A communication from the Maritime Automobile Co. Ltd., was read, asking for a rate for electric power for brick yard.

Laid on table to be taken up later in meeting.

A letter from Wm. Savidant was read, asking that a side walk be laid along the north side of Union Street.

This was referred to the Public Properties and Streets committee.

A communication from the Board of School Trustees, asking that 10,000 be assessed for school purposes, was read, and laid on table for further consideration.

A communication was received from Frank R. McGregor, re water service. This was referred to the Water & Sewerage committee.

A communication was also read from C. H. Kilham, re water backing up from sewer to his cellar. Referred to Water and Sewerage committee.

The application of Alex. Arsenault for a trucking license was read and referred to the Police and License committee.

Reb. LeBeef made application for an Employment Bureau license. This was referred to the Police and License committee.

Coun. Goss inquired as to what steps were being taken to have the Waverly river cleaned up.

Clerk—Owners have been written to, but no action has yet been taken.

The application of the Maritime Automobile Co. for electric power service was again taken up.

Coun. Harquail reported that manager of the Electric Light department had figured that it would take about \$700 to provide necessary wire and transformers. It was not likely the revenue would be large.

LOCAL SOLDIER AMONG THE WOUNDED

Casualties From Recent Fighting
Being Received Every
Day Now

Word was received here yesterday by Mrs. H. M. McLennan, that her brother, Pte. Harry Nelson had been wounded June 4th in the arm.

Word of the wounding of Arthur Young and Harvey S. Murray, both of this town, has been received here. Pte. Murray has a brother at the front who was also wounded recently, and another brother is a member of the 132nd here.

Mrs. John Farrer recently received a letter from her son Claud, which told of a narrow escape he had. A big shell exploded near him, burying him for a considerable time and injuring one of his ears so that he is quite deaf.

Mr. M. Mowat has received a letter from his son Lt. G. A. Mowat, who is in an hospital in England. He is making good progress and expected soon to be about on crutches. He will likely arrive home in August. No further word has been received from Mr. Mowat's other son Morden, who has been reported missing for some weeks. In a letter from the commander of the Flight division of which Morden was a member, the impression is given that he must be a prisoner in Germany.

**ANOTHER CAMPBELLTON
BOY KILLED IN ACTION**

Sgt. Major Edward Turner of First Contingent Died of Wounds Last Week

Another of Campbellton's brave boys has paid the extreme penalty of this bloody war. Sgt. Major Edward Turner, who was one of the first of our young men here to rally to the call of the empire, died last week as the result of wounds received in action.

Sgt. Major Turner was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen W. Turner of this town, and was a very popular young man. He was employed in the L. C. R. shops before he joined the colors.

The family will have the heartfelt sympathy of the community in the loss of their beloved son and brother.

**IMPROVED TRAIN
SERVICE NEEDED**

No Suburban From West Arriving Here During Day—Committee Appointed

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Council Chamber last evening, President Blackhall presiding.

A resolution from some residents of Matapedia, re the need of improved train service from Mont Joli to Campbellton was read and after discussion the resolution was endorsed and a committee consisting of Mr. John Harquail, Mr. D. A. Stewart, M. P. P. and President Blackhall were appointed to take the matter up with the railway authorities.

The need of a train from Bathurst to Campbellton Sunday evening was also brought up. Now when men working here go home Saturday evening, they cannot get back here from east before noon Monday.

DESERTERS BREAK OUT OF CO. JAIL

Two Members of 132nd Sentenced to Jail Are Now at Large

About two weeks ago two deserters of the 132nd Battalion were sentenced by Judge Matheson to fifteen months at "hard labor" in the county jail.

They were duly committed to the care of the sheriff and placed behind the bars.

They had only been in the jail a few days until in the middle of the day, they dug themselves out and disappeared, and so far are still at liberty.

Sheriff Stewart states that they dug themselves out through a hole in the foundation where stone work had been displaced to allow water and sewerage pipes to be installed, but the stone had never been replaced, so with a slat of their bed they were able with ease to remove the earth.

In our opinion it is a mistake to send men to the local jail to live months in idleness. We notice that in all similar cases deserters are being sent to Dorchester for terms varying from one to two years.

