STORY OF HIS LIFE AS TOLD BY HIMSELF

Read Dime Novels, Ran Away From Home and Became Criminal At Fifteen.

IS READY TO DIE Declares in Signed Statement

That Detective's Murder Was Accidental.

Toronto. June 12.—Frank McCullough's life story, written by himself, and delivered to his counsel, T. C. Robinelte, K.C., describes his various activities since he left home at the age of 14 to the last days spent in the death cell at the Toronto Jail.

"I am not a murderer, nor have I the instincts of one," says the condemned man. McCullough is to die on the gallows at dawn, Friday morning, for the murder of Detective Williams.

The article reads as follows:

I was born in Otsego County. New York, on a farm within five miles of Coopertown, named after the famous author of "The Last of the Mohicans."

My parents were honest, God-fearing author of "The Last of the Mohicans."

My parents were honest, God-fearing people of good old Yankee stock, and my proper name is LeRoy Ward Fay Swart. When I was a little over Il years of age my father's home was by some accident burned to the ground, so he sold the old farm and moved to Jersey City, N. J., where he obtained work as a carpenter on the Pennsylvania Railroad. I have two sisters and a brother, all of whom are younger that myself, the oldest being at this time 22. While we were in Jersey City I attended public school until I was 13, and then we moved over to Brooklyn, N. Y., where I continued my public school education.

I enjoy reading very much, and, as most young boys of that age, read what are termed dime novels a great deal, and when I was a few months over 14 I became imbued with the glamor of the life of some of these fictitious heroes, and ran away from my home.

I had about \$10, the proceeds of a boyish stamp collection, and with it I purchased a ticket on one of the Hudson River boats to Albany, N. V. Incidentally, my people made several efforts to find me, but I did not communicate with them for a year.



Dr. C. W. Rain spouts, barrels, tin cans, pools, puddles, ponds, broken dishes, old birds' nests, anything with standling water ought to be drained. Mosquitoes will not develop if the water is completely drained off; if the water is completely drained off; if the water surface is entirely cleared of vegetation or other obstructions; if the banks are cleaned and cut down vertically, Myling a smooth margin; if an abundance of suitable fish is made available to keep down the larvae; if a complete film of oil is applied to the entire surface; if a swift flow of water is set up to carry off the larvae or prevent their feeding; or if the water is treated with an effective larvicide.

Obviously, the choice between these methods will vary according to the nature of the place and the degree of permanence desired for the results.
Old wells, cisterns and the like may often be filled to advantage, oiled or treated with chemicals. It is seldom advisable to attempt drainage. It is when we come to ponds, lakes and swamps that the real problems arise.
Oil is applied as the next best thing to drainage.

Oil may be applied in various ways. In ordinary work the spray can is the main reliance. The type generally used is some form of knapsack sprayer which can be easily carried, and that has an adjustable nozzle. The nozzle should be adjusted to throw a very fine spray, otherwise much of the oil will remain in bules instead of spreading out in a

On small streams and ditches with a fairly good current, drip cans are used to advantage. Most of those in use are constructed upon the same principle, but in details they are very diverse. A discussion of several types will be found in Le Prince and Orenstein's "Mosquito Control in Panama." As a rule, each worker introduces modifications to suit worker introduces modifications to suit his own ideas or to suit the material available. One type of can used is constructed from an ordinary five or ten gallon oil can, having a spout near the top. The screw cap of this spout is perforated, and a nail, packed around the basal end with waste, is inserted in the hole. The can is laid on its side with the shout down so that the oil drips.

Making Oil "Work."

Another type of can, reputed to be satisfactory, is composed of an ordinary oil can, to which is attached an accur ately-ground pet-cock susceptible of ac-curate adjustment. This can exhibits the same tendency as others toward getthe same tendency as others toward getting clogged up with sediment to such an extent that the flow is inhibited. All types of drip ans require inspection every few hours to insure a regular flow. As a substitute for drip cans ollsoaked waste or bags of oil-soaked sawdust are often used. These are fastened at or near the bottom of the ditch or stream at intervals varying with the at or near the bottom of the ditch or stream at intervals varying with the size and rate of flow. Oil oozing out of the waste or sawdust comes to the surface, spreads out into a flm and floats downstream. As in the case of drip cans, the amount of oil-soaked material necessary and the intervals between the stations depend upon the volume of water, etc., and must be determined for each place separately. A termined for each place separately. A little practice will indicate the proper procedure. All that is necessary is that a continuous film be produced over the

entire water surface, throughout the necessary distance and for a period of at least twelve hours once a week.

No Mandate For Germany

One of the German counter-proposals it was certain the peace conference would not accept was the request for mandatory powers over the former German colonies. The intention of the conference is that in every case the mandate shall stand only until the natives of the colony are capable of self-government and express a desire for that privilege. It is not intended that they be returned to Germany unless they so decide. Under the conditions of the league of nations agreement raving about the housing problem in London, they will be put to school, educated and trained

picture what would happen. The slightest move toward independence would be promptly and ruthlessly choked off. No local legislation that is didn't fit in with Berlin's plans would be permitted. Trade, politics, religion, would be made subservient to the aspirations of the Teuton government. Of self-determination there would be nothing. That has been Prussia's way in the past and there is nothing in her recent behavior to indicate a change of heart.

The Prussian hasn't changed. He is as cruel brutal and conscienceless as before the war and is bending the knee only because of terrific pressure. To give him the mandate over his former colonies would be to return peoples already grossly persecuted back to further barbarisms and injustice. Germany's record in colonial administration in Asia, Africa and the South Seas is stained red from unspeakable atrocities. Had the conference agreed to Germany's request its act would have aroused, and rightly the indigns.
