DOMINION ELECTION.

THE DREYFUS CASE.

Dreyfus was re-convicted on Saturday and sentenced to ten years imprisonment. The verdict proved a great shock to the civilized world and has cast a dark stain on the history of France. Dreyfus must suffer for the whole army. In other words the honor of the army of France has been saved at the expense of one man. There was no spark of evidence to show that Dreyfus was guilty of the terrible charge and if justice had been meted out he would now be a free man. But at this trial the evidence was so weak that it was a case of a man's life against a man's life, and that was a difficult task, especially when several generals would swear falsely and almost make the judges believe black was white. The Jews of the world to a man are standing by Dreyfus, and France will not doubt find herself a much poorer nation than hitherto, as some of the wealthiest Jews in the world who have large amounts of money out in the country have stated that if Dreyfus was convicted they would withdraw every franc. France is in a queer predicament.

A FARMERS' TRUST.
