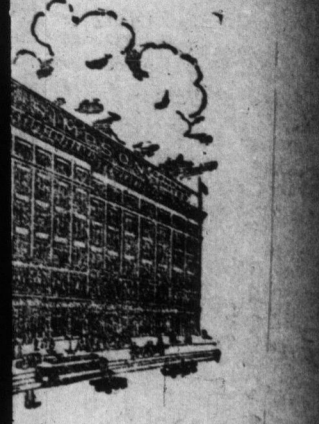

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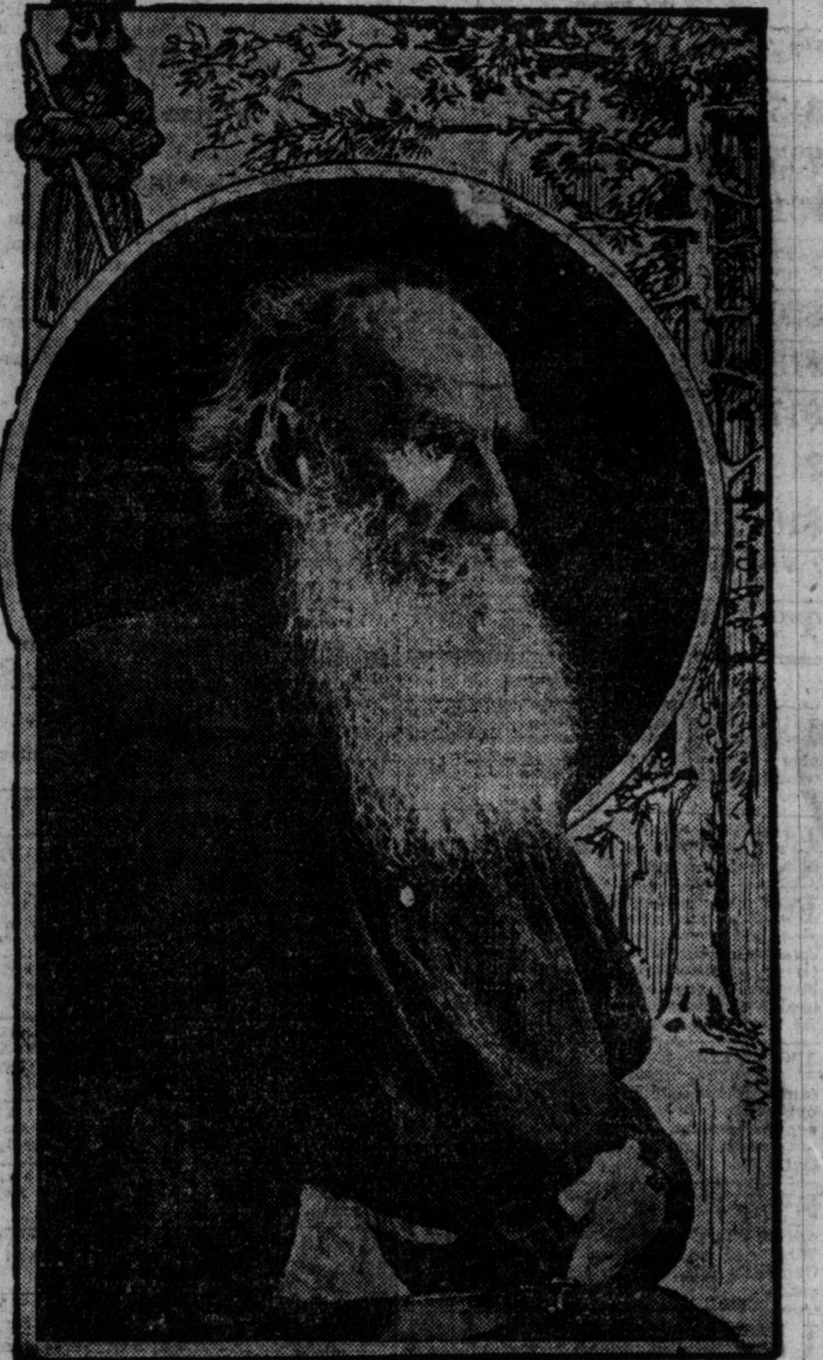

