COALITION MINISTRY FOR GERMANY UNDER PRINCE MAXIMILIAN

Socialists Are Expected To Be Included in the New Ministry -New Chancellor Outlines Program Before the Reichstag On Saturday.

London, Oct. 4.—There is little room for doubt that the solution of the German governmental crisis will be found in the shape of a coalition government under the chancellorship of Prince Maximilian of Baden. No official news on the situation has as yet reached London, but, according to German newspapers, there is a possibility that among the ministers there will be some Socialists. Prince Maximilian is a cousin of the Grand Duke of Baden, and president of the Upper Chamber of that grand duchy. He is related to the emperor by marriage and is popular at court. Although credited with democratic tendencies, it is understood that he has been recommended by Friederich von Payer, who will remain as vice-chancellor in the new government.

AMERICANS CAPTURE MONT BLANC IN ADVANCE IN CHAMPAGNE SECTOR

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—The capture of Mont Blanc and other positions in Champagne was reported today by Gen. Pershing, in his communique for Thursday, announcing further gains by the American forces fighting with the French. The communique follows:

"American troops fighting with the French have driven back the enemy and taken Mont Blanc and other positions in Champagne. Between the Moselle and the Forest of Argonne we carried out the usual artillery and patrol activity, taking a number of

FRENCH TAKE IMPORTANT POSITION.

London, Oct. 4.-French forces in the Champagne have captured Orfeuil and Bemont Chateau, northeast of Somme-Py. Mont Blanc, a position of considerable tactical importance, also has been taken from the Germans.

YANKEES GAS THE HUNS ON THE MEUSE ABOVE DANNEVOUX

With the American Forces Northwest of Verdun, Thursday, Oct. 3.—A successful gas attack was made by the Americans on this front at Vilosnes, on the Meuse, above Dannevoux. The German artillery fire was spasmodic during the day.

Many gas shells were thrown in by the enemy guns upon the American rear areas.

The American engineers have removed more than 100 buried German mines from the ground evacuated by the enemy.

BRITISH CAPTURE PRISONERS IN RAID IN ASIAGO REGION

London, Oct. 4.-Concerning British activities on the Italian mountain front, the war office today issued this statement: "Last night Warwickshire troops carried out a most successful raid into the enemy trenches facing Asiago, capturing 142 prisoners, including four officers. Our casualties were twelve."

HAIG TAKES 4,000 HUNS.

London, Oct. 4.—British forces, pursuing the retreating Germans in the Lens region, have reached the railway east of Lens, Field Marshal Haig announced in his official statement today. To the southeast, the British have made progress between Oppy and

FOE COUNTER-ATTACKS REPULSED.

London, Oct. 4.—German forces last night delivered counterattacks on Gouy and Le Catelet, midway between Cambrai and St. Quentin. Field Marshal Haig announced today that the enemy assaults had been beaten off.

The point of the British wedge in the region north of St. Quentin had been pushed at the end of yesterday's fighting to the high ground a mile northeast of Sequehart. The British are holding this ground, having repulsed a counter-attack.







UNIVERSITIES AND CITY GOVERNMENT. THE CONTRIBUTION of President Braithwaite of Western University to the first of the public meetings designed for education in citizenship was suggestive of the part which the universities of this country have it within their power to play in the bringing about of better conditions. It is a rather curious thing that while we have always looked to our medical faculties to bring about better conditions of health, and to our engineering schools for leaders in the development of our natural resources and

in the development of our natural resources and to the faculties in the humanities for our teachers and preachers, we have not as a rule thought of the departments of political science as training ground for men who are to be leaders in muncipal government and municipal administration. Dr. Braithwaite remarked on this fact, pointing out that an extension of the political science departments of Canadian universities to give the due amount of attention to municipal problems could not but have wide effect on the conditions surrounding Canadian cities.

