

SOME FACTS ABOUT BRITAIN'S GREAT STRIKE.

The strikers are members of the National Union of Railwaymen.

The cause of the strike is a demand by the men for a standardization of wages which will not reduce any of the present minimum scales.

The railwaymen are working under a wage agreement which expires on .Dec. 31.

For six months negotiations have been going out between the Government and the men to standardize wage scales, as different wages were being paid for the same work in different payts of the country. The union urged that the maximum should prevail and that the levelling should be apward. Last month an agreement was reached, fixing the wages of locomotive entineers, firemen and cleaners, but in other branches a dead-lock occurred. The first intimation of the gravity of the crisis came last Wednesday. J. H. Thomas M. P. Issued a public statement intimating an immediate strike was probable. A conference of Labor leaders and the Government met on Thursday and adjourned until Friday. It was announced that the negotiations had failed.

The strike was called and went into effect at midnight on Friday.




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Equal Pay for Equal Service.
