army."

Adjutant Bloss of Stratford felt deeply the interest that Mayor Shaw took in the work of the Army. He was qualified to do a good work that the churches could not do.

Commissioner Coombs said that the Salvation Army desires to aid in making Canada a nation. Of the great influx of population into this country, it was a remark of the English speaking people that have come to this country, the Army have brought out one in every 13. Next year, in the immigration just commenced, it was expected that one in eight would be brought.

"We are taking a great hand in the building of this country. We want not only people who will assimilate with the people of the Dominion, but men of good physique, who, at least, believe in God," he said. "So, by the help and blessing of God, we look out upon this great country, as the growing child of the motherland, and want to do not only that which will bind it tight to the empire to which we belong, but which will bind it tight to the empire."

At 10.30 this morning the opening session of the council will be held at the Temple, and the inauguration of the boldness campaign by the commissioner will take place at 7.45 to-night. The council will be in session until Sunday night next.

DEFECTION FROM I.C.R.

Moncton, Oct. 10.—Quite a number of machinists and boiler-makers are leaving the I.C.R. and emigrating to the States. Some seven or eight have severed their connection with the Intercolonial within the last few days, and four young men leave on the C.P.R. to-day.

The cause of the exodus from the I.C.R. is dissatisfaction over wages. All the machinists leaving are young men and first-class tradesmen, and it is stated they are leaving \$1.50 per day for \$2.50 per day with the C.P.R. at Winnipeg.

NOT FOR HEARST.

Member of Tammany Committee Sends Cheque to Republicans. New York, Oct. 10.—John B. MacDonald, the contractor who built the subway in New York and who for nearly forty years has been a member of the general committee of Tammany Hall, to-day sent a letter to Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee, enclosing a cheque for \$1000 for Republican campaign expenses and announcing his determination to support Charles T. Hughes for governor.

It developed at the meeting of the Tammany general committee to-day that Mr. MacDonald resigned his membership in the committee on Monday.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

RAILWAY HORSE REVEALS STEALING OF SIX SHEEP

Alex Hammer Cornered by Gang of Farmers in Odd Way—Death of Geo. Pfann.

Hamilton, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—This afternoon Alex Hammer was found guilty at the assizes of stealing six sheep from Andrew McClure, a Beverly farmer. The theft was detected in an odd way. Hammer loaded the sheep in a wagon, and, while on the way home, one of his horses balked.

He was forced to get another horse from a farmer who lives nearby, and it was in this way that the theft was discovered. He was cornered by a gang of farmers, and deserted the rig. A short time afterwards he was arrested in Salt. Sentence was not passed upon him this afternoon, and he was given a few days in which to produce witnesses who could testify to his previous good behavior.

George Pfann, corner of Robinson and Caroline-streets, died suddenly to-day about 1 o'clock. He was 84 years of age.

Edward Hore, 301 North Bay-street, a C.T.R. employe, was injured in clearing up the wreck at Burlington, received a painful injury in the back, and was brought to the hospital for treatment.

Ready Next July. J. W. Nesbitt, K.C., solicitor of the Haines enterprise, says that the Hamilton & Hamilton Railway will be completed, thoroughly equipped and carrying passengers by July 1 next, and that no road in the country will have a better roadbed or superior rolling stock.

It is claimed that the real reason that the crap-shooters in the county are not suppressed is that the county council refuses to pay the county constables for looking after the gamblers.

But He May Retract. John Peterson of the Central Power Company is likely to be a good witness for the city when the council starts arbitration proceedings to secure a reduction in the street lighting rates. He has assured several of the aldermen that the city is entitled to a reduction according to the arrangement made at the time the contract was made, and the aldermen may call him as a witness for the city.

Thomson Letch, proprietor of a drug store at 24 West King-street, died suddenly this morning.

Alex McDonald, a youth 16 years of age, was this afternoon acquitted by a jury of the charge of manslaughter. The evidence showed that McDonald threw this at Alex McGarvey, an Englishman of the weak order, at the Norton Manufacturing Company's works on July 8. McGarvey threw a brick and he struck McGarvey, who slipped and fell on some tin. After McGarvey fell, McDonald stepped on his head, and kicked him on the side. McGarvey then started to descend a ladder and McDonald kicked him. McGarvey worked for the rest of the afternoon, but was taken to the hospital, where he died three days afterwards.

Dr. McDonald is now in the hospital, and a deposition that McGarvey died from blood poisoning, and Dr. Davey supported that testimony. Doctors Bauer, O'Brien and other medical authorities, in their opinion McGarvey died from pneumonia. The jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, but Justice McIntyre, before freeing McDonald, gave him a strong talk, remarking that his conduct was most brutal.

The center of attention is discussing the advisability of procuring more land adjoining the western boundary of the cemetery.

Titles in Dispute. The Ontario crown lands department has caused some excitement on the beach by the purchase of some of the summer residents, who paid handsome prices for their lots. Before a patent for these lots, the department insists upon a substantial price. The willful damage case against Reeve Ptolemy will likely be dropped, unless the plaintiff has promised to leave the city fence on the roadway between the two interfering lots in white slates. H. W. Anderson of Toronto has an illustrated article on the Ontario Agricultural College and its work in the issue of Canada, just to hand.

Don't Covet the Jail. Toronto jail is not coveted as a responsibility by the Ontario government and Hon. W. J. Hanna stated yesterday that the proposal to take over its management would receive no encouragement from himself or his colleagues.

Prominent ladies from all parts of Canada are gathering in the city for the thirteenth annual session of the National Council of Women. One of the most interesting subjects to come up is the traffic in white slaves. Today the delegates spent in committee work, and the convention proper will open Thursday morning at 10 o'clock in the city council chamber.

Settles for \$1500. The Street Railway has settled with the parents of Victor Newman, the youngster who had his leg cut off by a car on Herkimer-street last summer, paying \$1500.
