NEW ACCESSIONS OF STRENGTH. The Tories of Britain have lately been trying to persuade themselves into the belief that the home rule question must be given a rest for a time and that the attention of parliament will be directed to the questions which will draw the minds of the representatives of Britain away to other issues.

They find now, however, that the Irish question must be settled before less pressing matters are to receive attention. They find too that as day follows day new converts are being made to the Gladstonian measure, and that many of the most eminent men of the kingdom who before were lukewarm in the question have come out squarely and earnestly in support of it.

A short time ago Professor Galbraith, of Trinity college, Dublin, a man whose name is familiar to every scholar, joined the nationalist league, and now we learn that Professor Freeman, of Oxford University has followed the example set by his Dublin friend.

When such men as these see in the nationalist league "the chief organ for the maintenance of law and order," how can we wonder that the league is supported by the foremost men of the mother country and how can we doubt that the emancipation of Ireland is at hand?

When one of the most finished scholars of Dublin, and one of the greatest of living English historians, see in the home rule measure a remedy for Ireland's ills they cannot but try to persuade us that it is supported only by the rabble of Ireland.

A short time will settle this most pressing question, and settle it in a manner which will show Salisbury and his cabinet that even an aristocratic government must yield to the voice of the people.

THE FISHERY DISPUTE. The Toronto News, an independent journal, commenting on the letter of Mr. J. W. Langley, attorney general of Nova Scotia, on the fishery dispute, has the following:—"The fishery question is ever to be settled it must be on a basis broad enough to exclude the possibility of party prejudices, and fair and equitable, so as to prevent the possibility of a future conflict. This cannot be accomplished simply by the settlement of the fishery question; another and still more important question, far-reaching in its scope and application, must be considered with it, reciprocal trade relations. The one question is intimately associated with the other, and unless the latter is settled so as to give free access to the continental market, an adjustment of the former is hopeless.

We have learned many lessons since the inauguration of the Treaty of Independence, and we, as well as the United States, should now be willing to accept the inevitable." This represents the feeling of independent thinking men in the matter of the settlement of the fishery dispute.

THE MONTREAL DETECTIVES. The revelations which have been made in connection with the trial of the detectives and policeman of Montreal who were lately arrested for robbing the safe of the Grand Trunk Railway, show a state of affairs terrible to contemplate. The examination shows that the detectives who have been paid by the city and who have often been intrusted with tracing out robbers and burglars to their proper quarters have been in many cases the robbers and burglars themselves. They have long been working with professional tools and have been in league with some of the professional burglars of the United States. They had formed themselves into a gang and held regular meetings for discussing their schemes. One of the gang was to commit robberies and the detectives were to be on the watch, and if the robber was detected by any one, his detective friends were to arrest him and hurry him off to jail, and either let him escape before reaching there or let him out

after being locked up. Such an example should be made of these men that those who are entrusted with the positions which they once held will be impressed more with the fear of punishment than with the hope of reward.

The question of preventing undesirable immigration has been seriously considered by many of our American cousins, and, as in Canada, it has been presented for the consideration of the public. Senator Palmer, of Michigan, is perhaps the leader of the movement to restrict the unwholesome immigration of foreigners, and will introduce a bill into the senate to provide means for restricting such immigration.

His bill provides that every person intending to settle in the United States shall first pass through the hands of the United States consul in the country of his residence, and shall be passed upon by the consul as if it were an invoice. The consul must certify that he is a fit and proper person, and upon landing the immigrant must pay head money.

Cable. The British Parliament will meet on February 7th.

A despatch from San Reno says the crown prince's symptoms are alarming. The tumor has spread rapidly with deplorable results.

The court arraignment has pronounced that no case is established against M. Wilson, ex-President Grevy's son in law, and the charge has been dropped.

A Lisbon despatch says that the crown prince was yesterday delivered of a daughter. The infant only lived two hours. The mother is in a critical condition.

Lord Randolph Churchill is the guest of Lord Huntingdon at Hardwick Hall, London. It is reported that they are conferring as to the best means to meet the fair trade agitation.

At a convention of landlords at Dublin the agent of Lord Lansdowne advocated state aid to landlords to enable them to pay mortgages, accepting rental as security. Mr. Eversard favored the proposal; he said it was the landlord's last chance.

