Montreal, April 30.-Ex-Senator Warner Miller, president of the Nicaragua Canal Company, was in the city today, his visit being in connection with his pulp mills and water power interests in the Dominion. Mr. Miller said that he anticipated a considerable boom in Canada's pulp and paper industries during the coming year. The direction which the expansion of business would take would be in trade with Great Britain rather than with the United States. The higher duties on pulp and paper imposed by the Mc-Kinley tariff would tend to throw the trade to Great Britain, even not considering the fact that the product brought a higher price there than across the border. "You have material here in Canada," said Mr. Miller, "and you have cheap water power. Both these are lacking in Great Brit-ain, and the British market is bound to prove a most valuable one. I be-lieve the industry of pulp and paper manufacture in Canada will see a wonderful expansion during the next few years, and will overshadow many in-dustries that have heretofore been looked upon as Canada's chief re-sources." Mr. Miller already owns, in conjunction with one or two other wealthy Americans, an extensive pulp



After resigning his post as Minister of War, in July, 1880, he was again recalled to that office three times in succession, for periods varying more or less in duration. The funeral of the late Edward Gort, late sergeant of the Fourth Light Dragoons and Ninth Lancers, took place here today. The deceased was buried under military honors, the volunteers turning out well, headed b Dead March. At the grave the services were conducted in full militar order. The Rev. Mr. Craig officiated. Edward Gort died of consumption at his home here on Tuesday last, aged 61 years. He was born in the parish of Dromore, county Tyrone, Ireland, and joined the Fourth Light Dragoons at Dundalk on March 17, 1852. He attended the cavalry school at Canterbury, and from there went to the Crimean war. He was in possession of medals Inkermann and Sebastopol. As bugler at Balaclava he sounded the advance in the charge of the "noble six hunmadly rushed into the face of the whole Russian army owing to a mistaken order. After the war was over soon after enlisted in the Ninth Lanc ers and left for the scene of the Indian mutiny. Here he was wounded on different occasions, and had the medals and bars bestowed upon him for both Lucknow and Delhi. The year 1860 found him in China, where he fought in the heart of several engagements and narrowly escaped with his life One day in company with another soldier he was scouting, and greatly to his surprise found himself in ambush, By making a flying jump over a ravine and mowing their way through the two scouts finally effected an egress, although their wounds were many and severe. After his exploits in Chin. he returned to India and was soldier ing there for fourteen years. Mr. Gor amply demonstrated himself tried and trusty warrior and spent 26 years of his life in the service of his country.



This City Led in the Enthusiastic Celebration of the Anniversary.

A Reminiscence of the Opening of London's First Park.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: As the 60th anniversary of the reign of her Majesty Queen Victoria approaches, many suggestions are being made as to the most appropriate form in which to celebrate the Queen's diamond jubilee. Hers has been the longest reign of any British sovereign, and the world's history records very few of greater duration. In no similar period by last year's council - Dr. Cl. T. has there been such progress made in the arts and sciences, in discovery and commerce, and in legislative reform. and the recognition of the brotherhood steel bridge. 


