**SUNDAY AT ST. PAUL'S.**  
Archdeacon Armitage preached on Sunday morning in behalf of the work of the Halifax branch of the Colonial and Continental Church Society in the Island of St. Helena. The text was taken from the parable of the Good Samaritan, and the sermon was a strong plea for home and foreign missions. The illustrations of the society were given by Rev. Mr. Armitage, who is one of the most difficult missions, one mission that year there were 75 candidates, a striking example of the value of the work to the church. In answer to the question that has been asked in the past, and is now being asked, the Rev. Mr. Armitage stated that the Rev. S. H. Prince preached on the subject of Temperance. **UNIONISTS CLAIM**  
Result of Saturday's British election against Home Rule.  
Liberals, however, claim defeat was due to Socialist intervention.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The results of the parliamentary by-elections held in Lillingburgh, Scotland, and Reading, England, are greeted with the wildest enthusiasm in all Unionist quarters, and particularly in Ulster.

The Liberal papers in their editorials declare that after two such staggering defeats it is impossible for the Government to persist in disregarding the demand for Home Rule in the country on the Home Rule Bill.

The Reading election Saturday was fought by the Liberal Unionist party by-election made necessary by the withdrawal of the Liberal Unionist candidate, Mr. Butler, 1,083. The Socialists undoubtedly out in Ulster.

At the last election Sir Rufus Isaacs, Liberal Unionist, was elected against the Home Rule candidate, Mr. Gooch, who entered the constituency only on the eve of the election. The result was due to the Government's policy of not treating the election as one of individual members of the community, but as one of the support of the Unionist cause.

The Daily News, Liberal, says the Reading result was brought about by the Socialist intervention and the women's opposition to the Liberal candidate.

**TORONTO THE CENTRE**

TORONTO, Nov. 10.—Toronto was yesterday in the centre of what officials at the meteorological observatory cautiously described as "one of the most pronounced storms on record," adding that the local records go back as far as the year 1860.

Hurricanes raged during the day over the city, with the wind blowing from the north at a velocity of 40 to 50 miles an hour. The rain was heavy and the air was very cold.

The rain will stop, but there will be frequent showers of rain. The temperature will be in the 40's and 50's.