**PTE. WHITNEY TOPE
DIED OF WOUNDS**

Mrs. Alice Tope has received the following letter expressing sympathy in the death of her son Whitney Tope, who died of wounds on June 4th, 1916, at St. John's Hospital, France. Pte. Tope was eighteen years of age.

Office of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of Canada.
Ottawa, 7th June, 1916.Dear Mrs. Tope:—
It was with feelings of very great regret that I learned today of the death of your son Whitney Tope, who died on June 4th, from wounds received at Private Whitney Tope.

I am writing this letter for the purpose of extending my very sincere sympathy to you in your sad bereavement. Nothing of course can lessen the effect of the blow and of the sorrow caused to you and his family and intimate friends, but at the same time it is a satisfaction to know that he died serving his country, fighting in defence of those who are left at home and of the free institutions that are so dear to the heart of every Canadian and Britisher.

S. A. COMMISSIONER HERE SUNDAY

Also Conducted Services Saturday Evening—Big Public Demonstration in Opera House

Commissioner Richards, in charge of the Salvation Army in Canada, with his private secretary, Brigadier Green, a talented musician and Major Barr of St. John, arrived here Saturday from Newcastle and conducted services in the S. A. Hall Saturday evening and Sunday morning. Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock a public welcome was tendered to the visitors in the Opera House, at which the following speakers were present: Upon the platform were the different sergeants and a large number of prominent citizens.

The Opera House was crowded, every seat being taken and all enjoyed the meeting.

His Worship introduced Commissioner Richards, who gave a very interesting address upon the work of the Salvation Army.

The Commissioner, who joined the Christian Mission, since known as the Salvation Army, in 1880, at a time when it meant nothing and bloodshed for one to identify himself with that organization, and who has commanded the army in Denmark, South Africa and New Zealand, and the last two years in Canada, held his audience at the closest attention. Very interesting was his description of the army's work reclaiming inebriates in Britain and New Zealand. A government officer had reported that 82 per cent. of those treated by the army were permanently cured. Army workers waited in police courts and at prison gates to take charge of unfortunates. In Australia, the whole charge of incorrigibles is given to the army by the government, and after 15 years work there the reports give 72 per cent. of the incorrigibles as turned out good citizens, and at a much less cost than the prisons would demoralize and ruin the same people.

In London, S. A. workers gather in hundreds of human derelicts about 1 or 2 a.m., give them a hot breakfast, then let them sleep undisturbed till 9, then hold a meeting and try to persuade them to enter the industrial home and begin to climb up to good citizenship.

At the end of 50 years work the S. A. has 16,835 paid preachers. Its program was the pure gospel of the Bible. It had no use for German materialism.

At the close of the address His Honor Judge McLatchey moved a vote of thanks to the speaker. This was seconded by Rev. Hugh Miller.

The meeting closed with the National anthem.

**NARROW ESCAPE
FROM DROWNING**

Pte. E. B. Borden Falls Out of Canoe and is Rescued With Difficulty

On Tuesday "A" Co. of the 132nd marched up river and while resting on the beach at Head Tide, two soldiers got into a canoe and poled out into the swift water.

When the call to fall in was given, one of the soldiers on shore threw a stone out into the river and called sharply to Private E. B. Borden. Borden saw the stone coming, and as it was quite near, dodged backwards and fell out of the canoe.

He could not swim, and the canoe had gone beyond his reach. Seeing the dangerous situation Lt. McLean coolly plunged into the water and managed with the aid of a log to bring the drowning soldier to shore. Pte. Borden is an expert canoeist, but was not able to swim.

STRANGE WAYS SOLDIERS ARE SAVED FROM DEATH

"One bullet went clean through my pocket, struck my notebook, and stayed there. I have it still. It was my first hit, and so I have kept it as a souvenir." Thus wrote an officer from Flanders some time ago, and the incident is typical of many occasions when men have been saved from death or disablement by some object they were carrying about their person.

