The Revolution.

"So came the unexpected turnover in Rusisan politics, internally and externally. The revolution came, and the people thought that at last they were not only going to be free themselves, but they were going to make an end of the human butchery so far as the whole world was concerned. world was concerned.
"What bright hopes the people at the "What bright hopes the people at the beginning of the new regime held for the re-establishment of their country! But their leaders thought they still could fool the general Russian public. That is where they made their mistake. When the general population of Russia saw how such political leaders as Lvow, Melucow and Kerensky promised at the beginning of the revolution that peace should come at any price, but still con-

should come at any price, but still continued to follow the politics of the last
regime, they rose up and placed the
reins of government in the most able
hands they "ould find—first of all, to make peace and stop further blood-shed. "Having been true to the Allies so far, and after sacrificing all that they had sacrificed for them, the Russians thought the Allies would assist them to re-establish themselves and not force them to continue the war any further. But, instead, the Allies turned upon them, and are still trying their utmost to subdue the Russians to the wishes of autocratic government, by maintaining a blockade. Unable to get food and necessities, the poor and suffering, the sick, women and children, old and young alike have perished. Expected Assistance.

alike have perished.

"What is the reason for the Allies doing this?" asks Mr. Lastar. "Is it that the Russians have betrayed the Allies? No; he reason is this: that it is a war ward by capitalistic governance of the state of ments against an innocent population which did not want to assume the obligations of their former oppressors, like the czar and the whole clique who had negotiated loans for their own private purposes.
The Reason Why.

"To get this poor, suffering popula-tion to take over the obligation, to get this pound of flesh, is why the French Government, with the assistance of the other Allies, is waging the war against Russia. During the last two years various bands of marauders have been created with the money of the Allies to destroy the government of Russia, but they have not succeeded. The govern they have not succeeded. The government is stronger than ever before, and the Allies have at last come to the conclusion that they cannot hold sympathy and friendship with this kind of politics. The Russians hope that in the near future the Allies will come to their senses and stop interfering in Russia's private affairs. The sooner the Allies do this the better for them and for the world at large.
"There is a proverb that you can fool

all the people part of the time, some of the people all the time, but that you cannot fool all the people all the time. I repeat this because certain misstate-ments directed by certain governments against the soviet government as to the against the soviet government as the dangers ensuing to the world should the soviets succeed in their policies. Thirty years ago socialism was looked upon as just as dangerous as the soviets are declared to be today. However, socialsm has come to be such a power that the whole world acknowledges and re spects to a certain extent some of the socialistic ideas.

Will Be Respected.

"In coming generations the soviet overnment will be looked upon with more respect than is even accorded to socialism today. When the world knows what the soviet government really stands for, it will be realized that it is the only solution for the complicated problem between capital and labor tooroblem between capital and labor Coday. No matter how much antagonism certain powers may create against the soviet government, in the end its policies will be accomplished even if the Russians have to endure still further opposition and hardships.

"Despite all the unrest in their countries of the strength of the contribution of the contribution of the seat with "Despite all the unrest in their country and the struggling of one sect with another, the Russians under the soviet government have passed constructive legislation that would not have been possible under the old regime for hundreds of years to come," declared Mr. Lastar, pointing to educational progress as an example.
