To Help Young Offenders  
A scheme under consideration two years ago in Holland was considered of great value in educating and improving the character of youthful offenders; it consisted in the establishment of a land-colony on a somewhat large scale.  
It was found, however, that sufficient money could not be raised to support the enterprise was not forthcoming. The plans were accordingly much curtailed, accommodation being provided for no more than 20 youths.

WILL DIG UP MANY STREETS

Contracts for Excavation for Water Work and for Pipe Are Recommended—Some Extensions

The last meeting of the water and sewerage board as it is at present constituted, was held last evening, and a very large amount of routine business transacted. Tenders were opened for sewer and water excavations in several streets, and Pollock & Nier, of the west side, secured the contracts in all, except one instance, and in this case it was decided that the city should do the work by day's work. There were fifteen tenders for supplying cast iron pipe and the checks enclosed to cover 50 per cent. of the cost amounted in the aggregate to over \$5,000. The tender of H. Thorne & Co. appeared to be the lowest, and was recommended to the council for acceptance.

The tenders of Pollock & Nier, for excavation work in the following streets, were accepted: Lancaster street, rock 83; earth, 85; Pond street, rock 83; earth, 85; Chatham street, rock 84.25; earth, 76; Main street, rock 80.50; earth, 87; St. John street, rock 84.25; earth, 85. As there was only one tender for Dock street, it was decided that the work be done by day's work. No tenders were received for the street.

The tender of W. H. Thorne & Co. for cast iron pipe, was as follows: 12 inch, 87; 10 inch, 82.85; 8 inch, 82.65; 6 inch, 83.4 inch, 82.  
A delegation of residents from Paris street was heard with reference to laying a sewer between Paris street and Cranston avenue, and it was decided to comply with the request if the residents would guarantee the sinking fund.  
It was decided to lay a three-quarter inch lead pipe in Cranston avenue to supply M. Thompson's house with water. The engineer submitted a report regarding the installing of an electric pump at Lancaster reservoir, estimating the cost of maintenance at \$4,000 a year. It was decided that the matter stand over pending a meeting with the Lancaster highway board.

It was decided to replace a sewer running through the premises of S. Simpson & Co., at a cost of \$1,200, on the understanding that the company pay half the cost.  
Miss Janet McLachlan and Mrs. Stapp wrote asking compensation for damage alleged to have been done to their house by the choking of the Forest street sewer. The engineer reported that the city is not liable, and his report was accepted.

With regard to water extension in Military road, the engineer estimated the cost at \$3,000 and the city was authorized to repair the service pipe, which would answer the purpose.

CANADA'S DELEGATE

Prof. Prince Representative at International Fisheries Congress in Rome  
Professor K. E. Prince has been appointed by the dominion government delegate representative of Canada at the great international fisheries congress, to be held in Rome next month. This congress is held every three years at some capital city. Three years ago it was held in Washington. It includes delegates from every civilized country including Germany, France, Great Britain, China, Japan, Australia, New Zealand and even such small places as San Marino, Rumania, and Bulgaria.  
Canada has played an important part at these congresses in former years. At the last congress Professor Prince was elected vice-president, and in the absence of the president conducted the proceedings of the congress on a number of occasions. He also made important contributions to the fisheries industries of Canada and it was generally recognized that Canada occupied a premier place in the discussion of fishing subjects.  
The president of the congress at Rome, His Royal Highness Peter Di Stala, and the Italian government are making great preparations to give the delegates an opportunity to see the important fisheries of the Mediterranean sea. Of special interest to the congress is the great fishery station at Naples, the greatest marine station in the world. Fishing experts have received their training at Naples for many years from all countries, and the fish breeding department is the most complete in existence. Therefore the members of the congress will have this great advantage when officially visiting the institution.  
Professor Prince expects to be away a couple of months and the fisheries of Canada are bound to benefit by what he learns and sees in his experiences at this important congress in Italy. Professor Prince is Canadian commissioner of the international fisheries commission, being associated with President Starr Jordan of Leland Stanford university.

DENY REPORTED

ENGAGEMENT OF COL. JOHN J. ASTOR'S SON

New York, April 27.—Emphatic denial of the reported engagement of young Vincent Astor and Miss Catherine Hamnerley is made. ### CRUSHING DEFEAT FOR LABOR BILLS IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, April 26—Two important constitutional questions were submitted to referendum today. The first aimed to amend to the Commonwealth parliament, and the second to extend powers over all matters relating to trade, commerce and industry. In fact, vesting in the federal parliament supreme power to the detriment of the state legislatures, which heretofore had complete control within their own states. The second sought to give the commonwealth legislative power to declare any industry or business a monopoly, and nationalize it.  
A bitter campaign had been fought out on these questions, and both measures were rejected by large majorities. The two bills were passed last November by both houses, subject to submission to a referendum, and their rejection today is considered a crushing defeat for the labor party.

### VICTORIAN MEN KNEW HOW TO TALK BY FLASH

#### Signal Corps at Work Last Night Were Given a Very Pleasant Surprise

A few years ago even amongst military men, the art of talking at long distances by means of flags, lamps, heliographs, or other instruments, was practically unknown, or at least confined to a small number, but the advantages of a knowledge of the "iddy-iddy" language have become strikingly apparent, and the number of signallers in various parts of the world has greatly increased in the last couple of years.

