BRITISH LOSSES WERE HEAVY IN WHITE'S "BRUSH" TUESDAY

Thirteen Men Were Killed and 93 Wounded, Yet the War Office Has Withheld the Details--A Big Conflict **Expected at Any Moment.**

Still Much Anxiety Over the Situation at Ladysmith, Although Gen. Yule's Forces Are in Touch With Those of General White—Thirty Hussars Return After Fighting Their Way Across the Biggarsburg-The General War Outlook.

It now transpires that the "brush" which General White's forces had with the Boers, near Ladysmith on Tuesday, was a hard battle, but the enemy were again repulsed. The British losses were 13 killed, including Col. Wilford, of the First Gloucester Regiment, and 93 wounded. The Boer losses are not given. The War Office bulletins regarding this last fight, it is claimed, were cooked to prevent another shock to the English people. Still details are very meagre as the censor is doing

There is still much anxiety in London although it is a fact that General Yule is again in touch with General White's forces. It is believed that Command ant Joubert will give battle with his combined forces at Ladysmith before reinforcements can be sent in. 



Devoted Specially to the Interests of our Beaders.

Just when we are all very dubious as to what success would attend the operations of women in any of the departments of agriculture, and when we are most anxious to know which department they are physically best able to undertake, comes a most interesting and timely paper in The Woman's Journal. "There has," continued Mr. Chamberlain, "been on the part of the Transvaal crookedness altogether incomprehensible, if they desired a settlement. I believed that, from first to last, President Kruger never intended to give anything approaching equal rights to the white race, or any acknowledgment of British supremacy. War, therefore, was inevitable. There has been an enormous strain upon us. We are called upon to bring the war to a quick conclusion, and send across the sea a force no nation in history ever before sent. This is entirely due to the preparations which made the Transvaal an armed camp, and which not only secured it a defensive position but enables it to take the offensive against the large force now engaged.

"Such a strain could not be continued forever. We should have needed a permanent force of 25,000 men in South Africa. We are told we shall lose South Africa. Our foreign friends are convinced of it, yet they are not happy. Such predictions were made before, and were even current in the days of Elizabeth. But I am not alarmed. One great Teutonic people, but this has never been our course. It is impossible to pretend that the Dutch at the Cape are crushed by our rule, when they have all the rights Englishmen possess, and even, in individual cases, are permitted to talk and write treason. Whatever may be the result of the war, and the premature talk of the result of the present war, does anyone imagine that we shall fail to do for others what we claimed for ourselves, or refuse equal rights to the Dutch in the Transyaal, which they refused us?"
