GENERAL NEWS.

Boise, Idaho, is now heated by water from a hot spring near the city. Four of the Anarchists who recently attacked Xerox, Spain, have been sentenced to be executed on February 9. Ichabod Tanner, one of the wealthiest citizens of Portage, Wis., has just died from the effects of a cancer at the advanced age of 100 years. A young Norwegian, in Minnesota, fell heir to a baronetcy and fortune in Norway, and the good news so elated him that he proceeded to get drunk and was frozen to death in a barn. Carlyle W. Harris of New York, the medical student who was convicted recently of murdering his young wife by morphine poisoning, has been sentenced to death by Reuben Smyth in the Court of General Sessions.

The French expedition in Senegal, in two battles with Chief Samory, lost one officer and nine men killed and 43 wounded, the enemy losing 150 killed and 300 wounded.

The Japanese some time ago adopted burial of the dead, but they have reverted to their old custom of burning the dead on account of its sanitary recommendation.

Martha Washington's Bible has just been sold by a New York firm to a Mr. Gunter of Chicago for \$4,000. The firm paid \$1,000 for it at the Washington sale in Philadelphia last year.

The remarkably beautiful green color of some preserved beans and other vegetables is said to be obtained by boiling the vegetables in a copper vessel while an electric current is passed through it.

Frank Clark, aged nineteen years, the adopted son of Smith Clark of Pickering, was recently found dead, drowned in a pool of water. Deceased was subject to fits and had fallen face downward. When found his face was in the water and life was extinct.

A most curious cock is displayed in the window of a tobacconist store in Philadelphia. The frame is made from cigar boxes fitted together. The real bird is marked by a coating of smoking tobacco. Two clay pipes of different lengths serve for the hands, and the figures are made of cigarettes.

Another one of those fearful coasting accidents happened at Harbor Hill, Goderich, Ont., recently. A double-runner holding over a dozen people while going full speed, struck a corner of a house, threw them all off and seriously injured five of them.

James Bryce, of Princeton, Ont., went to Dundalk to order a coffin for his sister, who had died the previous evening. On his return he found that his wife had during his absence given birth to twins, and that she, too, had died. He is left with a family of seven small children, two of them the newly-born twins.

While two boys belonging to Peterboro, Ont., were playing recently with a gun loaded with peas, which had been intended to drive away some dogs, the gun was accidentally discharged, the peas striking the youngest boy on the neck, making a frightful wound causing his death instantly.

The winning numbers of the principal prizes in the Louisiana lottery this month are as follows: 28,402,800,000; 22,102,100,000; 39,333, 50,000; 59,603, 825,000; 31,121, 10,000; 99,329, 10,000; 18,487, 50,000; 36,120, 50,000; 61,228, 50,000; 69,148, 50,000; 92,848, 50,000.

Mrs. Blackwell, of Wolfston, Ontario, poisoned tea with intent on the life of her family. Her husband detected something wrong, but Mrs. Blackwell denied the accusation and drank one cupful. She was taken ill and died before a doctor reached her side.

A horse purchased recently by James H. Metcalf, M. P. P., for Kingston, Ont., was afflicted with diphtheria. The stable dog and cat caught the disease and died. Mr. Metcalf's children, six in number, were laid up with the disease, and two have died. The others are recovering.

One of the greatest church meetings of the year is to be the convocation of the Old Order German Baptists at Millbrook, Pa., commencing on June 5. Eight states will send 500 regular delegates and from 10,000 to 120,000 daily attendants to the convocation. The main tabernacle will be the Good barn, at Millbrook, with an extension of fifty feet, making 8,000 square feet of sitting room and accommodating from 2,000 to 3,000 people. A ten acre field has been set apart for hitching, which will be laid off in avenues and supplied with posts. The seating tent will be 55x120 feet, and will have a capacity of seating 700 at one sitting. The scriptural injunction to feed the multitude and the meals will be free to all who attend.

The London Times unhesitatingly declares that Thomas Hardy's latest novel, 'The Mayor of Trenton,' is his greatest. "Amid his beloved Wessex valleys and uplands, and among the unsophisticated folk in whose lives and labors we have learned from him to find a new respect for dignity and romance, he has found a story, during his treatment of conventional ideas, pathetic in its sadness, and profoundly stirring by its tragic power. His very title is a challenge to convention."