TOLSTOI CELEBRATES HIS 80th BIRTHDAY RUSSIA JUBILATES



ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10.—The newspapers of Russia appear to-day, almost without exception, as Tolstoy jubilee numbers, and publish pages devoted to his life, criticisms of his literary work and anecdotes of his career. Many of the articles naturally are phrased in terms of extravagant adulation, but in general the criticisms are discriminating and just.

Count Leo Tolstoy, novelist, author and social reformer, celebrates the 80th anniversary of his birth at his home in Yasayna Poliana to-day.

The celebrations throughout Russia of the count's birth are much less widespread than was the original intention of his countless admirers, and the prime reason of this is the opposition of the Russian Government and the orthodox Russian Church.

Tolstoy
As a reformer, Tolstoy has been the one articulate voice for the one hundred and twenty odd millions of silent suffering people who speak the Russian language.

TEACHERS APPOINTED TO COLLEGIATE STAFF

Trouble Over Title For Smallpox Hospital Site—Grant to Veterans.

HAMILTON, Sept. 10.—(Special).—At a meeting of the board of education to-night S. C. Webster, St. Thomas, was appointed to the collegiate institute staff at a salary of \$1000 a year, and Miss Mabel Edwards, Richmond Hill, was similarly appointed at a salary of \$800 a year. C. S. Winchester, Ottawa, was appointed manual training teacher at the Wentworth-street school at a salary of \$600 a year.

The appointments made by the government of manual training and domestic science teachers for the past year have been arranged in the normal and the public schools were continued.

The question of increasing the teaching staff in the public schools was referred back to the finance committee on report on the insurance on all the city schools.

The board's solicitor will appear before the Ontario railway and municipal board in order to get the title for the Mountain-avenue and Weston-street schools, which have never been secured since the schools were taken over from the county by the city.

Vincent S. Bryan, 143 North Victoria-avenue, letter carrier, died to-night, aged 33 years. He has been only two days on duty.

Finance Committee Meeting. There may be a legal tangle over the sale of Mrs. Bowerman's ground on Paradise-street, used by the city for a smallpox hospital. The city has been unable to get a clear title of the land owing to a boundary dispute and the finance committee has decided that unless the matter was straightened out immediately legal proceedings would be taken.

The request of the city council that three more men be appointed so that they can get one day off in six instead of eight days was again laid over.

A sub-committee was appointed to deal with the request of the Bell Telephone Co. for a renewal of its franchise for five years. It is proposed to pay \$25000 a year and give the city 150 telephones for civic use at the rate of \$75 an instrument, but it was a clause inserted providing for the cancellation of the agreement by either party, within 30 days.

The reason for this request was that in view of the fact that the Dominion government was considering the raising question, and in the event of its deciding to reduce the rate the company could not pay that amount.

An amount of \$100 was made to the Army and Navy veterans to erect a monument at Stony Creek battlefield in memory of the British soldiers who fell in the war of 1812. The trades and labor council was given \$50.

The council will be asked to pass a by-law providing eight new polling sub-divisions for the coming Dominion elections.

The annual asylum sports were held to-day under very favorable conditions.

New Station Plans. Rumor has it that the Grand Trunk may take advantage of the opportunity to get a site for the new station by securing the city jail property, which the city officials are talking of vacating. The property is situated at the corner of Barton and Ferguson-avenues and while not quite as central as it is thought the company would like, it is possible that it might take it because of its convenience to the present main line. Mayor Stewart says he heard the rumor in Toronto yesterday.

