Premier Was Thrown to the Floor and Sustained Slight Injuries-One of the Trainmen Was Caught and Buried in the Wreckage-Rest of the Crew and Passengers Escaped.

PENSE, Sask., Aug. 5.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's train, eastbound from Moosejaw, ran head-on into a westbound freight about nine o'clock to-night, three and a half miles west of here. Both engines were badly damaged, and five box cars derailed, but the heavier passenger coaches stood the shock better.

Sir Wilfrid and most of his suite were thrown violently to the floor, but beyond bruises none of the party were injured.

The engine crews jumped to safety after shutting off steam and jamming on the air brakes, but the fireman of the premier's train was caught and buried in the wreckage, and as yet it is not known if he is living.

"If my adversaries want a lesson, they shall have it. They will be responsible for whatever happens.

"The manifestation has only been adjourned. I desire that it shall occur in order that its strength may be shown; but it must occur elsewhere and without constraint or threats."

Decrease in G. T. R. Receipts During


Progress of Strike. MONIREAL, Aug. 5 .- The Grand Trunk statement issued to-day of the traffic earnings of the ten-day week which closed July shows a decrease of \$448,320 in the receipts. They were \$719,037, as against \$1,167,351.

This only reveals a corner of the economic wreckage caused by the strike. The official statement covers the period from July 22 to July 31, inclusive.

The strike began three days before July 22, and lasted two days after the 31st, so that \$224,000 may fully be added to the amount of decrease in to-day's report, making it \$672,-

The company's weekly increases for the beginning of the present year to the date of the ordering of the strike averaged over warr, 000. This average is entirely obliterated for the 15 days the strike lasted, and makes the aggregate decrease in the company's earnings alone not far short of a million dollars, to say nothin of the direct additional expense involved by the company in engaging new men, in protecting men and property from possible violence, and in otherwise fighting the strike. #### Canada's Grand Old Man Ninety Years of Age

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, for years known thruout the British Empire as Canada's Grand Old Man, the born in Bonnie Scotland, celebrates to-day the 90th anniversary of his birth.

His career is certainly one of the most wonderful in the annals of modern times. Born at Forres, Scotland, on Aug. 6, 1810, as the son of a saddler, he made the prediction, as plain Donald Alexander Smith, to his cousin, now Lord Mount Stephen, then a herd laddie. that as there were no lairds in Canada to lord it over man, he would leave for British North America to tempt fortune and win a

Accordingly, as a raw youth of 18, he set sail for the west, years before Horace Greeley was known, and has done better on this continent than any man from the east who ever crossed the western

Arriving at Montreal, he at once entered the service of the Hudson Bay Co., and for years was immersed in the solitudes of Labrador. He endured terrible hardships, but finally became superintendent of that company, whose sphere of influence extended for

Afterwards, in company of his cousin, now Lord Mount Stephen, he advocated, against strong opposition, the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway. He was told that the receipts of the road would not pay for the axle grease of the trains. He had faith in the proposition, however, and has lived to see it the greatest transportation company in the world, carrying passengers from Great Britain to Hongkong over its own lines.



Dreams and Theories as to What

Causes Them.

Observation and experimental work have proved that bodily influences are among the most frequent causes of ordinary dreams, writes Carl A. Nowak, in The Progress Magazine. As regards the sense stimulations, it has been observed that dreams are the product of the same processes which produce sense deception or hallucinations. In fact, the physiologist Maury seems disposed to regard dreaming as the inciplent stage of that pathological condition of which somnambulism, insanity, etc., are more fully developed forms.

It has also been shown by other writers that there is a remarkable analogy between dreams of the sane and hallucination of the Insane. They have this in common, namely, that auditory and visual hallucinations as well as those of general sensation are frequent, while those of taste and smell are decidedly rare.

Experimental work has shown that during sleep the sensory centres are clearly in a state of activity. It has also been established, with a fair degree of certainty, that an active circulation may be going on in certain areas of the brain while the circulation in other parts of it is lowered to the level of sleep.

The manner of these active local circulations in the brain may be paralleled to that of local blushing. It is essentially this condition of modified and irregular activity which constitutes dreaming. One part of the brain may be practically asleep while the rest of it is active.

Mexico's Lost Declaration of Inde-

pendence.

In connection with the so-called first centennial of Mexican independence, which is to be celebrated all over the republic Sept. 16, writes a correspondent of The London Globe, the curious fact has developed that what is known as the original declaration of independence has been lost, and all efforts to find it have failed. It is probable that the document has been stored away either in this country or Europe and its hiding place forgotten.

Unlike the United States of North America, Mexico did not have a formal declaration of independence. The only thing that approaches it was the decree issued Sept. 21, 1821, signed by Agustin de Iturbide, who afterward became the first emperor.

It is curious that Mexico is this year celebrating what it calls its centennial of independence, when as a matter of fact the revolution started by the patriot-priest Hidalgo Sept. 15, 1810, was not a revolt against Spain, but against the viceregal government of Mexico and against the Bonaparte usurpers of the Spanish throne when Napoleon put his brother Joseph at the head of the Spanish Kingdom. This revolution the Spanish Kingdom. This revolution was crushed in 1815.

It was not until 1820 that the second revolt broke out, headed by Agustin de Iturbide and the Indian Juerrero. In this revolt all parties in Mexico were united. Iturbide became the leading figure through his influence with the church. It was not until late in 1821 that the purposes of the revolutionists were put into anything like definite form. Iturbide was thus the real liberator of Mexico, and the nation has really only been independent 89 years. And at first it was an empire,





#### Interesting Anniversary

The Church of England will in September next celebrate the two hundredth anniversary of the beginning of its ministry in Canada. The British had taken pos-session more than once before but had given the country back to France. The cession of 1710 was final so far as Nova Scotia proper was concerned, and that year regular services of the of England began at Port Roy-

al, now Annapolis.
Roman Catholic worship had been conducted at Port Royal for a century before that time, Thus it happens that two memorial festivals will take place in Eastern Canada almost simultaneously, one celebrating the completion of the second century of Anglican worship and one the completion of the third century since the first Catholic bap-

THE HAGUE, Aug. 5 .- Continuing his address for the United States before The Hague Fisheries Tribunal, Elihu Root described as an iniquity the closing of herring fisheries to American fishermen during several months of the year, and the prohibition of the use by them of various kinds of tackle. The premier had excluded them from Newfoundland bays, where, according to the American interpretation of the treaty, they were entitled to fish. If, declared Mr. Root, Newfoundland could thus restrict with impunity, without control, the rights of Americans, the privilege accorded Americans by treaty became a pure illusion, but this right was outside the province of Newfoundland legislation. If the right were subject to the British sovereignty, then Britain could close Cabillaud fisheries for six or fif-ty years, without the United States being able to object. The United States demanded that the tribunal should recognize its rights to a suspensive veto of such regulations.

The color of the head and of upper part and sides of the body is reddish tan, shading to a bay, and,

downward, it contrasts strikingh with the pure white of the animal's beilt and the inner side of the foreign. Along the spine runs a well-defined stripe of thick blacklish brown heir extending to the root of the tall. The hair is long and shaygy and protects the horse against the cold of winter.
The dziggetal, like all the other wild horses, live in hands or herds of 100 to 200 indiviluals, each presided over by an old male. This leader gives the signs when any danger approaches. These animals are preved upon frequently by wolves but their most ferrible and dreaded enemy is the sunce or Turkestan panther.





In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alougside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
