"I do not know," Mr. Nutter said. 'I have not seen them. But the building will have to be built according to the building bylaws, as it would be a mistake to allow it to be built other-

"The members of the board stated that your plans do not call for a basement under the entire school," Mr. Nutter was informed.

"That is not correct, as the plans call for a basement under the entire school," he declared. "More than that, in my plans I placed the heatingroom not under the hallway, but under one of the rooms, so that the hallway would not be threatened by fire in any case. I had a cement floor placed in the room."

"The whole difficulty is this: The board will not get away from mistakes that have been perpetuated in all the schools they have built. Some of the aldermen, it was stated, do not relish the fact that the plans have been given to an outside architect, when the city has a man for that purpose.

None of them would commit himself on the matter, but it was hinted that the debentures for the school might not be issued until this matter was settled.

The board of education will insist on its choice of architect, and will maintain that the plans of Mr. Nutter were not satisfactory while those of Mr. Murray were satisfactaory. No Comparison.

"There is no comparison in the plans," said Trustee MacRobert. "Mr. Murray's plans fill the bill. Mr. Nutter's do not. That is the reason we took Mr. Murray's. There is no rea-son why we cannot do this, and we are going to do it. We did not wish to hurt Mr. Nutter's feelings or anything like that, but we laid the two sets of plans before us, and without any opposition, Mr. Murray's was chosen. The board was unanimous. Since that was the case, there was only one thing for the board to do. and we did it. It must not be forgotten that Mr. Nutter is not an official in the employ of the board. As city architect, we got him to prepare plans for us. Had they been satisfactory we would have had to pay our proportion towards his salary. As they were not satisfactory we will have to pay our own official, that's all."



How C.B.'s Resignation Leaked London Court Hearing Bears On Children Rented To Farmers in Military Expert Says Armies the Reunion of the Scattered Race.

London, April 13.-The cold procedure of an English court applied to the ques-tion of the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy that the Jews shall be restored to Zion, furnished last week one of the nost remarkable scenes in the history of urisprudence. It was made memorable chiefly by the impassioned plea, hours in ength, addressed to the bench by Israel Zangwill, who appeared without counsel o oppose the restriction of the operations of the Jewish colonial trust to Palestine. The case arose in this way: The efforts of the trust to acquire colonization rights in Palestine were made nugatory by the opposition of the Sultan of Turkey. Finding all operations in the Holy Land were mpossible, a project was initiated in 1903 for an extensive colonization in East

Africa. The Zionist Congress in 1905 opposed this and an amendment to the company's charter proposed the restricting of the field to Palestine and Asia. Only 18,400 out of the 130,000 shareholders voted, and 16,000 favored the restriction.

The minority, represented by Zangwill and others, applied to the court to refuse sanction of the restriction, on the ground that the vote was not representative of the great body of shareholders. Friedrichshafen, Germany, April 13. -The annual recurrence of the century-old labor market, in March 31which many local journals deas only a slightly disguised scribe again aroused a storm of indignation in the frontier provinces of Austria, Switzerland and Germany.

In the marketplace of Friedrichshafen between three hundred and four hundred boys and girls, from 11 to 14 years of age, whose are in the outlying districts of the Tyrol and the Voraralberg, are contracted yearly for seven months, from April 1 to the end of October, to farmers from South Bavaria, Wurtemberg and Baden.

Little consideration is given to the wishes of the children, most of them being sent into service against their will, and in order to satisfy the avarice

of their parents. The children, generally in the charge on labor market day. Here they are drawn upon the marketplace and then brought forward for inspection by a crowd of farmers, who look them over, feel and poke their limbs, meanwhile discussing loudly their physical merits and demerits.






