## Cures Rheumatism.

The London News publishes an interesting letter from its special correspondent in the Sudan, dated Dongola, April 22, giving an account of the Mahdi and his movements. The correspondent thinks that beyond question Mohammed Ahmed is a man of considerable intelligence and extraordinary force of character. In barren discussion as to the nature or authority of his mission he loses no time. If any man be bold enough to challenge his divine origin or to express disbelief he is permitted to choose between submission, open acknowledgement, and decapitation. On the other hand, he is not one who encourages those who voluntarily accept him as the true Mahdi—the man sent by Allah to reform mankind. He boasts some education, as it is understood in the East; that is, he reads and writes, and is well versed in the Koran and the commentators. He speaks both the Arabic and Arabic languages. His life is simple in the extreme. He indulges in none of the luxuries or vanities of life, except perhaps a weakness for a large number of wives. He is credited with possession of thirty-nine of these aids to happiness, though the orthodox number allowed by the Koran is only four. By a system of temporary divorce it seems he keeps within the letter of the Mohammedan law, the ladies taking their turn to be divorced and taken on again. The Mahdi, the correspondent says, is a fighting Prophet. He takes part in all the battles and does not spare his own person. There is a report current that in the fight with Hicks' army he received a sword cut across the forehead which divided the brass cap which he wears under his turban, and inflicted a serious wound. For some time after the battle he did not appear in public, and it is suspected that the wound may have had something to do with the extraordinary inaction of the Mahdi's forces since the defeat of Gen. Hicks. Mohammed Ahmed is "a total abstemious man of the purest water." Not alone abstemious in food, but in his habits of life. He forbids the forbidden luxuries. One of the refugees merchants now at Dongola relates that having been caught by some of the Mahdi's men drinking wine and smoking a cigarette he was seized, brought before the Prophet, and sentenced to receive 150 lashes, which were inflicted. Under these circumstances it can well be imagined, that life in Obed is not gay.

## A NEW OBJECTION URGED AGAINST THE ACT.

ST. JOHN, June 2.—Prosecutions commenced to day at Sussex against six persons charged with selling liquor contrary to the Canada Temperance Act since the 1st of January, 1884. Any proceedings since that time should be taken under the Liquor License Act of 1883. That even assuming the Canada Temperance Act to have been in force prior to the 15th of May, 1883, that it then ceased to be in force under the provision of the Liquor License Act of 1883. That since the passing of the Liquor License Act all informations laid and all penalties imposed must be under the provisions of that Act, and that Act alone. That while a portion of the Liquor License Act of 1883 is within the power of Parliament, it is not valid in relation to the regulation of shops, saloons, or tavern licenses, as within the exclusive jurisdiction of the Legislature of the Province. A great deal of interest is felt in the result.

**Temperance.**  
ENGLAND'S DRINK BILL.—Mr. W. Hoyle, in a letter to the London Times, says that the number of deaths upon intoxicating liquors during 1883 amounted to 827,386,378, a decrease of 83,570,420, as compared with 1882. The number of deaths during 1882 was 910,956,798. In 1880, with a population of 28,778,000, the expenditure of the United Kingdom upon intoxicating liquors was £438,884,350. Year by year the expenditure rose until in 1876 it reached the enormous sum of \$736,443,795. Thus while the population had only grown fifteen per cent., the drink bill had grown seventy-two per cent. Between 1876 and 1880 the drink bill receded from \$736,000,000 to \$610,000,000. This was largely owing to the great depression in trade, and to some extent it was also due to the vigorous efforts of temperance reformers. In 1881 the drink bill rose again to \$638,000,000, since which year it has fallen to the extent of about \$3,800,000.

At the meeting of the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, at Pittsburgh, Pa., on the 26th May, the report of a committee condemning the liquor traffic licenced by government and providing for the economic relief of such church members as deal in spirituous liquors and rent property to tavern keepers, was after a heated debate unanimously adopted. This is one of the healthy signs of the times, that indicate how rapidly temperance and prohibition principles are taking hold of the public mind. Despite our efforts to rescue temperance principles are steadily marching onward.

**PLANTING BY STEAM.**—FARGO, Dakota, May 28.—A number of heavy wheat growers from all parts of Northern Dakota were here yesterday to witness an experiment in plowing by steam. A traction engine drew eight plows, turning the sod four inches deep as evenly and well as could be done by horse power, and at the rate of over 25 acres per day. This will mark a new era in wheat growing, as it will enable farmers to plow at a cost of not more than \$1 per acre.