The Duke of Norfolk has gone to Rome as special envoy from the Queen, and thousands of conjectures as to his mission fill the air. It is believed that the government intends to resume formal diplomatic relations with the Vatican, regardless of the popular prejudice, which exists on the subject. It is hinted too that Salisbury's government intends to counteract the stingy mission to Ireland of Mr. Persico, who has fallen much under the influence of the home rule party. If the Pope can be brought to issue a pronouncement in favor of home rule, a large part of the Irish clergy would be greatly pleased and strengthened.

American. Mr. O'Brien has again been elected Mayor of Boston.

Henry S. Lee, the "Young Napoleon of France," was arrested at New York, Tuesday on a charge of grand larceny, and released on \$25,000 bail.

The Ontario legislature will meet on Jan. 25th.

Three thousand tons of coal are on fire at the Montreal water works.

Raoul D. B. Julien, ex-M. P. for West Middlesex, and Dr. Platt, M. P. for Prince Edward county, commenced Tuesday at Stratburg and Pictou respectively. The six months objection was taken in both cases but was overruled.

Seven hotel keepers attacked two whiskey detectives named Melias and Dennis, at Myrtle, Ont., last night, and fire shots were exchanged. Robert Brown, bar tender, of Port Perry, was fatally injured. Melias was arrested here, but Dennis has disappeared.

John and Charles Carroll, farmers of Carleton, Ont., have been arrested charged with murdering the wife of the latter on October 1st. The woman's dead body was found hanging in a driving shed. The property was in her name and it is believed that Charles feared being over-looked in the will.

The Short Line. Special correspondence to the Portland Press says:—In spite of all the haste made by day and night both the Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk (Greenville) have not come within eight of Moosehead Lake; and will not probably reach even Moose River village, which is less than thirty miles from the point on the western border of Maine where the Canadian Pacific enters the state. Of the one hundred and thirty or forty miles of track to be laid between the western border and Mattawamkeag, only about twenty miles are down, and five miles more, which will bring the end of the track to Aroostook within five or six miles of Moose River village, are as much as will be completed this season. Along the rest of the line, except perhaps on portions of the Mattawamkeag division, where the work has been more nearly completed than on other parts of the line, operations will be carried on all winter.

At present there are not many laborers on the works, but large numbers are being hired in New York, McKeanie, Mann & Co. will have on their works the construction about 1,300 men this winter. Other contractors will have enough men probably to bring the total up to 2,000. These will push the work this winter.

McKenzie, Mann & Co., who have over fifty miles of the distance, have disbursed for labor and supplies during the six months the work has been going on, about \$100,000 a month. On the whole line, the disbursements have been about \$250,000 or \$300,000 each month.

Tyrannical Girls. Mrs. Ella Wheeler Wilcox says: "It is a sad commentary on American society and American manners that so many bright and otherwise charming young girls are allowed to tyrannize over their fathers and mothers, and that the parents seem to feel a sort of servile pride in being eclipsed by their own offspring. I know an almost innumerable number of girls still under twenty, who monopolize the conversation, deprive their parents publicly for any careless or old-fashioned form of speech, and whose opinions are law and gospel in the household; while the parents, with their heads in the background, gaze, half in awe and half in wondering admiration, upon the brilliancy of their own progeny. This thoroughly American habit of tyrannizing young girls does not conduce to their early wisdom or discretion. It prevents them from gaining a sort of premature schooling in the art of facing things of life far beyond their years, and gives them an exaggerated impression of their own importance. It requires time and experience to enable them to rightly estimate their own worth or understand their own needs."

IRISH LANDLORDS. Want a Compensation for Losses Sustained Through the Action of the Government. DUBLIN, Dec. 13.—At a conference of landlords a delegation was appointed to submit to the government that the landowners of Ireland are entitled to compensation for losses sustained through the action of the government in reducing rents to a greater extent than justified by economic conditions, depriving the landowners of a reversionary interest in the occupancy of the soil, lessening the saleable and receivable value of judicial rents, and depriving landowners of the right to obtain the best rent a solvent market is able to pay in the open market. The delegation will claim that landowners are entitled to a direct pecuniary grant.

BALFOUR SLEEPS UNDER GUARD. In a town square of Wellington, the Prime Minister, Lord Balfour, was arrested last night. In consequence of warnings that a plot had been formed to assassinate Balfour, the police guarded the approaches to the platform and were stationed at various points in the interior of the hall. Barricades extending around the hall were continued to the Town hall where Balfour sleeps under guard. At Balfour's appearance the prolonged cheering failed to drown the hissing. The preliminary speaking proceeded and great disorder. A number of fights took place and many persons were ejected from the hall. The discontented element was finally subdued. Balfour made an elaborate criticism of the most recent speeches in favor of home rule.