Dr. Andrew D. White will open the March Popular Science Monthly with a chapter on Astronomy in his Warfare of Science series. The strenuous exertions made by both the Catholic and the Protestant clergy to suppress the teachings of Copernicus and Galileo are set forth in this article with such strong evidence as to admit of no denial or shifting of responsibility.

Harpers' Weekly for February 13th will contain a remarkably interesting article on "Our Indian Contingent," detailing some of the results which have followed the enlistment of Indians in the United States army. Several characteristic illustrations by Fredrick Remington will accompany the article.

Sir Edwin Arnold who has been enjoying an interesting trip through the United States, has made a careful study of the conditions which govern the family in Japan and embodies his ideas in a paper called 'Love and Marriage in Japan' in the February number of the Cosmopolitan. The article is illustrated by the quaintest possible Japanese sketches running down the sides and across the bottom of each page. An excellent photograph of W. D. Howells, serves as a frontispiece, and his work as a writer of fiction is reviewed in the same number by H. H. Boyesen. The President of John Hopkins University, gives a most practical paper for parents on "Boys and Boy's schools," illustrated by cartoons of the famous Atwood. Mutual Halstead turns back lovingly to his early farm days, and tells of the Pets and Sports of a Farmer Boy. The Petroleum industry fully illustrated; An Algaean story by Archibald Forbes; the story of the Brazilian Republic by Adams, the minister of that country; and the leading Amateur of the United States in photography, are other leading articles of the month.

WOMEN'S COLUMN.

Conducted by the Ladies of the Sackville W. C. T. U. To day we give the readers of the Women's Column, a New Year's memory of more than fifty years ago, from the pen of Mother Thompson, one of the pioneer W. C. T. U. crusaders. The comparisons of former days with the present, serve to encourage all friends of the temperance, reform and to strengthen the faith of honest workers. If so much has been accomplished in the past what may we not hopefully anticipate in the spread of temperance sentiment in the days that are to come? A New Years Day Long Ago. (By Elizabeth J. Thompson.) How slow, and yet how sure, are the developments of God's eternal purposes. So I thought, as I read in the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette an account from "Washington Special," of the hospitality of the national capital on January 1, 1892, with this closing sentence: "Not so many years gone by, the bowl of eggnog was seldom if ever, omitted from the list of refreshments in every home upon hospitality bent. Yet to-day one is rarely tempted to indulge. Intoxicants of all kinds have been superceded in both official and private houses by the advent of bonbons and coffee or chocolate, as fancy may dictate or fashion ordain. Vividly there came before me a scene of the past. In Cincinnati, Ohio, fifty-three years ago, on Fourth St., near the old Longworth home, whose friendship and flowers yielded a most gracious and inspiring influence to the novelty of our new millennium, the "new" came near for the much honored observation of keeping open house on New Year's Day. At that date (1859) of the Christian era, the wine cup and eggnog bowl of liberal profligacy formed an essential and most attractive part of the entertainment. I mused on these things quietly in my own heart, and have decided to be true to my own convictions, even at the risk of being "alone in a good cause." I then novel entertainment of bolice and chocolate. First I invited Mrs. Alexander, a bright, lovable young widow to receive with me. Mrs. A. was a sister of Mrs. Lutz Anderson, Sr. and afterwards married Judge Hall, of Cincinnati. She was not a pronounced temperance woman, indeed few were at that date, but she was a sensible, good woman, and as she expressed it, "deplored the fashion of requiring of our gentleman friends the civility of so many drinks the first day of the new year." Hence my dear little bridesmaid, for such she had been, entered into my plans most cheerfully, much to my delight, and soon our party was complete to find that there was to be no opposition from the young Kentucky husband, who generously sealed his approval by presenting me with a superb sized silver coffee urn, as a New Year's gift, which, with its pioneer history, is a favorite heirloom in our family. From the dear old paternal home in the Highlands, sixty miles away, also came loving tokens of approval, and it did not seem, as that New Year's morning dawned brightly upon us, that all things were "working together for good." Many were the calls recorded on that day of new experiences, and our hearts were greatly cheered, as friend after friend, departing left with their blessing for the hot coffee, chocolate, etc. About dusk we were surprised by a call from Cincinnati's distinguished citizen Judge Burnet, accompanied by a group of young men - about eight in all - and none of them seemed more than 21 years of age. These favored youths, it appeared, were the pets of Judge Burnet, and entrusted to his care by their mother, who was his special society friend. When the pallid old judge entered the room, leaving his charge in care of Mrs. Alexander, he approached the table where I was standing near the coffee urn, and taking my hand in both of his he said: "I commend you heartily, my dear young friend, for thus bravely standing by the principles of your noble father," and casting his eyes towards the hot coffee and chocolate said, "This is just what I need to get my boys in condition to meet their dear mothers; and who is to blame?" Then, offering his arm, he said, "But let me introduce you to them;" he then graciously presented me to each one in the circle, for Mrs. Alexander knew them and their mothers well, had seated them, as she playfully remarked to Judge Burnet, "ready for a Highland coasting campaign," for my dear mother had sent me country hams, turkey, butter and even cream, for the occasion, and delicious cake in beautiful variety, made by "Aunt Parsey," the favorite cook of my childhood, who loved me only less than my mother. Hot coffee and chocolate had been faithfully served all day, and a fresh supply for the evening visitors was just brought in as our honored guest and his young friends arrived. They enjoyed it and so did we, and now, after more than half a century, can you wonder that I rejoice in the report from our Washington correspondent? - Hillsboro, Ohio.