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## The Irish Land Act.

SUBSTANCE OF THE MEASURE TO SIMPLIFY ITS PROVISIONS.

LONDON, May 28.—Mr. Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has introduced in the House of Commons, a bill to simplify those provisions of the Land Act by which tenants are enabled to purchase their holdings. Interest on loans to the state is reduced to 3 1/2 per cent. per annum, to the tenants paying one quarter of this purchase price down, with payments extending over a period of forty years. The State will furnish the whole of the purchase money, where the price is considered fair and the security offered is good, repayment to be made in 33 annual instalments with 3 1/2 per cent. interest. The amount that may be advanced by the State in any one year is limited to 25 million pounds. The entire sum to be devoted to the purchase must not exceed one hundred million pounds. This is announced to be the utmost that the Government will concede in this matter. The bill was read for the first time tonight, after which the House adjourned until June 5th.

## A Sealing Brig in Peril.

ST. JOHN, N. F., May 30.—The Newfoundland sealing brig Confedrate, Captain Thomas Greene, of Harbor Grace, with a crew of 79 men was caught in formidable ice and shipwrecked in Notre Dame Bay on the 28th April and was thrown completely on the floor. The ship lies over on her side, with the yard arms on the ice. On the 20th of May five of the crew volunteered to travel to land, a distance of nearly 20 miles and report on the situation, at imminent peril to life. In an exhausted condition they reached St. John's, boarded the steamer Heronies, and arrived here this evening. They report that all provisions are consumed, except bread and the last pound of flour was exhausted. There is a frozen expanse of ice all around, and as the ship, thus beset, is now drifting out to sea, there is a danger of the whole crew being starved to death. A powerful sealing steamship will be at once despatched to rescue them. Captain Cross of the steamer Hercules is expected to arrive eastward of Notre Dame Bay as far as the eye can reach, and innumerable icebergs.

## Frost and Snow.

Boston, May 30.—The frost did great damage all over New England last night. In the strawberry district around Taunton the crop, which is valued at many thousands of dollars, is said to have been quite ruined. In northern New Hampshire several inches of snow fell. Around Norwich, Conn., ice a quarter of an inch thick formed, and all crops which can be killed by cold are ruined. In Vermont all tender crops were killed, though corn is not advanced sufficiently to be hurt much, the fruit was badly damaged, and the wheat is heavy.

**ALBANY, N. Y., May 30.**—I saw an inch thick formed in this vicinity. Nearly all vegetables and small fruits are destroyed.

Accounts from Egypt depict the condition of affairs as growing steadily worse. French influence is in the ascendant and English influence is declining. Nabar Pacha himself is ready to become the instrument of French ambition. The recall of Clifford Lloyd has produced the worst impression there, and it is believed marks the final collapse of the attempt to execute an English programme of reform. The railway is equally capable and unscrupulous, having brought his intrigues at Cairo to a successful conclusion, returns to take his seat in the French delegation to the conference.

**OTTAWA, May 28.**—Sir Hector Langevin and Hon. Mr. Caron have gone to Quebec. During the absence of Sir Leonard Tilley, Hon. Mr. Bowell will be acting minister of finance. Several railway officials today witnessed an exhibition of Cooke's patent railway switch







## The Crops.

The May report of the Ontario Bureau of Industries has been issued. Winter wheat is much more satisfactory than in May last year. The area under wheat is about 25 per cent. less than last year. Winter wheat is a particularly favorable crop. From other parts the accounts are not without exception are favorable. The general outlook of fruit prospects a high average crop, nearly all kinds contrasting agreeably with the fruit of last season. Apples, barleys and spring wheat have made a fine start in living promise of a good harvest. The area of spring wheat is larger than last year in the western counties, and will make good, to a considerable extent, the reduced area under fall wheat. The effect of last week's frosts on field, orchard and garden crops are much less serious than was feared in nearly all fruit-growing districts; no permanent injury was done.

## Presentation.

Parker, of Derby, met at the parsonage, at that place, on Monday evening, and presented him with an elegant ice pitcher as a mark of esteem for his character, and of appreciation of the services rendered by him during the past three years. Hugh Parker, Esq., on behalf of the committee, presented the presentation, accompanying the same with a neat and appropriate speech. Mr. Parker made a suitable reply, and the friends at English Settlement also presented him with a small clock, and a presentation was made by Miss Annie Smith. The Rev. gentleman, who intends leaving Derby at the close of the ensuing conference, will be followed by his new circuit in the best wishes of a large circle of friends.