Magistrate Jelfs to-day fined George Powell \$20 and costs and bound him over to keep the peace for assaulting Emil Sterling in a barroom row the other night. Frank Solisberg was fined \$10 and was ordered to find \$100 sureties on the same charge. His worship said he would never send men to jail only if it was crowded. Harry Golden, proprietor of the Turbina Hotel, pleaded guilty to selling liquor after hours last Saturday night and was fined \$50. Charles Cleat, who gave money to deserters from the Royal Horse Artillery, was remanded.

The Independent Labor party will not countenance the candidature of W. Mackenzie King for the Dominion seat.

KOSHER MEAT AGAIN DISTURBING THE "WARD"

Butcher Caplan is Having a Merry Time Bucking His Higher-Priced Business Rivals.

"Kosher" meat has been a bone of contention among the Jews in "the co-operative" butchery shop organized by the Hebrews.

This shop was formed last winter to check a high-priced wave which swept over the 24 butchers of the city. It fell to pieces from lack of support four weeks ago.

Taking advantage of this the 24 meat sellers banded themselves together in a union, each depositing \$25 and a note for \$100 as a forfeit, to support their promise to maintain a scale of 12 to 20 cents per pound for meat.

All went well until it was discovered that D. Caplan & Sons, 99 Agnes-street, were selling at ten cents per pound to a few customers.

A week ago Friday last he was halted by the union and explained that this was only in the cases of a few poor customers. Nevertheless, he was expelled from the union and his deposit forfeited.

Caplan was not pleased, but was still more angry when refused meat by a Jewish wholesaler. He determined to have his own business, and he went to the schocheds, the accredited killers of meat for the Jews. These, too, eight in number, had formed a union last winter, but Caplan persuaded two of them to go to the Levack abattoir with him and kill two cattle for him. This Monday last he was at the abattoir when he found that the meat had mysteriously disappeared.

He secured the services of two other schocheds not in the union and these killed for him.

Fearing violence since excited crowds had surrounded his shop Saturday night, he determined to get a supply of non-kosher meat, he sought protection from the police, and was advised to use stealth. He left his place going south, a policeman being stationed at the corner. Then his wagon was driven north. Later they met and went to the junction, where the meat was secured and brought to the city.

Still the cry of "Not Kosher" was kept up, and to clear his name and save his business, Caplan secured the services of Rabbi Levi, who issued the following circular:

"Welcome News." The Store of D. Caplan & Sons is now under my inspection. I hereby certify that all meat sold in this store is kosher, according to our law, and will be as long as my inspection continues.

Then the other side denounced Rabbi Levi, saying he is no rabbi, and that even Caplan's schocheds are not kosher eligibles.

Thus the matter stands, save that Caplan is selling meat for seven cents per pound, and the police are busy every night keeping the crowds away from the door and peace in the ward.

LET THE PUBLIC KNOW.
Editor World: I observe that one of your Toronto evening papers has the following legend beginning its editorial column:

"The News, an independent journal, devoted to politics, education, literature, the presentation of current news and the diffusion of useful information." J. S. Willson, Editor-in-Chief.

Is it not true that The News is now a Conservative organ? Is it true or is it not that George Gooderham, M.L.A., E. B. Oiler, M.P., A. B. Kemp, M.P., Hon. Frank Cochrane, M.L.A., and other prominent Conservatives are interested financially in this "independent journal"? With the departure of J. W. Flavell from control of The News—and he is an independent man in more ways than one—is it not time for J. S. Willson to give his readers the facts regarding his absorption by, and his paper's slide into, the Conservative ranks?

Late Reader of The News.
As to the information our correspondent asks for, The World can say that while it has been rumored that The News is now controlled by Conservatives, yet the facts relating to this control are in the possession of J. S. Willson and his associates alone. That The News is no longer an independent journal in the sense that it was an independent journal at the time of its being taken over by J. W. Flavell, no one need be told. The News speaks now as a Conservative party newspaper.

