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# UNB MODEL PARLIAMENT POLITICOS STATE PLATFORMS

## Liberals propose scholarship plan

The Liberal party's platform reads as follows:

1. The Liberal party proposes to establish, in consultation with the provinces and working through the National Council of Canadian Universities, 2500 Canada Scholarships and 7500 Canada Bursaries for university students; and with federal capital, to establish a University Loan Fund.
2. In order to combat present unemployment, the Liberal party proposes to increase government expenditures and decrease taxation.
3. The Liberal party believes that the prime object of Canadian trade policy should be to continue to increase exports as much as possible and to widen the geographical basis of our external trade. This expansion, not diversion, of trade is the only policy compatible with sound, rapid, economic development and with increasing productivity and living standard.
4. The Liberal party believes that the effectual defense of Canada can be most practically achieved through continual adaptation of domestic defense policies and current requirements together with judicious support of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and Canadian-American defense agreements.
5. The Liberal party advocates that the present special excise tax of 7 1/2% on automobiles be abolished.
6. The Liberal party believes the New Brunswick fishermen should be brought into closer relation with the subsidies granted to other primary producers.
7. Mistresses should be deductible for income tax purposes.

### 11th Annual Held Here

The 11th Canterbury Conference of Eastern Canada, held in Fredericton last weekend with UNB Canterbury as hosts, was attended by delegates from McGill, Assumption, Western, U of T, Carleton, Dalhousie, Mt. A, and Bishop's, as well as from UNB. Rev. K. H. M. Creal, diocesan missionary from Niagara, conducted the conference along parish life lines. Two important motions: (1) that Canterbury drop the club aspect, (2) no merger with SCM: were carried unanimously, and from now on the association will be known as "Canterbury". This Sunday at 8:15 pm in Cathedral Hall, Rev. Savary will lecture to Canterbury members on his work as a Missionary in Japan.

## P.C.'s offer larger engineering grant

## Manzer - Miles off to McGill

Ron Manzer and Peter Miles have been selected by the UNB Debating Society to be our representatives at the McGill Winter Carnival Debating Conference. At McGill they will debate against such universities as Harvard, Toronto, and Columbia.

Manzer last week combined with Allison Trites, and defeated the Canadian champion St. Dunstan's team that was sent to UNB. Miles has been on the UNB Intercollegiate Debating Team for two years. The boys will leave Fredericton on Friday morning, and return on Sunday. All intercollegiate debates have now been completed for the year, with UNB coming off second best in all but the St. Dunstan's match. More experienced Mount Allison and Acadia teams took decisions from UNB.

The club will hold regular intramural debates until the end of March.

### SRC NOTES

A complete report of the SRC dances was given at the weekly meeting Wednesday evening. Out of nine dances held, the average loss was \$15.15, and the average paid attendance was ninety-eight. It was noted that only one dance showed a profit. Since the adoption of records as the source of music, the overhead has been cut considerably, but lack of attendance has negated any advantage gained.

The SRC will sponsor one more dance. The possibility of future dances being held will depend on the success of this one.

Reports from WUSC and NFCUS Regional Conferences were presented. The NFCUS delegates returned with two mandates. They were asked to investigate the possibilities of the establishment of a summer school for bilingualism, and of student weekend exchanges.

The WUSC report indicated that the organization was firmly imbedded in the Maritimes. The Council was informed that a student from Southeast Asia was presently being selected for the WUSC Scholarship.

The SRC constitution was changed to allow the chairmen of the local WUSC and NFCUS committees to be in the future elected by campus-wide elections and to sit as voting members of the SRC.

## UNB Graduate Rings

A year ago the S.R.C. contacted Henry Birk and Son concerning university rings. As a consequence the company has made up a number of samples—an all-metal man's size, and a gem-inserted ladies' model. These samples are currently on display at the Students' Centre.

The Birk Representative stated that:

1. Red and Black were difficult colours to work into jewellery;
2. Enamel work usually cracks and discolours;
3. The synthetic gem insert is  $Al_2O_3$ , the same chemical composition as a genuine ruby;
4. To have the date engraved on the rings would increase the

cost and also the delay in ordering.

The S.R.C. had several ideas concerning the samples and their distribution.

1. The rings should be available to graduates and seniors;
2. No mention of faculties should be present on the rings;
3. The rings were possibly too large and ornate;
4. The university crest should be larger and the university motto included.

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### Model Parliament

If we can draw your attention away from the Red 'n' Black Revue for a moment we would like to make particular mention of the forth-coming Model Parliament scheduled for the end of the month. This is the second successive parliament to be held at UNB for a number of years. ### Functional . . . Why Not Beautiful?

One afternoon last week we paused longer than usual in our walk from the Arts Building to the Students Centre and looked over the new residences. They are very fine and the workmen are putting them up with astonishing speed. But frankly we are appalled at their outward appearance. It is vain indeed to expect imagination in everyone, but surely one could reasonably hope that architects are among that imaginative minority.

