POOR MAIL SERVICE.

A Word From U. Hitemagin of Borum's Lake, Kings County.

ishes of Kingston and Westfield which lies at the southern end of the peninsula between the Kenebeccasis and the St. John was supplied with a daily mail from St. John, via Millidgeville, but later, at the request of the carrier and some residents who had no use for correspondence or newspapers, the daily was cut down to or newspapers, the daily was cut down to Hosiery, gloves, whitewear, children's a (nominally) tri-weekly service during hats, caps, etc. nine months of the year, the daily being (nominally) continued during June, July and August. We still have our (nominally) Tel. 1765. ri-weekly mail, just as we did last year, tri-weekly mail, just as we did last year, and the year before, but if we should get a daily service by and bye, you may bet your life it will not be forgotten to cut it off promptly the first of September. Under present conditions, letters are frequently ten days on the route between here and St. John, a distance of about ten miles, and at least 1,000 people, served at 6 or 8 post offices (including Whitehead and Bayswater) have to submit to the outrage. Considering our lack of mail facilities, of proper means of reaching the city with our products, and the wretched state of the roads (though the road taxes are high and are promptly collected), it is no wonder that the country is fast losing its population.