If The News prefers to keep its own private and internal business to itself, no one, not a reader of The News, has just grounds for complaint, but if it pretends to be "an independent journal," and is in reality merely a partisan mouthpiece, then readers of The News and those whom The News asks to pay for the paper, are entitled to the fullest and freest possible revelation of the men and the means behind the newspaper. Undoubtedly, Late Reader of The News is entitled to know whom The News speaks for and to know that he must know who own and control The News, even though the official policy for the time has been put in the absolute care of Mr. Willson.

JUDGES AT VARIANCE.
Mr. Justice Anglin does not succeed in showing that his decision in the matter of the mayor of Galt's refusal to sign the electric power bylaw can be reconciled with the action of Chief Justice Falconbridge in the Hamilton case and with Mr. Justice Latchford's in the Berlin application. The main point raised is whether or not a mayor has any discretionary power to withhold his signature to a bylaw passed by a majority of the council over which he presides. Mr. Justice Anglin says that he has, while the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Latchford are just as positive that he has not. That being the view, it is evident enough that even had the arguments that prevailed with Mr. Justice Anglin been presented to them, they would have regarded these as irrelevant. For in their view the mayor's signature could not affect the validity of the bylaw, but left it to be decided in the ordinary course of law should it be impugned.

If Mr. Justice Anglin's view is correct and the mayor has a discretion in the matter, what are its limitations? He thinks it can be exercised if the refusal is based "on the ground that the bylaw is beyond the jurisdiction of the municipal council and that it purports to authorize and require the making of an invalid and illegal contract." But that was precisely the point at issue in the Hamilton case. Mayor Stewart refused to sign on the ground that the city had instructed the council to enter into a contract with the hydro-electric commission and that a majority of the council had no power to act contrary to these instructions. But Chief Justice Falconbridge declined to consider the mayor's contention on its merits, holding that "there appears to be no power for a municipal officer to exercise a veto when the council has voted on a by-law. It is quite clear on the authorities that he has no right to refuse to sign it." Mr. Justice Anglin, however, differs from these authorities and holds that a municipal officer has a discretionary right to refuse, and that the courts should examine and declare if it is properly exercised. These judgments are absolutely irreconcilable.

THE OLD FORT.

adequate preservation of the historic spot.
The huge government grants which have made possible the sanctification of the Plains of Abraham should encourage the hope that some such assistance, tho of a much smaller scale, might be rendered by the federal and provincial authorities for the preservation of the site of Old Fort York. In many ways the spot is as precious to Ontario as is the Quebec battlefield to the rest of Canada. A few thousand dollars would make the place attractive to citizens and tourists alike and so keep ever green the hallowed associations which it now has to those who have been laboring so zealously for its preservation.

THE NEW TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

The board of education last evening on a close vote decided to go ahead with the erection of a technical school at a cost of at least \$600,000, but which some members said may cost a million. Whether Toronto should or should not spend such an amount of money on such an important work is a point that may bring about honest differences of opinion, but it does seem imperative that somebody should take official action that would verify or disprove the oft-repeated assertions of Trustee Brown that some of the members of the board of education have been only the mouthpieces and the voting power of certain interested property owners. In view of these assertions the whole technical school site middle might very properly be probed by a commission before the huge expenditure is undertaken.

WHAT CHEAP ELECTRICITY WILL DO.

Farmers and householders are being told by interested parties that cheap electricity is of no value to them, but is only of importance to manufacturers and large consumers. The quarter whence statements of this kind emanates lays them at once open to suspicion. Electrical science is as yet only in its infancy, but enough is already known to warrant the affirmation that it will some day, and that not remote, be the greatest of boons and blessings to the tradesman, the farmer and the ordinary citizen. There is ample warrant for saying that electricity will greatly lighten both the work and the expense of running handlooms, farms and households. The provision of cheap electric light and power is not a matter that affects capitalists only, it is of direct advantage to every trade, to every householder and to the community as a whole.

