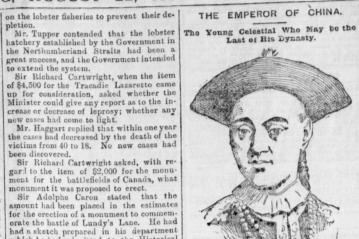



The pretense of inability of account of your new autonomy falls to the ground by your own acts. If you inten-to persist in this you must find some other to persist in this you must ind some offer excuse. Here are certain indisputable facts: You are not so helpless as you pre tend. In the face of all this weak ness and inability the confederation under the Government of Sir John Macdonald has pensioned the survivors of under the Government of Sir John Macdonald has pensioned the survivors of 1812. So it seems you are not paralyzed after all. You have pensioned these men. For what services? For defending against invasion and for fighting the battles of Chrisler's Farm, Lundy's Lane, Queenston Heights, Fort Erie and River Thames, all in Ontario. Now, why did not the Government of Sir John Macdonald apply the same argument you have mocked us with to the men of 1812? Why did not Sir John say: "Gentlemen, you are entitled and ought to be pensioned, but the trouble is you did all your fighting and service in Ontario, and the Provincial Government of Ontario is the door to knock at." He did nothing of the kind. The Confederacy pensioned them. You have furnished your own precedent. What is the difference between them and us? Only a matter of priority. 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

### TEMPERANCE JOTTINGS.

From Georgia we have the news that the Legislature of that State has just passed a stringent law to prevent drunkenness among physicians, not because they are more ad-dicted to overindulgence in liquor than other professional men, but because of the serious consequences, bit the result is other professional men, but because of the serious consequences which may result in the treatment of a case by a physician liable to drunkenness. The Georgia statute disqualifies any medical man from further practice who first once been convicted of drunkenness, and imposes a heavy penalty upon the man thus disqualified if heattempts to practice medicine again. New York has also a law on the subject. It is not as the Georgia law, and only deals with drunkenness of the doctors when engaged in the treatment of patients, and then only when the intoxication endangered the life or seriously affected the health of the patient. This is drawing it very mild so far as the physicians are concerned. It might be well for New York to adopt the Georgia law in place of the present statute, the 357th of the Penal Code. If a physician will drink intoxicating liquors, the offense of drunkenness should debar him from practice. Think of depending for a diagnosis of a critical disease upon a drunken man and receiving medicine at his hands! We should adopt the Georgia law.

A Professor Says It Don't.

A Professor Says it Don't.

According to Prof. Pammel chess or cheat
(Bromus secalinus L) is so well known that
it is hardly necessary to call attention to it.
It is especially troublesome to grain
growers. It is worshless as a forage plant,
while in "wet seasons it often takes nearly
entire possession of a field, and when at
harvest time the farmer finds chess instead of oats, he concludes that the wheat has turned to chess. This is a very erroneous idea. Wheat or any other grain cannot, under any circumstances, turn to chess or to anything eise. A wheat or oat seed will invariably, at all times and in all places, ce a plant of the same kind or nothing! The reason why chess takes possession of a field some seasons is, because either the ground is well stocked with the seed produced by plants growing the year before, or the farmer himself sowed the seed. The season proving more favorable to the chess than the grain, the fermer smothered out the latter and took possession of the field."

The Loss of Young Pigs. The profit derived from swine-breeding is dependent to a very large extent on the success achieved in rearing good farrows, and nothing is more annoying or discourag-ing when a sow has presented one with a and nothing is more annoying or discouraging when a sow has presented one with a farrow of fine youngsters than to find one or more dead each time the pen is visited. One of the chief causes of loss in this respect is incurred by the sow lying on her young, a habit often occasioned by feverishness entailed by parturition, and causing constipation, which renders her restless and ness entailed by parturitor, and cataling constipation, which renders her restless and uneasy. This is generally the result of feeding and insufficient exercise, and is more often met with in the case of sows that have been penned up and fed too highly; but, unfortunetely, this is not often from dow until too late to save the farrow.

This last cause is perhaps more annoying than any of the former ones, as, on account of its being unsuspected, a six-weeks-old pig is as apt to be sacrificed as a pig a day old.—[Mark Lahe Express.