This was evidenced in a pleasant surprise accepted a party of signallers last evening while at work demitting messages across the harbor with the lamp. The steamer "Victoria" lay at her wharf, Sand Point, and one of the officers espied the flashes of light conveying the messages, and as speedily as possible brought forth a lamp, and before long attracted the attention of the local signallers, mostly members of No. 8 Section, in two parties in charge of Lieut. Leavis and Sergt. Instructor Lindsay, respectively.

It took but a few minutes for the boys on shore to call a halt in their communication, and a friendly conversation through the air was entered into between the officers on ship-board and the signallers on the hill-top in the rear of Douglas avenue, who, strangers though they were, talked freely and easily, and had a very enjoyable evening exchanging pleasantries until the closing signals "Vic. E" and "R. D." terminated the discourse.

### HYDRO ELECTRIC COMPANY'S PLANS

#### Development of Water Power They Already Own—Propose Cheaper Power for St. John

A member of the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Company said to the Times today that they hoped to secure letters of incorporation and supply St. John with cheaper power. The company, he said, never sought to get control of water rights which belonged to the public, but to develop and transmit power which they owned outright.

They own the property and water rights on the lakes and streams in question, and can develop the power wherever they choose. What they sought from the legislature was power to expropriate so that they could put down posts, string wires and transmit the power. They will now endeavor to get by purchase the privilege they desired to secure by expropriation.

So far as St. John is concerned they would have the right under provincial law to enter the city with their distribution system, subject to such conditions as the provincial government might impose. They desire, however, to come to an agreement with the city council, so that the latter will be fully satisfied, and they have held several conferences. Thus far, however, they have got no definite answer, or come to any terms. It is their intention to proceed with the enterprise, and they hope to make such arrangements as will be satisfactory all round.

The member of the company said he desired to emphasize the fact that it is power they already own which they propose to develop and transmit. They offer it to the city, if terms can be arranged.

### MARITIME ART GLASS WORKS SCENE OF FIRE

#### Only Good Work of Firemen, Says Manager Saved, the Plant—Loss of \$600 Covered by Insurance

Fire in the establishment of the Maritime Art Glass Works this morning resulted in damage estimated at \$600 and for a time threatened the destruction of the plant. The blaze was in the plate glass and bending rooms and there is a mystery as to its origin. It was first seen by the foreman of the factory when, going along Garden street on his way to work about 8 o'clock, and he sent in an alarm from box 221. The department were quickly on the scene and so serious did the fire look that a second alarm was sounded and a saboteur fight was waged before the fire was under control.

W. C. Bauer, manager of the factory, said that he estimated his loss roughly at \$600, which was covered by insurance. He was at a complete loss, to understand how the fire caught, as a gas furnace is used in the room, and this had not been in operation since yesterday. He spoke in the highest terms of the work of the firemen, and said that it was only through the excellent manner in which the fire was handled that the plant was saved.

### MR. SEGEE IS ON THE STAND

#### Tells Court His Story in Land Dispute With the Turnbull Company

The case of the Turnbull Real Estate Company vs. John A. Segee and Mahel M. Vanvari, which was commenced on Tuesday morning before Mr. Justice McLeod, is being continued today. When the court resumed yesterday afternoon the direct examination of Mr. Adams, the secretary of the company, was concluded. Thomas Gilbert, George M. Rodgers, John McDonald, Major H. Green and Arthur W. Sharp were also examined.

The defendant, John A. Segee, was on the stand all this morning. He said that he and his father had practically used the land as their own, building on it, and cropping and using it as a pasture, and quarrying there.

He told of interviews with Dr. AWARD and Mr. Adams and men whom they had sent there at various times, and how he managed to get rid of them all.

He told of being sent for by Magistrate Ritchie and of a chat with Dr. AWARD afterwards, when in jail, and said that Dr. AWARD wanted him to go and take down the last building that he had put up, and that he would give him \$1000 for it. ### LUMBERMEN NEED A WARM RAIN FALL

#### British Market and Local Conditions In This Important Industry

The weather conditions have not been at all favorable for the lumber business in the lower country, and in consequence, log driving is practically at a standstill. Warm rains and warm weather are needed to assist the lumbermen. On the upper St. John, while the weather is still cold, the conditions for driving are very good, as there is still plenty of snow and ice, and the prospects look good for a large cut.

The English market is depressed on account of the strong competition of cheap Russian woods/large areas of which have been opened up. Previously this country was in a "barbarous state, but now London bankers are financing the operations, and much more lumber is being taken out than ever before.

The trans-Atlantic freight market is at least five shillings a standard stronger than last year.

At the present time Murray & Gregory, Randolph & Baker, and the Stetson, Cutler mills are in operation, and several of the other mills expect to start work in the course of a few days.

### THE RIVER STEAMERS

The Champlain left Indiantown this morning on her regular run to Belleisle. She carried quite a heavy freight and some passengers. She was able to get only as far as Nutter's Point on her run yesterday but it is believed that the ice has broken up somewhat since yesterday and she will be able to proceed a little farther today.

The Majestic and Elaine are running to Fredericton, and both are doing a good freight business. The Victoria and Hampstead will likely go into commission early next week.