Not very long ago, a private in the 4th East Yorkshire Regiment was saved from death by a cigarette-case which he was carrying in a pocket over his heart. The missile lodged in the inner cover of the case, and the cigarettes were badly damaged, but no harm

Bishop Taylor Smith, speaking at Harrow School, told how a captain in the Coldstreams was wounded by a shell. When he was examined the doctors found a Bible in his hip pocket. The piece of shell had struck the Bible and gone through the pages. Had it not been for the Bible the officer's spine would have been shattered. Curiously enough, the missile had stopped at the ninety-first Psalm and the officer's father, who had given him the Bible, had written a verse from that Psalm on the flyleaf.

Shaving soap, tobacco pouches, letter-cases, and books of all descriptions have saved the lives of many soldiers, but the most extraordinary life-saver was a mouth-organ which was smashed to pieces by a bullet as it rested in the left breast pocket of Private Keighley, a Canadian. It was found afterwards that the mouth-organ bore the legend, "Made in Germany."

DELAY IN LEAVING

165TH PARTY WAS

Major Bissonette and Men Have Signed on 21 Recruits

MONCTON TRANSCRIPT

Captain L. P. D. Tilley, Chief Recruiting Officer for New Brunswick, arrived in the city last evening en route from Madawaska county, where he has been spending some days with Major Bissonette's 165th recruiting party, to his headquarters at St. John. Captain Tilley reports that the 165th officers and band had a very successful tour across the International line from Campbellton to St. Leonard's. In all, up to the time he left them to return home, they had secured twenty-one recruits, of which number, one was signed for the 145th Battalion. A pleasing feature of the tour was the fact that all of the men signed up, nearly every one succeeded in passing the medical examination.

The recruiting party was commanded by Major Bissonette, and included Captain Tilley, Capt. Jean Gaudet, Captain J. Arthur Leger, several subalterns and eighteen bandmen.

CHARLO—FOUR RECRUITS

On Monday evening the first meeting was held in the parish hall at Charlo, at 8 o'clock in the evening. Father Robichaud, the parish priest, presided. Father Melanson, of Balmora, was also present. The speakers were Father Robichaud, Major Bissonette, Capt. Leger, Capt. Gaudet, and Capt. Tilley. There was a very large gathering, and four recruits were secured.

One of the principal artists appearing with the Belgian Royal Concert Company is Mr. Jan Collignon, known as the best bass-baritone in Belgium. He has been connected with many important musical enterprises in his native country and has sung in the Opera Houses of Brussels, Antwerp and Ostend, for the past fifteen years, with such stars as Litvinne, Van Dyck, Delmas, Urius.

Monsieur Collignon left Antwerp when the bombardment began, in October 1914. His son was a lieutenant in King Albert's gallant army, was taken prisoner during the siege of Namur and he is still in the hands of the Germans.

Mr. Collignon owns extensive property in Belgium and he has had the misfortune to have four of his houses burned down, shelled and looted.

Mlle. Daisy Jean, the cellist, and Mlle. Gabrielle Radoux, the pianist, have on several occasions, played at private musicales given at the Belgian Royal Household. Mlle. Radoux is a niece of the late Theodore Radoux, who was a director of the Royal Conservatoire at Liege. She studied under such masters as Nordlinger and Jan Blockx, the latter a composer of many Flemish operas. The great Belgian pianist Arthur De Greef regards Mlle. Radoux's talents highly.

Mlle. Octavie Belloy, soprano, has been singing for the past five years in grand Opera in Antwerp, where she has played leading parts. She was trained by the great Van Dyck and Henry Fontaine. Together with Mr. Collignon and other talented artists such as Heinrich Henzel, Sommer, Muratore, and Katcherovski, she used to take leading parts in Operas by Wagner, Gluck and Mozart, at musical festivals given in Antwerp under the direction of Frank van der Stucken, Conductor of the Cincinnati Philharmonic Orchestra.

"Few of us realize what a great help our Canadian newspapers have been in this campaign," he said. "They have done excellent work, wonderful work indeed."

During the course of the interview he touched on the ability of the French-Canadians as soldiers, but did not make any statement regarding the progress of recruiting in the province of Quebec. "The French-Canadians are among our best fighters at the front today," said Sir Sam. "We've got to give them credit for their fighting ability; they are fighting over there like bear cats and we all should be proud of their record to date."
