The shipment of plaster from Windsor last year amounted to 111,392 tons, value in 212 vessels. The plaster is now shipped in its raw state, the value being less than \$1 per ton. The Windsor Tribune points to the Albert plaster industry at Hillsboro and advises the Windsor quarrymen to manufacture their plaster before shipping.

The customs returns for the port of Yarmouth show the value of the total imports for the year was \$438,980 compared with \$509,763 in 1886, a decrease of \$69,773. The value of the exports in 1887 was \$497,155, compared with \$475,079 in 1886, an increase of \$22,076.

Messrs. Reed Langrange, of Parnassus, N. S., and G. S. Steves, of Hillsboro, N. B., have been granted master's certificates of competency for the coasting trade by the St. John Marine Board of Examiners.
