### LABOR MINISTER GIVES KNOCKOUT

Raising Constitutional Objection To Federal Aid

### TO TECHNICAL EDUCATION PLANS

Liberal Member Introduces Re solution Calling For Appointment of a Commission of Investigation.

**GOV'T MAJORITY 22** 3 LIBERALS OPPOSED

OTTAWA, Dec. 6 .- Two remarkable things happened to-night in the commons. The Laberal majority fell to 22, which is the lowest since 1896, and the strongest opposition to the government since the days of Mr. Bourassa came from within its own party.

The occasion arose over a resolution proposed by Hugh Guthrle of Scuth Wellington asking for a commission to enquire into the question of technical education, Canada being the worst off country in the civilized world in this regard.

Hon. Mackenzie King, minister of labor, opposed the resolution, after a wordy speech, and dissertation upon the needs of technical education. Inci-dentally he made a bad break, having forgotten that the premier himself had fold the Trades and Labor Congress that the appointment of such a comnission was under consideration of the

But the government rose to his rescue, and while many Liberals had supported Mr. Guthrie in their speeches only two had the courage to vote him. They were Mr. Verville and Mr. Fowke. He himself voted for his resolution. It was interesting to note that John Tolmie, who seconded the resolution, voted against it, and Ralph Swith, who was absolutely its warmes supporter, stayed away, as did Mr. Sinclair of Guysboro, another Liberal

According to Mr. Guthrie's under-standing, the government has shelved The Resolution. Hugh Guthrie (Liberal South Welington) moved this resolution: That in the opinion of this house it

is advisable that a commission of enquiry be forthwith appointed to investigate the needs of Canada in respect to technical education, and to report on ways and means by which these may be best met." Mr. Guthrie introduced the resolution, he said, at the request of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

Manager Wright's Interview and the Real Cause of Power Failure.

Nobody wanted to expose the weakness of the Niagara plant of the Electrical Development Company and its associate corporations—the Street Railway and the Toronto Electric Light Company. But when Manager J. J. Wright, manager of the Electric Light Company, makes that weakness the occasion of an attack upon the city's hydro-electric power policy, as he did in The Telegram last night, then the people ought to be acquainted with the facts.

Mr. Wright, in a prepared interview, declares that the company is generating power by its local steam plant now because the increased demand for power and light in December is more than Niagara can cope

Then, says Mr. Wright, the City of Toronto must also instal a steam plant, or it will be unable to supply its customers with sufficient power. Mr. Wright's inference is that Toronto consumers should tie themselves down by long contracts with his company, instead of dealing with the city.

The facts are that two of the Electrical Development Company's generators at Niagara were blown to pieces recently owing to the failure of the governors to work. There have been two absolutely serious breakdowns in the last few weeks, so that of the four generators two only are available. Hence the necessity of using the steam plant in Toronto. And hence the announcement that two new generators are to be added to the equipment. The facts have been kept very dark, and but for Manager Wright's unnecessary knock of the city's scheme they might have so re-
