STEAMER FOREST CITY SOLD NO LAKE CONNECTION WITH CLEVELAND THIS SUMMER Will Bring the Line Into Toronto Samson, in his hydroplane, rose from the water and flew very high, desible to see Sir William Mackenzie rel-

Mr. R. C. Eckert, On Behalf of Syndicate Controlling the Boat, Disposed of Ship to Fort William Parties-\$30,000 Earned Last Year, But There Were No Dividends.

The steamer Forest City has been sold by Mr. R. C. Eckert, acting on behalf of the company controlling the boat, to Fort William parties, and as a result there will be no lake connection with Cleveland this summer, so far as Port Stanley is concerned. The deal was arranged by Capt. Stephens, and will be closed today. He is acting on behalf of a party of western capitalists, who will run the vessel as an excursion steamer on Lake Superior ports, and also to the Soo.

Preparations were being made by the local organization to run the Forest City this season. They had purchased the vessel during the winter, and looked forward to a big season. Men were engaged in putting it in good condition, \$700 having been spent when Captain Stephens asked Mr. Eckert to put a price on the vessel. This was

done, and in a short time the deal was consummated. The Forest City will be taken north in time for the opening of

The sale of the steamer occasioned much surprise to summerresorters and citizens generally. The moonlight excursions were always popular, and attracted large crowds to Port Stanley. The earnings of the ship for the season of 1911 were large over \$30,000 but the expenses were heavy, and as a result there were no dividends. The Forest City was sold under mortgage, but the local syndicate were of the opinion that it could be made a paying proposition. They had gone ahead with their plans when the offer of the Fort William

"We have sold the Forest City," Mr. Eckert stated to The Advertiser. "An attractive offer was made for the steamer by Fort William parties, and we closed the deal. That means there will be no excur-

sions to Cleveland this summer." The bondholders break even on the deal, but the stockholders lose

all they put into the boat.

MORE RUMORS OF BIG BANK MERGER

President Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R., Said To Be at Head of Plan.

WILL BE THIRD LARGEST

Bank of Montreal Reported About to Form an Alliance With the Royal-Traders.

While the average bank merger story assumes a somewhat fantastic view when it appears in type, there are some rumors afloat now in higher financial circles which indicate that the movement is not yet over. The genesis of all the expectations of a still larger banking consolidation is simply that the large interests in the Bank of Montreal are determined not to surrender supremacy. Two banking institutions, the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank of Canada, are so well up in the second and third positions that hey are pressing very closely upon creasing its authorized \$25,000,000, the Bank of Montreal apparently done little to keep ahead, but at a meeting of prominent members of the financial com-munity yesterday it was stated that the absorption of the Traders' Bank by the Royal Bank of Canada was only a preliminary to a further amalgamation of the merged institution with the Bank of Montreal. Among the details furnished was that the plan was being worked out by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, and that in the Sir T. Skinner. event of its successful completion the present head of the Canadian Pacific Railway would be the president of the merged bank, and Mr. Edson L. Pease (of the Royal Bank) would become

The British House of Commons, by a majority of 124, carried a bill the other day which will to some exten diminish the volume of child labor and the evils of "blind-alley" employment There are 30,000 children under 13 years of age working half-time in the textile mills of Yorkshire and Lancashire, and many thousands more in other occupations. The new law provides that no child shall leave school for any portion of the day until 13 years of age. The local education authority must be satisfied that any child under 14 is entering an occupation which will lead to permanent employment and afford useful training. The Labor members, while urging that the age for leaving school be raised from 13 to 16, supported the bill as a step forward. It is amazing to find 52 members of the House of Commons opposing so mild a reform. Sir Frederick Banbury, the Unionist member for the City of London-the business heart of the metropolis-stated the old-fashioned point of view candidly, in moving the rejection of the bill:

"A child who went the full time to school forgot things as quickly as the half-timer.