The field of medicine has been continually advancing because of the laboratory method of investigation. Men have diligently sought out all the data bearing on some disease and then have painstakingly gone ahead to seek yet further truth, and having found the root of the disease, to find the remedy. Some process not unlike this is needed today with respect to municipal activities. All over the country there are experiments being tried. There are cities in Ontario that are following out methods that long ago over shown to be costly and useless. Chiefly because there is such an ignorance of what other cities have done and are doing, such a feeling of self-sufficiency and cocksuredness that the trouble of making investigation is passed by, and so mistakes are repeated again and again. 

of Allied successes coming in every day, people are beginning to dare to hope that those gardens of next summer won't be "war gardens," but "victory gardens" and "thrift and good habit" gardens. But to get back to the subject of a grand "clean-up" week. It is always much easier to coax than to scold the majority of humans into doing things they should do. Obviously, it is bad taste to call to the attention of London the fact that if, by any chance, it really does organize that clean-up week this year, it is just half a dozen years behind a number of western and other cities in Canada. Out in the west country the rule has been to hold the clean-up week or day, as the size of the place demands, in the early part of May. Then, every-

the year to inaugurate such a rational, common sense, thrifty campaign in Just think of the waste and the hardship of fire, and the folly of preventable fire, especially at such a time as this when all available resources of money and time and materials are required to carry on the war overseas, forward supplies to soldiers and Allied nations, and keep things running at home. The householders of London have a commendable amount of civic pride in this respect, and the backyard and vacant lot gardening fashion has done much to improve property. The person who always sees lions in the pathway says that a clean-up week can't be done here. "How are you going to manage it?" he asks, then proceeds without waiting

to find out, "It would be the old story. Some people would clean up. Some wouldn't. How would the city find out?" Just the way other cities have enforced clean-up week and "found out." A clean-up day in a certain western city is vividly recalled. It was the first Friday in May, and a holiday was declared in the afternoon to afford business people and school children a chance to take a hand in the gensral tidying up. School yards were brushed and combed, and everybody worked, from father

down. The weather favored, and gave a splendid chance to carry out the clean-The next day a grand formal inspection was made by the mayor, members of the council, the fire department, and the board of health, newspaper reporters

riding in the parade in order to tell the story. The streets in that city have narrow lots, which are a defect, and, indeed, a crime in a roomy prairie country. On the other hand, because there is seldom crime in a roomy prairie country. room beside the houses for a "right of way," a lane runs right down the middle of the block, dividing the backyards at the rear. It is an easy task to inspect backyards under such circumstance, simply drive along the lane (when it isn't too bad going), and keep turning your eyes from left to right, and from right to left, like royalty and celebrity riding in a procession), and "looking pleasant" for the admiring populace.

ment of the Canada Food Board is situated right down on the bottom floor. But this isn't any reflection on the work the educational section has done and is doing. The publicity conservation section (second floor front), has worked hand in hand with the educational section, with the result that the educational messages have gone over the top and straight home to their objectives without

waste of time in transit.

The educational section has pioneered and paved the way for new regulations; has patiently explained and filled the role of a "go-between" for the food board and the Canadian citizenship; has worked out the problems of conservation set by his majesty the food controller and his cabinet of experts; has reduced the scientific reports of the said experts to words of one syllable for the lay mind, and has gone right into people's kitchens to show people how to bake and stew and preserve in order to conserve. Want to know how to get the best results from your garden? Write and ask the educational section of the Canada Food Board. If the man who opens the mail isn't an authority on the subject, somewhere, up or down stairs in the food board building, someone is located who can tell him (or her) all about it. The "Dear Educational Section" to whom you address your correspondence, will find out all about it for you, or

tell you where you can find out. Nobody, inside or outside, of the Canada Food Board could consider the educational section unimportant. Anybody who knows anything about the quantities of literature sent out, the original manner in which commonplace themes are treated, the way demonstrations at the autumn exhibitions have been organized, in fact, anything definite at all about the workings of this department, is rather inclined to stand in overwhelming awe of it. Just to think that small, human heads, round heads, long heads, heads with bumps, peculiar or otherwise, can hold all that the people who constitute that educational section know

and can think up! After all, it seems a rather fitting thing that the educational section sh have first place right on the ground floor. Education, to an appreciable extent has been responsible for the big increase in shipments overseas in the past year of vital foods, over the average of five preceding years.

If the housewives of Canada hadn't heard the call, attuned to catch their ears, and hadn't been impressed to the extent of keeping the public eating-house regulations in their own homes, then the figures quoted from the food controller last week would undoubtedly have been far different and far less

creditable to Canada. But where is that building in which the educational section of the Canada Food Board occupies "ground floor, front"? Readers of this page have all "heard tell" that there was once upon a tim