Now, what do you suppose these particular architects had in mind when they designed our new residences? Beauty perhaps, but what happened to it? We don't pretend to know very much about building design and normally we take it pretty much as we find it. But in designing these residences, someone had a chance to improve the outward appearance of our campus which is not enhanced by such architectural monstrosities as "Memorial Hall". Instead they chose to continue, rather than interrupt, the bawdy tradition of architectural errors found all around us.

Could someone please enlighten us? We hope our readers will not do us the injustice of thinking that we are ungrateful for the money or the residence accommodation many Canadians have given us through their contributions. But if we have residences, why couldn't we have had attractive ones?

### What Do We Do?

Many students will be in a position to vote on March 31 and we hope this does not frighten them. The right to vote is our inheritance as most of us are aware; the right to vote intelligently is a heavy responsibility which can not be inherited and must not be taken lightly.

Perhaps large numbers of UNB students are unsure of both the issues at stake and of themselves. We should perhaps ask ourselves what is the best way in which to approach an election. This is not an easy task and probably we should not have begun it. At any rate, we can point out a few ways in which we should not meet it. Maybe then something a little more concrete will occur to us.

Right off we are reminded of a little story about Sir Winston Churchill. It appears that a charming young lady, at a public dinner at which Churchill was the principal guest found herself at a loss for conversation and wanting to avoid embarrassment twitted the venerable statesman with:

"In all frankness, Mr. Churchill, I don't think I approve of your politics or your cigar smoking."

"Pray don't disturb yourself madam," replied Churchill, "I don't think you'll come into contact with either of them."

Churchill could well have been speaking to a very great number of young people today, who vote for one party because they don't like the face of the other leader, or something of that sort. We should avoid ridiculous prejudice of this kind and of any other kind. How often have we suspected our colleagues of supporting one party or another because it is the fashion!

We must try to erase from our minds that all too common conviction that politicians are all crooks. Some of them probably are, as some bankers are thieves and some millionaires murderers. But surely they all aren't. This is a rather juvenile appeal, we agree, but it is necessary. Some of us believe only the worst of our elected representatives, although if this is the case why do we always elect them?

Finally, don't allow yourself to be talked into anything against your will. No good will come of it and you will only be labled a dupe.

Approach the election with an open mind. Try, in as much as it is possible, to judge the issues for yourselves, never denying someone the chance to tell you something, but always reserving judgment until you have had time to consider it. Remember that all governments rule only with your consent and this consent should not lightly be given.

### NOT CRICKET!

Only recently we heard something about the Winter Carnival which is of vital concern to each and everyone of us. We realize that the Carnival has been over for a few weeks, and it has been tidied away, both in fact and in people's minds. Yet we would be denying our responsibilities if we didn't mention it.

It is simply this. The last night of the show "Around the World in Eighty Minutes" (Saturday) about 150 people were unable to find seats and were turned away. Quite rightly too. However, they were not told that the hall was filled, the ticket taker disappeared, the doors were shut and the show opened. Left standing in the foyer were a large number of people, among them a large segment of Fredericton residents, who had to find out for themselves and leave without so much as a word from any official. This is not the courteous way. It is the irresponsible way.

The carnival is past and there is no point in laying blame on anyone in particular. However we should continually remind ourselves of the responsibility we as students have, both to our selves and to the residents of Fredericton, who contribute no little bit to the carnival.

The University of New Brunswick senior varsity men's swim team, better known in the campus sporting circles as the Beavers, are off this weekend for Montreal to compete in the Canadian Intercollegiate Telegraphic Swimming Championships. Actual competition for the Beavers will come from the swimmers of Sir George Williams College of Montreal. The two squads will clash in a dual meet, and the times of all events will be submitted to the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, which is sanctioning the national contest.

While Sir George and UNB are fighting it out in Montreal, the other top college swim teams in the nation will also be competing in various meets. Ultimately, depending on which squad has the best record, a national champ will be declared. Other universities in the competition are McGill, Western, University of Toronto, University of British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and McMaster.

The UNB aggregate which left Fredericton on Thursday evening and will return on Sunday, should be ready for their Upper-Canadian rivals. The Beavers have more than proved their competence in Maritime swim circles. For the past eleven years Coach J. L. "Amby" Legere and his boys have completely dominated the tri-province pool competitions. In these years UNB has won ten Intercollegiate crowns, two out of four Maritime Open Championships, and eight diving championships. In addition the Beavers now hold a total of eight of the twelve Maritime Intercollegiate records.

Swimming is the only varsity sport "Up the Hill" to earn national recognition. In 1957 the Beavers placed four men on the All-Canadian team, a record which compared favourably with

those of UBC, Western, McGill, and Toronto.

When the final marks were in last year, the results showed UNB had gained a fourth place in the 400-yard free style relay with its team of Tom Stephenson, Jeff Starr, Brian Arthur, and Dave Sanger. Starr, who was captain of the team in '57, placed fifth in the 100-yard free style race, while Dave Sanger, this year's captain and a Maritime record

holder, gained a fourth in the 220-yard free style.