The Price of Honey. Mrs. L. Harrison was lately asked this

Mrs. L. Harrison was lately asked this question:

"What do you consider a good price by the crate for the very best white clover honey, in one and two-pound sections?"

She replied through the Prairie Farmer:

"There has been but a light crop of honey. In many localities for several years, owing, in a measure, to long protracted droughts. During the past winter, in Peoria, choice crates of white clover honey, in pound sections, brought 20 cents per pound, and two-pound sections about the same figures per pound. There was no choice, owing to the tcarcity, seldom any being offered at all. I have seen choice white clover sections sold at retail by producers who were forcing it upon the market. Those bee-keepers who were producing honey during the war, and for a few years subsequent, can never foget the high figures then obtained, and since have been watching the decline in prices with anxiety. Honey is not a staple article, Hke butter and potatoes, and may never become one, as many families never use it at ali. A producer may create a market, and when he had educated the people to use it, and the demand has been made, another person knowing of it will bring in a large supply and undersell him, which is not obeying that good old golden rule, 'Do unto others as you would that they should do to you.'"

In filling the Silo.

In filling the silo, the excessive tramping of the past is not followed, except in extreme cases, writes John Gould to the Practical Farmer. In Ohio, tramping silage as the pits are being filled has been abandoned, as far as I can learn, except a very little along the walls to overcome the friction of the silage against the walls. Some do not practice this even to any great extent. The silage as it comes from the carrier is usually allowed to drop into the center of the pit, and is then forked about the pit by a man whose business it is to keep the silage level and the sides tramped. A far better way is to lay two scantlings across the top of the silo three feet apart, and on these lay some short boards so as to make a platform at least 31 feet square. As the reage falls

upon this table it quickly forms a pyramid, and the silage as it falls upon this is shunted to about every part of the silo and needs very little after attention; an hour during very little after attention; an hour during the day is about all the labor needed in a 16x16 foot silo. The silage will be much the highest at the walls, and this extra weight then forces down the silage about all that is needed. Sometimes the silage will not fall uniformly, and it may need a little spreading. This is a great laborsaver, and in our silos not a bushel has been lost in corners or sides in two winters with this plan of self-scattering and packing, and has saved the expense of one man, save the last day, when the nearness of the silage to the platforms did not longer give silage to the platform did not provide the falling silage a chance to scatter sufficiently. Those who practice the no-treading plan are wholly in favor of it, and it is

Color of Poultry Flesh. Color has much to do in many markets with the sale of poultry. In some of the European markets, especially Paris, white-skinned animals are preferred and meet with the readiest sale, while in most American cities, notably Chicago, yellow-skinned birds are in the lead. There is, doubtless, little or no difference in the edible qualities of the flesh, but, nevertheless, the customers imagine that there is. Though this color comes mainly from breeding (as to its lonorably disc color comes mainly from breeding (as to its immediate source, the people of the cities think it comes from the kind of food fed, hence the preference as to color. The American can imagine no more delicious food for fowls than corn and corn meal, and hence he chooses a bird that has apparhence he chooses a bird that has appar-ently been bred on that diet. In France the use of corn is not so extensive and the ideal food is oats or some white-fleshed cereal.

Gapes in Fowls.

A Frenchman who has been making an extended and thorough research into the causes of gapes in fowls, has formulated

causes of gapes in Towis, has formulated the following conclusions:

1. The cause of the disease is a small vermicular parasite (two of which, the male and female, cling together) that infests the trachea or windpipe of the young fowls.

2. The larvæ of the parasites are usually introduced into the fowl by being drank in the water though sometimes healthy chickthe water, though sometimes healthy chickthe water, though sometimes healthy chickens get them by eating the worms that are coughed up by those having them. 3. They may be prevented by putting a little salicyclic acid in the water chickens drink.

4. It may be cured by mixing garlic or onions treely in their food, or by mixing powdered asafortida and powdered gentian with it.

London, Aug. 21.—The Standard's correspondent at Braila reports an enormous increase of the Russian troops on the Austrian frontier. He says the Bessarabia frontier guards, formerly a gendarmery corps to prevent smuggling, have grown into a permanent advance guard ready to invade Austria on a few hours' notice. Large forts and other works are being rapidly built, and the Russian Government has given a heavy subsidy to the Black Sea and Danube Shipping Company to crect a large dock yard at Renia and to forward troops to any part of the Black Sea.