But cheap electricity as a motor power in large industries is also of direct benefit to the citizen generally. It will diminish the cost of production, thus promoting the progress of the province as an industrial centre. It will reduce the working expenses of elec-

tric railways and thus ultimately when these pass into public control will enable fares to be reduced and additional facilities to be afforded the traveling public. It will bring electric light within the reach of everyone and it is the best, cleanest and safest illuminant. It will make electric heating in the home a possibility and will thus substantially lessen the labors of the housewife and add to the comfort of the household. These are not fanciful benefits; they are already well on the road to accomplishment, and will soon become the commonplace of everyday life.

Here are some of the things an electrical engineer has figured out can be done with 50 cents' worth of electricity at the price of 10 cents per kilowatt hour:

- Light an ordinary barn or stable with three 10-candlepower lamps one hour every night, for 30 nights.
- With a small motor attached to the washing machine and wringer 50 cents' worth of electricity will do eight washings.
- It will also do two weeks' ironing, using a six-pound iron.
- An electric fan can be operated three and one-half hours a day for 30 days for 50 cents.
- Two weeks' sewing can be done on the motor-driven sewing machine for the same price.
- It will light the porch light for three hours every night for two months.
- Fifty cents will pay for the current consumed in using the electric heating pad three hours every night for 30 nights.
- It will grind 1125 pounds of coffee; broil 30 steaks; cook 20 parebites in the electric chafing dish; fry 400 eggs.
- It will run the blacksmith's forge-blower for a week.
- It will hoist 2,000,000 bricks, two storeys.
- A one horsepower motor will run seven hours at full load for 50 cents.

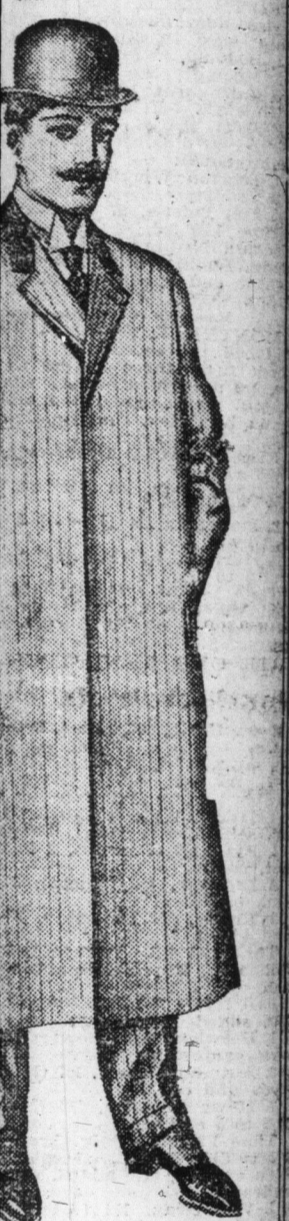

COBAL ---Sindicating of Financers Buy's Block of Chambers-Ferland---COBAL

REACTION IN CROWN RESERVE NO INFLUENCE ON MARKET

Voluminous Trading Develops in All the Cobalt Stocks Which Have Public Confidence.

World Office, Thursday evening, Sept. 10. Crown Reserve stock attracted considerable attention, and was the most erratic issue at the Toronto Mining Exchange to-day. Heavy selling orders for the stock reached the market at the opening this morning and the prices broke over 30 points from yesterday's top figure. With this realization out of the way the stock underwent another sharp rally and recovered almost all the lost ground. The cascades of Crown Reserve had no particular influence on the rest of the market. Transactions were voluminous in all the issues, which have the public confidence and despite a certain amount of profit taking a majority of stocks made advances on yesterday's quotations. Nova Scotia was in special enquiry and the demand brought the price up to over 52. Peterson Lake had a sympathetic movement with Nova Scotia, but buyers of the shares are not certain of what position the company is at present in. La Rose was in excellent demand all day, but New Yorkers were willing to pay better prices than were obtainable here, and most of the selling orders went to the large market. Temiskaming, Trethewey and Silver Leaf were the only other issues in active enquiry, and of these were absorbed as fast as offerings were presented. Brokers are all behind in their orders to-night and would welcome a slowing up in orders for a day or two, so as to allow them to get even with the markets.

