With the daughters he played tennis and with the mother he talked Tennyson, the result being that no member of the British embassy was ever more welcome at the Crown Prince's palace, and when Emperor Frederick died it was Mr. Rodd whom his sorrowing widow selected to write the biography of her illustrious husband.

On the south side of the new wing bachelors' bedrooms have been built over the billiard room and bowling alleys, the upper story aflording additional accommodation for the servants. The interior of the house has been considerably redecorated. Many alterations have been made which were ungreated by the Prince of Wales. The bachlors' cottage in the grounds has been so considerably enlarged that it is practically a new house, and after the present winter it is to become the separate residence of the Duke of York.

According to present arrangements, the court will leave Windsor on either Dec. 16 or 20 for Osborne, and the Queen is to reside in the Isle of Wight for about nine weeks. The Queen has not opened Parliament since 1886, and it is said that there is not the slightest prospect of her being seen at Westminster in January next. It is claimed that there is no reason winetver why the Queen should put herself to much inconvenience in order to open Parliament, and that her strength really is not equal to the ceremonial, which is of an exceptionally prolonged and fatiguing nature. It is well known that in 1886 her Mojesty found it very trying indeed, and was unwell for several days afterwards.

It is understood that the Queen will be the guest of the Prince and Princess of Wales at Sandringham for a few days, when the memoriais of the late Duke of Clarence, which are to be placed in the parish church, will be formally dedicated.

Centralized wealth met the scattering fire of divided labor, and as a natural result labor lost in each battle. If the lessons are carefully taken to heart the sacrifices may not be in vain. NINETY MILES AN HOUR

Exciting Railroad Accident on a Mox ican Mountain.

Monteray, Mex., Nov. 17.—The particulars of one of the most remarkable and exciting railroad accidents that ever occurred in Mexico have reacted here. The catastrophe occurred three days ago on the Mexican national line, but only meager details of it were received here until to-day. The grade of the new canal road from this city for a distance of 90 miles to Saltillo is very steep, and two engines are required to get ordinary freight trains over the Sierra Maderia Mountains about Saltillo. On Sunday afternoon, as one of these double-headers was pulling a trainload of corn up the almost perpendicular mountainside, twenty miles south of Saltillo, the couplings broke, releasing the caboose and six cars filled with 3,000 bushels of corn from the train. James Martin, the conductor, and Frank Harwood, the rear brakeman, were in the caboose. They rushed out and began setting the brakes, but were powerless to stop the increasing momentum of the cars. Within a distance of six miles the train was running at a speed of 90 miles an hour. The cars began jumping the track at Buena Vista, and Martin and Harwood went down, both meeting a terrible death. Before Saltillo was reached, all of the cars with the exception of the caboose and one other had left the track. The train dispatcher at Saltillo was terror-stricken when he saw the the track. The train dispatcher as Sartillo was terror-stricken when he saw the cars pass, as he knew they were certain to erash into another double-header freight train that was putting up the mountain, twenty miles below Saltillo. He did the next best thing by having the wrecking car out. The caboose and loaded car kept to the trade. Frank Davis, the engineer of the up train, saw them coming down the mountain but too late to save himself. His freman and the crew of the second engine jumped and received but slight injuries. Davis was buried under a pile of corn and debris. Both engines were completely dismantled.



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

A FIERY MONSTER COMING.

The Comet May Appear Bigger Than Many Moons.

ALBANY, Nov. 16.—Prof. Lewis Ross, of the Dudley Observatory, finds that the comet in Andromeda, discovered by Holmes on Nov. 6, is very probably identical with Biela's periodic comet, which has not been certainly recognized since 1852. This confirms the auspicion telegraphed from Berlin by Prof. Berberich some days

go. Prof. Boss thinks there is likely to be a Prof. Boss thinks there is likely to be a very close approach between the comet and the earth on the morning of Nov. 28, in case it is Biela's comet. The Holmes comet was observed at the Dudley observatory on the night of the 13th. Assuming from the calculations then made, that on that night the comet was 13,500,000 miles from the earth, the diameter of the cutside nebulosity would be about 36,000 miles. It is probable that the comet will rapidly nebulosity would be about 36,000 miles. It is probable that the comet will rapidly grow in brightness, and that within two weeks it will appear many times larger than the full moon. The comet can now be seen through small telescopes and will be found about 2 degrees west of Mu Andromed a. Andromed æ.

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
