DR. JOHN DAVIDSON DEAD IN SCOTLAND

The sad news of the death of Dr. Joh Davidson, lately professor of philosoph and political economy in the Universit of New Brunswick, has reached her through the Scottish papers of July 3 Death resulted from pulmonary troubly which necessitated leave of absent

ate, but being uncertain of recovery, he resigned.

The Edinburgh papers publish lengthy and eulogistic notices of Professor Davidson, and speak in highest terms of his attainments as an economist. His untimely death cut short an exceptionally promising career. Articles by Dr. Davidson relating to subjects on which he was a specialized student appeared steadily in British and American journals during his seclusion from the duties of his chair, and he did considerable work for the Nelson-Harmsworth Encyclopoedia, and contributed valuable articles to the Week's Survey.

His premature death will be keenly felt in educational circles both in New Brunswick and on the other side of the Atlantic.

The amount of water which will be required from the lake is rather more than 2,000,000 gallons a day. To obtain this quantity the sluice gate will only need opening about three inches. The amount used by the city during the past twenty four hours was approximately 2,200,000 gallons and the flow of water from Lake Latimer will be regulated on that basis. The present state of affairs presents a problem which is not without its humorous side. It might be argued that had the contractors carried out their agreement to the letter and lowered Lake Latimer by the middle of August the city would have had to face a water famine in reality. The contract calls for the lake to be lowered fifteen feet below its normal level. The water is now two and a half above the bottom of the intake, which is about to supply the reservoir. If, according to contract, the water had been lowered fifteen feet this intake would now be high, and dry eight feet above the water in the lake.

It might be urged that the water could have been stored in the reservoir when the lake was lowered, but no provision appears to have been made for this in any case.

**BREAKS RECORD** WATER PROBLEM

Supt. Murdoch Sees Way To Speedy Turbiner Clips Two Hours Off Her Best Pre-Overcome Lake Latimer vious Time.

The problem of supplying the city with water from Lake Latimer without interfering seriously with the work of the contractors may not prove so difficult as was expected.

Superintendent Murdoch and the director held a consultation in the office of the department Thurday, and decided to start a gang of men this morning deepening the ditch which conveys the water from Lake Latimer to Ellersley brook. At the point where the brook crosses the pipe line on Section 2, provision will be made to handle the extra volume of water by enlarging the sluice. The only other point which threatens trouble is on Section 1, where Little River crosses the wood-stave pipe on its way to the reservoir. At this spot the stream is nearly thirty feet wide, and a sluice with sides of sufficient height to prevent an overflow will be necessary.

The intake of the sluice at Lake Latimer is situated a little to the north of the new pipe line. After a straight course in land to the edge of the now well known dried lake, the water flows through a ditch cut in the bog a distance of about half a mile until Ellersley brook is reached. It is this half mile of ditch which must be deepened to prevent an outflow through the soft mud to the pipe line