BIG SYNDICATE DEAL.

Large Blocks of Chambers-Ferland Bought by Financers. It was learned yesterday that a syndicate of Montreal and Toronto capitalists had purchased a block of 425,000 shares of Chambers-Ferland. The property of this company is in the very heart of the rich deposits at Cobalt, the holdings, about 216 acres, entirely surrounding the La Rose and O'Brien mines. The veins of both these properties run into the Chambers-Ferland and a car of rich ore was shipped last week. A listing for the stock is being asked from the Toronto mining exchanges and regular quotations for the shares can be given when this is arranged. Some of the stock is changing hands in private transactions at between 70 and 80 cents at present, but a sharp advance is expected when the possibility of the property are fully appreciated.

SEEKING CONTROL.

American Syndicate Said to Be After Right of Way. Persistent enquiry has been made for Right of Way stock the past week, and orders for the issue have been exceedingly difficult to fill. This company, which is capitalised at \$500,000, has already paid more in dividends than the total capital and bids \$30 were made for the shares to-day. Rumor says that control of the property is being sought by an American syndicate, and that \$6 a share has been offered for controlling shares. Some of the stock that the company can and intends paying a dividend of 6 per cent. monthly from now on.

RICH GOLD ORE.

Important Development in Crystal Gold Mine. SUDBURY, Sept. 10.—(Special).—Some of the richest gold bearing ore that ever reached this town, was brought from the Crystal gold mine to Sudbury yesterday. There was about 100 pounds of quartz, all carrying fine gold, and in such large quantities that it could be seen by the naked eye several feet away. In fact, some pieces showed gold in as large quantities as the rich Cobalt mines are showing. Silver mining men here state it is the richest showing they ever saw, and some prospectors have already left for this district.

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COBAL MAKES BIG SHOW OF ORES AT EXHIBITION

Specimens From Some of the Big Silver Properties in Mining Camp.

A complete and interesting exhibit of the minerals of the province is to be seen in the horticultural building at the exhibition. It is in charge of Prof. Nicol of the School of Mining, Kingston. The display is well arranged and attracts a great deal of attention. Especially is this so in regard to some of the principal Cobalt properties. The chief specimen is a huge mass of native silver in calcite from the Crown Reserve mine in Cobalt. The weight of the nugget is 1600 pounds and the value placed on it by experts is \$5000. It is one third metallic silver. The Ontario government purchased this "wonder" for its collection. A fine exhibit has been put in by the DeLoro Mining and Reduction Co. It shows a quantity of speiss, the residue from the refining of silver. From this are prepared the dark and light grades of arsenic, the crystalline arsenic and the refined arsenic. In addition the company has six silver bricks, each weighing 80 pounds and worth from \$500 to \$600. The exhibit is prepared from ores taken from the O'Brien mine. The Conlags Reduction Co. of Thorold shows a series of Cobalt ores with a brick of refined silver and also cobalt, nickel and arsenic oxides. These are the first samples of pure cobalt and nickel oxides ever prepared in Canada. The silver brick weighs 80 pounds and is worth from \$500 to \$600. One may judge of its purity when he is told that out of 1000 parts 99.4 parts are pure silver. From the O'Brien mine are also shown two large masses of native silver with vein matter and two large slabs of silver. A case of La Rose silver nuggets forms an interesting part of the big exhibit. The exhibit is prepared from large masses of sections of the La Rose vein and some fine masses of cobalt bloom. There is a collection of rocks from the district showing the occurrence of silver, cobalt, nickel and arsenic ores. This is said to be an exceptionally fine exhibit from the viewpoint of the metallurgist and was prepared by A. A. Cole, M.E. The mineral display, however, is not confined to the minerals. There are samples of free gold from the Douglas Mining Co. at Sturgeon Lake, also one from the Graze Mining Co. of Vermilion Bay, Ont. Ore from the iron ranges of Atikokan, Moose Mountain and Bessemer; from the iron ore, Kingston; marble from the Ontario Marble Quarries, Bancroft, Hastings, and other less valuable minerals complete one of the most noteworthy exhibits at the big fair. There is also a lot of individual occurrences from Miller and Everett Lakes, the most recent discoveries in northern Ontario.

