A. J. E. Butler Wins An International Championship

London, March 4th, 1924-At the National Partridge Wyandotte Club, which convened recentlyy at Toronto, Mr. A. J. E. Buter, of this city won the champion male prize in competition with two hundred and fifty other birds. In the contest were eleven breeders from the United States and thirty breeders from all parts of Canada. Mr. Butler's success is especially gratifying to all Canadians as it marks the first time the prize has been won by any Canadian since the inseption of the Club in 1903. He also won he bronze medal for the best colored male bird at the Exhibition. That Mr. Butler is held in the highest esteem by the members and officers of the association is shown from a letter which he received from Mr. J. F. Tallanger of Rochester, N.Y., who is general secretary of the club. Mr. Talangr, in his letter, asked Mr. Butler for articles for publication on his methods of mating, breeding, conditioning for poultry shows and so forth. Chicago, Ill., March-Municipal Judge Edgar A. Jones was saved from falling down an elevator shaft in the County Building by an unknown colored man who grabbed him by the coat as he was falling into the shaft. The rescuer slipped away without giving his name.

Judge Jones was descending in one of the elevators when the fuse blew out and the car was forced to stop between the sixth and seventh floors. To allow the Judge to alight the operator reached down and opened the sixth floor door. He then placed his stool on the sixth floor and Judge Jones climbed out. ON NEGRO LEADERSHIP (By S. Brwster, Sydney, N.S.)

What about our Negro learders? In this age of enlightenment, of graft, of selfishness, of that spirit which dominates the human mind: "I want to be up caring not who I knock down," it is interesting to watch the downfalls and the upward strides of the various leaders of the Negro race. It causes the Negro youth of intelligence to get busy assorting these leaders as though they were sifting the tares from the wheat.

The Pittsburgh American, in an article on why Race Leaders have so few followers says:-"The race of life requires pace makers as well as pace followers. We are pace-followers from habit and environment. Motion is possible without progress in any one direction. The general progress of the Negro in America in proportion to opportunities is a negligible quantity. This is due to poor leadership that fails to see and think clearly. It leads in a zig-zag way without shooting ahead at any particular goal. Present day Negro leadership is engaged in experimentation, which in actual practice is only completing another chapter of racial disappointment and hopelessness."

The American Negro is surfeited with individuals attempting to lead in the wrong direction. These leaders are trying to adjust the race to the white man's programme for the Negro. In such an adjustment they expect to find a soft spot for themselves. They want to escape the suffering and self-denial that accompany true leadership. Personal advancement is their paramount thoughtis a secondary consideration. Their method prevents the accomplishment of the thing these leaders are pretending to do. It explains why the masses of American Negroes will not follow present day leadership.


