The Eastern Steamship liner Prince Arthur, which arrived in port this

Arthur, which arrived in port this morning, reported picking up a dory containing the dead body of a fisherman, while en route here from Boston. There were no marks on the boat or clothing of the unfortunate man to identify him, who is about 30 years of age and from appearance was taken to be an Italian or a Portuguese. Death had apparently been from exhaustion or exposure.

The body was picked up yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock, when the liner was approximately 13 miles east of Cape Anne, on the Massachusetts coast. At that time Second Officer Nickerson, who was on duty on the bridge, noticed the dory floating some distance away and changed the course of the steamer' to come up to it. As they approached the small craft he saw a body in it and immediately notified the capitalin.

the captain.

When the liner came alongside, First Officer Charles Burke ordered the ladder put over the side and then went der put over the side and then went to make the dory secure so that it could be hoisted on board. After the violent storm of Tuesday night the seas were running high and choppy and as a re-sult he had a hard task preventing him-self from being dashed against the side of the steamer or having his hold torn from the rope. Before he succeeded in making all fast he was on the point of exhaustion.

Dead Six Hours.

When the dory was hoisted to the deck a wireless message was sent to the agent in Boston and instructions were received to proceed and turn over the body to the American consul at this port. 