The New Brunswick government also makes a creditable showing of minerals. One of the principal attractions of this portion of the exhibition is a collection of albertite, found only in Albert County, N.B. This is a mineral which is related to sphalerite. It yields 100 gallons of oil per ton, but these deposits have been worked out. But in the bituminous shales of this province, a new oil occurs. The New Brunswick government recently made a large shipment to Scotland and the result of its treatment is 100 gallons of oil per ton. It is also noted that the shale contains large deposits of bituminous shales. Samples from the gypsum beds of Albert County are shown. The beds are developed at two in depth and cover an area of two to three square miles. The rough rock is ground and shipped as plaster of paris. The shipment is made in 100-barrel cars. Gypsum is used in the manufacture of regulus, babbitt metal and type metal and other ores is also shown. In addition there are iron ores, now being mined at Bathurst; the Drummond Syndicate's iron ore, and at Lepreau by the Dominion Iron & Steel Co.

Shearer urged the representatives to support the petition in their efforts to suppress gambling. J. J. Kelso gave an account of the work of the Ontario Department of Neglected Children. 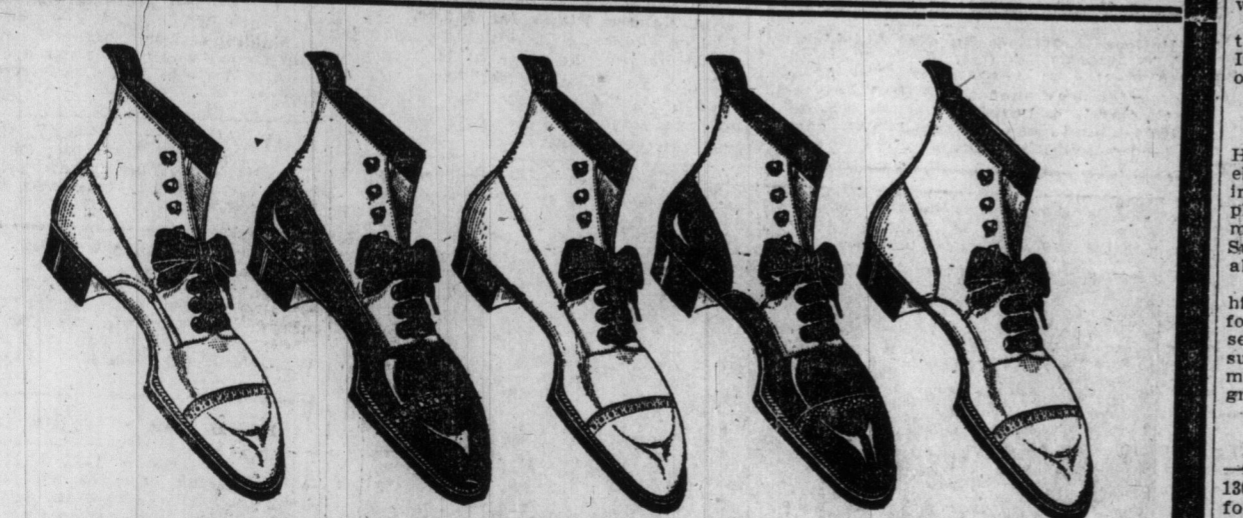