The English Market. Below is a continued extract from the able speech made by Prof. Robertson in Ontario, and the British Market. Part of the address was given last week. BUTTER. The value of the butter imported into Great Britain in 1891 was \$56,410,414. Of that quantity Denmark furnished \$23,680,421, at the average price of 24 cents per pound. France supplied \$14,782,293 at an average price of 23.6 cents per pound, while Canada sent only \$912,307 at an average price of 18.2 cents per pound. There is an easy possibility for a very large extension of our exports of butter. The freight charges are not barriers. The rates last week from Woodstock, Ont., to Liverpool were 55 cents per 100 pounds. A shipment of 200 packages of fresh-made creamery butter has just been made from the Dominion experimental dairy stations at the English market. It is expected to realize 50 cents per cwt. the finest Danish butter. The English price of fresh made butter is always high during the winter. A responsible firm of exporters of dairy products has offered to provide quantities of the finest Danish butter to 25 cheese factories into creamery for the manufacture of butter during the winter. By the use of a centrifugal cream separator as a creamery from 16 to 30 per cent more butter can be obtained from the same milk than when it is handled in the ordinary way at the farms. A higher price will always be obtained for quality that is uniform. The winter creameries will enable us to ship \$1,000,000 of fresh made creamery butter to England annually during the winter within three years if these 25 experimental stations are the first which have ever been opened.

Of eggs Great Britain imported in the year ending December, 1891, to the value of \$23,434,829. It may be interesting to note the trend of this business. Great Britain imported in 1890 from Canada \$5,910,433 and from United States, \$16,384,248, while in 1891, she imported from Canada \$9,692,448, and from the United States, \$8,560,817. One reason for our great gain in this market is that we have improved the quality and made it nearly uniformly fine. A like success in other lines of our exports will follow from similar care here in providing the very best quality. A quantity of finest Canadian cheese is still sold at high prices retail, under the name of finest English Cheddar. We are making an effort by branding our cheese "Finest Canadian" to gain for our farmer the higher price, which presently finds a stopping place in the pocket of a crafty English shopkeeper.

EGGS. The total value of animal products, of the kind which have been enumerated in the foregoing, which were imported into Great Britain in 1881 was \$240,864,671. The total value of the exports of these same products from Canada to Great Britain in the year ending June 30, 1891, was \$19,684,238, and from Canada to Great Britain, \$1,935,441. If all our food products from animal sources were sent to Great Britain they would form only 9 per cent of her total purchases of the same commodities. A 1 that points to the possibility of sending food products from Canadian farms to the English market at a profit.

A florist says that the law governing the coloring of flowers makes a blue rose impossible. According to this law, the three colors, red, blue and yellow, never all appear in the same species of flowers; any two may exist, but never the three. Thus we have the red and yellow roses, but no blue; red and blue verbenas, but no yellow; yellow and blue in the various members of the viola family (as pansies, for instance), but no red; red and yellow gladioli, but no blue, and so on.

BAND CONCERT - The 8th Cavalry Band are perfecting arrangements for a military concert to be given in Music Hall next month. Besides the usual features introduced by the band, there will be exhibitions of sword work, fencing and the single stick exercises by the members of the band.

HOME FOR INTERMENT - The body of Robert O'Brien, son of the late Michael O'Brien, Esq., of Fort Lawrence, who died in Boston on the 30th, arrived on Tuesday evening and was interred on Wednesday afternoon in the cemetery at Amherst Point beside his parents.

