

session an old diary that contains the following article which will make interesting reading to those who complain of the coldness of the present season. The article appeared many years ago in the New York Sun:

The year 1816 was known throughout the United States and Europe as the coldest ever experienced by any person then living. There are persons in the habit of keeping diaries for years and it is from the pages of an old diary begun in 1810 and kept unbroken until 1840, that the following information regarding this year without a summer has been taken.

January was so mild that most persons allowed their fires to go out and did not burn wood except for cooking. There were a few cool days, but they were very few. Most of the time the air was warm and springlike. February was not cold. Some days more colder than any in January, but the weather was about the same. March, from the 1st to the 6th, was inclined to be windy. It came in like a small lion and went out like a very innocent sheep. April came in warm, but, as the days grew longer, the air became colder and by the first of May there was a temperature like that of winter, with plenty of snow and ice.

Snow fell ten inches deep in Vermont. There was a seven inch snow all in Maine, a three-inch fall in the interior of New York state, and the same in Massachusetts. There were only a few moderately warm days. Everybody looked, longed and waited for warm weather, but warm weather did not come. It was also dry, very little rain fell. All summer long the wind blew steadily from the north in blasts laden with snow and ice. Mothers knit socks of double thickness for


