PERILS OF THE SEA.

Fatal Accident on Board the Cir -Five Days in a Dory.

Quebec, May 28.—The Circassian experienced a very rough passage on the way out. On Tuesday, four passages—D. Valpy, of Gaspe, Que.; J. Grey, of Ottawa, Ont.; Lieut. Warden, R. N., and O. Frechette, Spanish consul, Quebec, were standing on the head of the stairs leading down to the saloon gazing out at the rough sea, when a tremendous wave struck the ship, washing her decks and knocking the four passengers down the stairs onto the floor of the saloon. All were unconscious when picked up. Mr. Valpy was fatally injured, his body being terribly bruised and his skull smashed in. He lingered a short time in an unconscious condition, and then disd and was buried at sea. Mr. Grey had his collar bone broken and was otherwise bruised. Lieut. Warden was badiy bruised about the body and face. Mr. O. Frechette escaped with only a severe shaking and some slight bruises.

FIVE DAYS IN A DORY.

HALIFAX, May 28.—The Norwegian bark Concordia, which arrived from Liverpool, brought two seamen, Spencer Decker and Eugene Bourke. They were picked up on the banks on May 19, having lost their vessel in the fog five days previously. The men belong to the American fishing schooner Nelle G. Thurston. They drifted about for days and nights without food or water. The men were attending their trawfs when the fog set in and shut them out from their vessel. After rowing about for a day in an attempt to find the vessel they decided to make the Newfoundland coast, a distance of some 200 miles. Their sufferings from thirst, hunger and cold became intense. On the fifth day out the men became very weak, their arms breaking out in sores from the continual splashing of salt spray upon them. Their feet and lips became swollen, and it looked as though their last hour had come. To their great joy a ship was seen about a mile off, which proved to be the Concordia, and that vessel bore down on them and took the men and dory on board.

New York, May 28. - Frank L. James New YORK, May 28.—Frank L. Vantas, a well-known African traveler and author and a half-brother of D. Willis James, of the firm of Phelps, Dodge & Co., of this city, was killed near the Gaboon River in Africa on April 21, by a wounded elephant. Details of the disaster were not received until Sunday when a dispatch was received from Arthur James, who was in this country, to attend his nephew's wedding, but try, to attend his nephew's wedding, but had hurried back to England to receive his

try, to attend his nephew's wedding, but had hurried back to England to receive his brother's body.

The dispatch says that Mr. James' body was pierced in front by the tusk of the enraged clephant. The wounded man knew that he was dying, but the shock to his system prevented him from feeling any pain and almost dulled his senses. He lived only 40 minutes after receiving the fatal wound. Only one member of his party was with him at the time of the accident, which happened about five miles from his yacht, at 4:34 p.m., and, by a strange fatality, on his birthday. Mr. James started from a town in Portugal about the end of January in his own yacht, the Lancashire Witch, which is an exact counterpart of Lord Brassey's Sunbeam, for a trip to Africa and South America, intending to get back to London about July 1. He had with him several old companions of his African expeditions.







Mr. Stiff was indignant at the imputation of the Free Press that the company desired in any way to coerce the employes. "We never thought of such a thing," said he. "I'll explain our action in a few words. We know well enough that the Mowat Administration has treated us fairly in contra-distinction to the other Government and on that ground, as a company, we support it. Heretofore we have held aloof from elections and have sent circulars to that effect to our agents. On this occasion I sent our two inspectors to state verbally to the agents Inspectors to state verbally to the agent that it would be to the interests of the roa that it would be to the interests of the road to have the Mowat Government sustained. Many, I believe the majority of our men, have the interest of the road at heart, but as to their being individually spoken to regarding their votes or threatened with dismissal, the idea is too absurd to find

dismissal, the idea is too absurd to find room for thought regarding it. The men will vote as they please." Mr. Larmour decidedly expressed the same opinion of the action of the railway.

The general manager of the company, Mr. Joseph Hickson, is authority for the following statement: "No man has been or will be, with my sanction, threatened with the loss of his position or punishment because of the manner in which he may vote. When a flowing spring is not available, the cooling power of the fresh water may be used more economically, if it be carried to the bottom of the tank and the warmed water be caused to run off from the top. If water be scarce, the overflow may be carried into a watering-trough for the stock of the farm.

13. Milk cans should be washed in cold or tepid water first, and then rinsed in boiling water before they are exposed to be aired. The addition of a little sada and borax to the hot water will increase its cleaning properties.




