

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

WITH the present anniversary we complete our thirty-sixth year of work in the Home.

On the first of January, 1892, there were 87 children in the Home, 68 have since been admitted making a total of 155, of whom 52 were placed under indenture or taken by friends, two died and one ran away leaving 100 now under our care.

The Lady Managers desire to thank their many friends and subscribers for their continued interest and sympathy in the work of the Home.

Also the Lady Managers gratefully acknowledge their obligation to the Venerable Archdeacon Boddy for his goodness in giving instruction to the elder girls every week. And to Mrs. McGee, superintendent of the Sabbath-school and her efficient staff of helpers in their labour of love.

Miss McKee and Miss McMaster are in charge of the day school, and many of the children are making good progress in that department. The honour roll increases every month, which proves the earnestness of both teachers and scholars.

Our Physicians, Dr. Wishart and Dr. Susannah Boyle, have given their best attention to the Home and during the epidemic of diphtheria were most painstaking and attentive, and are deserving of our most grateful thanks. And we are also indebted to Dr. Caven for examination of any children that are sent to him.

In reference to Mr. Douglas, our solicitor for the past two years, the following resolution was passed at the annual business meeting held January 3rd, 1893 :

Moved by Mrs. Dension, seconded by Mrs. A. M. Smith, and adopted :—"That this Board desire to express their sincere regret at the sudden death of Mr. George Harvey Douglas, solicitor for the Home, and to tender their sympathy and condolence to his parents Mr. and Mrs. Douglas, of Chatham."

During the past year we have to mourn the loss, by death, of two of our fellow-workers. Mrs. Hugh Blain, a faithful and willing helper, and Mrs. Joseph Robinson, who was much esteemed and for thirty-four years an efficient and valued member of the Board.

Mrs. Bright gives every satisfaction, and the Ladies desire to record their appreciation of her unremitting care and attention during the sickness which visited the Home in the early summer.

A fire occurred in the Home which caused much alarm and considerable damage to the ceilings and walls, but the repairs and expenses were promptly met by the Western Assurance Co.

The resignation of Miss Hamilton, who so ably filled the office of secretary for the past four years, was accepted with much regret.

The Board of Management give their careful consideration to placing the girls in suitable houses and the majority of them we trust grow up useful members of the community. Some hopeful letters will be found in the corresponding secretary's report.

Mr. Osler's donation, with many others who kindly remembered the children, enabled them to have a festive holiday time, culminating in the annual entertainment on the 13th January. We have to thank Messrs. Mason & Risch for piano free of charge, Mr. Whittemore for magic lantern views, and a number of other friends who contributed to the evening's enjoyment.

To Mr. David Walker, the Ladies Committee of the "Old English Fair," to the Directors of the Industrial Exhibition, and all others who have in any way contributed to the comfort and happiness of the children, the Management tender their most grateful thanks.

REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN OF THE GIRLS' HOME FOR 1892.

THERE are at present forty children indentured, fifteen of whom are placed in the city, two in the suburbs, and the rest distributed throughout Ontario. Of those in the city, eight are well, happy, and good, one ran away from her place, but was returned, and is now doing well, five are well, and seem contented, but are not quite satisfactory, and one has not been long enough from the Home to judge, one child has been taken from the parties to whom she was indentured, as she was not properly treated. Of those throughout Ontario I have received, on the whole, most satisfactory accounts. They have been perfectly well throughout the year, and I have letters from various ministers as to their moral and spiritual welfare; four girls have been returned to the Home, one has been again placed out, one has been taken by her former mistress, and two are still in the Home. As regards the payment of the fees, collected by the Home, and given to the children, on their attaining the age of eighteen years, there have been but two defaulters. Suits against these to obtain the moneys due the children, are in hand, but the sudden and lamented death of our solicitor has delayed them. In mentioning our solicitor, the late George Douglas, I must bear my testimony as one who had much to do with him in his official capacity, that he was uniformly kind and obliging, though I had necessarily to take up a great deal of his time, and give him a great deal of trouble, that was unremunerative to him, yet he always cheerfully complied with all my requirements, even taking after-hours to do my work. I feel that the Home, and children, and myself have suffered a severe loss.

I have grown a lot since I came here, I am about two inches taller, I give my love to the girls, and hope they are all well.

I would have liked to have gone there this summer, but the folks here all went away at different times, so I could not go,

but I will be sure to come and see you all. I get pretty lonesome sometimes. Now don't say "that is childish" for after you get through working, and go to bed, you get thinking, and then it is you wish you could see them all. Is Mrs. Gooderham one of the ladies there now. She will be glad to hear I have a good place. The lady is very good, she helps with the work ; she is always kind ; she is just the same now as when I first came, and never speaks a cross word. Well, there is lots more I would like to tell you, but I must get supper, so will close hoping you are well.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of managers and friends was held in the Board-rooms on the afternoon of Friday, February 17th, his Honour, the ~~Le~~ut.-Governor of Ontario, presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. B. D. Thomas, after which the report of the retiring Secretary was read by Miss Woodbridge; the Treasurer's report by Mrs. Alfred Denison and the Medical reports by Drs. Wishart and Dr. Susanna P. Boyle.