MISSIONARY CONCERT - The members of the Young Peoples Society gave a most interesting concert in the New Baptist audience room on Sunday evening. The programme consisted of reading of well prepared papers and recitations giving a brief but comprehensive sketch of the Grand League Mission, together with suitable recitations and singing.

Second lecture on the musical course was delivered by Prof. W. W. Andrews on Saturday evening. Subject, Sound. The lecturer illustrated his remarks with experiments, with Syren, Singing Flame, etc., with the aid of a fine Oxy-Hydro light recently added to the Laboratory. The next lecture will be a concert on Friday 26th inst., when music of the years 1226 to 1727 inclusive will be rendered.

MR. WILSON'S - Rev. F. W. and Mrs. Harrison are recovering from their recent attack of Logripne and his friends hope to be able to see Mr. Harrison in the pulpit in the near future.

MR. WILSON'S - Mr. Frank Morioe, who has been seriously ill for some weeks past, is slowly recovering.

MR. WILSON'S - Mr. J. E. E. Dickson, general agent of the Union Assurance Society, was in town yesterday in the interests of that company.

Local Matters.

Samuel Maheson captured a black fox at Shabos the other day. Mrs. Arnold Hatfield, of Port Caville, N. S. fell on the ice at that place on Monday night, breaking her left arm. Mrs. John Kelek fell on the sidewalk at Parrsboro, N. S., last Friday evening and injured herself so badly that she has not been able to walk since. It was thought at first that her hip bone was broken, but it is now believed that no fracture had been sustained.

A correspondent from River Hebert, N. S., a week ago, reported the death by accident of Joseph Porter. On Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Prter, the widow, appeared to be sleeping as usual, but those in the house became alarmed at her sleeping so long, tried to awaken her, when it was found that she had passed away in her sleep. This makes six deaths in River Hebert in ten days.

Peter Landry, a youth of 14 was yesterday sentenced to one month's imprisonment for having maliciously stabbed another youth, Charles Cook, with a butcher's knife on the evening of Friday last. The two youths were having a snowball fight, when Landry lost his temper, went into the house, returning with the knife Landry stabbed him in the thigh, inflicting a deep wound over an inch long (Amherst Ex.).

Measles are reported to be very prevalent in some of the country districts. At Berry's Mills the school has been closed for some time past on account of the prevalence of the disease, but has now reopened again. At Lakes Mountain the school was closed down on Thursday on the same account. The disease is confined principally to the children, though some grown up people are ill with the malady. No deaths have occurred in these sections so far from this disease.

Amherst Press: R. B. Chapman, of this town, has been the recipient of a valuable and very pretty curiosity from the Christian Herald, in the shape of a piece of Olive wood, brought by Dr. Talmage from Jerusalem, and presented to the above gentleman, as a token of his personal appreciation of the kind interest he has manifested in the magazine. It is a handsome specimen of the olive wood, the grain of wood showing up very prettily.

Mrs. Alexander Stewart, the oldest resident of Amherst died there on Wednesday 10th inst. at the residence of her son-in-law, Hon. Senator Dickley. Stewart, Master of the Rolls for Nova Scotia who died 27 years ago. The funeral took place on Saturday, and was largely attended. Among her surviving descendants are: Col. C. J. Stewart and Mrs. Clarke (Colonel), Halifax; Mrs. Dickey (Senator), Amherst; Mrs. Bliss (Rev. D. M.), Westmorland. The late Mrs. Townsend, wife of Rev. Canon Townsend, was her eldest daughter.

David Leonard has just sold the schooner Elmo and James Arthur. Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm McLeod, of Gulf shore, celebrated their golden wedding this week. A set of easy chairs was presented to the aged couple by their guests, in addition to the usual presents made of the satisfied, precious metal by Thomas Jones, one of our oldest inhabitants, has passed away. Mr. Jones was a native of London, England, and was 82 years of age. Capt. Gambol, of the Salvation Army, has left Pugwash, and Capt. Rochevone is now in charge of the corps here. - (North Sydney Herald).

A travelling agent writes that he saw the body of a young man who had just buried his wife in the cemetery at Moncton from placing his motherless children in the care of a sister in another town was in company with another young gentleman from Boston, who was wearing his sister's corpse to Prince Edward Island for interment in the family burial ground at the station they saw an ominous looking box, which enclosed another coffin, and naturally went over to see whose it was. Fancy the horror of the Moncton gentleman when he discovered by the address, that it was the body of his own mother, and this was the first intimation he had of her sudden and unexpected death. 