Mr. Warring Kennedy, seconded by Mr. R. S. Neville, moved the adoption of the above reports, which was carried.

Mr. J. Herbert Mason read the list of officers and managers for the year 1893, and then moved their election, which was seconded by the Rev. Dr. Thomas, and carried unanimously. (List as per book.)

A resolution of thanks to contributors and others was moved by Chancellor Burwash, seconded by Mr. A. M. Smith, as follows :

RESOLUTION OF THANKS.

That the lady managers of the Girls' Home in thanking their many friends for their kind attendance at the meeting of this afternoon, desire to place on record their deep sense of obligation to those interested helpers who have from time to time contributed money, food, clothing and various other donations, which have proved so material an assistance, and without which the continuance of the work would be impossible; and in doing so they would recognize the hand of the Great Giver which has guided the administration of the affairs of the Home, and prompted the assistance which has been received.

A resolution of thanks was then passed to the officers of the Home for their very efficient management.

The announcement that Mrs. Kirkpatrick had consented to become Lady Patroness of the Home was received with applause.

After a vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. Warring Kennedy, seconded by Mr. A. M. Smith, was tendered the Lieut.-Governor for his kindness in presiding, the business meeting was brought to a close by the Rev. Dr. Thomas pronouncing the benediction.

The Gubernatorial party then adjourned to the class-room, which had been decorated for the occasion, where a pretty song of welcome was sung and a handsome basket of flowers presented by the little ones to their Patroness, whose visit will long be remembered by her small protégées. Five o'clock tea was then served by the ladies of the Board, and a very successful and pleasant meeting closed therewith.

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MEDICAL REPORT.

February 17th, 1893.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :—

The year 1892 has been marked by an unusual amount of sickness among our children and by a severe epidemic of diphtheria, which kept the Home in isolation and its inmates in a state of alarm for months. We have great reason to be thankful that although sickness was so rife the number of deaths was small and proportionately insignificant. —

In January Edith Tucker took ill with pneumonia and died in a few days. This was followed by several cases of bronchitis, none of which were fatal. In April a mild epidemic of German measles visited the Home. In May Violet Stevens was taken suddenly ill with what appeared to be laryngismus stridulus, and she was promptly sent to Victoria Hospital. In a few hours, however, it became apparent that laryngeal diphtheria was present. The disease ran a rapid course in its most virulent form. Dr. Wishart performed tracheotomy, but in spite of this she died on the fourth day. Prompt measures were at once taken to discover how far the infection had spread among the children, and it was discovered that fifteen had already caught the disease, and these were at once isolated. In spite of this, case after case was discovered, and the epidemic ran on for ten weeks till forty-four children had suffered more or less severely. Of this number, one was sent to the Victoria Hospital and thirteen to the Isolation Hospital, while the remainder, who were less severely affected, were kept in three rooms in the upper flat of the Home.

In spite of the large number seized with the disease, only one succumbed; the percentage of recoveries (ninety-seven) being unusually large, and testifying to the great care and watchfulness of those in charge.

After a searching investigation, it was discovered that the disease originated in the Home through a visit paid to one of the child-

ren by her mother, who had carelessly come direct to the Home from the presence of the disease elsewhere. This fact indicates the danger that constantly menaces our little ones, as parents from every variety of abode persist in visiting their children and bringing them presents. If visits of this kind could be prevented, without undue harshness, the health of the children would undoubtedly be improved.

The total number of sick in the Home for the past year may be classified as follows: Diphtheria, 44; pneumonia, 4; bronchitis, 6; German measles, 12; ringworm, 5; rheumatism, 1; Tonsillitis, 4; enlarged tonsils, 14; other affections, 20. So that the work devolving upon the medical staff has not been light.

Miss Jennie Quirk was sent to the Home for Incurables, suffering from rheumatism.

After the outbreak of diphtheria the Home was placed in a thorough state of disinfection, and the drainage inspected. This had, as you are aware, been repaired at a great outlay last year, but the work was inefficient and the Board were compelled to spend another large sum in the endeavour to make the drainage perfect, a matter of such vital necessity where a number of children are spending their growing years.

Once more we have to thank Mrs. Bright and her assistants for their constant, watchful care, which, as every one knows, is more than half the battle, and thanks are also due to Dr. Julia Thomas for her valuable assistance repeatedly rendered.

CONSTITUTION OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral, and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen, and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, to be invested for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The management shall be entrusted to a Committee, of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, and a majority vote at a Monthly Meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no Directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as a Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the Board, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE
BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order :

1st. The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting all the meetings during the past month ; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

2nd. The presiding Lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation, not addressed to the presiding Lady, shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend, to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of and read all correspondence respecting them, at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all the children in the Institution—giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

8. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

9. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with the doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE
MATRON AND CHILDREN OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen, in sewing, knitting, and household work.

2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon the doctor's certificate; subject always to the approval of the Board.

3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be \$5 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day-school punctually and regularly; and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.

5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.

Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.

6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.

7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-school, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-school in the Institution.

8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday and Friday afternoons, from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come at other hours must obtain a permit from the Board.

9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week,
